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Letter from the Editor


New age heroine



Her rebellion sparked a movement and set her husband on the path of being a public crusader against open defecation.

She was paired with Taapsee Pannu in the former and with Konkona Sen Sharma in the latter and formed a successful partnership with both, showing that girls needn't be rivals and can make a cracking film together. Lipstick Under My Burkha changed my life...

hev sav luck counts a lot in showbiz. While some people slog all their lives to make the cut in the industry, others zoom along on a route paved by destiny. One such person who got her first project when she wasn't looking for it is Aahana Kumra. She made her debut with Amitabh Bachchan on the small screen in the 20-episode series called Yudh in 2014. Six years from then she has done some quality work in the digital space as well as in films like Lipstick Under Mv Burkha, which changed her life both as an actor and as a person. Talking about how she landed such a prestigious project with Amitabh Bachchan she reveals, "Anurag Kashyap watched me in a play at Prithvi Theatre and cast me as Bachchan saab's daughter in Yudh. And till date, he remains my most favourite co-actor. And Yudh remains the project closest to my heart," she gushes.

There's a bounce in her voice as she recalls her first meeting with the megastar. "He had an hour-long chat with me about our characters and the history of our relationship. We shot our first scene together after that. He asked me if I had any problems with too many rehearsals. Till date, he's the first person to message me on my birthday, even before my parents and always reverts immediately whenever I text him. I follow his rules of punctuality and discipline. He doesn't take any single day on set for granted and enjoys being in front of the camera," she rattles of. One can make out she's been markedly influenced by Big B.

Aahana has done several plays, web shows, films as well as advertisements. She studied acting in Whistling Woods International and later started working as a casting assistant to Shanoo Sharma in Dharma Films. She assisted Shanoo on My Name Is Khan and realised how auditions were conducted and what was expected of an artiste once he/she walked into a casting room. She simultaneously worked

in theatre with Motley productions, Ansh Theatre group and Akvarious Productions and immersed herself into theatre completely for a few years to hone her acting skills.

Incidentally, the actress grew up away from the world of showbiz in Lucknow. Her mother is a former CBI officer and her father runs a pharmaceuticals business. She too was expected to become an IAS officer. However, things changed when she shifted to Mumbai at the age of 12. She started performing on stage in school and enrolled herself in theatre workshops while she was in college. After college, her mother had a serious conversation with her regarding her career choices. Her mom suggested she should formally learn acting if that was her intention. "Mother enrolled me in a film school despite opposition

from my father. He didn't think this was an ideal career for a young girl who could become a marketing head, a civil servant or a dentist. Dad took a long time to come to terms with my career choice but now both my parents are proud of who I am and what I have achieved." she states.

ipstick Under My Burkha directed by Alankrita Shrivastava has been the high point in her career so far. The actress played a beautician from Bhopal in it. She terms it as a life-changing experience not only as an actor but as a woman too. "The film changed my life. It opened my eyes to a world I seldom acknowledged and acquainted me with the stigmas attached to being a woman," she reveals. The film travelled to numerous film festivals globally, winning accolades everywhere. Ekta Kapoor later got associated with it and helped release the films in theatres in 2017. She has fond memories of interacting with her fellow actresses like Ratna Pathak, Konkona Sen Sharma and Plabita Borthakur while making the film and has kept in touch with them ever since. "It wasn't just a film for us, it became a movement," she asserts.

The actress was last seen in Khuda Haafiz (2020) playing a police officer. She performed some close contact action scenes in the actioner. The film made her shed her inhibitions when it comes to action and now she wants to do more action films. "I spoke Arabic in the film and did action for the first time for which I was training with action director Andy Long. We shot the film in Uzbekistan and shot the action sequences in very low temperatures which was challenging but it also boosted my confidence

that I am capable of doing more such action roles."

She insists that women are more than capable of holding their own doing action and more such roles should be written for them. She's a feminist at heart and feels more and more women should enter showbiz not only as actresses but also into different fields of filmmaking. Only then things will improve and become better for women. Says the actress, "My current set of Call Mv Agent, which is a remake of the French hit series directed by Shaad Ali, has a female DOP, Sunita and a female production designer, Anita, and we have a fairly large number of women ADs and costume stylists on set. I'd love to have more and more female writers and directors that I can work with. I'd love to see a film with 10 actresses. like an '83. Trust me, it's because there are fewer opportunities that women are always fighting with each other as opposed to men who get a hundred films on a platter. Women artistes would cut an arm and leg to get good roles and it's time we wrote those powerful stories for them."

