There was a time when film heroines, even when working for the biggest studios were paid a pittance. The buying power of women has increased. The FMCG companies want to cash in on that potential and as a result female stars are getting the bulk of endorsement deals. They're selling everything from soaps to smartphones. Needless to say, the moolah coming in has added to their wealth. Be it fashion, Privanka Chopra's tent-like met gala gown is still being written about, or charities, Aishwarva Rai Bachchan has long been associated with the UN, they have been at the frontline everywhere. Sassy, smart and willing to take risks, our leading ladies are no longer content with arm-candy roles. They don't need men to be relevant. BREAKING FREE

Singer LEENA BOSE hasn't let the coronavirus dampen her enthusiasm, finds RAGHUVENDRA SINGH

t the time of writing this, singer Leena Bose has been isolated at her Kolkata home as she has tested positive for the coronavirus. But she's still in high spirits, all set to hit the deck running once she tests negative. Sadak 2 might have had the dubious distinction of being the lowest-rated film on IMDB, but the song Tum se hi, which she has sung with singer and composer Ankit Tiwari has been well received. The Bhatts have been known for their musical acumen, and this time too they've nailed their music. Leena's phone wouldn't stop ringing when the song came out. While she rues the fate of the film, she's happy with the compliments coming her way. "No one could have predicted this kind of backlash for the film. People wrote it off without even watching it," she comments. "But what has happened, has happened. The music has been

appreciated. No one can take that away from us."

adak 2 came her way just out of the blue. One fine day, Ankit Tiwari called her up and said he wanted to try out her voice. And many studio sessions later, the song was crafted out. Thankfully, it met the approval of the Bhatts as well. Leena points out that she could have got her big break long ago but for the circumstances. It was in 2013 that Leena Bose was shortlisted to sing Sun raha hai na *tu's* female version from Aashiqui 2. However, the makers thought Shreya Ghoshal's voice would be more suited for the song and Leena lost out on a big opportunity. The singer says that losing out on such big chances does leave an impact. "It can affect you on so many levels especially when vou're extremely young, naive and new in Mumbai and you know you've done your job right," she points out. "I took it as a part of my journey and focused on building my craft and worked on my confidence. These experiences and rejections have made me who I'm today." Ask her if there is gender disparity in the singing world and she says, "I think it's not about male or female singers. It's more about famous and non-famous singers." She is pragmatic enough to understand that she isn't such a big name as yet that people will give her work or a song will become a hit just because her name is associated with it. "It doesn't happen that way. In today's scenario, you're

as good as your last hit," she reasons.

Leena started participating in music shows at a young age and was winning prizes and praise everywhere from the Dover Lane Music Conference (Jr.) to the Pandit Ravi Kichlu Foundation.

She began performing on regional television shows as well. She confides that such shows definitely put pressure on the participants but if you persevere, they can help jumpstart your career. Says she, "It's full of drama and after a certain point, you get pressurised. That's not how music happens for me. It certainly does give a lot of fame though. When you know your purpose you take the road accordingly." The talented singer has worked with stalwarts like AR Rahman -- in Coke Studio. Anup Jalota, Sachin-Jigar, Ankit Tiwari, Arko Pravo Mukherjee. And she continues to perform Bollywood and semiclassical, bhajans and ghazals in live shows. Her struggle in Mumbai was pretty straightforward. She started pounding the street, reaching out to people, giving out audition tapes -- and hoping for a callback. "That's how I got selected for a lot of

ad jingles and TV spots," she reveals. "You have to keep meeting people and hope for that big break. There's nothing more to it. You keep doing whatever comes your way, expand your portfolio and just keep having faith in your abilities."

urrently, releasing independent tracks is considered the way forward. While Leena agrees that putting up original work does get you noticed, she also points out that producing a professional album on their own is beyond the reach of most new talent. "Original music scene has definitely started again but singers need support at all levels to produce an album. Most newcomers can't bear the costs involved." She earns her money doing shows and mentions that's the case with most singers. In such a scenario, it's hard to invest both time and money in putting up independent singles. And anything you put up needs marketing as well. "You can't just jump into it. Everything needs to be planned," she states.

She could have happily continued with a music career in Kolkata but came to Mumbai as she wanted to spread her wings. And asserts that despite the hardships, she doesn't regret a single moment spent here. "I wanted to see the world. I want to live life on my own terms. And I'm doing it. I've no complaints as I'm enjoying the journey."

Well, we first wish her a speedy recovery from coronavirus. And hope all her dreams come true.

undreds of newcomers enter and exit showbiz almost every single day. For anyone to make their mark in such a situation requires a combination of talent, hard work and luck. Looks like that's the case with Ritwik Bhowmik. who's waited for the dice to roll for him quite patiently. Ritwik, who is a

"I was confident about becoming an actor, but the way my family supported me emotionally and financially is something I'll always be grateful for. It's only because of them that I am here today," he gushes.

Ritwik, who has wowed the audience with his stellar acting in Bandish Bandits, directed by Anand Tiwari, says that the opportunity came to him as a surprise. Like most actors in Mumbai, he would send audition tapes to casting directors and one fine day, he got a call for a live audition. When he came to know he had been selected as the lead for a musicbased series starring such stalwarts as

and Atul Kulkarni. his joy knew no bounds. Since he was plaving a classical singer, Ritwik had to attend numerous workshops to get his expressions and body language right. It was a laborious process but he shone through. They were shooting in Rajasthan and the harsh sun sometimes took its toll. Remembering one such tough day on the sets, the actor spoke about the scene where he had to give the 24-hour pariksha. "It was 44 degrees and I had to walk up those temple stairs bare feet. My face and feet were burning. It was the toughest day of shooting for me. I had to look haggard in that shot, so it helped, but to shoot in so much

heat was a big task," he reflects.

he series gave him a chance to work with one of his idols. Naseeruddin Shah. Ritwik says the experience has been surreal. He mentions working with the veteran was everything he had dreamt of and more. He gushes that Naseer could inspire people with a line, with a gesture. "That's what differentiates a legend from any other artiste. Just by being who he is, he's given me a lot of lessons and guidelines to live by, especially as an actor and I'll cherish that till my last breath."

