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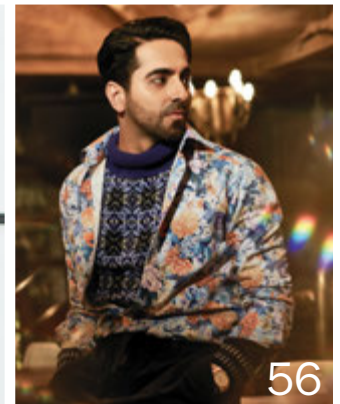
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Letter from the Editor

A fulfilled life...

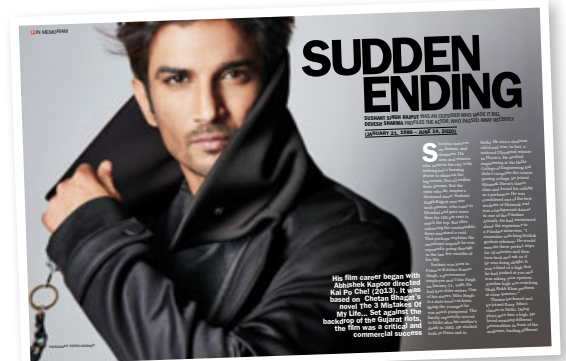
Those whom the gods love, die young. Or so we tell ourselves to stave off the flood of sorrow waiting to engulf us. Sushant Singh Rajput's untimely death came as a shock to the system. For some time, I was too numb to think, to speak. I kept thinking it was a hoax. That any minute a disclaimer would appear saying that it was a goof-up. Even the gory photos of his mortal remains didn't help. As they were too gruesome for the mind to comprehend. Slowly, as I read message after message on social media and attended call after call asking me about the incident, the news sank in. Sushant really was dead.

Subconsciously, memories of our meetings began to play in the theatre of my mind. I remembered our first meeting, when he had come over to the Filmfare office. He was full of energy, excited over his first film project. We chatted nineteen to the dozen about everything on earth. I realised he was vastly well-read. That his only interest wasn't just films or acting. That he believed in a world beyond filmmaking. Not that he was disinterested in films. On the contrary, he displayed a childlike curiosity about the subject. He wanted to know everything. And pumped me for some anecdotes regarding legends.

We developed a friendship of sorts over the phone and over social media. He would message me enthusiastically about the various things that were happening in life. Likewise, I was astonished to learn he had invested in a high-quality telescope. He reportedly even carted it to the outdoor shoot of Sonchiriya as the remote area would give him better access to the stars. I have yet to meet an actor, who had such diverse interests as him.

He was said to be crazily excited about Chanda Mama Door Ke, where he was to play an astronaut. It was to take him closer to NASA. He reportedly sponsored the trip of two school children to NASA to help them realise their dream. That project sadly couldn't lift off. Shekhar Kapur's ambitious project, Paani, failed to materialise either. He took all these setbacks in his stride, counting them as learning experiences.

There has been enough speculation about why he took his own life. There's no point in going there as we would never know. The mind is a complex thing. One doesn't know what triggers people to take extreme steps. I always saw him as a sweet, positive, full of life person. Always, cheerful, always inquisitive. And that's how I'll remember him.

SUDDEN ENDING

SUSHANT SINGH RAJPUT WAS AN OUTSIDER WHO MADE IT BIG. DEVESH SHARMA PROFILES THE ACTOR, WHO PASSED AWAY RECENTLY

(JANUARY 21, 1986 – JUNE 14, 2020)

His film career began with Abhishek Kapoor directed Kai Po Che! (2013). It was based on Chetan Bhagat's novel The 3 Mistakes Of My Life... Set against the backdrop of the Gujarat riots, the film was a critical and commercial success

Showbiz survives on dreams, and dreamers. On men and women who come to the city with nothing but a burning desire to shine on the big screen. Not all realise their dreams. But the ones who do, inspire a thousand more. Sushant Singh Rajput was one such person, who came to Mumbai and gave more than his 100 per cent to reach the top. But after achieving the unattainable, there remained a void. That perhaps explains the emotional anguish he was reportedly going through in the last few months of his life.

Sushant was born in Patna to Krishna Kumar Singh, a government employee and Usha Singh on January 21, 1986. He had four elder sisters. One of his sisters, Mitu Singh, is a state-level cricketer. Being the youngest he was much pampered. The family reportedly moved to Delhi after his mother's death in 2002. He studied both in Patna and in

Delhi. He was a studious child and was, in fact, a national Olympiad winner in Physics. He studied engineering at the Delhi College of Engineering but didn't complete the course. During college, he joined Shiamak Davar's dance class and found his calling as a performer. He was considered one of the best students of Shiamak and was a background dancer in one of the Filmfare Awards. He had reminisced about the experience in a Filmfare interview, "I remember watching Hrithik Roshan rehearse. He would execute these perfect steps for 10 minutes and then turn back and ask us if he was doing alright. It was a kind of a high that he had looked at you and was asking your opinion. Another high was watching Shah Rukh Khan perform at close quarters."

Theatre beckoned and he joined Barry John's classes in Delhi. Doing plays gave him a high. He loved enacting different personalities in front of the audience, leading different

lives. He joined Nadira Babbar's troupe Ekjute when he came to Mumbai and loved doing theatre in the city as well. He broke into the ad-circuit and began doing commercials. Soon, he was getting TV offers. His first stint came with Balaji's Kis Desh Mein Hai Meraa Dil. His popularity in the show, won him a lead role in Balaji's Pavitra Rishta in 2009. The show became a gamechanger of sorts. Ankita Lokhande's and his popularity knew no bounds. The two leads of the show were said to be in a relationship from 2010 onwards. It kept strong even when he left the show in 2011 to pursue a career in films. Their break-up was reported by the papers in 2016. This is what he said about his break-up in one of his interviews to Filmfare, "Everything you know changes one morning... two people who are close sometimes grow apart. It's sad but there's nothing you can do about it..." He was later linked to Kriti Sanon and was currently said to be dating Rhea Chakraborty.

He also participated in the dance reality show Zara Nachke Dikha 2 in 2010. He was extremely close to his mother, who had passed away in 2002. His team dedicated their performance to his mother in the Mother's Day Special show. He also appeared in another dance reality show, Jhalak Dikhhla Jaa 4.

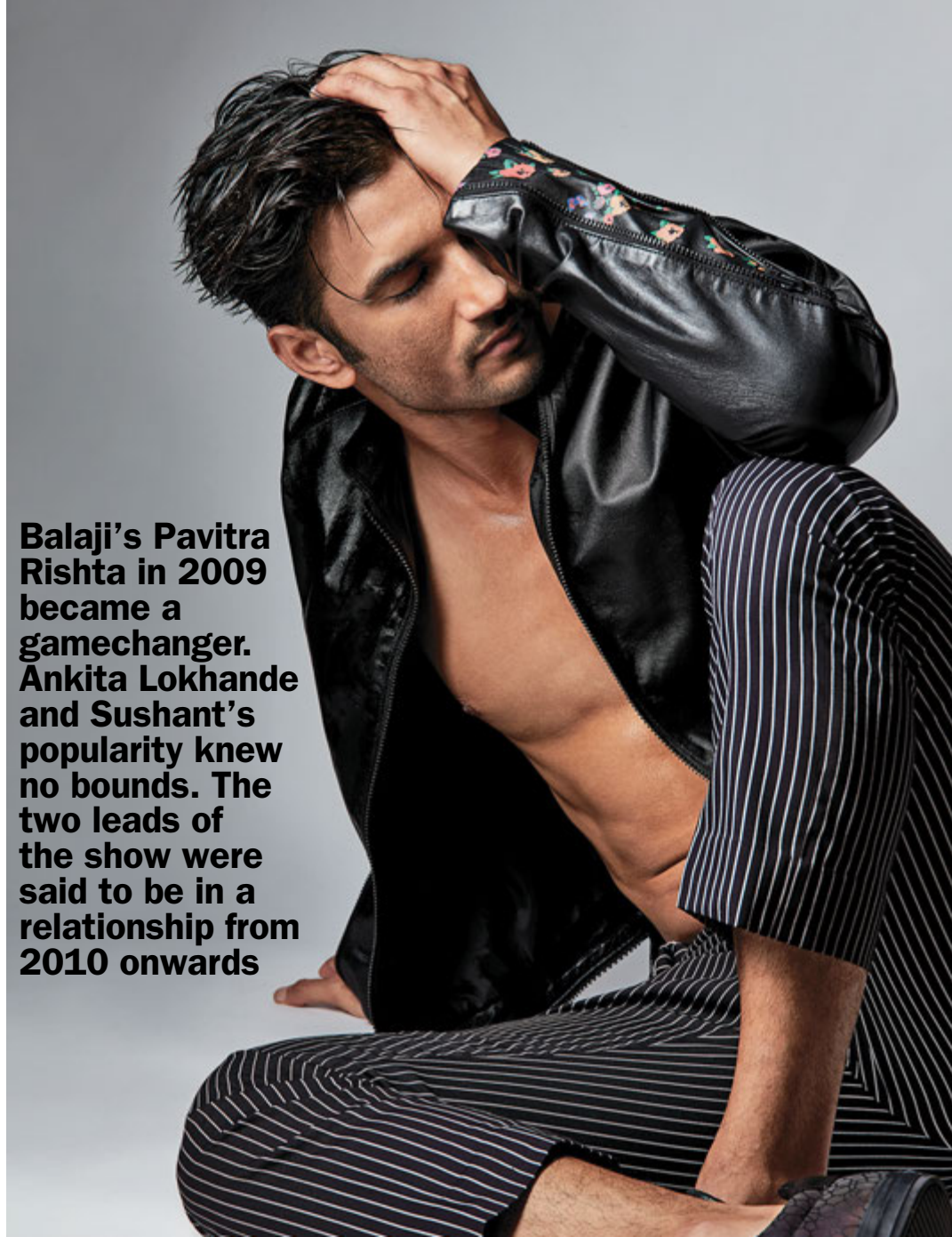
His film career began with Abhishek Kapoor directed Kai Po Che! (2013). The film was based on the Chetan Bhagat novel