Well said.

Duniya Laiye Mathe, in which he played multiple roles. He was included in the Limca Book of Records for his play Mohan's Masala; a monologue about Mahatma Gandhi's early years performed in three languages, English, Hindi and Gujarati on the same day.

e met his future wife television and theatre actress Bhamini Oza during one of his plays. She liked his performance, came backstage to meet him and soon they started seeing each other. They got married in 2009 and a daughter, Mirava. was born to them in 2014. He dotes on his wife and daughter and considers them his lifeline.

He landed his first Gujarati film Bey Yaar (2014). He took leave for 22 days from office to complete it. And things changed for the Gujarati film industry after that. "It became a runaway success and in a way, a cult film in Gujarat and changed things around for the Gujarati film industry. Two years later, I landed another movie called Wrong Side Raju. The movie went on to win the National Award for Best Gujarati film." At office, he was up



for promotion and that meant longer working hours. That's when he decided to let go of a secure monthly paypacket and concentrate purely on acting. "From 2016 I became a full time actor and since then I have done around ten Gujarati film and two Hindi films. In 2018 I got into talks with Hansal Mehta for Scam 1992, which finally came out this year," he explains.

Pratik read books and articles about Harshad and watched his interviews. He

wanted to get into the mindset of the character. He also put on 18 kgs as Hansal asked him to gain weight. He let loose the foodie inside him and ate everything with relish. The lockdown period proved to be a blessing for him as the shooting had gotten over, and he could use the time for working out to get back into his lean frame again. One thing Pratik wanted to avoid was to mimic Harshad. The actor says Harshad came from nowhere with nothing but dreams of making

it big. His aim was to humanise the stockbroker. who used unfair means to achieve success. "Harshad, in a way, became the embodiment of middle-class aspirations. He achieved what others only dream about all their lives." The actor reflects that it was tough not to be judgemental about Harshad Mehta. "But when the camera came on, my theatre training kicked in. We're taught in the theatre to lose ourselves in our characters on stage. That's what I did.

I give credit to my present success to my theatre days," he confesses. Pratik isn't overwhelmed by the accolades coming his way after Scam 1992. "I'm a stage actor and I understand when the audience claps after a show they're appreciating the character. So one shouldn't let the adulation get into one's head, as an actor can have off days as well and the claps can easily turn to boos," he reflects. His day was made when Shabana Azmi called him up and complimented him. "Shabanaji told me that she hasn't seen a performance like this in the last 30 years. That was a big, big compliment coming from a stalwart like her," he gushes.

He's been flooded with offers but isn't being hasty in signing on the dotted line. The most important criteria is that the role should satisfy the actor in him. "Bollywood isn't the only option for me. I'm looking at offers from across languages. Thankfully, other avenues have opened up for actors besides films. Hansal sir told me that people are going to remember my portraval of Hansal Mehta for vears. Hence, my aim is to make a home in people's memory through memorable characters."

Manish Malhotra goes down memory lane and shares anecdotes about his illustrious career







MANISH MALHOTRA LOOKS BACK AT HIS 30 WONDERFUL YEARS IN SHOW BUSINESS. AKASH NIHALANI TAKES NOTES

Manish Malhotra is a name that is synonymous with Bollywood fashion. The designer started his journey at the movies back in 1989 with *Swarg*. Thirty years down the line and Manish is the ultimate poster boy for showbiz fashion. He's created some iconic outfits over the years. And has made friends with half of Bollywood — the half that matters, that is... As Manish completes a milestone in his career, we chat with the designer and learn a little more about his memorable journey down the years. Excerpts...



Your journey as a designer in Bollywood began in 1989 with Juhi Chawla in Swarg. Tell us something about how that came about.