He had to do a couple of intimate scenes in the series as well and says his co-star Shreya Chaudhary was very accommodating. "It must have been more awkward for her than for me but we kind of gelled together from our first meeting itself and were quite comfortable with each other. So doing intimate scenes wasn't a problem. Director Anand Tiwari made sure to shoot them aesthetically and with a minimum of fuss." he reveals.

The series was well received and things have definitely changed for Ritwik after its release. He has become more active on social media. Posting about different aspects of his life and posing for 'candid' photos has become a regular thing now. He smiles at that and says he has no issues about becoming a public figure as that's kind of expected.

He also relishes the newfound superpower of saying no to a project. "Initially, I never used to have that liberty, I used to crave for one opportunity, but now, after *Bandish Bandits*, I can say that I have the liberty to choose and I'm loving it."

Every actor wants to look like a MMA fighter currently but Ritwik says that's not his aim. He likes his lean body and says according to him an actor should have a flexible body, which he can change according to the requirements of the role. He doesn't believe in looking back. It wasn't easy reaching where he has today but Ritwik feels no bitterness about the past. Newcomers get flooded with advice but according to him, the best advice is not to take any advice. We've heard that he's been signed by a big talent company and has been offered a couple of lucrative projects. Ritwik chooses to be hushhush about them for now. Says he, "All I want is to keep doing good work, that's all. It doesn't matter whether it's on OTT or films. I want to be recognised as an actor. All other things are secondary."

He sure has got all his priorities figured out, alright.

WHAT'S YOUR TAKE ON DESIGNER MASKS AND HOW FASHION IS EVOLVING WITH THE PANDEMIC? I think it's necessary to contribute and also make money for yourself. As a designer, it is your job to



cater to people's needs. If there is something a person is looking for, it is our job to provide them with it. I think it's great that everyone is coming up with their own version of masks. They are anyway a necessity and now people can have fun with them.

WHERE DO YOU SEE THE FASHION INDUSTRY HEADING ONCE THE PANDEMIC IS OVER?

This is the time for everyone to reflect on how much wastage happens when we create a collection. It's time to rethink and evolve in terms of benefiting the environment. All the different industries have abused nature. But as part of the fashion industry, I'm looking into how much I can contribute to enviroment. You have to also look into sustainability. Sustainable fashion is something everyone needs to think about.

t a time when the entire country is struggling with the coronavirus pandemic, Sonu Sood has emerged as the unlikely hero for thousands of migrant workers wanting to reach home. He has become so successful that people have started naming their shops, businesses, even their children after him. In the midst of doom. he's become a beacon of hope for the downtrodden. We all were moved by the disturbing images of the migrants walking miles under the hot sun, but it was Sonu who decided to act on the impulse and reached out. He started interacting with them and soon organised transport for 350 migrants

from Mumbai to Karnataka, That kind of opened the floodgates and people started reaching out to him for help. He has been busy ever since trying to sort out their problems. It wouldn't have been easy for Sonu to cut through the red tape and get the required permissions for inter-state travel for so many people but the goldenhearted actor says the problems sorted themselves out. Says he, "I felt the power of the prayers of all the migrants' families praying for their sons or husbands to come back. I think their prayers did the trick. And watching the smiles on those faces and tears in their eves made me believe that

I was doing something right." He initially put in his own money and later friends, acquaintances, and even complete strangers started reaching out financially. He names longtime friend Neeti Goyal, who helped him start out, as his biggest supporter. At the last count, Sonu had helped some

90 thousand people reach home safely. That's surely some kind of a record. But this also begs the question that if a single person was able to help so many, why has the government been so lethargic in its response? Sonu cuts the government some slack and says they too did their job. He however adds that



Spending time with the immigrants they could have done much more. "I wish the interstate buses had started sooner for the people who were walking on foot. A prompt response could have saved many more lives," he reflects.

Some navsavers point out that he's doing it all for future political gains. That he might join politics soon. Sonu laughs at these assumptions and says he's doing it not for political but for spiritual reasons. "I have come to believe I came to Mumbai all those years ago just to do this very thing," he asserts. The effort is taking a

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jokes he promises them in the night that he won't venture out the next day but he persistently breaks his promise every day. "I know I have to take this step to save those who are risking their lives walking on the highway. There is risk involved regarding my own health and I'm aware of that. I'm willing to take the risk. I'm alwavs extra careful and take all the necessary precautions. I keep on sanitising my hands. I don't touch anything when I am out, and I wear a mask always," he maintains.

He has many heartbreaking stories to share. There was a man stuck in Australia who wanted to come home because his father had passed away. Sonu man was sobbing. That left the actor teary-eved as well. He certainly has touched many lives and is overwhelmed with all the love and adulation coming his way. One pregnant woman whom he had helped went on to name her newborn son after him. "She named her son Sonu Sood. I was humbled by the gesture. It was a pointer towards the fact that I was doing something right," narrates the Good Samaritan with a lump in his throat.

e reveals he was doing social work earlier too but the scale has now escalated thanks to the coronavirus pandemic. Sonu maintains he will continue to help people in the future as well. "I'm just a phone call, a message away for them." He adds he plans to connect with each and every individual he has helped and see how they are faring after the lockdown. He wants to help them in any which way he can to rehabilitate their lives.

The performer turns philosophical and comments that the lockdown has taught him many lessons. One of the things he has learnt is to be prepared for anything new

toll on him for sure. He's cut back on his sleep because of this and sometimes doesn't sleep for 2-3 davs at length. He comments that he doesn't feel tired as the love he receives from immigrants keeps him going. Besides rest. safety is a concern as well. Sonu says he takes every precaution he can. His family is rightfully fearful about his health. He

facilitated that. Another person stranded in Chennai came to know that his father had met with an accident. He called up Sonu, who helped him out. Another man who had lost his wife, was helped by Sonu to reach his village. The actor received a call from him afterwards and the life has to offer. The present crisis has also reinstated his belief in giving back to society. "If an extra meal is cooked in every single kitchen, no one will sleep hungry in this country. Try to make an extra meal for vour watchman or vegetable vendor, anyone who is out there, who needs vour help." Another thing he has learnt is that life is fickle and hence one should spend as much time as possible with one's family and loved ones.

he industry is poised to resume work in the coming months and Sonu is definitely looking forward to facing the arclights once more. He thinks the smaller banners will lead the way and slowly the bigger houses will follow suit. He calculates that by October, life in showbiz might become somewhat normal. He's aware of the risks ahead and believes that everyone has to be extra vigilant towards their own safety while on the sets and learn to live with the threat of the virus. It's heard that he's getting more lead roles now and he confirms that indeed is the case. Says he, "Yes, I'm getting 'hero'

roles. I'm getting offers for positive roles. I'll try to do what people want me to do. I'm really looking forward to this new phase." He's a complete outsider who has made it big through the sheer dint of hard labour. Ask him about the whole outsider vs insider debate and he reiterates that life has always been difficult for outsiders. He

points out that one has to stay strong at all times. "When you aren't connected to the industry or any corporate house, you need to make your own mark. And that's the only way you can survive. You can't just complain that you are an outsider and things are not happening the way you want them to happen. Stay humble and focused. Patience is the key."

