Somehow, we survived the worst and slowly, by the end of the year, limped back to the new normal.

That we were apprehensive about how we were going to conduct our main Bollywood event is an understatement.

Nevertheless, we decided to go ahead and face the fears rather than doing nothing and speculating about them. Fortune favours the brave, as they say. Despite the mandatory tests, social distancing norms and the phased pattern of the awards, we pulled it off. Three cheers to my entire team and to everyone involved in giving birth to this mini miracle.

The event started at 2 pm in the afternoon. And that was the first hurdle. As the denizens of the film industry are notorious for keeping their own timings. But we needn't have worried as the *esprit de corps* kicked in. Knowing that through this ceremony they were signalling an all is well message out there, the industry folks turned up on time. And the 66th Vimal Elaichi Filmfare Awards 2021 were on.

We lost many illustrious stars last year. One of the brightest among them was Irrfan Khan. He used to make each nuance of every character he played stand out. One could vouch for the basic humanity of the characters he played and their believability, be it in *Haasil* (2003), which brought him mainstream fame, *Maqbool* (2004), where he touched Shakespearean heights with his performance, *Paan Singh Tomar*, where he looked like a Chambal legend or *The Lunchbox* (2013) where he played a middle-aged man in love. Irrfan was our Lifetime Achievement Award winner this year. His son Babil collected it on his late father's behalf and the industry greeted him as one of their own. There were only kind words and pats of encouragement for the youngster, who wants to carve a career in showbiz.

I missed the booming baritone of Bachchan *saab*, who couldn't attend due to medical reasons, and who won the Best Actor (Critics') award for his performance in *Gulabo Sitabo*. Turn the pages to know more about the drama and the madness of this year's magnum opus...

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

IRRFAN KHAN

Irrfan studied drama at NSD after doing his MA. He moved to Mumbai after passing out and acted in numerous television serials, including *Chanakya, Bharat Ek Khoj, Sara Jahan Hamara, Banegi Apni Baat, Chandrakanta, Shrikant* and *Sparsh.* He made his big-screen debut with the Academy Award nominated film *Salaam Bombay!* (1988) directed by Mira Nair. He was also seen in the acclaimed art film *Ek Doctor Ki Maut* (1990).

He became a known face in the West when London-based director Asif Kapadia gave him the lead in *The Warrior (2001)*, which won acclaim in several film festivals abroad. He later went on to act in several prestigious projects from the West like *The Namesake* (2006), *The Darjeeling Limited* (2007), the Academy Award winning film *Slumdog Millionaire* (2008), *New York*, *I Love You* (2009), *The Amazing Spider-Man* (2012), *Life of Pi* (2012), *Jurassic World* (2015) and *Inferno* (2016).

He won the Filmfare Award for Best Villain for Haasil. Besides that, he won the Filmfare Best Supporting Actor trophy for Life In A... Metro (2007), Best Actor (Critics') for Paan Singh Tomar (2012) and the Best Actor trophy for Hindi Medium (2017) and for Angrezi Medium (2010), its sequel. The award was given posthumously to the actor. In February 2018, Irrfan was diagnosed with an undisclosed disease, which later turned out to be a neuroendocrine tumour. He travelled to London and returned after one year of treatment. He was hospitalised due to a colon infection on April 28, 2020 and died of subsequent complications.

SAGAR SARHADI DID AN INTERVIEW WITH *FILMFARE* A FEW DAYS BEFORE HE PASSED AWAY. **DEVESH SHARMA** CHRONICLES THE WRITER/DIRECTOR'S LAST WORDS...

(May 11, 1933 - March 22, 2021)

Writer/filmmaker Sagar Sarhadi was born in Baffa, Pakistan on May 11, 1933. Like millions of others, he became a refugee after Partition. Destiny brought him to Mumbai, where he lived in a small room with his elder brother's family. He was of Marxist leanings and was interested in becoming an Urdu writer and poet. The need for financial security gravitated him towards films. After initial struggles, he became associated with Yash Chopra and the rest, as they say, is history. He became known for his dialogue and screenplays in Yash Chopra's love sagas like Kabhi Kabhie (1976), Silsila (1981), Faasle (1985) and Chandni (1989), among others. He even wrote the dialogue for Basu Bhattacharya's Anubhav (with Kapil Kumar, 1972), Raj Kanwar's Deewana (1992) and Rakesh Roshan's Kaho Naa... Pyaar Hai (2000) but would forever be known for his association with Yash Chopra.