I was modelling at that time and had also started working in boutiques. I really enjoyed my time there as I was amongst clothes, I was sketching, I was dressing up the mannequin and all of that, Island magazine had just started their design fraternity, NIFT had just opened and they had done a thing about young designers. I was on the cover of the *Island* magazine. Then, I kind of ended up keeping two tailors at home. My cousin Laali, who is married to David Dhawan, was going to Hong Kong and she needed a few clothes for an exhibition. I showed her my sketches and she really liked them. I ended up making those clothes for her. Laali told David about me. They had to rush to shoot a schedule which was for the last song of Swarg in 1989. That's how I ended up doing three costumes for the film. I remember going helter-skelter at the time. I was constantly running around.

I picked up two costumes, changed them around, made one costume. And then, David ji gave me another film which was supposed to be Divya Bharti's launch film with Govinda but it got shelved later. Then I went on to do *Lootere* and all those films.

From Lootere (1990) to Student Of The Year 2 (2019), Bollywood fashion has come a long way. What do you think has influenced the industry through these years?

In my opinion, cinema is always changing. There are younger and younger actors, directors, writers coming in. They've changed the whole medium of storytelling and with that change, the look of a film has changed as well. Actually, I've really enjoyed my journey of 30 years. I don't even know when these vears passed by. There has been so much work, travel, friendships, relationships, success, celebrations, stress, handwork... all of it. It is something that I'm emotional about as it is a major chunk of my life.

At what point did your interest in fashion begin?

As far as I can remember, it was at the age of six... I was always interested in fashion, music, films, dance, costumes, heroines... My mother had hired a tuition teacher for me at the age of five, because she wanted me to be a good student, which of course I never was. She tells me I'd tell the teacher that her outfit wasn't good or her sandals were not matching her outfit.


What does Bollywood fashion mean to you?

stories. From the style, richness and grandeur one saw in Raj Kapoor's films, the complete artistic viewpoint of Guru Dutt to Yash Chopra's dreamy, rich world, everything has been such a strong influence. On screen, she's fighting patriarchy with her powerful roles, on social media she's making the right noises for conserving the environment. Over our zoom call, I also meet the young, simple girl who loves doing make-up and likes to look good at all times. Clearly, there's more to Bhumi Pednekar than meets the eye. "You know because of the roles that I do... I don't get to glam up in my films. But in real life I'm so away from those roles or those characters that I play, I take out all my frustration on myself when I'm not in front of the camera. I love playing dress-up," chuckles the actress. One wouldn't have known that she's as fond of make-up kits as she's of method acting. The stark contrast between Bhumi's on-screen and off-screen personalities makes her more real than most. Her candid replies make you aware she's actually woke and not pretending to be so. Her relatability is her USP and the more you learn of her inspiring journey, the more your respect grows. Bhumi started off on a strong note with Dum Laga Ke Haisha (2015), then went from one high to another in her career and five years later she's reached that point where author-backed roles are being written for her. 2020 started off on a high as she received the Filmfare Award for Best Actress (Critics) for Saand Ki Aankh, along with Taapsee Pannu. And she's closing the year with the spectacle called Durgamati, her first project where she's the solo lead. The candid, witty, compassionate actress talks nineteen-to-the-dozen about making her way in a man's world, surviving the lockdown, becoming a warrior for environmental issues and losing her heart to showbiz — that kind of explains the lack of a special someone in her life... Excerpts...

This year has also given us a lot of time to sit back and introspect. What are the biggest learnings you've had this year?

The biggest learning I've had this year definitely has to be that we give ourselves too much importance. We all feel like we are invincible and that nothing can affect us. And that we are above everything else, well, we are not. I think the Universe has given all of us a tight slap and taught us a big lesson that don't mess with the basic running of the world. The year helped me become a humbler human being. Also since I spent so much time with my family, on a lighter note, I feel I've relearnt a lot of things about my sister and my mother and a lot of things about myself as well. Things that I thought I'm not capable of doing like cooking... I'd thought oh my God I'd never be able to cook... you get so busy with your career that you start feeling that if you ever



have to stay home and do the household work. will you be able to manage? But I managed it really well. As I said, I learnt a lot about my sister's work. Her law world was completely unknown to me. I have a newfound respect for her because I've always looked at her as just my younger sister. For the first time, I saw her as a professional and realised the amount of work she puts into it. I learnt a lot from my mum as well. My mum writes and we discussed it a lot. I walked down our family history. I learnt so much about my grandparents and my uncles and aunts. Like this time was tough, but it's a period that I'm going to miss and I'm going to hold close to my heart. I'm already getting withdrawal symptoms. As much as I want to go shoot, nothing takes away from that, I'm already having withdrawals that I'm not going to have this for a long time again.