Pictures of Sonu working out with his teenage son Ishant went viral recently. The young lad has developed an enviable physique already and rumours are that Sonu might launch him soon. The actor laughs at that and says his son is too young currently for all that. "He's a kid but I'm glad he is working hard. He has yet to start college. We haven't thought about what he wants to do in future but as of now, he's a fit boy who is focused, humble, grounded and wants to do well in life. I'm sure he'll work hard to make his parents proud," chirps the proud father.

Time to wind up our conversation then. And he sends out a message of positivity for the readers. "Stay strong. Stay positive. Convey to your family how much you love them and try to make some memories which will stay with you for years to come..." YOUNG ALAYA FURNITUREWALA HAS INHERITED THE SASS FROM THE WOMEN IN HER LIFE. EXCERPTS FROM AN INTIMATE CHAT WITH JITESH PILLAAI

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Her gene pool is dramatic. Her grandmother, actor-danseuse Protima Bedi, grabbed headlines when she dropped the garb of convention in the flower-power '70s. Her mother, actor-host Pooja Bedi too was all about stark candour unlike her plasticine contemporaries. It's not a surprise then that Alaya Furniturewala too chose to play out her dreams, her way. Her unconventional debut in Jawaani Jaaneman – where she played an unwed mother in search of her father – didn't fetch a single bad review, so convincing was her act. Being part of a family that's been free and fluid, Alaya F understood early that relationships are nurtured more with freedom than force. And that being a parent doesn't entail a renunciation of personal pursuits. In a no-holds-barred interview, she shares how she's enjoying this trip of finding her bearings both as an actor and a person...

WHAT WAS YOUR **ROUTINE LIKE DURING** THE LOCKDOWN? It remained the same. Even now, I wake up around 10.30 am. I take a shower. I have breakfast. Then I draw a bit and chill. After that I go in to do video meetings and interviews. I have lunch. Around the sunset hour, the light is good. That's when I shoot my social media content. After that. I read books. I've begun learning Photoshop. I've gone back to editing software, something I was learning at New York University (NYU). I read scripts too. (Smiles) Thankfully, people still remember who I am.

DID YOU TAKE UP COOKING?

Occasionally, I did. I'm good at following a recipe. But I'm not an instinctive cook. (*Smiles*) I cooked banana bread because everyone was doing it. I made pancakes and pasta. I'm better with sweet stuff then I'm with



the savoury things. Everyone likes my protein pancakes. They're healthy.

TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT YOUR DAYS IN THE NEW YORK UNIVERSITY. I went to NYU to study filmmaking. That's when I realised I wanted to act. I dropped out of NYU and went to New York Film Academy (NYFA) to learn acting. I realised I wasn't terrible at it. Mv real training started when I returned to Mumbai. I could barely speak Hindi. I grew in an English-speaking household. Now, I curse them for it. I had to get rid of this godawful accent that I'd picked up from America. I couldn't dance to save my life. I began training in Kathak, hip-hop, Bollywood dance. I also learnt singing, gymnastics, MMA and Pilates.

DID JAWAANI JAANEMAN

COME EASILY? Not at all. I had to give lots of auditions. I got rejected many times. People would say, 'Oh you're very good but blah blah blah…' Then I realised there's some sort of a pattern in the rejection. I started wondering whether I'd ever get a film. Then Jawaani Jaaneman happened. Things took off from there.

HOW GOOD ARE YOU AT HANDLING REJECTION? Honestly, I appreciate criticism. Obviously, it stings. But that's the best way to learn. I'm good at handling rejection in the sense I bounce back quickly. But that moment feels like the end of the world. Like I remember there was one audition for which I'd worked the scene insideout with my acting coach. I'd arranged for the make-up artist and had rented hairextensions as well. But just the night before the audition, they cancelled it. It was the worst experience. But I told myself it's a test of my determination.

I FIRST BEGAN READING

Every film has its own destiny. What's meant to happen, will happen.

YOUR GRANDMOTHER. THE LATE PROTIMA BEDI, WAS A NONCONFORMIST. HAVE YOU READ HER **MEMOIRS TIMEPASS?** Grandma passed away when I was just about a year old. I've heard stories about her. I first began reading her book a long time ago. I stopped reading it halfway. I found it scandalous then. It was about people I know. Few years later, I picked it up again. It's an incredible book about an incredible woman. When my grandmother decided to become a classical



Odissi dancer, she'd never danced before. She began training for 10 hours a day. She put her heart into something and she just did it. That motivated me too. All the women in our family have this one common streak of being bold and unapologetic. My mother is crazy but less crazy than my grandmother. I'm much tamer than mom.

A PIECE OF ADVICE YOUR

MOTHER GAVE YOU... Be kind to people and work hard. That's the one consistent advice she's given me. At the end of the day, people will I'M GOOD AT HANDLING REJECTION IN THE SENSE I BOUNCE BACK QUICKLY. BUT THAT MOMENT FEELS LIKE THE END OF THE WORLD. THERE WAS ONE AUDITION FOR WHICH I'D WORKED THE SCENE INSIDE-OUT WITH MY ACTING COACH... BUT JUST THE NIGHT BEFORE THE AUDITION, THEY CANCELLED IT. IT WAS THE WORST EXPERIENCE remember you for how you've treated them. You can do a great job. But if you've been horrible to someone, they'll remember that. So I just try to be nice to everyone.

WERE YOU A TEMPERAMENTAL KID WHILE YOU WERE GROWING UP?