The 3 Mistakes Of My Life. It had Sushant play a cricket crazy youngster, who along with his friends, played by Amit Sadh and Rajkumar Rao, opens a sports goods shop and a cricket academy. He goes on to mentor a young Muslim cricketer. The film was set against the backdrop of the Gujarat riots and proved to be a critical and commercial

success. Shuddh Desi Romance, which came the same year, had Sushant in a different avatar. He played a young commitment-phobic man caught between two lovers, played by Parineeti Chopra and Vaani Kapoor. His natural ease in front of the camera was noted by the audience. He got a chance to work with Rajkumar Hirani in his next, PK

(2014), where he played a young Pakistani national in love with Indian culture. The role, though short, won him notice by the critics. Dibakar Banerjee's wartime thriller, Detective Byomkesh Bakshy! (2015), had him play one of India's well-loved fictional detectives. It was a period film praised for its detailing. Sushant rued the fact that the

audience didn't take to it. "Byomkesh deserved to be seen by a much bigger audience. It was way ahead of its time. But I guess the audience has been conditioned into seeing a certain kind of film."

The biggest fillip to his film career came with the Mahendra Singh Dhoni biopic, *M.S. Dhoni: The Untold Story* (2016), directed by Neeraj Pandey. Sushant was a diehard fan of Dhoni and was delighted to get a chance to play one of the greatest cricketing captains in the world. Sushant was coached by former wicket-keeper and batsman Kiran More both in the art of keeping stumps and batting. He watched around 500 hours of footage on MS Dhoni to get the mannerisms right. He grew close to Dhoni over the making of the film. It was a commercial and critical success. Sushant was praised not only for his physical transformation but for his effortless portrayal of Dhoni.

He was reportedly going to star in Shekhar Kapur's

Paani and spent some 10 months preparing for it. Though nothing came of it, he did find a friend in Kapur and chalked off the experience as a huge learning module.

Chanda Mama Door Ke, a science-fiction film where he was supposed to play an astronaut too never got made. As did the musical *Takadum*, which was supposed to be directed by Homi Adajania and co-star the late Irrfan Khan.

What got him excited was Dinesh Vijan's reincarnation thriller *Raabta*, co-starring Kriti Sanon. The big-budget film however bombed. He appeared next in Abhishek Kapoor's *Kedarnath* (2018), set against the backdrop of the Uttarakhand floods. Here, he played a Muslim porter in love with a Hindu girl, played by Sara Ali Khan. The film didn't meet with the kind of success that was projected, though Sushant's acting did come for praise. *Drive* (2019), produced by Dharma Productions and Tarun Mansukhani, went straight

to Netflix. Abhishek Chaubey's *Sonchiriya* (2019), a period dacoit film, was a poetic journey into the hearts and minds of the baaghis - as dacoits are called in Chambal. Though it won a lot of awards and Sushant was lavishly praised for his intense portrayal, the film didn't work at the box-office. Thankfully, his *Chhichhore* (2019), directed by Nitesh Tiwari and starring Shraddha Kapoor, released the same year was a commercial success. He

played a concerned dad as well as a carefree collegian. The *Fault In Our Stars* remake titled *Dil Bechara*, directed by close friend Mukesh Chhabra, was supposed to release in May 2020. Given the COVID-19 pandemic, the film will have an OTT release now.

Sushant was an entrepreneur too. In 2018, he launched *Innsaei Ventures*, an endeavour which hoped to maximise the potential of technological innovations for a wider set of the populace. He was signed by NITI Aayog, a think-tank belonging to the government of India, to promote the Women Entrepreneurship Platform (WEP). The actor was said to be suffering from depression for some months and was reportedly getting treated for it. He allegedly died by suicide on June 14, 2020 leaving his fans heartbroken. ■

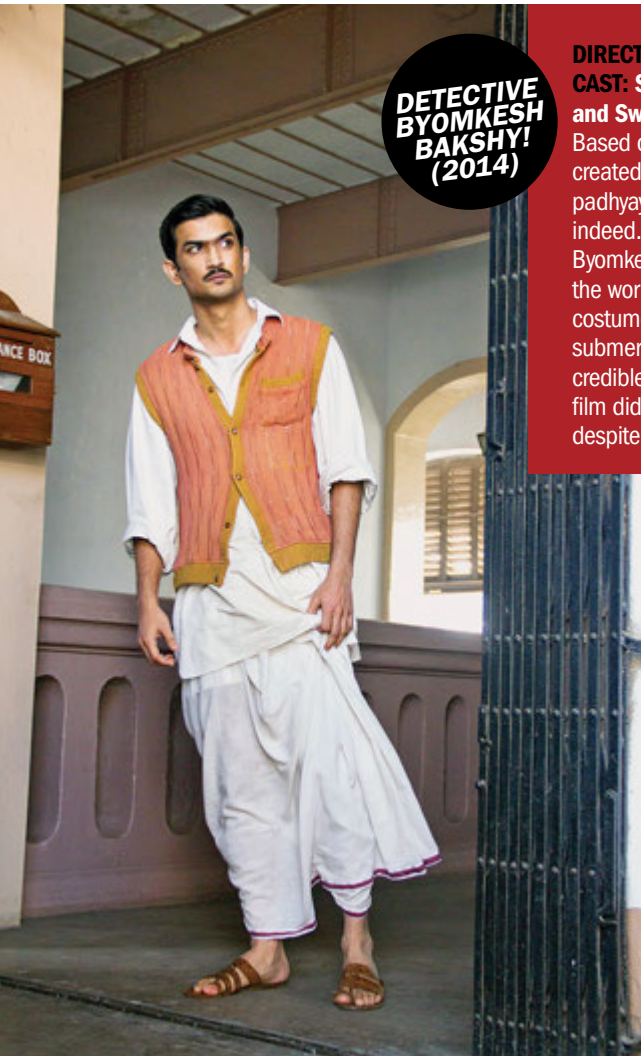

Mansoor (Sushant Singh Rajput) happens to be a Muslim but has faith in Lord Shiva. It's thanks to the Shiv temple at Kedarnath that he's able to earn his livelihood. He's an affable man prone to giving discounts to his clients and posing for selfies with them. Their common love for cricket leads to a chance meeting. A smitten Mukku later hires him for the whole month. She bares her heart to him and he amusedly listens. Gradually, they fall in love. But there are complications. Mukku is betrothed to someone else. Sushant's chemistry with Sara works in the film's favour. He acquired the body language of a porter beautifully.

VETERAN FILMMAKER **BASU CHATTERJEE** PASSES AWAY

(10 January 1930 - 4 June 2020)

Filmmaker Basu Chatterjee, best known for films like *Chhoti Si Baat*, *Rajnigandha*, *Baaton Baaton Mein*, *Swami*, *Ek Ruka Hua Faisla* and *Chameli Ki Shaadi* passed away on June 4, 2020 in Mumbai, following age-related ailments. He was 90 years old.

Basuda was born on January 10, 1930, in Ajmer. He started his career as an illustrator in a reputed newspaper before turning to films. He assisted his namesake Basu Bhattacharya in *Teesri Kasam* (1966), starring Raj Kapoor and Waheeda Rehman. His first film as director was *Sara Akash* (1969), based on the eponymous novel *Sara Akash* by Rajendra Yadav. The film, starring Rakesh Pandey, Madhu Chakravarty and Jalal Agha was about the incompatibility between a married couple. Apparently, it was shot at Rajendra Yadav's own house in Agra. Cinematographer K K Mahajan won the National Film Award for Best Cinematography for his black-and-white camera work in the film. The film set the tone for

Basuda's future films, as most of his offerings revolved around the lives of common people and their problems.

In fact, most of his films revolved around marriage. *Piya Ka Ghar* (1972), starring Jaya Bhaduri and Anil Dhawan, was

based on Raja Thakur's Marathi film *Mumbaicha Jawai*. It talked about space crunch and the lack of privacy in Mumbai experienced through the eyes of a young couple. *Swami* (1977), starring Shabana Azmi, Girish Karnad and Vikram,

was a more serious film revolving around a woman, who pines for her lover even as she's married off to someone else. *Priyatama* (1977), starring Jeetendra, Neetu Singh, Rakesh Roshan and Utpal Dutt was about how reality kills romance

Basuda's films revolved around the lives of common people. Even in his rom-coms the milieu was middle-class. *Rajnigandha* (1974) was based on a short story by Mannu Bhandari, starring Amol Palekar, Vidya Sinha and Dinesh Thakur. It was about a woman's dilemma in picking a life partner

in a marriage. *Khatta Meeta* (1978) was about a middle-aged widower (Ashok Kumar) marrying another middle-aged widow (Pearl Padamsee). Both have children from their former marriages and the youngsters find it hard to adjust to each other.

He made pure rom-coms as well but here too his milieu was middle-class. *Rajnigandha* (1974), based on a short story by Mannu Bhandari, starring Amol Palekar, Vidya Sinha and Dinesh Thakur, was about a woman's dilemma in picking a life partner. *Chitchor* (1976), starring Amol Palekar, Zarina Wahab and Vijayendra Ghatge, was a romantic comedy involving mistaken identities.