the most hard-hitting moments not just for me but for Sushant's fans as well. And for so many people across the spectrum who'd worked with him. That was definitely one of the toughest moments for me. Apart from that, there are so many families I know, who've lost their loved ones, This time is such that you've only been hearing about heartbreaking, brutal things that are happening around. People are losing their jobs... But there've been some good moments too. I have a couple of friends who've become parents. Also, we're seeing some positive change in the way people are looking at things. The work I've been doing with the Climate Warrior campaign or with Abhyudaya Ashram is giving me immense joy. Durgamati is your first project where you're the solo lead. What are your expectations from the film?

Tons and tons! My expectations are extremely high. It's the first time I'm helming a project. The film already has a successful Telugu version which is called Bhaagamathie. And Anushka Shetty had done a fantastic job in it. I have a lot of responsibility where this film is concerned. Also, the names connected to the film. be it Akshay sir (Akshay Kumar), Abundantia, Amazon, all of them have a lot of credibility so I have to make sure that my hard work pays off. The film's a genre breaker, to be honest. I have not seen myself do the things I'm doing in the film. There's a lot of hard work that has gone into the film, it's a conspiracy thriller, with a horror story. I enjoyed making the film because it's a family entertainer. It's not one of those horror films that you can't watch. I'm nervous too.

Durgamati was meant to release in theatres but then the world changed. How did you react when you came to know it's going to have a direct-to-digital release?

I'm going to be honest.



I'm a consumer of the OTT platform. So I love all our OTT platforms. There's path-breaking work happening on these platforms. But being a film actor. someone who is so used to seeing her films release on the big screen and someone who loves the theatre-viewing experience, I had mixed feelings. I wasn't sure, especially for a film like Durgamati because it is a spectacle. The film is extremely larger than life. Once you see the film, you'll understand that it's an experience. So I was a little confused. I've already had Dolly Kitty Aur Woh Chamakte Sitare that came out on a similar platform. The love that the film got was amazing. And that experience taught me that if you have a good film, it doesn't matter what medium people watch it on. I'm glad that at least my film is reaching people in the same timeline that it was supposed to reach people earlier. I feel that films do get stale. Every film has a shelf life and you need to enjoy it then. We all move on with our lives, I'm going to start shooting my next

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film in January. There is a certain amount of relevance and also the business needs to keep rolling. Besides, the kind of reach all our OTT platforms have is immense.

You worked with Akshay Kumar in *Toilet: Ek Prem* Katha but this time he's not acting with you. How is he as a producer?

I would say he's more

hands-on as a producer than he's as an co-actor. He's someone I keep learning from. I've always maintained that he has had the biggest influence in my career and in my life. I was fortunate that I did the film Toilet... with him so early in my career, so I learnt many things, professionalism, punctuality, mutual respect for everyone around, being happy, hard work.... When I saw him take on the hat of a producer or a presenter, I realised that he is as involved. Be it the script sessions that we had, the postproduction work that went into the film. he was constantly checking with me when we were shooting or with the director. He was completely up to date with whatever was happening on the set. And he has four films in a year. I was like how do you make time, how is it possible? I don't know, he just has superhuman strength. I did not expect this level of knowledge and investment from him as he is so busy, but he surprised me.



In your next project Badhaai Do, you're teaming up with Rajkummar Rao for the first time. How excited are you collaborating with him and secondly are you going to miss one of your favourite co-stars Ayushmann Khurrana who was part of Badhaai Ho? I'm definitely going to miss Ayushmann. I think the chemistry that AK and I have is cracking. It just happens. You know whenever we speak to each other we're constantly telling each

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other that we haven't found that comfort elsewhere, even though I have had the opportunity to work with some amazing co-stars. But me and Ayushmann, there is something special about what we do. And coming back to Rajkummar, he's one of my favourite Indian actors. I thoroughly love his work. I'm nervous that I really have to up my game. He's so good with comedy. I've met Rajkummar a couple of times in a professional space for Badhaai Do. He is such a nice guy, so sweet, so secure about his craft, that is something I really appreciate in a co-actor.