Yeah I was. But I've calmed down a lot. My mother has always borne the brunt of my bad moods. But we've always had an open relationship where we converse, argue and fight. She got the worst and the best of it. Earlier I used to get angry. I used to have strong views. Over the last few years, I've understood that things aren't always black and white. There are shades of grey. It's nicer to keep quiet sometimes. You don't have to give your point of view always.

DID THE SEPARATION OF YOUR PARENTS' (FARHAN EBRAHIM **FURNITUREWALA** AND POOJA BEDI) **BOTHER YOU?** My parents are great friends. I was around five when they divorced. So I don't remember a time when they were together. When I look at them now. I can't believe they were ever a couple. Two incompatible people but wonderful

friends. I've grown up in a happy home. Whether it's with my *Nana* and whoever he's been with. Whether it's my mother and the people she's been with or my father... I'm happy for people when they're happy.

HAS YOUR GRANDFATHER (ACTOR KABIR BEDI) EVER GIVEN YOU ANY ADVICE? We grew close when I returned to Mumbai. I wanted to make a showreel of all my scenes from my acting classes to show it to filmmakers. So I'd go to him at least twice a week with all my scenes and seek his recommendation. I was prompt in following his suggestions. He was impressed.

WERE YOU ABLE TO UNDERSTAND YOUR PARENTS BETTER AFTER JAWAANI JAANEMAN? In a way yes. Even in Jawaani Jaaneman it's an open family.

No one's judging anyone for their choices. I could relate to Tiva, my character. because we share similar values and ideas. Having said that. it didn't change the way I understand my parents. I guess I figured them out a bit more. I understand when my mother's being extra temperamental. I try to pinpoint the reason. When my father's upset, I know how to calm him down.

DOES YOUR MOTHER SAY THAT HER RELATIONSHIP WITH YOU IS A LOT LIKE THE ONE SHE SHARED WITH HER MOM? My grandmother left my mother when she was around 18-20. She went on to do her own thing (Protima founded Nrityagram India's first modern Gurukul for classical dance). My mother had to

handle the house and support herself. Now I support myself. I pay the salaries and bear the daily expenses. My mother has moved to Goa because she works there. My brother's off at the University. The other day mom told me, 'It's funny I was so upset when my mother left me to fend for myself. Now I've done the same thing to you'. But I do enjoy living alone.

ARE YOU SINGLE, DATING OR IT'S COMPLICATED?

(Smiles) Everyone's been asking me about my relationship status. I'm too simple to be single and too complicated to be in a relationship. But I'm trying to make it in this industry. So right now, let's just focus on that.

ARE YOU SEEING SOMEONE OR NOT? Ummm... I mean I'm enjoying life.



JUDENT PILLAAI CHATS WITH THE MAVERICK FILMMAKER IMTIAZ ALI HEAR REAL AND

LIFE'S A JOURNEY, OR SO IMTIAZ ALI FILMS LIKE

TO MAKE US BELIEVE. His films are testimonials to Sufi philosophy where his characters journey both outwards and inwards. He seems to be the most sorted of filmmakers and yet you feel he's a nomad who hasn't really set roots in the film world. Or in the real world either. He's a hermit who belongs to the mountains. He can talk at length on any topic and his deadpan wit can be quite deadly. He gives off the impression of being an old acquaintance, someone you feel you know a lot about and yet there's a hint of mystery that clings to him like a muted fragrance. And that's true of his films as well. You feel you know what his formula is by now but you're left with something new with every release. Likewise, you like conversing with him because you never know what might come up. Excerpts from a free-wheeling conversation with the supremely-talented filmmaker...

WHAT WERE YOU DOING IN LOCKDOWN? WITH WHOM WERE YOU STAYING?

I shifted in with my daughter Ida. I was writing a lot. Thinking, conceptualising. I wanted to finish the first round and go to the outer realm, which is like those stories that were remote and I couldn't really reach them because there was always something more urgent to do.

IS THERE ANYTHING YOU HAVE DABBLED WITH IN THE KITCHEN?

The only thing I am challenged about is cooking. But I am the best when it comes to eggs. *(Smiles)* And I'm the best tea and coffee maker in the world.

HOW DO YOU PROCESS THE LOCKDOWN?

People were restless initially. But then they were fine. And if given the opportunity, I don't know if they'll rush back to those pubs and cafes immediately. I also think people have discovered a bit of themselves. They have taken refuge in themselves so to speak. There are lots of people who are displaced and don't have access to daily bread, etc etc. But the air is cleaner. You can see the moon better, the sunset is better. And while we can we should enjoy all of this...

WHAT KIND OF PERSON WERE YOU WHEN YOU CAME FROM DELHI. DID YOU ALWAYS WANT TO TELL STORIES? I was in XIC –

Xaviers' Institute of Communication and I stayed in the hostel there. It was a great time to land in Mumbai. I was already directing plays. So I wrote and directed a play here. I was already writing stories, already doing theatre in a big way, in the biggest way actually.

PROFESSIONAL THEATRE?

I used to do it when I was in college in Delhi. In Mumbai, this was the only play I did. *Phir roti, rozi, mazdoori mein main lag gaya paise kamane ke liye. Phir chhoot gaya...* (then I drifted towards making money. And theatre got left behind)

HOW DO YOU LOOK BACK AT THE DAYS WHEN YOU WERE DOING *IMTIHAAN* FOR DOORDARSHAN. RETROSPECT ALWAYS GIVES EVERYTHING A GOLDEN GLOW... Yeah, it does.

INTERVIEW

There was a lot of insecurity because I didn't know this shit. I was directing Purushkshetra before Imtihaan. Anupam Kher's wife Kirron Kher used to be the anchor. He used to come to meet her and he was impressed by me. Because I was technically sound. He used to see me doing online edit etc... so he used to think ki *bahut* smart *banda hai*, Ravi Rai, who wrote and directed Imtihaan for 98 episodes, suddenly fell out with Anupam. I don't know what exactly happened. They needed a director mid-episode. He said – do this one. And I said *nahi* it's not fresh and all that. He said – arrey yaar







abhi toh koi nahi hai tu kar de... you are smart (We don't have anyone, you do it). I said, I haven't ever done fiction. He said nahi, nahi tu kar lega (You will be able to do it). Abhi jab choice nahi hoti hai toh confidence dikhana padta hai (When you have no choice, you have to show confidence). So that's how I started doing it. But while doing it, I remember that I was constantly feeling that I'd be called out. Because I didn't know how to direct.