He turned director with *Bazaar* (1982). Starring Farooq Shaikh, Smita Patil, Naseeruddin Shah and Supriya Pathak, the film was reportedly based on a true story about Muslim girls in Hyderabad, who were being forced to marry rich expatriates for money. The film had some soul-stirring music by Khayaam, with songs like Dikhayee dive vun. Karoge vaad to and Dekh lo aaj humko jee bharke being popular even now. It was considered one of the hallmarks of the neo-realistic cinema in India and despite its art film tag, was a commercial success as well. Unfortunately, despite the film's success, Sarhadi wasn't able to carve a career as a filmmaker. He had set his heart on making the sequel to Bazaar but couldn't see his dream come true.

He had planned a film called *Tere Shaher Mein*, starring Naseeruddin Shah, Smita Patil, Deepti Naval and Marc Zuber, but the film couldn't be made. Also, his last project *Chausar*, starring Nawazuddin Siddiqui and Amruta Subhash, couldn't see the light of the day.

Sarhadi was said to be close to several women but he never married. He passed away on March 22 and is survived by his nephew, filmmaker and theatre personality Ramesh Talwar. Excerpts from his last interview with *Filmfare...*

How did Ganga Sagar Talwar change into Sagar Sarhadi? There used to be a gentleman living in my neighbourhood who was called Ganga Sagar and hence I didn't want people to confuse him with me. And Zia Sarhadi was quite a famous screen writer when I was starting out. He was from a border town like I was, so taking Sagar from my own name and borrowing Sarhadi from Zia saab I became Sagar Sarhadi. The nom de plume suited me and brought me fame.

Do you still retain memories of your home in Abbottabad, Baffa, which is now in Pakistan?

Why would we want to leave our ancestral home? We were told to run away otherwise we'd be killed. I left behind my beautiful village, which had a stream running alongside it. The best days of my life were spent there. I yearn to return to it always. In my memory and dreams I still do.

Coming to Mumbai after Partition must have felt like a cultural shock

There was a sense of uprootedness which hasn't really gone even after all these years. I still feel uprooted. There was a sense of loss but being young, I was also full of hope. I wanted to learn, to earn, to make a name for myself in this new place where everything, be it the language, the cuisine, the architecture seemed alien. It was a whole new country. But at the same time I knew that it had better opportunities as well. So I decided to stay here and began my struggle.

You were associated with the Progressive Writers'

Association...

I met Kaifi Azmi *saab* and through him became part of the Progressive Writers' Association. I did have Marxist leanings back then and like most idealistic young men, wanted to do something for my country. We all felt that art should be used for the betterment of the society. I came across feminism and





feministic writers during that phase and that kind of left an impression on me. If you notice, all the films I wrote had strong female characters.

You started off with writing the dialogue for Basu Bhattacharva for Anubhav. Tell us something about that Basu Bhattacharva was a little older to me. He had worked with Bimal Rov and carried forward Bimal da's sensibilities. He was a well-read, well-articulated, well-rounded man. I started working with him because I felt being associated with him would make me grow as a writer. Anubhav was a realistic film and the dialogue was meant to be echoes of actual conversations.

How did the association with Yash Chopra come along? Yash*ji* called me up after watching a one-act play of mine which I had written and my nephew Ramesh

661 realised that if a writer wants to make what's dear to him then he has to direct it himself. So I joined a film society, watched hundreds of films from all over the world and picked up nuances. One day, when I was confident about making a film independently. I became a director 99

Talwar, who is also a good friend, had directed. Ramesh used to work with Yashji and he asked Ramesh to bring me along one day. He offered me Kabhi Kabhie after that first meeting. He sent me to Taj Hotel in Kashmir after narrating the germ of an idea. I used to go on long walks in Kashmir, lost in my own thoughts and then come back and write what I gathered. Strangely, Yashji liked everything I wrote. And he never changed anything without asking me. That creative freedom he gave was the reason I came up with so

many beautiful things for him. And not only was it satisfying creatively, I reaped monetary benefits as well. My future was secure and bright.