Tell us about the time you decided to become a climate warrior...



TABU TALKS TO ANALITA SETH ABOUT HER OTT EXPERIENCE

Starting her career with the over-the-top commercial fare, making her presence felt there, then achieving glory in serious cinema to 30 years later, carving a new niche in the OTT arena with A Suitable Boy; Tabu has done all that and more. She has reunited with Mira Nair once again after The Namesake (2006). The intervening 14 years didn't prove detrimental to their camaraderie. It's as if they never stopped working together. Tabu has a way of making each role her own and watching her in A Suitable Boy, it feels like she was born to play Saeeda Bai. She worked with Shahid Kapoor in Haider (2014) and six years later finds herself working with his younger brother Ishaan Khatter, whom she finds a bundle of energy. She talks about old bonds and new in this candid chat. Excerpts...

You worked with Mira Nair after fourteen long years. How was it reuniting with her for A Suitable Boy?

Fate brought Mira and me together after 14 long years, after our muchloved project, *Namesake*. *A Suitably Boy* has been well received both in the UK and in India. I always





jokingly tell her that we are a 'hit pair'. Mira and I have a special bond. Her being the person she is, it is easy to just pick up from where we left off. There is something so strongly unchanging about her that it feels dependable. It took me two years from the time she offered me the role to me agreeing to do it. But once that was done, it was exciting from the word 'go'. Because I know a role that Mira offers me will most definitely suit me and will be something we will enjoy working on together. Plus, Saeeda Bai was so starkly different from Ashima (my character in Namesake), that it was interesting to try it with the same director.

From the *Namesake* to *A Suitable Boy,* how much have you and Mira Nair changed?

As I mentioned earlier, Mira is so easy-going and dependable, it is always a pleasure to work with her. Mira hasn't changed at all. Yes, she has become more of who she was and has honed her skills. very inspiring, she can fuel you to take action. That's what I love about her. She also has some strong connections that she's made over the years. I always tell her that she has a film family that has been consistent for more than 30 years... Actors and crew members that she regularly works with. I think that is one of her greatest strength. Three generations of the same families have worked with her, which is amazing.

How do you look at your character. Saeeda Bai?

She's a courtesan, surrounded by a rich culture specific to that time -- beauty, music, poetry. But she's also someone who is familiar with politics and the establishment. Confined



anyone else in the cast. The whole family of actors was a mad, happy bunch and it was such a fun experience. The whole bunch - Ishaan. Viiav Varma, Manoi Pahwa, Tanya, Rasika, Shahana and everyone else — is extremely talented. I am glad I got the opportunity to work with them. Shooting in Lucknow was an amazing experience, it was my first time in the city. Mira likes to make the shooting experience fun and celebratory for everyone, which added to the joy.

Are there any significant differences in the book and the series according to you?

I haven't read the book. However, I remember when the book was published in 1993, people were so impressed. There were praises all around

What is your favourite thing about the series?



He'll soon be seen in Bhuj: Pride Of India, where he plays a military officer. Sharad will also be making his acting debut down South. He's been taking it slow and steady so far and says he likes it that way. Excerpts from a candid interview with the unconventional sex symbol...

We've been spotting you at dubbing studios. What kind of safety measures are being followed?

I've been to the studio only about five-six times for dubbing for some film or web series. But it was important to follow the protocol, wear a mask, sanitise and cover yourself. You need to monitor vourself and others, and the Aarogva Setu app helped in that sense. The studios are also taking precautions. There are some that have complete protection shield inside the studio. It's a German technology. They were extra cautious and it was all for everyone's benefit. I was taking proper precautions and thankfully nothing happened. God has been kind.

How much did the coronavirus pandemic affect you on a personal level? How did you spend the lockdown period?

I am a workaholic. I'm used to going out every day, working back-toback without taking

breaks. This year was looking quite busy. I was about to start working on three films from August onwards but then everything came to a standstill. So it was a bit of a rude shock for me. Being at home all the time was affecting me. But the pandemic taught me to do things that I missed doing in the last many years. like spending time with my family. I got to spend a lot of time with my daughter (Kesha Kelkar), wife (Keerti Gaekwad Kelkar) and with my mother. I helped my wife and mother in their household chores and even dabbled in the kitchen. I helped my daughter with her studies. While the initial days were tough, as it took time to come to terms with the pandemic, things eased out eventually.