YOUR CHARACTERS TRAVEL A LOT, THERE IS AN ISSUE OF

IDENTITY AS WELL... A lot of people ask me and I think about it myself as to why this theme repeats itself in my films but I have no answers for it. Maybe when I was young I used Earlier, I used to be terribly interested in what the critics had to say. I got one-and-a half and two stars for *Socha Na Tha. Kisi* mai ke laal ne dhai star se zyada nahi diya tha Jab We Met ko (No one gave more than two-and-a-half stars to Jab We Met). Now it's hailed as a cult classic. When Love Aaj Kal released, I looked at the critics and they had all given... more stars but each one said not as good as Jab We Met. And I'm like what the hell, it doesn't add up

to wonder about who I am? But I don't know why my films have these people doing that.

ALSO, THERE IS A KARMIC CONNECTION WITH NATURE IN YOUR FILMS.

and write in some exotic location... woh mujhse nahi hota (I can't do that). I'd rather chill at an exotic place. You finish writing at home before you leave. That's how it is. I'm not completely aware of what I'm doing when I am writing.

YOU HAVE AN INNATE INSTINCT FOR MUSIC. HOW DID THAT GET DEVELOPED?

My mom wanted me to be a singer initially. When I was a kid, we were staving in Patna those days, I was enrolled in a music class. I learnt a few ragas. But then cricket came into my life, in the 5th grade or something. So I stopped going to music classes. Also at home, *qawwalis* were played constantly. It was

high-grade poetry. Amir Khusrow's stuff on tapes. It was constantly on at my place and I used to dislike it because it was not as entertaining as Kishore Kumar singing a song on Binaca Geetmala. But all of that seeped into my bones. It shaped me, I think. And that got me involved in the whole process of making music. I

like interacting with composers. If you get a chance to hang out with Rahman, you want to spend more time... You enjoy it so much that you spend more and more time and get more and more involved. That's all I can think of.

HOW DO YOU REACT WHEN CRITICS SLAM YOUR FILMS?

Earlier, I used to be terribly interested in what the critics

had to say. I got one-and-a half and two stars for Socha Na Tha. Kisi mai ke laal ne dhai star se zvada nahi diva tha Jab We Met ko (No one gave more than two-and-a-half stars to *Iab We Met*). Now it's hailed as a cult classic. When Love Aai Kal released, I looked at the critics and they had all given, the same guys, more stars but each one said not as good as *lab We Met*. And I'm like what the hell, it doesn't add up. Then I realised they themselves had forgotten what they wrote about my earlier film. So, let me stop taking them seriously. And from that point, I didn't read criticism.

YOU HAVE WRITTEN SHE. IS IT ALMOST LIKE MAKING A MOVIE OR

DOES A MINI-SERIES REQUIRE A DIFFERENT DISCIPLINE?

I'm the showrunner of *She*. It's my story idea. But there are other writers that came in. We had seven episodes, I mean it's like three feature films.

YOUR DAUGHTER IDA ALI IS A DIRECTOR NOW. WHICH FILMS OF YOURS DOES SHE LIKE?

She used to dislike *Rockstar* when it was released. *Bechari* was calculating that it won't be as successful as I would want it to be. She was 11 years old then. But now it's her favourite. She likes it now.

IF THERE IS ONE FILM YOU COULD REDO FROM THE PAST CLASSICS OR A SONG, WHICH ONE WOULD IT BE?

When I saw Delhi 6, I felt I want to make this film again, right now, in my own way. But as far as classics are concerned, there are a lot of songs that I would like to picturise. Like Rahe na rahe hum... I will do it someday, There is a societal barrier or even the barrier of life itself in Rahe na rahe hum. Amazing! I will take permission and I will redo it for my own kick. I would also like to do Lag ja gale... And a few other songs that show an almost mystical connection between two people.

REMEMBERING JOHNNY BAKSHI

DEVESH SHARMA PROFILES THE VETERAN FILMMAKER, WHO PASSED AWAY RECENTLY
(1938-SEPTEMBER 5, 2020)



ohnny Bakshi was born in North-West Frontier Province in pre-Partition India in 1938. He reportedly lost his family in the Partition riots and found himself stranded in India. It's said he lived his early life in Odisha, before moving to Kolkata. He was a good sportsman and could play football, hockey and even boxing tolerably well. He reportedly got work in the railways under the sports quota. But he wasn't destined

to be a sportsperson. Destiny brought him to Mumbai. He found work at the Filmalaya Studio and started learning the intricacies of production there. He became friends with Raj Khosla, who he considered his guru. Mahesh Bhatt was another of Khosla's assistants. It was Johnny who gave Mahesh his first break as a director by producing Manzilein Aur Bhi Hain (1974). The film was miles ahead of its time in the sense that it revolved



around the relationship of a prostitute with two criminals. The censors reportedly refused to pass it. Bakshi had to put up a fight to get it released. Kabir Bedi acted as one of the leads in the film and became a lifelong friend. It can be said that while Johnny was unlucky when it came to commercial success, he was lucky in his choice of friends. His office in Mehboob studio. was said to be a place where the stars could unwind. He was always joking around, his booming laughter bouncing off the walls, as he passed around innumerable cups of tea and coffee and lent a sympathetic ear to their real and imagined woes. He was said to be the confidant of half the film industry.

The failure of his debut film as a producer didn't deter him. He soon made another thriller, starring Sanjeev Kumar in a double role, called *Vishwasghaat* (1977). It was again directed by Mahesh Bhatt. He got a chance to pay back his guru Raj Khosla when he produced Mera Dost Mera Dushman (1984). It was a dacoit film starring Shatrughan Sinha, Sanjeev Kumar, Smita Patil and Danny Denzongpa and was one of the last offerings of Khosla. Bakshi was quite close to Smita Patil. he produced and directed an art film called *Raavan* (1984) for her. It was a story about how a woman's love can change a man from being evil to being good. Jagjit Singh gave the music. Bakshi went on to make a few more films. He was friends with Rajesh Khanna and produced and directed Khudai (1994) with the former superstar in the lead.