Chhoti Si Baat (1976), starring Amol Palekar, Asrani, Ashok Kumar and Vidya Sinha, had Palekar playing a man with low self-confidence. He then hires a life coach to teach him how to propose to a girl. *Baton Baton Mein* (1979) had a Christian setting and was all about the courtship between Amol Palekar and Tina Munim, assisted by her uncle, played by David. *Man Pasand* (1980), starring Dev Anand, Tina Munim, Girish Karnad and Mehmood, was based on George Bernard Shaw's *Pygmalion*. *Shaukeen* (1982) was perhaps his boldest comedy. Starring Ashok Kumar, Utpal Dutt, A.K. Hangal, Rati Agnihotri and Mithun Chakraborty, it was about

the misadventures of three old men, who want to have a good time in Goa. *Chameli Ki Shaadi* (1986), starring Anil Kapoor and Amrita Singh, was about an ex-wrestler trying to marry a rather feisty girl. Caste politics played the villain of the piece.

Basuda touched upon thrillers as well. *Tumhare Liye* (1978), starring Sanjeev Kumar, Vidya Sinha and Neelam Mehra, was about reincarnation. *Ratandeeep* (1979), starring Girish Karnad and Hema Malini, had Karnad masquerading as the dead husband of Malini in a bid to loot her riches. *Chakravyuha* (1978), starring Rajesh Khanna, Vinod Mehra, and Neetu Singh, was a James Bond kind of an espionage whodunnit. *Sheesha* (1986) was a thriller around rape starring Mithun Chakraborty, Moon Moon Sen and Mallika Sarabhai.

There was a serious streak to his filmmaking as well. *Manzil* (1979), starring Amitabh Bachchan and Moushumi Chatterjee, was based on the hit Bengali film *Akash Kusum* (1965). It had Amitabh pretending to

be a rich man in order to impress Moushumi. *Jeena Yahan* (1979), starring Shabana Azmi, Amol Palekar and Zarina Wahab, was a film about women empowerment. *Ek Ruka Hua Faisla* (1986) was a gritty courtroom drama based on the American hit *12 Angry Men* (1957). *Kamla Ki Maut* (1989), starring Pankaj Kapur, Supriya Pathak and Roopa Ganguly, was a hard-hitting drama about the suicide of an unmarried pregnant girl. It forces her neighbours to re-examine their own lives.

Basuda had the knack of casting big stars in small-budget films. He worked with Mithun Chakraborty in *Shaukeen*, with Vinod Mehra in *Us Paar*, Jeetendra and Neetu Singh in *Priyatama*, Dev Anand and Tina Munim in *Man Pasand*, Rajesh Khanna and Neetu Singh in *Chakravyuha* and Dharmendra and Hema Malini in *Dillagi* and Amitabh Bachchan in *Manzil*. He directed the TV Series *Byomkesh Bakshi* and *Rajani* for Doordarshan, both of which were hugely successful. He's survived by his daughter Rupali Guha, who's also a film director. ■

GOD *of* SMALL FILMS

DEVESH SHARMA RECOMMENDS THE BEST FILMS OF THE LATE **BASU CHATTERJEE**



Basu Chatterjee, who passed away on June 4, 2020, was a prolific filmmaker. He was a versatile director, able to do justice to many genres, though his forte was romantic

comedies. He made films, which depicted the life of common people. Their problems, their heartaches, their victories and small joys were the heroes in his stories. Though he didn't shy from working

with commercial stars - having worked with Dharmendra, Hema Malini and even Amitabh Bachchan - actors like Amol Palekar, Vidya Sinha and Shabana Azmi were seen more in his films. He was one of the

pioneers of the middle-of-the-road cinema between the '70s -'80s. Along with Hrishikesh Mukherjee, he had a large hand in making the genre popular. Presenting a list of some of his best films down the years...



PIYA KA GHAR (1972)

CAST: Jaya Bhaduri, Anil Dhawan and Agha

The film was a remake of the hit Marathi movie *Mumbaicha Jawai* (1970). It spotlights how congested homes in Mumbai deny privacy to married couples, which can sometimes dent a marriage. Malti (Jaya) is a good-natured girl living in a village. Her marriage is fixed with Ram (Anil Dhawan). Initially, Malti is all excited with the thought of living in a big city with her husband. But her happiness is shattered when she finds she has to share space with his parents, brothers, sister-in-law and uncles, all crammed together in a two-room tenement in a chawl. The young couple has to sleep in the kitchen. A disillusioned Malti wants to go back to her father's house. Eventually, she realises the worth of her caring in-laws. The hit song, *Yeh jeevan hai* sung by Kishore Kumar, sums up the bitter-sweet nuances of life.

CHITCHOR (1976)

CAST: Amol Palekar, Zarina Wahab and Vijayendra Ghatge

It was a romantic comedy involving mistaken identities. Geeta's (Zarina Wahab) elder sister Meera writes to her family about an eligible bachelor Sunil (Vijayendra Ghatage), an engineer, who's set to visit the village for construction work. Pitamber Chaudhri (A.K. Hangal) and his wife (Dina Pathak) are happy with the news. When overseer Vinod (Amol Palekar) lands up in the village, he's mistaken for Sunil. The parents take a liking to him and so does Geeta. He even starts teaching her music. They fall in love. But Sunil's arrival changes

all equations as he too starts liking her.

The film was shot in the picturesque locales of Mahabaleshwar and Panchgani. It had lovely music by Ravindra Jain, comprising songs like *Jab deep jale aana*, *Gori tera gaon bada pyara* and *Tu jo mere sur mein*. It was later remade by Rajshri as *Main Prem Ki Deewani Hoon*.

RAJNIGANDHA (1974)

CAST: Vidya Sinha, Amol Palekar and Dinesh Thakur
Rajnigandha was based on a short story, *Yahi Sach Hai*, by noted writer Mannu Bhandari. It catapulted Vidya Sinha to instant fame. Refreshingly different from the arm-

candy heroines of that era, she plays a city girl, caught between two suitors. She takes a while to make up her mind about whom to marry. Devoid of melodrama, it brought the lives of three ordinary, middle-class people in sharp focus. Vidya's plaited hair and simple sarees had an earthy appeal.

The film, which also marked the debut of Amol Palekar, had two wonderful Salil Chowdhary compositions - *Rajnigandha phool tumhare* sung by Lata Mangeshkar and *Kai baar yunhi dekha hai* sung by Mukesh. The latter won Mukesh the National Award for Best Playback Singer.

CHHOTI SI BAAT (1976)

Cast: Amol Palekar, Asrani, Ashok Kumar and Vidya Sinha

The film had Amol Palekar playing a man low in self-confidence. He hires a life coach to teach him how to approach a girl. Palekar plays a mousy introvert in the film while Vidya plays a woman waiting for him to make the first move. Again, the middle-class milieu of the film helped it make a home in the hearts of the masses. The film boasted of great music by Salil Chowdhury. Fans of Hindi film music got a taste of South maestro Yesudas' genius in his duet with Asha Bhosle, *Jaaneman jaaneman tere do nayan*. Incidentally, it was filmed on Dharmendra and Hema Malini.





SWAMI (1977)

CAST: Shabana Azmi, Vikram, Girish Karnad and Utpal Dutt

The film was adapted from Sarat Chandra's novel of the same name. Saudamini 'Mini' (Shabana Azmi) has grown up idolising her liberal uncle (Utpal Dutt). Like him, she loves to read Western literature, likes Western philosophers and is an atheist at heart. The neighbourhood boy Naren (Vikram) is smitten by her beauty and intellect. Sadly, he takes a long time to make his intentions clear. Mini gets married off to a wealthy trader Ghanshyam (Girish Karnad). He's the epitome of patience. In her

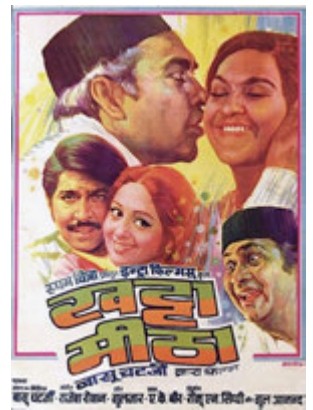
mind, she has become a prisoner in her husband's house and wants to break free. But it's only when she takes the actual step does she realise her foolishness. She begins to appreciate her husband's strength of character. The last scene, where he asks her to return home, completes her transformation from a rebellious girl to a dignified wife.

The film belonged to Shabana Azmi. Her quicksilver expressions carried the day. The film had great music by Rajesh Roshan with songs like Ka karoon sajni, Pal bhar mein and Yaadon mein woh.

KHATTA MEETHA (1978)

CAST: Ashok Kumar, Rakesh Roshan, Bindiya Goswami, Pearl Padamsee, Deven Verma, Preeti Ganguly and Pradeep Kumar

It was loosely based on the 1968 American movie Yours, Mine and Ours. The story revolved around a middle-aged widower, (Ashok Kumar) marrying another middle-aged widow (Pearl Padamsee). Both have children from their former marriages. The youngsters find it hard to adjust to each other. There are several spats between them with the parents trying to patch up things and keep the family united. Nargis' son Feroze (Rakesh Roshan) falls in love with Zarine (Bindiya



Goswami), a daughter of a rich businessman (Pradeep Kumar). The businessman tries to harass the family, which then comes together as one and the matter is solved. The film ends with everyone learning to live in harmony. Thoda hai thode ki zaroorat hai sums up the film's theme of living and loving.