Are you a strict father? What are your dos and don'ts for your daughter?

I'm not a strict dad at all. My wife always says that I'm spoiling our daughter. (Laughs)

My daughter is only six but I show her movies like The Avengers. I want to be a close friend and a confidant to my daughter. I want to be her best friend alwavs.

What's your favourite from among the OTT content vou saw during the lockdown?

I'm not a bingewatcher, but there are a few things I really enjoyed watching. One is Scam 1992. Pratik (Gandhi) is a dear friend and it's great to see one of your friends do so well. It's a great series by Hansal Mehta. I also enjoyed watching The Boys on Amazon Prime. It's a unique subject and it's been shot brilliantly. I also enjoyed watching Lootcase on Hotstar. There's no 'best' time to be an actor. You can become an actor any time if you have the passion, courage and a will to learn. There's no age or time for that. If you have it in you, have the patience and if you can learn the skill, you can become an actor anytime.

to every platform. The medium is irrelevant.

You have the knack of picking powerful roles. Even if they are small in length, they still make an impact. Ram Leela and The Family Man are two examples. What are the factors that help you zero in your choices?

I've been lucky to choose the right things. But you need to be patient to analyse what you want to do. For me, the quality of the role is more important than the length. So there are many parameters. The character I play is most important, money comes last.

Would you love to do an all out-and-out commercial lead role? Do you see yourself doing that in films or on OTT in future?

I'd love to do an outand-out commercial lead role; everyone dreams of it. But I'll be selective about it. I won't jump on anything and everything. I'm an actor and I should be able to do all kinds of roles. I'm learning and I'd love to be part of such a project.

Name one film or role you've done which satisfied you the most?

I cannot name one film, as all the films I've done are special THE PANDEMIC **TAUGHT ME TO DO THINGS** THAT I MISSED **DOING IN THE LAST MANY** YEARS, LIKE SPENDING TIME WITH MY **FAMILY. One iconic role you wish you can replicate?

The Hindi film industry is so vast


industry but have made it big. On the other hand, there are many actors who are from the film fraternity but they haven't clicked. The audience makes the stars, not the industry.






HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PROPOSED UP FILM CITY

The proposed Film City in UP is being hyped as a multi-level studio on the lines of Hollywood's Paramount Studios and UK's Pinewood Studios. The Yamuna Expressway Industrial Development Authority (YEIDA) has earmarked 1,000 acres in Gautam Budh Nagar for the proposed Film City. The anticipated setup will have indoor and outdoor shooting areas. The idea is to create sets of villages, forts, historical places and urban and rural environments from India and abroad. The setup will also have dedicated blue screen and green screen areas, pre and post-production labs, SFX studios, an animation studio and a dedicated data centre. The aim is to provide a comprehensive filmmaking experience – a film unit can enter with just the cast and crew and return with a finished product. To facilitate that, there will be five-star, three- star and budget hotels erected on the premises. The proposed site is 50 kilometres away from the national capital and five kilometres from Jewar, where the construction of the country's biggest international airport with an aviation hub is underway. Later on, the Film City would have a film school, a film museum and entertainment rides, which would be on par with those offered by the Universal Studios. Filmfare conducted a virtual panel discussion on Film Destination UP and the Proposed Film City, where stalwarts like directors Rajiv Menon, Nikkhil Advani, Amit Sharma, Amar Kaushik, Neeraj Ghaywan, Aniruddha Roy Chowdhury, actor Malvika Mohanan and Aparna Purohit, head Amazon India Originals, participated. Presenting some of the highlights of the proposed film city, interspersed with thoughts of the esteemed panellists.





UNDERWATER STAGE

The water stage will be equipped to handle every kind of underwater coverage. The studio will have fool-proof tanks for shooting submerged scenes. The water will be filtered using ultraviolet rays. A comfortable temperature of 30 degrees will be maintained throughout. Specialised underwater lights, supply lines and camera set-ups will be provided.