Bakshi had a fascination for foreign celebrities and named his three sons after them. One of his sons is called Brando (named after the thespian Marlon Brando), another is called Bradman (named after cricketing legend Sir Don Bradman) and the third is called Kennedy (after the American President John F Kennedy). His daughter is called Priya. The filmmaker remained actively involved with various film trade bodies all his life and genuinely cared for the welfare of everyone associated with the cine trade. One day before he died, Bakshi complained of breathlessness and was put on a ventilator. A COVID-19 test was done, which turned out to be negative. He died of cardiac arrest in the early hours of September 5. The veteran was 82 at the time of his death.

FAREWELL, ASHALATA WABGAONKAR

shalata Wabgaonkar was a multitalented personality. Not only was she an acclaimed theatre and film actress. who'd made her mark in both Marathi and Hindi cinemas, she was also a trained classical singer. And had reportedly learnt music under the tutelage of renowned vocalist Pandit Iitendra Abhisheki. She used to sing in Konkani, her native language for the All India Radio. She was also a proficient *sangeet* natak (musical drama) artiste. Her most famous musical was the acclaimed Matsyagandha. She displayed her range in the play by playing a character whose arc ran from 18 to 80 years. She loved theatre and rubbed shoulders with the who's who of Marathi theatre, doing plays like Guntata Hriday Hey, Raigadala Jevha Jaag Yete. Chinna (where her co-stars were Smita Patil and Sadashiv Amrapurkar) and Mahananda. She also acted in Savitri. Umbartha. Pudhcha Paul. Maherchi Saree, Navri Mile Navrvala, Eka Peksha Ek, Atmavishwas and several other Marathi films.

The actress was born in Mumbai but traced her roots to Goa's Palolem village in Canacona. She

studied at the prestigious St. Colombo High School in Girgaum and reportedly also worked briefly in Mantralava after her matriculation. She did her post-graduation in psychology from the SNDT University. She then got associated with The Goa Hindu Association and her career took off under its aegis. She also associated with other associations like Chandralekha, Mumbai Marathi Sahitya

Sangh, Mauli Production, Kalamandir, INT etc and acted in many plays produced by them.

She became known as a reliable character artiste in Hindi films as well. Ashalata started off her Hindi career with director Basu Chatterjee's *Apne Paraye* (1980). It's said Chatterjee saw her in the play *Guntata Hriday Hey* and immediately offered her his film. She held her own amidst actors like Utpal Dutt, Amol Palekar and Shabana Azmi in the film and won mass acclaim. She soon made her mark doing mother and *bhabhi* roles in films. She acted in more than 200 Hindi films. Chief among them being Sharabi, Namak Halal, Shaukeen, Coolie, Sadma, Nikaah. Chalte Chalte. Aai Ki Aawaz, Woh Saat Din, Marte Dam Tak, Ghaval, Yeh To Kamaal Ho Gava. Pasand Apni Apni... She was also a writer and has written an autobiographical memoir called Gard Sabhovati.

Nearing 80, she was still active as a character artiste in serials. She was acting in the serial Aai Majhi Kalubai at the time of her death. It's said that around 22 members of the unit working in the serial got infected with COVID-19. Most reportedly recovered and so did Ashalata initially. Then she had a relapse and succumbed to the illness. She was admitted to a private hospital in Satara, Maharashtra and died on the morning of September 22. Her remains were cremated at Satara itself by fellow actress Alka Kubal, a long term associate, on the request of Ashalata's family members. She was 79 at the time of her death.



he prolific singer, who sang predominantly in Telugu, Tamil, Kannada, Malayalam as well as in Hindi , showed a natural tendency towards music from an early age. S. P. Balasubrahmanyam (SPB) was born in Nellore, Andhra Pradesh on June 4, 1946. His father, late S. P. Sambamurthy, was a *Harikatha* artiste and perhaps SPB picked up the nuances from there. He also, time and again, spoke about being influenced by Mohammed Rafi and

considered him as his guru. He revered the way Rafi brought alive the feelings contained in the songs and confessed to emulating him. The other singer he held in high esteem was Yesudas. In fact, in 2016, SPB had organised a *padapuja* in honour of Yesudas.

He has the rare distinction of rendering the most songs on a single day by any singer. He recorded 21 songs in Kannada for the composer Upendra Kumar in Bangalore from 9:00 am to 9:00 pm on February 8, 1981. He also recorded 19 songs in Tamil, 16 songs in Hindi in a day which is also a notable achievement. He reportedly had absolutely no formal tuition in Carnatic music. But had such a good ear for it that he was able to pick up on the subtleties without any hindrance. Director K Vishwanath's superhit Shankarabharanam secured a National Award for Balasubrahmanyam his first, in 1979. All six songs in the film were classical. Such was the case even with Ganavogi Panchakshari Gawai (1995), the Kannada film based on the life of the blind Hindustani music

visionary Panchakshari Gawai. He initially refused to do the project but later won a National Award for it.

PB made his debut as a playback singer with Sri Sri Sri Marvada Ramanna (1966), a Telugu film scored by his mentor, S. P. Kodandapani. His first Kannada song was recorded in1966 for the film Nakkare Ade Swarga, starring Kannada comedy king T. R. Narasimharaju. Other early songs he sang were duets with P. Susheela, Ivarkai ennum ilava kanni in the

1969 Tamil film Shanti Nilayam, starring Gemini Ganesh, and Aaviram nilavae vaa for MGR in Adimaippenn (1969). He was introduced to the Malayalam film industry by G. Devarajan in the film Kadalppalam (1969), starring Prem Nazir. His first work in Hindi films was in Ek Duuje Ke Live (1981), for which he received the National Award for Best Male Playback Singer. The film was a remake of director K. Balachander's Maro Charitra (1978), where SP was Kamal Haasan's voice in all the songs. The Hindi had Laxmikant-Pyarelal as the composers and they reportedly weren't convinced his was the right voice for the film. He had to give an audition and won L-P over with his versatility. The film proved to be a musical hit.

He has won six National Awards in all. His fame in Hindi cinema got cemented when he became Salman Khan's voice in Maine Pyar Kiya (1989). The album became a huge hit and SPB won a Filmfare Award in 1990 for his efforts. Apart from this, he has bagged six Filmfare trophies. He became the voice of Salman Khan after giving playback for the actor in *Maine Pvar Kiva.* He continued to sing for the actor in many films like Saajan (1991), Patthar Ke Phool (1991). Hum Aapke Hain Koun..! (1994), Andaz Apna Apna and many more.