BATON BATON MEIN (1979)

CAST: Amol Palekar, Tina Munim, Pearl Padamsee and David

The film had a Christian setting. It traced the courtship of Amol Palekar and Tina Munim, assisted by Uncle Tom (David). Rosie Perreira (Pearl Padamsee) is a widow living with her violinist son, Shabi (Ranjit Chowdhry) and daughter Nancy (Tina Munim). She wants her daughter to get married soon. Nancy and her uncle meet Tony Braganza (Amol Palekar) daily in the Bandra local train. Tony and Nancy soon start seeing each other. But Tony is unduly shy and that irks Rosie. She starts looking for a match elsewhere. However, timely intervention by Tom sets things right. The film had some lovely songs like Suniye kahiye kahiye suniye, Na bole tum na maine kuch kaha and Uthe sabke kadam tuned by Rajesh Roshan.





APNE PARAYE (1980)

CAST: Shabana Azmi, Amol Palekar, Girish Karnad and Utpal Dutt

The film is based on Sarat Chandra's novel Nishkriti. Utpal Dutt, a senior advocate based in Kolkata, dotes on his younger cousin, Chander (Amol Palekar). Chander is a bit of a slacker and is only interested in music. His wife, Sheela (Shabana Azmi), runs the household with authority. The advocate's wife Siddheswari (Ashalata) is fond of them both. One day, Utpal Dutt's younger brother, Haish (Girish Karnad), lands up with his wife Naintara (Bharti Achrekar). Naintara's gets jealous of Sheela's hold on the household and plots against her. She gets Sheela and Chander thrown out of the house. Harish files a suit against them. Suddenly, life is on a downward spiral for them. It's only on the intervention of the elder brother that things get back on track. The rivalries of a joint family are amply brought out in the film.

SHAUKEEN (1982)

CAST: Ashok Kumar, Utpal Dutt, A.K. Hangal, Mithun Chakraborty & Rati Agnihotri

The film is loosely based on the American comedy Boys' Night Out (1962). Om Prakash Chaudhary (Ashok Kumar), Jagdishbhai (Utpal Dutt) and Inder Sen (A K Hangal) are three men in their 60s, who love cigarettes, wine and women. While they secretly indulge in the first two vices, the third eludes them. They plan a getaway



trip where they hope to get lucky with women. The driver Ravi (Mithun Chakraborty) takes them to Goa as he wants to meet his girlfriend Anita (Rati Agnihotri) residing there. Anita is easygoing and bohemian. All three get bitten by her charms. They

plan to get lucky with her but the encounters end in fiascos. Of course, being men, they don't admit to it and spice up the narratives. In the end, they feel guilty about not behaving like gentlemen. They redeem themselves by uniting Ravi and Anita. They also help Ravi tide over his financial difficulties. Though a sex comedy, never once does the film cross the bounds of decency. Ashok Kumar, Utpal Dutt and AK Hangal were superb as lecherous old men.

CHAMELI KI SHAADI (1986)

CAST: Anil Kapoor, Amrita Singh, Amjad Khan, Pankaj Kapur and Om Prakash

The film takes a stand against casteism. It also has a feminist heroine, a novelty in those days. Charandas (Anil Kapoor),

is under the influence of Mastram Pahelwan (Om Prakash) and wants to dedicate his life to being a wrestler. All his vows of celibacy go for a toss when he spies Chameli (Amrita Singh), the daughter of the local coal trader Kallumal (Pankaj Kapur).

The duo falls in love and decides to get married. Their parents are against the match as they belong to different castes. They take the help of advocate Harish (Amjad Khan) to resolve the dilemma. He advises them to elope and get married. He later convinces both the girl's father and the boy's brother how the alliance could be politically beneficial to them.

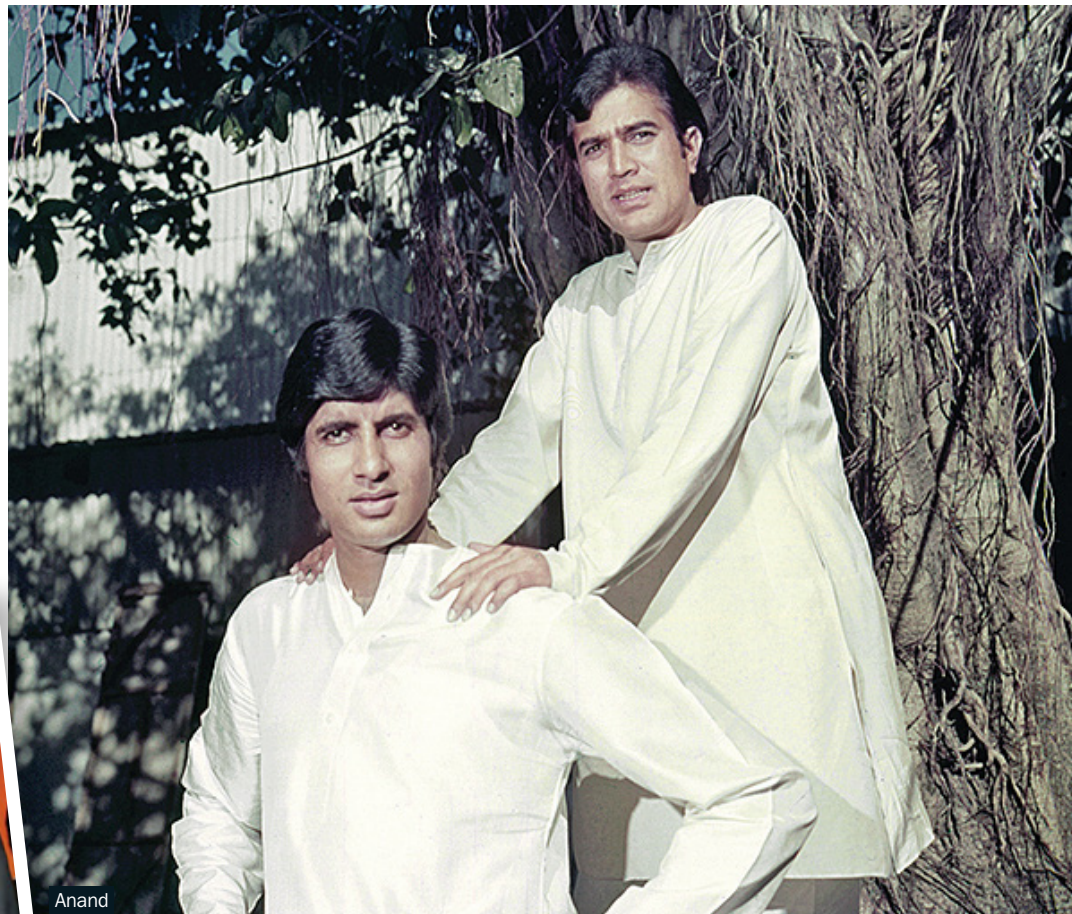
Amrita Singh is pure gold as an overgrown schoolgirl, who has failed class eight four times. She bashes up her relatives like a freestyle wrestler when she overhears their plans of bumping off her boyfriend. Anil Kapoor lets her take centre-stage and is good as an ex-pahelwan. Amjad Khan gets the best lines as the street-smart lawyer, who plays upon the weaknesses of people for his advantage. ■

DEVESH SHARMA PROFILES
LYRICIST YOGESH, WHO PASSED AWAY RECENTLY

(March 19, 1943 - May 29, 2020)

He had been writing poetry ever since he was in school. If the class happened to be punished, the teacher would only let them off the hook if Yogesh Gaur agreed to recite one of his poems. The young boy had no idea back then that he would become a lyricist one day. After his father passed away, Yogesh left Lucknow to try his luck in Mumbai. He landed here with his childhood friend Satyaprakash Tiwari,

Sattu in short. They rented a room in a chawl for Rs 11, a big sum those days, and set about finding work. Yogesh's cousin, Vrajendra Gaur, was a celebrated writer in Mumbai

then. Yogesh hoped his cousin would set him up somewhere. But that wasn't to be. Thankfully, Sattu got a job. As promised, he supported Yogesh till he found his feet.

After knocking on every door, Yogesh finally

found his calling when he started penning down his thoughts in a diary. Those took the shape of poems. Yogesh realised he could try to be a lyricist. Composer Robin Banerjee, who used to work mainly in action films, taught him how to set words

to music. He gave him a break in the film Sakhi Robin (1962). The song was Tum jo aao, sung by Manna Dey and Suman Kalyanpur.

The song got him noticed. But Yogesh was slotted as a 'B' movie lyricist. He wrote for action films starring Dara Singh and Randhawa, which were targeted at the mass audience. His films had exotic titles like Tarzan And Delilah and Flying Circus. These may not have won him recognition. But they did help him survive in Mumbai. Also, he had this knack of writing a song from the female perspective. So he was saddled with songs describing the hero's manly attributes. It's said, he didn't have a record player back then. Hence,

he used to visit composer Salil Chowdhary's house to listen to the tracks. Slowly, an association developed, which resulted in him getting to write two songs in Anand (1971). The film was of great importance to him because the other lyricist was Gulzar. The film was being directed by Hrishikesh Mukherjee and starred superstar Rajesh Khanna. He was apprehensive at first but Salilda backed him up. He wrote two gems for the film – Kahin door jab din dhal jaaye, sung by Mukesh and Zindagi

Rimjhim gire saawan from Manzil was picturised on Amitabh Bachchan and Moushumi Chatterjee amidst the real rain in Mumbai. The appeal of this Yogesh-R.D. Burman number hasn't faded away even today

kaisi yeh paheli haye, sung by Manna Dey. The songs became extremely popular. Then came Annadata (1972), where Salilda made him write the whole album. It had the philosophical Nain hamaare saanjh sakaare sung by Mukesh on one hand and the frothy Guzar jaaye din sung by Kishore Kumar. Nis din nis din and Raaton ke saaye ghane were both sung by Lata Mangeshkar.