Tell us a memory from Kabhi Kabhie...

Well, it was my first film with Yashji and yet he gave me pride of place on the posters. Written by Sagar Sarhadi came before Lyrics by Sahir Ludhianyi, Now. Sahir *saab* was a much senior, much-respected writer. He didn't like it and was angry with Yashji for doing so. He complained to Yashji and the director

in his own way explained that you're well known, let this youngster also get a share of the limelight and then Sahir was mollified.

Yash Chopra didn't give you a chance to direct?

Yash*ii* never saw me as a director. He knew me as a writer. And hence he only gave me work as a writer. It was through my own epiphany that I became a director. I realised that if a writer wants to make what's dear to him then he has to direct it himself. So I joined a film society, watched hundreds of films from all over the world and picked up nuances. One day, when I was confident about making a film independently, I became a director and became successful in that field as well.

From Yash Chopra's world to the world to Bazaar. it was quite a leap... I read an article on the



fake marriage racket and couldn't believe such a thing was happening. I went to Hyderabad and met the journalists and social workers who had exposed the racket. introducing a new face. Writing with a new actor in mind is a challenge. Your responsibility increases as you want his debut film to do well. I kept him loud and aggressive in the first half and emotional and sensitive in the second half so that he could showcase a complete range of emotions to the audience. He was the height of confidence when we were shooting and predictably went on to scale great heights in years to come both as an actor and a star. It's a matter of pride for me that he began his innings with my screenplay.

Gulzar, Salim-Javed, used to be your contemporaries. What sort of a rapport did you have with them? Gulzar had a mastery of language which I admired and wanted to emulate. I respected and loved him and the feeling was mutual. When we were younger, I used to regularly drop by his place in Bandra, share a drink or two. I learnt much from him and would always be grateful to him for everything he taught me. You grow when you associate with people who have a unique grasp on reality. There was no rivalry between writers back then. We were all brimming with ideas and we all grew through that association of ideas. Salim-Javed were at the top of their game back then. Their word was law. They used to write with a particular actor in mind and the filmmakers used to respect

their casting choices. No other writer in the industry has ever wielded that kind of power. They were very organised in their lives and that's what I learnt from them. We knew each other but we were never close. But the mutual respect was there.

Any advice to young writers of today?

Change is compulsion, Change is constant. Change is the only reality there is. A new grammar, a new technique of working will emerge and you'll have to learn that fast in order to survive, in order to excel. You should constantly keep reading new books, new plays, keep watching good cinema from different parts of the world, and constantly try to evolve. Also, don't let success make a home in your head. Be humble. In the film world, your fortunes change every Friday. So keep your head down and keep striving for excellence with every endeavour.

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REMEMBERING SHASHKALA AUGUST 4, 1932 - APRIL 4, 2021

The veteran character actor passed away recently. **Devesh Sharma** offers a brief profile of her life and career

hashikala Jawalkar Saigal was born in 1932 at Solapur. Her father Anantrao Iawalkar was a cloth merchant. She had five other siblings. Her father's business unfortunately collapsed when she was still a child. It was tough going for the actor, who then joined a dance and drama troupe to make ends meet. Her troupe enacted mythological plays at fairs and child Shashikala became famous for playing Krishna. The family later shifted to Mumbai. She started going to film studios to find work. It's said she was discovered by singing star Noorjehan. The singer and her husband Shaukat Hussain were making a film called Zeenat (1945) and wanted to cast her as Noorjehan's daughter in the film. Her lack of mastery over Urdu

didn't get her the speaking role but she was included in a *qawwali* scene in the film.