SPB also tried his hand at acting and shone in Tamil films like *Keladi Kanmani* (1990), *Thiruda Thiruda* (1993), *Kadhalan* (1994), *Ullaasam* (1996) and many more. He became

a well-known dubbing artiste as well. In his long career, he provided his voice for stars like Kamal Haasan. Rajinikanth. Vishnuvardhan, Salman Khan, K. Bhagyaraj, Mohan, Anil Kapoor, Girish Karnad, Gemini Ganesan, Arjun Sarja, Nagesh, Karthik, and Raghuvaran in various languages. He also dubbed for Ben Kingsley in the Telugu-dubbed version of Gandhi. And he dabbled in music composition too.

SPB was admitted to the MGM Healthcare hospital in Chennai with mild Covid-19 symptoms on August 5. He was transferred to the ICU on August 13 and his situation was said to be critical. He had been connected to life support since then. He underwent plasma therapy and physiotherapy at a later stage when his condition seemed to be improving. He remained on a ventilator and ECMO (Extracorporeal Membrane Oxygenation) support. But while his condition remained critical, he was stable and responding to doctors. Sadly, S.P. Balasubrahmanyam passed away at 1.04 pm in Chennai on September 25 He was 74.

n an era predominated by a handful of singers. singer and composer Jagiit Singh's contribution to music can best be described as being genre defining. The ghazal, the prerogative of classical singers like Mehdi Hassan, Begum Akhtar, Angoori Bai and others and patronised by the literary elite, was brought into the mainstream thanks to Jagiit Singh's efforts. His constant companion in his endeavours was his wife Chitra Singh, an accomplished singer herself. He handpicked the works of noted poets like Mirza Ghalib. Mir Taqi Mir, Daagh Dehlvi right upto Sudarshan Fakir, Nida Fazli, Gulzar and Javed Akhtar, reaching across the demographics. Staying away from the usual tropes of sharab and shabab, his compositions spoke of the rites of passage... of loving, losing and learning, appealing to ghazal connoisseurs



as well as to the masses. Jagiit's style of composing and singing was what the learned dub as bol-pradhan (emphasis on words). Also, his raag-based renditions relied both on the strains of the saxophone and the guitar alongside the tabla and the sitar... The same fusion of melody and melancholy, he brought to films like Saath Saath and Arth in the '80s, making it a character in the relationshipdriven films of the era. After losing their only son Vivek Singh in a tragic road accident in 1990. a heartbroken Chitra stopped singing, while Jagjit took it on as a panacea for his pain. Just as his passion for horses and penchant for humour... were all but engagements to keep the sadness at bay... Around his ninth death anniversary, we pay a tribute to the maestro, who not only popularised the ghazal as a genre but also gave it a pride of place in Hindi cinema...

EARLY YEARS

Jagjit Singh Dhiman was born at Sri Ganganagar, Rajasthan, in a Ramgarhia Sikh family. His father, Sardar Amar Singh Dhiman, was a surveyor with the government's Public Works' Department. Initially, Jagjit learned music from a visually-challenged master, Pandit Chagan Lal Sharma and later from Ustad Jamal Khan of Maihar Gharana. Ustad Jamal trained him in vocal traditions of *khaval*. dhrupad, thumri and others. While his father hoped he would become an engineer, music was what pulled Jagjit. He began his career in 1961 singing at All India Radio's (AIR) Jalandhar station. In March 1965, he came to Bombay to make a career in music. Jagjit managed to survive by hosting *mehfils* and home concerts. He sang at film parties in the hope that a music director would hear him and give him a break. But it was tough to break into a competitive industry.

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JAGJIT & CHITRA

Still a struggler, he met singer Chitra Dutta in 1967, when a music director wanted to compile an album with various singers.

Jagjit and Chitra's vocals added to the ambience of Raman *Kumar's* Saath Saath. The film traced the conflict between ideals and reality. Yeh tera ghar veh mera ghar. **Pyaar mujh se** jo kiya tumne, Yeh bata de muihe zindagi and Tumko dekha toh veh khaval aava. lvricised the themes of romance, rancour and redemption

When Chitra heard him sing, she found his voice unique but heavy. She feared she wouldn't be able to sing with him. Eventually, she sang. And as his voice grew on her, so did his 'caring' personality. Chitra married Jagjit in 1969 (she was earlier married to Debu Dutta, who helmed a recording studio). Gradually, the couple found its groove in the realm of *ghazals*. Their album, The Unforgettables in 1978, remains unforgettable till date. Exquisite poetry rendered with light traditional music, the selection was a precursor to the genre they were to later define and own. Raat bhi neend bhi, Baat niklegi and Ahista ahista... the lyrical and lucid *ghazals* were loved by the masses. Through the '80s, albums like A Milestone. Main Aur Meri Tanhai. The Latest (the entire album was written by Sudarshan Fakir with Woh kaagaz ki kashti turning immortal), The Gold Disc. Ae Mere Dil. Ecstasies, A Sound Affair and Echoes carried their fame across countries. Bevond Time (1987) was the first digitally recorded album by an Indian artiste. "A friend in England insisted that the doctors play our album Beyond Time each time his wife went in for

Mahesh Bhatt's Arth yet again endorsed Jagjit's penchant to play around with poetry and pain. Bhatt's narrative, reportedly based on his unhinged relationship with the late Parveen Babi, was a study of conflicting emotions. It spoke of broken promises and broken people. Kaifi Azmi's lyrics were in sync with Homi Mullan's and Jagit-Chitra's compositions. Chitra sang Tu nahi toh zindagi mein, while the rest were rendered by Jagjit. Bringing forth the bitter-sweet nuances of life was Tum itna jo muskura rahe ho. While Jhuki jhuki si nazar spoke of suppressed love Koi yeh kaise bataaye, questioned the impermanence of feelings. The music of Saath Saath and Arth, sold in a single cassette, proved to be a bonanza for Jagjit-Chitra fans.

Jagjit's other popular film songs include the heart-breaking *Chithi na koi* sandesh from *Dushman* (1998), the poetic

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the delivery of their three children," shared Chitra with *Filmfare*.