Salil Chowdhary asked him to write for Basu Chatterjee's Rajnigandha (1974) as well. Yogesh wrote the pensive Kai baar yun hi dekha hai, which won a National Award for Mukesh but no awards came Yogesh's way. The title song Rajnigandha phool tumhare, sung by Lata, too was admired. He worked with the illustrious SD Burman in Mili (1975). While it had the lively Maine kaha phoolon se, sung by Lata, it also had the seeped in sadness Badi sooni sooni and Aaye tum yaad mujhe sung by Kishore Kumar. Chhoti Si Baat (1976) was another Basuda-Salil Chowdhury film, for which Yogesh wrote

gems like Na jane kyun, sung by Lata and the Yesudas-Asha Bhosle duet Jaaneman jaaneman.

Yogesh then on became a regular in Basuda's films. Priyatama (1977) had the happy Koi roko na deewane ko, composed by Rajesh Roshan and the sad Tere bin kaise din. For Baton Baton Mein (1979), composed by Rajesh Roshan, he wrote the poignant Kahan tak yeh mann ko among other songs. In Manzil (1979), he wrote the evergreen ode to Mumbai rains, Rimjhim gire saawan. The song had two versions, one sung by Kishore Kumar and the other by Lata. Picturised on Amitabh Bachchan and Moushumi Chatterjee amidst real rain, the appeal of this Yogesh-R.D. Burman number hasn't faded till date.

Sadly, even after writing memorable songs, the unassuming Yogesh never got his due. His last film was Angrezi Mein Kehte Hain (2018), where he wrote two songs. His health was fast deteriorating. During his last days, he was cared for by Satyendra Tripathi, who had sung Piya mose rooth gaye from Angrezi..., Yogesh's last film song. ■

GOODBYE WAJID

DEVESH SHARMA PROFILES
WAJID KHAN OF SAJID-WAJID FAME,
WHO PASSED AWAY RECENTLY

(1973 - 2020)

Wajid Khan belonged to the Kirana Gharana. His father Sharafat Ali Khan was a tabla maestro. While his elder brother, Sajid, is an ace tabla player like their father. Wajid learnt to play Hindustani classical on guitar. The duo used to jam on their favourite instruments, while composing tunes. Sajid-Wajid's first film as composers was the Salman Khan starrer *Pyaar Kiya To Darna Kya* (1988). Salman Khan gave a break to two music composers in the film. One was Himesh Reshammiya, who composed the title song. The others were brothers Sajid-Wajid, who composed an intricate qawwali *Teri jawaani badi mast mast hai*. It was sung by Iqbal Sabri, Afzal Sabri and Anupama Deshpande. Earthy, and rooted in folk tradition, it became the calling card for the musical duo. Making massy, melody-based music became their mantra for life. The main music composers of the film were Jatin-Lalit.

Life is a circle, as they say. Years later, Lalit Pandit was the guest composer for *Dabangg* (2010), while Sajid-Wajid were the main composers.

Sajid-Wajid's name would forever be linked to Salman Khan. Their most fruitful partnership was with the actor. They composed music for several films starring Salman, including the Dabangg series

Wajid was initially inclined to be a singer. Sonu Nigam's hit non-film album *Deewana* (1999), which was composed by Sajid-Wajid, was also supposed to be Wajid's launchpad as a singer. But Wajid was an unknown entity then, while Sonu was a household name. Naturally, Sonu got precedence. The songs of the album, *Deewana*

tera, *Ab mujhe raat din* and *Iss kadar pyaar hai* are still popular. One can only guess the heights Wajid would have touched as a singer if things had worked out.

In 2001, they composed another non-film album *Khoya Khoya Chand*, featuring Alka Yagnik and Babul Supriyo. In 2005, they came out with *Tera Intezar*, featuring Indian

As a singer, Wajid Khan began his career with *Partner* in 2008, singing tracks like *Soni de nakhre* and *Do you wanna partner*. He has sung popular tracks like *Hud hud dabangg*, *Jalwa*, *Fevicol se* among others. Sajid-Wajid had also composed IPL 4 theme song *Dhoom Dhoom Dhoom Dhadaka* with Wajid singing the title track. They were mentors on the reality shows like *Sa Re Ga Ma Pa Singing Superstar*, *Sa Re Ga Ma Pa 2012* and composed the title track for *Bigg Boss 4* and *Bigg Boss 6*.

RD Burman is linked to Rajesh Khanna. Likewise, Sajid-Wajid's name would forever be linked to Salman Khan. Their most fruitful partnership was with the actor. They composed music for several films starring Salman Khan, like *Tumko Na Bhool Paayenge* (2002), *Tere Naam* (2003), *Garv* (2004), *Mujhse Shaadi*

Karogi (2004), *Shaadi Karke Phas Gaya Yaar* (2006), *Partner* (2007), *Hello* (2008), *God Tussi Great Ho* (2008), *Wanted* (2009), *Main Aur Mrs Khanna*, (2009), *Veer* (2010), *Dabangg* (2010), *No Problem* (2010). *Mashallah* was their only song in *Ek Tha Tiger* (2012). They often mentioned that Salman had a great ear for music and took the final call when it came to picking tunes. They reiterated that his suggestions worked for other music directors too.

Their non-Salman hits included films such as *Kya Yehi Pyaar Hai* (2002), *Gunaah* (2002), *Chori Chori* (2003), *Kal Kissne Dekha* (2009), *Chashme Buddoor* (2013), *Main Tera Hero* (2014), *Heropanti* (2014) and *Freaky Ali* (2016). The craze for multi-composer albums ate into their repertoire. But battling the odds, they continued to bet on melody. *Dagabaaz re* (*Dabangg 2*), *Sureli ankhion wale* (*Veer*), *Tere mast mast do nain* (*Dabangg*) and *Anarkali disco chali* in *Housefull 2*, are examples of what they were able to achieve despite the constraints.

Wajid passed away on June 1. Sajid shared a statement on Instagram that read, "Our dearest Wajid passed away at the age of 47 due to a cardiac arrest... He had a successful kidney transplant last year and he was undergoing treatment for a throat infection." He's survived by his wife Maryam and two children, a son and a daughter. ■

WHAT'S YOUR ROUTINE DURING THE LOCKDOWN?

I follow the same routine every day because it keeps me sane. My husband wakes up at 5:30 am. I wake up between 6:30 – 8 am. I have jeera pani and two glasses of hot water with lemon. Then I make coffee for myself. I walk on the treadmill or around the house like a crazy person for 40 minutes. It makes me feel good. Then I do some suryanamaskars. The fact that I have the space to do that is amazing. Then I go to the kitchen and begin cooking for the family.

WHAT ALL HAVE YOU BEEN COOKING?

Regular khana. Like today I made Sindhi

turai, spinach and chawal khichadi. My mother and mother-in-law both didn't cook because they didn't have to. The only reason I know cooking is because I went to boarding school. My Nani (maternal grandma) was a good cook. I wanted to be like her. You tend to want to do things your mother didn't do. Thank God! Otherwise we'd be eating bread and butter every day because our chef doesn't stay with us. One of our staff, who lives with us, helps me with the cooking.

WHAT DO YOU COOK BEST?

Unfortunately, I can only cook vegetarian food. I cook Sindhi food the best

because my Nani did that. Sindhi kadi, aloo tuk and also South Indian curry... since I love South Indian food.

DO YOU LIKE LONDON OR PREFER LIVING IN INDIA?

Honestly, I like India, be it Mumbai or Delhi. I like Delhi because I've shot most of my films here. I like London because of the freedom I enjoy there. It's difficult for me to step outside for a walk in Delhi.

WHAT'S YOUR AVERAGE DAY IN LONDON LIKE?

In the morning, I walk to the gym and walk back home. Then I visit the office, do some work and come back. We order in all the time. London is

a lot like Mumbai in that sense.


SO YOU DON'T COOK IN LONDON?

I prepare dinner sometimes - mostly salads. To call for food from outside every day is a pain. In India we have the privilege of staff and house help. But in London it's not like that. So if it wasn't for these two years of training in London or my stay in a boarding school, I'd have been a mess during quarantine.

WHAT ARE THE OTHER REALISATIONS THAT QUARANTINE HAS BROUGHT ABOUT?

You realise how privileged you are, how good a life you lead as compared to others. I've only been grateful this whole time as opposed to being frustrated stuck at home. Everyone's going through this. We're all in the same storm but in different boats. I'm grateful that I'm in a boat that's comfortable, nice

and warm and we have enough food for ourselves. I count my blessings every day.

MANY ARE ANXIOUS ABOUT THE ECONOMIC CONSEQUENCES OF THE PANDEMIC INCLUDING THOSE IN THE FILM INDUSTRY.

Everyone goes through different levels of anxiety. I'll be the wrong person to give advice because I come from a place of privilege. I can't even begin to understand what so many are going through. I don't have to put a roof over my head or bring food on the table. So I cannot answer that question without sounding condescending.

Yes, I am anxious for my friends. A lot of them are entrepreneurs, who might have to shut down their

businesses or reduce the scale and let go of people. I'm anxious for my husband, my father-in-law and brother-in-law because they run a corporation, which is human resource heavy.

I'm not anxious for their business but for the people who work with them. They're like family to them. I'm anxious for journalists and media persons, who're my friends. I'm anxious for all my near and dear ones. I'm not anxious for myself as I'm in a different boat. I wish we were all in the same boat.

YOU ONCE SAID THAT ANAND AHUJA CAN ONLY SEE THINGS IN BLACK OR WHITE, NOT IN SHADES OF GREY. DOES THAT IDEALISM STILL HOLD TRUE FOR HIM?