She started getting work regularly through the good graces of Noorjehan but all that changed when the singing star and her husband migrated to Pakistan after Partition. Her struggles started all over again. She married Om Prakash Saigal, a relative of singer and actor Kundan Lal Saigal when she was barely 19. She'd been getting roles in films but wasn't getting the recognition she deserved despite being talented. The lead roles too weren't coming. Her husband tried to make a film starring her



but it took too long to make and ultimately nothing came of it. The film. ironically titled Krorepati (1961), which starred Kishore Kumar opposite her, bombed at the box office, taking all their savings with it. Financial insecurity led to marital discord at home. It's said she even left her husband for a while, though they reconciled later.

It was her decision to concentrate on character roles that saved her career. The change came with the film Aarti (1962), starring Meena Kumari, Ashok Kumar, and Pradeep Kumar. She played a villain's role in this family drama. The negative role

won her plaudits and even won her a *Filmfare* trophy. Offers started pouring in and she never looked back after that. She did important roles in films like *Gumrah* (1963) – which won her another Filmfare Best Actor In A Supporting Role Award-Avee Milan Ki Bela (1964), Waqt (1965), Anupama (1966). Phool Aur Patthar (1966) and many more. While she was financially secure, she wasn't mentally at ease and it's at this point of life that she reportedly started searching for spiritual solace. Her search first took her to vipassana meditation and later attracted her towards Mother Teresa. She was very much influenced by Sisters of Mercy and even worked in their ashram in Pune as a volunteer. A meeting with Mother Teresa pushed her further into social service. Mother assigned her to look after Nirmal Hriday, a home for the dying. Working with the organisation brought her the spiritual ease she had long wished for. Later, when she lost one of her daughters to cancer in 1995, she was able to draw strength from the work she was doing. In between, she converted to Christanity, though in her interviews she maintained it wasn't Mother Teresa's influence but the compulsion of her own heart which made her take the step.

She soon graduated to doing bhabhi and maa roles. Not all were negative in nature. One remembers her matching Rekha's footwork in Khubsoorat (1980), where she played the eldest *bahu* of the house. She hadn't formally

learnt Kathak and yet so apt were her moves that it felt she was a trained dancer. Earlier. in Phool Aur Patthar, she had even done a cabaret dance. She certainly could move if she set her mind to it. The wind of new wave cinema was blowing in the '70s -'80s and she too wasn't untouched by it. Her performance in the 1977 film Swami, where she acted side-by-side with art film veterans like Utpal Dutt, Girish Karnad and Shabana Azmi was admired by the masses and the critics alike.

ike most character artistes. she gravitated towards television in the later stage of her career. Her best known work for TV remains Sonpari. She was also seen in series like Kise Kahen Apna, Jeena Isi Ka Naam Hai, Apnapan and Dil Deke Dekho. She remained an outgoing personality, remaining active in the field of social service and was in touch with her industry friends. The pandemic and the resultant lockdown reportedly took a toll on her personality. She hated being homebound and felt caged by the restrictions. God chose an auspicious day for her passing away. On April 4, Easter Sunday, which is seen as a celebration of new life, she passed away at her home in the presence of her granddaughter Soniya and her great-granddaughter Shanaya.

She may no longer be with us in the flesh but will always be known to us through her work on the silver screen...



OVER BY HER CANDOUR AND SASS

wara Bhasker is one actress who has happily hopped onto the OTT bandwagon and is reaping rich benefits. While others were sitting idle and baking banana bread during the lockdown, Swara had four web series out on OTT. And she isn't averse to taking risk or shying away from something risque as long as it indulges her creative cravings. She's always spoken her mind and is known for her antiestablishment stance. She reasons if the artistes don't speak up when other sectors get affected, then being quiet will become a habit and they'll easily submit to curbs when creativity gets targeted. She doesn't know about others but she's unwilling to go gently into that dark night. Excerpts from a rollicking interview with the feisty actress who doesn't believe in being just another pretty face...

How does it feel to have had four web series released during the lockdown?