FORAY IN FILMS

The '80s brought them unprecedented glory in films too. Though Jagjit had done playback before, he found mainstream recognition with *Hothon se choo lo tum*, filmed on Raj Babbar in *Prem Geet* (1981). He also composed the soundtrack for the film. The year 1982 remains a landmark in his film career. Suiting the tone and tenor of arthouse cinema, Jagjit and Chitra's vocals added to the ambience of Raman Kumar's *Saath Saath*. The film traced the conflict between ideals and reality as played out by Farooque Shaikh's and Deepti Naval's characters. Kuldeep Singh's compositions, Gulzar's poetry is at times abstract. Papa (Chitra's endearment for Jagjit) wouldn't hesitate to say; 'Mujhe samajh mein nahi aaya, toh logon ko kya aayega?'" - Chitra Singh

" Chitra once shared with Filmfare adding, "Haath chhoote bhi toh rishte nahin chhoota karte (Pinjar) was their favourite." Chitra added that classifying Jagjit as a 'ghazal singer' would be restricting his genius. "He was a unique musician. His voice was so rich. it could seldom match any hero. When Mahesh Bhatt used Jagjit*ji's* voice for Raj Kiran in Arth, it didn't sound as heavy. We also sang for Saath Saath (1982), where his voice suited the mood of the film. But generally, his renditions remained background songs." she analysed.

Mirza Ghalib in 1988. Jagjit popularised the legendary 19th-century poet by composing and singing his *ghazals* in the eponymous serial, directed by Gulzar. Traditional ghazals like Dil hi to hai, Hazaaron khwahishein aisi, Aah ko chahiye ek umr and Yeh na thi hamari qismat, given the contemporary spin, enjoyed a mass appeal. "A song is not about vocal acrobatics, it's the sound of your soul," reflected Chitra.

THE TRAGEDY

The couple's musical odyssey came to a jarring halt in 1990 when their 20-year-old son, Vivek, died in a tragic road accident. "My world came crashing down. I had reduced to 43 kilos and looked like a ghost. I couldn't face people. *Mera gala apne aap* band ho gaya (I was struck speechless). And it staved like that for nearly 14 years," recalled the grief-stricken mother, who gave up singing altogether. She took refuge in spirituality and Bowen healing. Jagjit and Chitra's tribute to Vivek came in the form of the album Someone, Somewhere, which was recorded before the mishap. Starting





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with a *Shabad Gurubani*, Jagjit began a new journey from thereon. His music changed forever. It veered towards the spiritual and the philosophical. Apart from an album with Lata Mangeskar, titled *Sajda*, Jagjit's other notable albums include *Hope*, *Marasim*, *In Search*, *Mirage*, *Silsilay* and many devotional albums including Kabir bhajans. His last film track was *Har aur tabahi ka manzar* for the film *Gandhi To Hitler* (2011).

THE LAST YEARS

Another tragedy that hit the family was when Chitra's daughter and ex-model Monica Dutta, 50, committed suicide on May 29, 2009. Jagjit was shaken after

Monica's death. "He had seen her as a five-year-old. She was like his daughter," shared the equally bereaved Chitra. Jagiit was touring America then. He cancelled his shows and caught connecting flights to reach home. While Chitra found solace in spirituality and in looking after her young grandsons Umair and Armaan (Monica's sons from her first marriage with cinematographer Jehangir Choudhary), Jagjit, keeping his grief private, immersed himself in music. Reportedly, in 2011, a series of 70 musical events were planned the world over to celebrate his 70th year. One such was a show with Ghulam Ali in Mumbai. Sadly, just prior to that, he suffered a brain haemorrhage on September 23, 2011. He was in a coma for over two weeks and passed away on October 10. After his demise, Chitra released the album, The Voice Beyond (2013), which includes seven of Jagjit Singh's unreleased compositions. "Since Vivek passed away, there was this thing between my daughter Monica, Jagjitji and me as to who would meet him first. Both of them have beaten me to it!" she told *Filmfare*. "Everything in life is momentary va jee lo, vaa jhel lo (enjoy the moment or endure it)," she summed up quoting their ghazal, "Manzil na de, charag na de, hausla toh de... I know he's around and that gives me strength."

ash Chopra, as everyone knows, is the younger brother of noted filmmaker BR Chopra. While BR was known for his socialist stance in his movies, Yash concentrated on human emotions and later came to be known as the king of romance.

In Yash's eyes, the heart knew no boundaries. He understood that love blinds human beings to the norms of the society and more often than not people end up breaking rules. He tried to show that there was no malice involved when people did so. In Daag (1973) for instance, Rajesh Khanna is presumed dead. He starts a new life and meets Raakhee. He's forced by circumstances to marry her. Later. when he comes across his first wife once more, he finds it hard to choose between the two. He lets the women decide and they all end up living together happily.

In *Silsila* (1981) in a casting that reportedly mirrored their real-life situation, Amitabh Bachchan and Rekha indulge in an extra-marital romance as Jaya Bachchan looks on. Here too, the director didn't take sides. He told the tale of human follies like it is and let the audience pass their own judgement. The film's box office prospects was marred by its too real casting, though today it enjoys a cult status.



The filmmaker believed in making his offerings larger than life. He loved shooting at foreign locations and was even honoured by the Swiss government for promoting Switzerland through his films. They have even installed his statue there. Also, he kind of pioneered designer films. The leading stars of YRF films wore the best clothes, travelled in the best cars, ate in top-of-the-table restaurants and lived in top-class homes. He showed us how the rich lived and partied and made us live their lives vicariously. But he also made sure to show them as people like us beneath the designer togs.

Music also played a large hand in making brand YRF a success. Strangely, he worked with unconventional composers, be it Khayaam, Shiv-Hari, Uttam Singh or even Pritam, who was unknown at the time of *Dhoom*.

Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenge can

be said to be his, and by extension, his banner's crowning achievement. The film was a simple love story at heart which defines society's norms, had some great music to boot and was shot all over Europe and in Punjab. It starred Shah Rukh Khan and Kajol and cemented their superstardom. The baton from the old to the new passed seamlessly with this film. His elder son, Aditya Chopra, took over the reins. While romance still remains the core, the banner has started investing in action too. The highly successful Dhoom series or the recent War. which too will reportedly be developed as a franchise, are proof enough that Adi has made the right call.

Yash Chopra is no more but his banner continues to make his legacy shine year after year, for both the old and the newer generations of fans...