Yes. His is a huge responsibility

because so many people's jobs are on the line... it requires someone with great moral fibre to realise that. I'm not saying this because Anand's my husband but because of the person he is. I call him Gautam Buddha. I tell him if you hadn't met me, you would have left everything and gone off to the forest. He's extremely idealistic. (Laughs) I'm like one of those apsaras pulling the sadhu out of his tapasya! I'm lucky to have married such a good human being. He's so black and white that to an extent it's annoying. Like we cannot do this and we cannot cut the queue... and things like that.

ON YOUR RETURN FROM LONDON, YOU DIDN'T JUMP THE QUEUE BUT STOOD PATIENTLY AT THE

DELHI AIRPORT...

I wouldn't do that. My husband too would never do that. He said if they ask us to be in quarantine, we will go through that. I said, 'Yeah I'm okay with it'. We agree on the same things. That's why I married him. Otherwise, I'd have married some movie star, who'd want to take a private plane up and down.

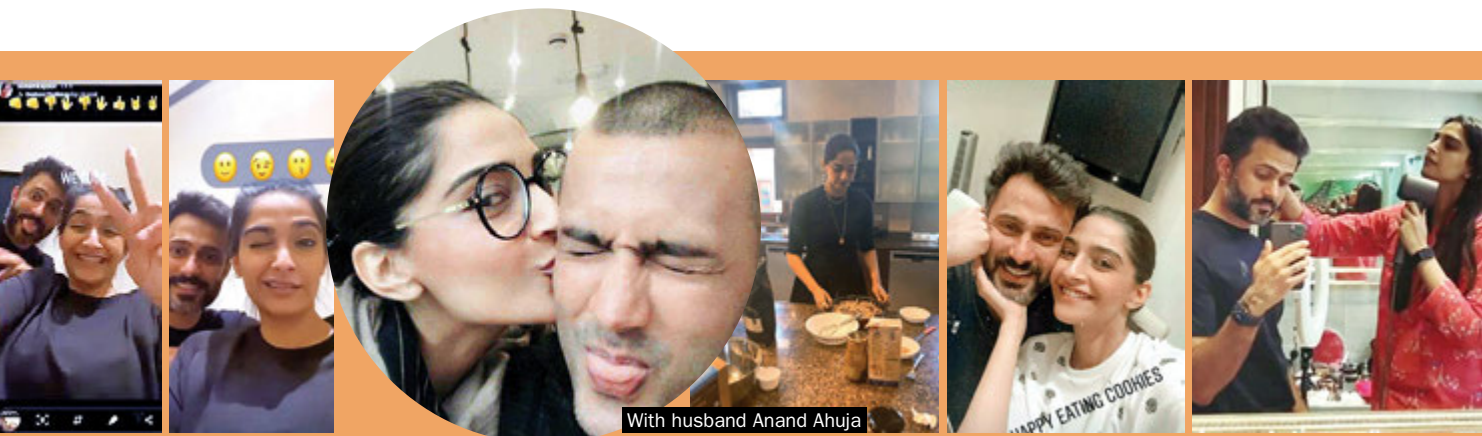
WHAT WAS THE MOMENT, WHICH PROMPTED YOU TO MARRY ANAND?

He loved me even though I was nuts. He knows exactly who I am. I say whatever comes to my mind with no filter. He saw the person in me and not some glamorous heroine. He saw me as Sonam, someone who's extremely naïve and moohfat (frank). And also,

someone least competitive and ambitious. He said I cannot understand that being in the film industry you're not ambitious. I was like being ambitious is not a bad thing. The dance of life

MADHURI DIXIT-NENE RETRACES HER STEPS TO RECALL HER ICONIC DANCES AND MORE... WITH JITESH PILLAAI



Rhythm is her hallmark. In every phase of her career and life, Madhuri Dixit-Nene has waltzed to her own beat. She's just celebrated her 53rd birthday. And just like her dazzling smile, her charisma is timeless. Her talent is in perpetual pursuit of newer platforms of expression. The lockdown, in fact, has helped her tap new reserves.

Organised by her academy, Dance With Madhuri (DWM), she recently hosted an online dance festival to help people beat the blues and learn new dance forms. She cut her first single Candle, where she sings of hope and happiness. The virtual auditions of her dance show, Dance Deewane, have kicked off from home... For Madhuri Dixit-Nene the show never stops. Excerpts from an intimate conversation with the diva...



Madhuri Dixit-Nene shares snapshots of her time at home during the lockdown

WHAT'S YOUR ROUTINE DURING LOCKDOWN?

Initially, it was hard to get into a routine. You try to understand the new situation from every angle. The harm the virus has caused, the economy being flattened, lives disrupted... Kids have also got onto virtual learning. It's not a bad thing but the kids (referring to sons Arin and Ryan) suddenly have

to plan everything for themselves. But I'm proud of them. Initially, it was hard for me too. We don't know how long it will go on. So I started my riyaz. I practise singing with my mother in the evening. We're trying to keep ourselves occupied doing something constructive. On the brighter side, you have more time with your family now.

Earlier, one often complained about not being able to do so many things. (Smiles) After a long time, I read a book - Born A Crime (by Trevor Noah).

YOU HAVE A TALENT FOR SINGING AS WELL...

I won't say I'm a professional singer. But I do sing. It's because of my mother. She used to sing classical music. She did her masters in vocal Hindustani classical music. She'd urge me to learn from her. But for me, kathak was the ultimate thing. I'd sing with her sometimes. I enjoyed being on stage in school. Being a convent, I'd sing English songs. Of course, I love Hindi music. Actually, I love all kinds of music.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A MOTHER OF TWO TEENAGE BOYS?

When you have teenagers at home, it's a different world altogether. They're also going through so many changes. In their bodies, in their thinking, everything... so it's a challenge as a parent. But I'm enjoying it. I want to be as close to them as possible. Another year and the older one (Arin) will be in college. I want to spend as much time as I can with them. Right now, they're busy with

school work. They spend time with friends on Skype and Zoom. They play games online.

HOW MUCH ARE THEY LIKE RAM AND YOU?

They are a mix bag. In temperament, outlook and behaviour, the older one is more like Ram. But Arin's interests also lie in drama, music, math, physics... The younger one (Ryan) loves music. But he's also interested in science, engineering and math. He's more like me. He's quieter. Ram is gregarious. Arin is outgoing and gregarious too. Arin is a mini Ram. If you see photographs of Ram at 17, the similarity with Arin is uncanny.

YOUR DANCES HAVE BEEN ICONIC. WHEN WAS THE FIRST TIME YOU DID A COMPLICATED DANCE?

Dancing for the camera is different from the way you would normally dance. Initially, while I'd be engrossed in my dance, they'd ask me to stop if I went beyond 'the mark'. Even if you go a little to the other side, you're not in frame. It would irritate me.

During Tezaab (1988), Sarojji (Khan) told me, "Tum toh Indian dancing karti ho. This is a Bollywood-kind of dance. You'll have to rehearse." I agreed. I wanted to get my steps right. So that when I'm performing, I only have to concentrate on my expressions not where the mark is. Tezaab was a lesson in Bollywood dance. I had to change so many expressions in seconds. It was fun. Jackie Shroff

once told me, "In the Ek do teen song you're like a squirrel moving from one expression to another."

A SEQUENCE WHERE YOU HAD TO GIVE THE MAXIMUM TAKES?

We (Sanjay Dutt and Madhuri) gave maximum takes with the chair for Tamma tamma (Thanedar 1990), choreographed by Sarojji. We did like 40 retakes. Even if one of us made a slight mistake, we had to do it again. Finally, we did an entire shot perfectly. In the end the cap had to fall on my foot and stay there. But it fell and rolled off. So we had to do it all over again.

HOW MANY DAYS WOULD IT TAKE TO

CHOREOGRAPH A NORMAL SONG?

It would depend on what kind of song it was. If it was a simple song like Palki mein hoke savar chali re (Khalnayak 1993), it would be done in two-three days. If it was an elaborate song like Ek do teen, Choli ke peeche (Khalnayak), or Dola re (Devdas 2002), then it would take around 12 days. These had so many dancers, the frames had to be perfect, the sets were huge. Ashok Mehta was doing the photography for Choli ke peeche. The way he lit up everything was magical. There were so many props on the set. One day, Subhashji (Ghai, director) exclaimed,

ANY OTHER MEMORY?

There was another sweet song Tere bin nahin guzre din in Anjaam (1994). I try to seduce a wheelchair-bound Shah Rukh (Khan). Sarojji wanted to do the song in one take. Three-four cameras were placed in different angles. I had to remember, which camera was where in keeping

with whether I’d to give a profile shot or a long shot. We rehearsed for it. Thankfully, it got okayed in one take. Shah Rukh, being on the wheelchair, had just to watch me. I guess, he must have been on tenterhooks wanting us to finish the shot soon. (Laughs) Imagine, when you’re dancing in the moment, and someone is just watching you, fearing kahin ye mistake na kar de!

TELL US ABOUT THE KAY SERA SERA DANCE IN PUKAR...

When I was told that Prabhudheva would be choreographing it, I was a bit scared for the first time in my life. I told him you have a different style and I have a different one. He said don’t worry and that he’d take small shots. We rehearsed for the song. Next day, when we started shooting, he began dancing at a stretch. I reminded him about the chhota chhota takes.

He said, “Ma’am you can do it.” He pushed me to do it. He has so much rhythm, a sense of timing and also humour in his dance. It was fun. I had a great time working on that song.

AND HUMKO AAJKAL HAI INTEZAAR FROM SAILAAB...