The studio will have permanent sets replicating real-life locations including an airport, railway station, mandir, court, chawl, school, hospital... There are plans to provide mock-ups of aeroplanes and railway carriages too.

Multiple post-production facilities will be provided to filmmakers. These include cutting-edge technology for sound design, sound editing and sound effects, SFX labs, DI labs, recording rooms, dubbing rooms etc. Once again, the idea is to cater to every need of the filmmaker under one roof.

every department. Hence, five-five-star accommodations, threestar accommodations and budget hotel facilities will be provided to the visiting units. A 24-hour cafeteria and catering service will take care of the meals of the crew. A clubhouse with a world-class gym and pool is also proposed so that the artistes can both exercise and relax. Green-rooms, make-up rooms, dressing rooms, storage areas for props and costumes and other sundry equipment will be provided as well. Multilevel parking is also in the pipeline.

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

The proposed studio is centrally located and will be well-connected to Delhi and other parts of UP by rail and road. The international airport in Delhi is nearby and an international airport, said to be the biggest in India, is being built at Jewar. A Knowledge Park is being planned to provide roundthe-clock technical support and data to filmmakers.

Summing up, the proposed **UP Film City promises** the strengths of both the traditional studios and their modern counterparts. It aims to make Uttar Pradesh a shooting centre for Indian filmmakers and international teams. It intends to provide topof-the-line services to big-budget producers and small and medium budget banners too.



oumitra Chatteriee was born in Sealdah, West Bengal on January 19, 1935. His grandfather and father both were associated with theatre. Soumitra too joined theatre while still in school and started getting accolades for his work from a verv early age. Soumitra graduated from the City College, Kolkata with honours in Bengali literature and later did his post graduation in the same subject from the University of Calcutta. He joined the famous theatre personality, Ahindra Choudhury, while still a student. The doyen of Bengali drama, Sisir Bhaduri, was also one of his mentors. After college, he briefly worked as an insurance agent and then joined All India Radio as an announcer and also started looking for work in films. After two decades in films, he returned to theatre, his first love, in 1978, with his production Naam Jiban. His other noted plays include Rajkumar (1982), Phera (1987), Nilkantha (1988), Ghatak Biday (1990). Tiktiki (1995), an adaptation of Sleuth, Nyaymurti (1996), and Homa Pakhi (2006). Besides acting, he also wrote

and directed plays and was an avid translator as well. He also took to performance poetry in his later years. His swan song in the theatre was *Raja Lear* directed by Suman Mukhopadhyay, a play based on *King Lear* by William Shakespeare.

His claim to fame lay in his long and fruitful association with that giant of Indian cinema. Satyajit Ray. The duo worked in some 14 films together. He had the honour of making his debut in the third part of Ray's most famous work — The Apu trilogy. In *Apur Sansar* (1959), he played a voung writer dealing with the travails of a newly-wedded life. His sensitive performance won



him accolades and admirers worldwide. Soumitra also brought to life that masterful creation of Ray, the detective Feluda. Ray's stories revolving around the adventures of this Indian Sherlock

Holmes were a rage and Soumitra captured the nuances brilliantly in films like *Sonar Kella* (1974) and *Joi Baba Felunath* (1979). His other notable films with Ray include *Devi* (1960), *Teen*

Kanya (1961) and *Charulata* (1964).


He didn't just restrict himself to his mentor but worked with other notables of Bengal cinema too. One remembers him for the natural ease he displayed in Mrinal Sen's Akash Kusum (1965) and In Tapan Sinha's Jhinder Bondi (1961), an adaptation of The Prisoner Of Zenda, where he incidentally played a villain opposite Uttam Kumar. The duo were portrayed as rivals by the press but were friends in real life and maintained cordial relations throughout.