It feels great. Rashhari got released in June 2020, then came *Flesh* in August, Bhaag Beanie Bhaag in December and the latest is Aapkey Kamrey Mein Koi Rehta Hai (AKMKRH), streaming on MX from January 2021 onwards. So I'm loving it. For a year dominated by the coronavirus pandemic, this is great.

Horror-comedy is not a

highly explored genre in India. Were you skeptical before signing AKMKRH?

When I read a script, I never think of what genre it belongs to. I read it for what it is. So when I read its script, I really liked it. It was edgy and funny. For me, the horror in the series is how can four boys be so dumb. Gauray Sinha, the writer and director of the series has done a good job with balancing the humour and the scary bits. Of course, there is horror but it's a story of four friends, a comedy of errors. The only

thing I was worried about was that whenever a story requires a suspension of disbelief, it can get tacky or cheesy. I feel if your audience is interested in you, they don't necessarily have to believe in what they are watching. If you've got them hooked in, then you're okay. So the challenge for me was whether as an actor I can engage you enough that vou'll be interested in my performance even though vou don't believe in what's happening.

What were the shooting timelines for your series? Did you shoot anything during the lockdown? All four were shot between the end of 2018 till the start of 2020. *Bhaag Beanie Bhaag* was the last thing

it difficult to flow from one to the other?

As much as possible, I try not to shoot two things together. I've done it once before and it's most distracting and irritating. It's also very hard. Later, when I watched these shows. I realised I had prepared well for each of them. The transition from one to the other happened during the process of preparation. So for me, if you prepare well for each role, you will be able to find that transition in the preparation. There's also this new thing I've started doing. Actors always try hard to get into a role, but we never have a process of getting out of it. I've started to do that now. Especially after Anarkali Of Arrah. I hadn't realised that it

I shot before the lockdown. But I dubbed for two or three of these shows during the lockdown. So we had this impressive set-up with the sound engineer in Mumbai and I was in a studio in Delhi with a different sound engineer. Everything was sanitised after each sitting and I bought my own headphones. Everything was shot before but a lot of the post-production happened during the lockdown.

All your four roles are different from each other. How did you prepare for them and was had affected me psychologically. After that film, I started to question myself as to why there was so much anger within me or what was happening with me. I realised that I got into the role but never got out of it.

Do you feel being an entertainer and an active voice of activism can go hand-in-hand?

I never saw them as being in opposition with each other. Having an opinion is the most natural thing. We are born with a brain and a mouth. Opinions make us human. My pet can't have an opinion and even if it

does, it can't express it. So I don't understand why being an actor and having an opinion are two opposite things. I'm an artiste, I pay taxes here, I'm a citizen of this country... whatever happens in the country affects my work directly. I feel as an actor I should have an opinion. I believe in the policy of live and let live. If I have an opinion, it doesn't mean you need to have the same opinion as well. I don't judge people for not speaking up, for the choices they make or choosing to stay silent. I do judge people for breaking the law. Have whatever opinion you do, but don't try to justify murder and don't normalise hate. If you have used your voice or platform to harm someone, especially a community, then I'm not okay with that. It's okay if you don't want to work with someone to avoid the toxicity.

What is your take on censorship and the hike in ban culture?

I do not believe in censorship. The legacy of censorship in India is very problematic because those laws were made by the British colonial government to repress the

voice of India during the freedom struggle. They didn't want people to go out there and demand freedom. That is literally the origin of censorship in India. So I don't understand why these laws still exist and why do we have to bear the burden of our colonial past even now. I believe in certification. Yes, there is content that children shouldn't watch. It's only meant for adults. It's terrible that censorship is happening in our country and of course. it is politicised. It is a bad sign for democracy because you don't know what you'll say that will hurt someone. In the last six months, every other week there is a new controversy where people are trying to ban content. That is such a terrible sign for us as a modern society. We've also become too petty as a society. One of the biggest conditions for good art and creativity to flourish is the freedom and safety of your thoughts and expressions. If you make our creativity criminal and if people can go to jail for having a certain expression, then we have to go back to the nonsense formula of filmmaking with item numbers, cars flying and the same old storyline.