It just took around three-four days to shoot it. When we first heard the song, Sarojji and I realised that the main lead was just singing a

line. The chorus was singing the entire song. Sarojji said yeh kaisa gana hai. But she said that we had a great opportunity with it. She said, “Let the girls sing but you express each line with your facial expressions.” I came on the set thinking it was a koli dance. My hair was tied in a bun. We even took a shot. But Sarojji was not happy. She felt something was amiss. It was an alhad (innocent) song about a young girl

Yes, we used to shoot from 6.30 pm to 6.30 am. The set was all lit up in Filmcity. The words Maar dala were said in four different ways. We played with the expressions... happy and sad. Hothon pe aisi baat (Jewel Thief) was the inspiration behind Dola re dola. It was shot in long shots. Sarojji and Sanjay Leela Bhansali did a fab job. Even Kaahe chhed chhed mohe... from the same film is wonderfully shot.

A DANCE NUMBER WHICH EXCEEDED YOUR EXPECTATIONS...

Chane ke khet mein from Anjaam (1994)

was a cute song. At first Rahulji (Rawail) had a different song to be picturised. Sarojji and I didn’t find any fun in the song. Rahulji had a strict image. But we went up to him and said the song wasn’t good enough. He asked the music directors to work out something else. That’s how Chane ke khet mein came about. We had liked the song then. But I didn’t know it would grow to be so popular. People perform it in reality shows even today.

WHAT DO YOU MISS ABOUT THE ‘90S AS COMPARED TO TODAY?

There’s immense discipline today. Today there’s no waiting for anyone. You come, you shoot, you finish your work and leave. That’s great. But earlier there was a kind of spontaneity. We’d be sitting on the set with make-up while the dialogue was being written on the other side. When we’d ask for it, we were told, “Two minutes, we’re just completing it.” Ek spontaneity thi usmein. 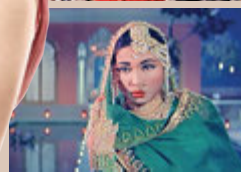
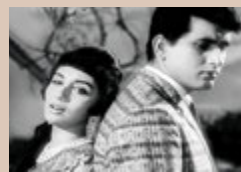

is planned and calculated. Earlier a project was just ruled by passion. But every era has its ups and downs, pros and cons. There would be continuity jerks. The shooting would halt for some reason. Then after a year or so, it would suddenly resume. In between the jewellery would be misplaced. Then we’d wear something similar. So you enter a room wearing a different pair of earrings and leave the room with something else. But all that was forgiven. People just loved cinema.

AS A JUDGE IN DANCE REALITY SHOWS, HOW DO YOU FEEL WHEN CONTESTANTS DANCE ON YOUR NUMBERS?

I go with the emotions behind it. Either they love me or the song or they love the choreography, that’s why they are doing it. It makes me happy to inspire someone. There’s so much talent in the remote corners of India. These platforms give them a chance to showcase the talent. Some of them are self-taught. They have gone on YouTube and websites and picked up dance. That justifies why I am online to teach dance. It will enable people to perform, work and earn money. ■

That makes it around 9 to 10 hours of sleep. I feel redundant. I wonder if I’ll be able to work after the lockdown. I’ve become used to just lazing around.

I surface around 4.30 pm. I feel energetic after that. Before that I'm cranky. (Smiles) I may even strike someone with something.

AREN'T YOU COOKING ANYTHING LIKE THE OTHERS?

Khana khane se fursat milti hi nahi. I can't cook. When I first came to Mumbai, I'd brought my cook along. I was living in a 1BHK flat. My cook used to share it with me. I can live without a girlfriend or wife. But I can't live without a cook.

ARE YOU BEING A PAIN TO YOUR WIFE TAHIRA (KASHYAP)?

I've been an absolute pain to Tahira. She wonders

what I'm doing. The last time we spent so much time together must have been 10 years back. She considers me as her third child. She's always known me as a lazy guy, who tries not to be lazy.

WHAT HAVE YOU DISCOVERED ABOUT YOUR KIDS? ARE YOU A GOOD FATHER?

I try to be a good father to my kids (son Virajveer and daughter Varushka). I can still do better. I've discovered that they're truly my kids because they're terrible in mathematics. I go crazy explaining math to my son. He's good with the piano and art. He's an artiste.

NOW THAT YOU HAVE THE TIME DO YOU REVISIT YOUR FILMS?

Two things can happen while watching your own films. Either you get self-obsessed or you become over-critical. I have both these tendencies. So I don't watch my films. I watch my films in the edit and probably once with the cast and crew. I remember watching Dum Laga Ke Haisha with the audience. It was overwhelming because the film was so special. It was a kind of comeback for me. After that I decided not to watch my films with the audience in the theatre. I came from Chandigarh with huge aspirations of

becoming an actor. I've bought tickets in black to watch films. Cut to when you watch yourself on a 70mm screen. It becomes too overwhelming.

DID YOU IMAGINE THAT YOU WOULD BECOME SO SUCCESSFUL?

We all dream about it. I imagined it too. I won't deny it. But what you dream about doesn't turn into reality always. I'm fortunate to find success. I'm full of gratitude.

DID YOU BECOME OBNOXIOUS AFTER TASTING SUCCESS?

After Vicky Donor, I turned obnoxious probably with my family. Maybe, because

I was going through a low phase with Tahira after Vicky Donor. When your first film becomes super successful you start believing you're invincible. You gain this false sense of confidence that whatever you touch, will turn into gold. Mera dimaag kharab ho gaya tha. Then I went through a learning curve after some flops.

HOW EASY OR DIFFICULT A PERSON ARE YOU TO LIVE WITH?

(Smiles) You'll have to ask Tahira about that. I'm my own person. I like to do my own things. I'm like let me live my life. Don't hinder it. If I'm reading a book in a corner of my house – let me

WHAT DO YOU LIKE AND NOT LIKE ABOUT STARDOM?

As a star, you’re pampered. There are 10 people around you, who take care of everything in your life. You feel empty when you’re on a foreign trip on your

own, where no one knows you. There is no spot boy or manager to take care of your ticketing or talk to the person at the reception. It’s difficult to get out of the glamour world and make yourself ready for the real world.

DO YOU GET TO KNOW YOURSELF BETTER WHEN YOU TRAVEL?

Of course! I went to Bahamas for New Year. We were staying at a great seven-star property. Being anonymous and having to stand in a queue, without a security guard, spot boy and manager to take care of you, makes you realise that there’s something beyond your stardom. You’re shown the truth. You may be somebody in a certain sphere. But when you step out of that, you’re a nobody. That reality check is not easy.

HAS YOUR SLANT TOWARDS BUDDHISM HELPED YOU STAY REAL?

Buddhism has been a life-altering experience. It’s been miraculous. I started the practice of reciting chants before the release of Meri Pyaari Bindu (2017). I chant for at least 40 minutes a day. Though the film didn’t do well I remained self-assured. By nature, I get confused easily. But this practice has given me clarity about what

I want in life. Also, the goal of this practice is peace, something we need in this day and age.

GULABO SITABO HAS RELEASED ON THE OTT PLATFORM. HOW DO YOU VIEW THIS DETOUR?

Entertainment is a luxury item, not a basic necessity. Now, in times of job cuts, people will think twice before spending 1000 bucks at a multiplex. People will try to save now. The economy has taken a huge dip. But at the same time art will survive. You need art to maintain sanity. You need to consume entertainment. People have grown used to watching films on the OTT platforms. They may think twice before going to the theatres now.

I guess concerts or even the big Punjabi weddings will not happen soon. It will be difficult to get married in the first place. Now people won’t match horoscopes. They’ll get corona tests done of prospective couples. Life will turn that crazy. Having said that, the fun of watching cinema in the theatres is exciting. Whenever that happens, say after six months or whenever, it will be a huge celebration for cinema. We’re going through a tough time. But we will survive. ■

LOVE IS ALL THERE IS

WHILE HIS CONTEMPORARIES WROTE ABOUT REBELLION, **SHAKEEL BADAYUNI** CHOSE TO WRITE ABOUT ROMANCE, WRITES **FARHANA FAROOK**

*“Mujhe fakhr hai meri shayri
Meri zindagi se judaa nahi.”
Shakeel Badayuni*

He belonged to neo-India; a nation just woken to freedom. In that mood of revolutionary ideas and progressive poetry, Shakeel Badayuni stayed true to his romantic predilection. He preferred being a crusader of love than a cheerleader of rebellion. Along with maestro Naushad, he went on to celebrate romance in all its sensual and lyrical glory.

He's also remembered for being an advocate of the Ganga-Jamuni tehzeeb, the womb of secularism. Shakeel, Naushad and Mohammed Rafi came together to create the iconic bhajan Hari Om... man tadpat Hari darshan ko aaj for Baiju Bawra based on raag malkauns. Story goes that Naushad asked his team to attend the recording only after ablutions as a bhajan was to be recorded... such was the sanctity of their art. Mughal-E-Azam remains another monumental collaboration where their

songs captured the delirium and the disenchantment of love against the backdrop of palace intrigue.

Shakeel's the only lyricist to have won three consecutive Filmfare Awards (1960, 1961, 1962) under composers Ravi and Hemant Kumar. His paeans to a woman's celestial beauty in Chaudvin ka chaand, won him the Black Lady and Waheeda Rehman an epithet forever. He won the Filmfare trophy twice again for the deferential Husnwale tera jawab nahin and the melancholic Kahin deep jale kahin dil. While his lyrics for films thrived on corporeal metaphors, outside it, his poetry was marked by the intricacies of love and life. No wonder it found patronage in renowned ghazal exponents. Begum Akhtar's rendition of his ghazal, Mere humnafas mere humnawa, has exalted Shakeel into the gallery of the greats...