Entering the 1980s and 1990s, he started working with contemporary directors, like Goutam Ghose, Aparna Sen, Anjan

Das and Rituparno Ghosh and even acted on television. In 1986, he played the role of a swimming coach in the film Kony (1986) directed by Saroj Dev, a role that came to be much admired by all. Soumitra didn't lose his command over acting to age. The new directors in Bengali films recognised that and wrote roles keeping him in mind. His famous films during his latter years include Asukh (1999), directed by

Rituparno Ghosh, Shadows Of Time (2004), directed by Florian Gallenberger, Paanch Adhvav (2012) directed by Pratim D Gupta, Hemlock Society (2012) directed by Sijit Mukherji, Rupkatha Nov (2013), directed by Atanu Ghosh, Shunyo Awnko (2013) directed by Goutam Ghose, Bela Seshe (2015) directed by Nandita Roy and Shiboprosad Mukherjee, Posto (2017), directed by Nandita Roy and Shiboprosad

Best films of SOUMITRA CHATTERJEE

APUR SANSAR (1959)

DIRECTOR: Satyajit Ray

CAST: Soumitra Chatterjee, Sharmila Tagore, Alok Chakravarty, Swapan Mukherjee

The film marked the debut of Soumitra into films and what a debut it turned out to be. Apurba Kumar Roy "Apu" (Soumitra



Chatterjee) is an unemployed graduate living in Kolkata. He accompanies a friend to the latter's ancestral village for the marriage of his friend's cousin Aparna (Sharmila Tagore). On seeing that the prospective groom has a mental disorder, the bride's mother breaks off the marriage. Apu is forced by the villagers to marry Aparna and after initial reluctance, he agrees. Both he and she are in marital bliss despite living in poverty. Their happiness is cut short when Aparna dies giving birth to their son Kajal. Apu blames Kajal for his mother's death and is inconsolable. He leaves the newborn with his maternal grandparents and becomes a sort of recluse, travelling to different parts of India. Later, he comes to his senses and takes the responsibility of Kajal once more, his heart full of hope about starting life afresh with his young son in Kolkata.

JHINDER BONDI (1961)

This reportedly was a retelling of *The*Prisoner Of Zenda. It marked the beginning

of the Uttam-Soumitra pairing on screen. Both the actors, portrayed as rivals by the press, enjoyed squaring off each other in films. Soumitra played the role of Mayurvahan, an antagonist against Uttam Kumar's Shankar Singh. That Soumitra would essay a negative role was met with apprehension as it was outside his comfort zone. He, however, made his naysayers take back their words and gave the performance of a lifetime.

It's said that Martin Scorcese based his *Taxi Driver* (1976) on Narsingh's character.



The film is based on the novella *Nastanirh* (The Broken Nest) by Rabindranath Tagore. Some say it's Ray's crowning achievement.



It's famous for its feminist overtones, its 'female gaze'. Till then, the female desire wasn't overtly expressed in cinema. But Ray brought it out in the open and got a conversation started about it. The film revolves around Charulata "Charu" (Madhabi Mukherjee), the intelligent and beautiful wife of Bhupati (Sailen Mukherjee). Bhupati is an intellectual lost in his own world. His younger cousin Amal (Soumitra Chatterjee), is a budding writer. Being of the same age group as Charu, they both instantly connect. She's attracted to him and he's also drawn to her but societal norms prohibit him making his interest known to her. Guilt-ridden, he leaves abroad to study. A distraught Charu is caught mourning for him by her husband. The last scene of the film though, hints towards a rapprochement.

AKASH KUSUM (1965)

The film was a bitter-sweet comedy woven around middle-class aspirations. Soumitra plays a middle-class man who is smitten by a



rich girl played by Aparna Sen. He wants to woo her despite knowing she's way above his league. He has a rich friend who owns a posh flat and a fancy car. He makes use of his friend's riches to pursue the girl. He keeps saying one lie after the other, leading to one comical situation after the other. One day, he's exposed and the girl's father asks him to leave the girl alone. The film was remade in Hindi as *Manzil* (1979) by Basu Chatterjee and starred Amitabh Bachchan and Moushumi Chatterjee.

e was having health issues since some time and was reportedly suffering from chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). The veteran tested positive for the novel coronavirus on October 6, following which he was admitted to Bellevue Nursing Home in Kolkata.

On October 9. Soumitra Chatterjee was moved to the ICU and put on oxvgen support after his health worsened. He was later put on BiPap ventilation. His condition worsened on October 25 and was put on life support. According to the doctors, his key problem was Covid-19 encephalopathy. He stopped responding to treatment later and passed away on November 15, 2020

He's survived by his daughter Poulami Bose, who learnt acting under Utpal Dutt and is an active theatre worker and is the artistic director of her group Mukhomukhi.