What do you feel about escapist cinema compared to realistic stories?

It is fine to have escapist cinema but one day they'll come to control our fantasies also. If you can't crack a joke today, one day they'll tell you, you can't dream a dream. Your fantasies will hurt their sentiments. No genre is problematic. Look at *Avatar.* It is a prime example of cinema that can be called escapist but look at the kind of critique it is making of authoritarianism, capitalism and the American foreign policy. So the problem is not the genre but the mentality we have as a society.

How was it working with Shabana Azmi and Divya Dutt in *Sheer Qorma*?

Shabana *ji* and Divya ma'am are two of my most favourite actors in the industry. Shabana *ji* is an inspiration for me and she's someone I've always looked upto. So when I heard that they both were going to be in the film. I didn't care what it was about. I knew I wanted to be in it. I was okay if I had one line, I would still go ahead and say it. To share screen space with Shabana *ji* after ten vears of mv career, I feel fulfilled. It's a lovely film with great performances and Shabana ji and Divya ma'am are both in great form.

What next on your plate?

I have started shooting for my next film Jahan Chaar Yaar which is a fun story of four housewives from a small town in Uttar Pradesh who decide to take a vacation to Goa. It stars my 'veere' Shikha Talsania, Meher Vij and Pooja Chopra. Fingers crossed, this year I'm also planning to turn producer. There's something I've written and I'm trying to make sure that it goes on the floor. So it's going to be a busy year.



BESTFERENCES ABOUT BEING A DIRECTOR AND SHARES ARECDOTES ABOUT HER CO-STARS AND HER PERSONAL LIFE. VEDANSHI PATHAK TAKES NOTES

My parents used to watch Surabhi and loved it. What they liked most was the ever-smiling anchor Renuka Shahane, who together with Siddharth Kak regaled the viewers for 10 years. The actress made her mark in films with Hum Aapke Hain Koun..! (1994) playing Madhuri Dixit's elder sister. Though strangely, she never capitalised on that success. She married Ashutosh Rana in 2001 and afterwards got busy with her married life. Her sons Shauryaman and Satyendraand kept her busy. She did come on and off in TV serials but didn't pursue acting actively. Renuka was seeking different horizons and made her debut in direction with Marathi film Rita (2009). Now a decade later, she has made her directorial debut in Hindi cinema with Tribhanga. When I approached Kajol for the role of Anu, she just loved the script and her character Anu. And once she stepped into it, everything just fell into place. Tanvi and Kajol had already worked together in Dushman. When I narrated the script to Tanvi, she loved the script, she loved her character so she came on board. Mithila also loved Masha as she felt that nobody else would have cast her as Masha because she's always that chubby little girl next door. Once Kajol was on board, Ajay Devgn also read the script and stepped in as the producer. Then we got Siddharth Malhotra, Banijay Asia. Netflix on board as producers as well. It was like a dream production for me.

WHAT DO YOU THINK OF YOURSELF AS MORE – RENUKA THE ACTOR OR RENUKA THE DIRECTOR?

Definitely as a director because I feel I'm more driven as a director than as an actor. As an actor you're dependent on other people. As a director you're doing your own thing. You're the captain of the ship.

I had to give three auditions before

they selected me for it. Working with Sooraj *ji* (Barjatya), Madhuri (Dixit) and Salman (Khan) and Reema *ji* (Lagoo), Laxmikant Berde was such a beautiful experience. And the amount of fun we had on the sets and the amount of warmth we did the work with. got reflected in the film. Nobody thought it would run for long at that time and it did. It broke all kinds of records. It made me feel powerful, you know. I could say no to projects at the time when I was getting really good roles.

WHAT'S IT TO HAVE TWO SEASONED ACTORS UNDER THE SAME ROOF? HOW DOES THAT WORK? TELL US ABOUT YOUR JOURNEY OF LOVE WITH ASHUTOSH RANA?

We met at the trial of Hansal Mehta's film *Jayate*, which never got released but at least we got introduced that day. And after that we kept in touch.