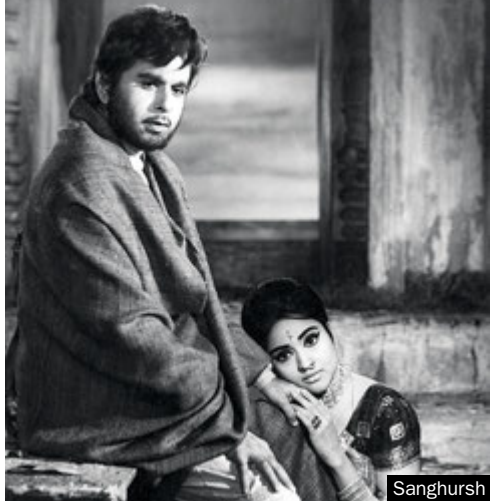
STAR POET

Shakeel Badayuni was born in 1916 in Badaun in Uttar Pradesh, known for its ethos steeped in Sufism and poetry. Hailing from a literary family, his father was keen he master Arabic, Urdu, Persian and Hindi. Shakeel's early inspiration was his relative Zia-ul-Qasiri Badayuni, a religious poet. Young Shakeel attended Aligarh University in the 1930s. There he

came in contact with poets Neeraj and Jigar Muradabadi. The latter had a strong influence on Shakeel's poetic sensibilities.

Given his flair for verse, Shakeel made a name for himself in mehfilis and mushairas. Romance being his forte, he grew popular. After a short stint of working with the government's supply department in Delhi, Shakeel found his reckoning as a poet in Bombay in 1944.

NAUSHAD & SHAKEEL

Shakeel first met maestro Naushad at

a mushaira in 1946. There Naushad asked Shakeel to express his skill in a couplet. "Hum dard ka afsana duniya ko suna denge / Har dil mein mohabbat ki ek aag lagaa denge," replied Shakeel. This interaction paved the way for a musical odyssey between the two, which spread across two decades and 22 films. Interestingly, Shakeel could sing and Naushad wrote poetry, which explains the symbiosis between the two musical soulmates. Shakeel's lyrics for Kardar's Dard (1947) for



Sahib Bibi Aur Ghulam

Naushad were hits especially Uma Devi's (Tun Tun) Afsana likh rahi hun. Their memorable songs include those in films like Dulari (1949), Babul (1950), Deedar (1951), Baiju Bawra (1952), Amar (1954), Mother India (1957), Mughal-

e-Azam (1960), Kohinoor (1960) Gunga Jumna (1961), Mere Mehboob (1963), Leader (1964) and Dil Diya Dard Liya (1966).

Shakeel's fluency with language made him switch dialects with ease. The utterly romantic Suhani raat dhal chuki from Dulari, or the mounting strains of Mere mehboob from Mere Mehboob, Naushad

and Shakeel excelled in celebrating the lyricism of love. He could weave pain as poignantly. Na milta gham to barbadi ke afsane kahan jate in Amar, urged Sahir Ludhianvi to compliment Shakeel as the best ghazal writer in Hindi cinema.

On the behest of Naushad, filmmaker Vijay Bhatt signed Shakeel to write the lyrics for Baiju

Bawra, based on the legendary musician. Man tarpat Hari darshan ko aaj sung by Mohammed Rafi, Ustad Amir Khan and DV Paluskar's Aaj gawat man mero (raag desh) and the evergreen Tu ganga ki mauj (raag bhairavi), sung by Rafi... established Shakeel's prowess over Hindi as well. Naushad and Shakeel created some songs in the Khari Boli dialect as well. Holi aaye re kanhai (Mother India), Mohe panghat pe (Mughal-E-Azam) or Dhoondo dhoondo re saajana (Gunga Jumna) were folk songs adapted

to suit the situation. In Gunga Jumna, he used Bhojpuri words in Nain lad jai hain toh manwa ma to reflect the setting of the film.

The album of Mughal-E-Azam was a bouquet of ragas and romance. The iconic Pyar kiya to darna kya in Mughal-E-Azam was based on the homegrown folk song Pyaar kiya hai, kya chori ki hai. The bhajan Mohe panghat pe, the qawwali Teri mehfil mein kismet aazma ke, the spiritual Bekas pe karam kijiye and the classical Prem jogan ban

ke and Shubb din aayo sung by Bade Ghulam Ali Khan... proved Shakeel's competence in writing in all genres. Mughal-E-Azam remains the duo's masterpiece.

In the late '60s, Shakeel was rendered indisposed by tuberculosis. He was admitted to a sanatorium. In a bid to buoy his sagging spirits and finances, Naushad got him three projects, Ram Aur Shyam (1967), Aadmi (1968) and Sunghursh (1968). It's said Shakeel was paid 10 times more than his normal fees for these. The

maestro almost never worked with any other lyricist till Shakeel's death in 1970.

SHAKEEL AND OTHERS

Shakeel also teamed up with composer Ravi for 15 films including Gharana (1961), Ghungat, Grahasti, Nartikai (all in 1963), Phool Aur Patthar and Do Badan (both in 1966). Shakeel proved to be lucky for Ravi, as the composer got his big break with Guru Dutt (Chaudvin Ka Chand in 1960). Ravi got his first Filmfare Award for Best Music for Gharana, while Shakeel got it for Best Lyrics for Chaudvin Ka Chand. Their other popular songs include Mori chham chham baje

payaliya (Ghunghat), Zindagi ke safar mein (Nartaki) and Lo aa gayi unki yaad (Do Badan). The latter earned the Filmfare Award for Shakeel yet again. His song Wo aurat hai jo insano ki from Ghar Grihasthi is revered for the dignity it accords to a woman.

Shakeel was also associated with Hemant Kumar during Bees Saal Baad (1962). They created beautiful songs like the Filmfare Award-winning Kahin deep jale kahin dil and Sapne suhane ladakpan ke. The pair reached its peak with Sahib Bibi Aur Ghulam (1962). The playful Piya aise jiya mein, the beseeching Na jao saiyen and

the haunting Chale aao from Sahib Bibi Aur Ghulam are a masterclass in situational writing. The film owes as much to Meena Kumari's poignant act as to Shakeel's lyrics that spelt out her turmoil.

Some of Shakeel's films with S.D. Burman include Kaisa Kahoon and Benazir (both in 1964). With C. Ramachandra he wrote the lyrics for Zindagi Aur Maut (1965) and Wahan Ke Log (1967). While he collaborated with Roshan on Badaag (1965) and Noorjahan (1967). He also came together with Naushad's ex-assistant, Ghulam Mohammed. But Ghulam never got his due and so

Shakeel's work with him remained underrated. Their songs include Yeh duniya hai (Shair 1949) and Shikayat kya karoon (Kundan 1955). His repertoire earned him the title of Geetkar-E-Azam from the Government Of India.

GHAZAL KING

Unlike his peers, Shakeel had little interest in political ideology. He didn't align with progressive poets like Faiz Ahmed Faiz, Majrooh Sultanpuri, Kaifi Azmi, Sardar Jafri and others. Doyen Jigar Moradabadi described Shakeel as 'Shair-e-fitrat' or an instinctive poet as his poetry was not a play of words but an extension of

his personality. The poetry and pain in his ghazals made them popular with exponents of the art form such as Begum Akhtar and Talat Mehmood. Begum Akhtar, at every concert and TV show, sang his ghazals. These included the iconic Mere hamnafas, mere hamnawa and Aye mohabbat tere anjam pe rona aaya. Talat's favourites remained Hangama-e-gham and Gham-e-ashiqi se keh do.

Shakeel's non-film poetry collections include Rangeeniyen, Ranaaiyan and Shabistan. He also published a collection of devotional poetry called Naghma-e-Firdous. Though his poetry reflected love and estrangement, there was a fun-loving side to the poet. Shakeel enjoyed playing badminton, going for picnics and hunting trips and flying kites with

friends Naushad, Rafi and Johny Walker. Dilip Kumar and writer Wajahat Mirza were also amongst his close friends.

THE FAREWELL

Shakeel Badayuni succumbed to diabetes complications at the age of 53, on April 20, 1970, leaving behind his wife, two sons and two daughters. His daughter Najma, passed away soon after his demise, while still in college. His friends formed a trust called Yaad-e-Shakeel after his death, which became a source of support for his family.

Today, his lyrics continue to play on retro channels, defying the vocabulary of the times. And in a non-descript lane of Badaun, a family-maintained library under his name... stands as a quiet reminder of the poet who walked this way but once... ■

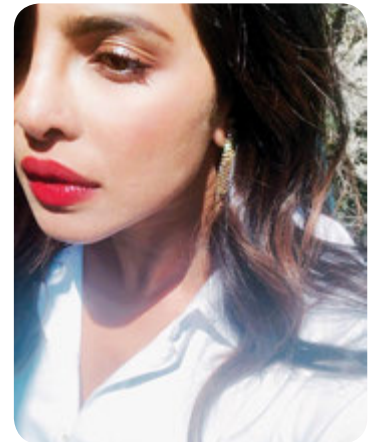

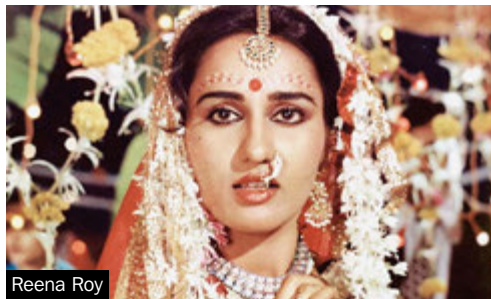

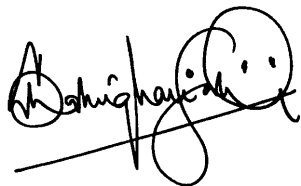