THE BUTTERFLY EFFECT

is described as a phenomenon whereby a minute localised change in a complex system can have large effects elsewhere. That's what the emergence of OTT platforms has done to the lives of both content creators and viewers. Actors have benefited most from it as now they're being judged on the merit of their performance and not their star value. Manoj Bajpayee, a star performer for the last 20 years, found himself marginalisd in movies lately. But he made a resurgence, thanks to the humongous popularity of The Family Man, where he played the title role. He was an unusual choice to play a secret agent but proved to be the show's leading light, thanks to his split-second timing. The second season of the show will start soon and Manoj is understandably excited about it...

You seem ahead of your times. You did short films much before anyone else and won awards for them. Then you jumped on the OTT bandwagon and won the Filmfare Best Actor In A Drama Series (Critics') Award for The Family Man as well...

Thank you very much. When I was in Cannes a couple of years ago to promote Bhonsle, I saw a 20-year-old boy getting mobbed by the French audience. And when I enquired about it, they told me that he is a YouTube star from France. No other Hollywood or French actor got that kind of attention from the audience. So I learnt that this is the way ahead. This is the way the world is spinning these days. My wife kept pushing me to do short films. All of them got so many awards. Looking at the world and the changing patterns, you can realise what's the way forward. This is not rocket science. I just keep my eves open about every activity and the way the world is responding to it. I have an eye on each and every actor who's working today. All the young actors and how they're experimenting



with their performances and how they're reinventing the craft. So you keep changing, reinventing yourself — otherwise, survival would be difficult.

How has the COVID-19 situation changed things for an actor?

Our immediate entertainment source was only cinema earlier. Then the next preference was satellite channels and then OTT. But suddenly because of the pandemic, everyone got locked inside their homes. OTT platforms were already there for people to watch anything and everything from anywhere. That changed the demographics. When people started watching more and more OTT stuff, LOOK AT THE KIND OF TALENT EMERGING FROM OTT PLATFORMS. I DON'T THINK THEY COULD HAVE GOT JUSTICE IN THE CINEMA HERE. I AM HAPPY THAT THE SCENE HAS CHANGED

Man season 1 was streamed pre-covid. There was no sign of coronavirus back then. It was a massive success. And it was not only a successful show nationally, but it kind of crossed the borders as well. It was a hit even internationally. And the second season, will stream at a time when the cinema halls aren't still fully functional. So you can understand how much the fan base is going to increase. It gives you all the more reasons to be hopeful and optimistic that if The Family Man could be that kind of blockbuster pre-covid. the next season will definitely get higher ratings in today's scenario when cinema halls are reportedly being shut down again.

But would it be as impactful as a film?

It gives you the experience of three films put together. You really dig into the characters and understand every aspect of the story, of the characters. Thinking aloud, I feel the impact would still be the same if it were made as a film because each character is so relatable. If you present the audience with relatable characters, they will take to them no matter what the format is.

they started investing heavily in their own favourite shows, favourite actors and suddenly by the end of nine months, you had a parallel world of entertainment. When theatres were still struggling, this emerged as a viable option even for filmmakers. The audience got exposed to not only different content, but also to content which opened their eyes to different kinds of talent that weren't fully utilised in cinema. Because cinema has its limitations — due to box-office and/or its length. I just hope, even after cinema-life comes back to normal, these new choices made by the audience will continue to flourish.

If *The Family Man* were made into a film today, would the impact be the same as on the digital platform?

Let me remind you that *The Family*

You're shown to be super secretive in The Family Man. Are you like that in your personal life as well?

I am a good keeper of secrets for my friends. In my friendships, I keep the secrets of all my friends, but if it is a secret I am not so proud of... I always kind of warn them. And reprimand them. But you know, the only place where I'm completely myself is with my family. With them I can be both black and white. In that way, I am not Shrikant Tiwari at all.

What can we expect from *The Family Man* Season 2?

It's far bigger than what came earlier. And it's a lot more intense this time as well. Because Shrikant's life has changed in Season 2. So definitely his relationships are looked at differently. But his quirks, his way of responding to other characters, his way of handling his marriage and his job... at times it's quite baffling and funny — that hasn't changed.

What's your wife's take on The Family Man?

Neha loved it. She was chosen as one of the test audience for the second season. Even I was not allowed by her to watch any episode. She is strict about her responsibility. All she said was that the show is good. She shared her observations directly with Raj and DK. But she loved the series. I hope once she feels a bit free of her responsibility towards Ava, our daughter, she returns to acting. Ava and I will cheer her from the sidelines.

You got to spend a lot of time with Ava during the lockdown...

I haven't seen any child with that much energy. She is like a doll who wakes up and starts moving and never thinks of stopping for a moment after that. Till we are really tired and exhausted in the night and put her to bed. She keeps us busy. She was not allowed to go down and play or meet her friends. But it was good that for the initial four months we were stuck in Uttarakhand and she was hiking and trekking 10 km, 12 km every day with me. So you can imagine the kind of energy that she has. She needs that kind of activity to exhaust her.

Are you loving this phase of your career where you're the protagonist of an action series?

Look at the kind of talent emerging from OTT. I don't think they could have got justice in the cinema here. I am happy that the scene has changed and people are loving the OTT platforms and their content. They are looking forward to the work of good directors and actors. If you ask me, it has come a little late for me per se because I'm not in my 20s today. But at the same time, I am trying to make the most of it. Every day, I keep getting calls from people to be part of their shows. That's where I feel completely grateful and humble. So yeah, it's a fantastic time, we all have our hands full. And I just hope it continues for a long, long time.

are struggling because the masses are still staying away. People are still a little wary of going to the theatres. I just hope they show a lot more enthusiasm. And courage to go to the theatres and not feel fearful. Because I somewhere feel that theatres are safe. They are as safe as flying today. So if they can sit in a flight for two-three hours, why can't they sit in theatres where all the protocols are being followed. Theatre owners are making sure to sanitize the seats, wearing a mask is compulsory and the seating capacity has been reduced to 50 per cent. I think we should go to the theatres. All the medium of entertainment should do well simultaneously.

How was your experience working with Samantha Akkineni in The Family Man?

She started shooting with me in Chennai and then we got pally. She has been very dedicated. She's become a big star by giving it her 200 per cent both

We don't think age is a hurdle or a barrier in your case...

Definitely not a hurdle. But it doesn't give me the option of playing a 28-year-old guy anymore. All the roles that come to me are of characters who are 35 and above. 45 and above. So yes, that's the only thing. Otherwise, I'm happy. I feel blessed. There are no regrets or complaints. I was just stating a fact.

Will people flock to the theatres again?

Samantha (Akkineni) and I were discussing this. She told me in South India people are filling up the halls to see their favourite stars and films. But in North India especially, for Hindi films, theatres

physically and emotionally. She delved deep into the character while she was shooting for the challenging sequences. That's commendable indeed. And even during the promotions, she made sure she had the full attention of the media. I just hope we get to do more stuff together.

Why are you not a part of South cinema? Are you open to doing South films?

Since last October, I have been shooting back to back. There is no breathing space or window to take up another project. And all the last year's commitments have been pushed to this year. It will take me another year before I pick anything else. I am open to doing South films provided they offer me something worthwhile. Let's see.

OTT is a new industry. Is there pay disparity here as well?

I haven't experienced it. I have always been getting a fair amount of compensation for all the work I have done. But yes, I expect better compensation. I don't think there should be any kind of disparity if there is an already established name coming on OTT. It has its own audience base and it has its own market. And at the same time. I would say that whatever the budget allows, you are paid accordingly. And till now I don't have anything to complain about.

mol Parashar is an IIT graduate. He started doing theatre in college and fell in love with the process. After his graduation, while he did grab a high-paying corporate job, his heart wouldn't commit to the corporate rat race. He decided to take a break from his job to pursue theatre professionally, which led to more opportunities, including ads and films.

He played Ranbir Kapoor's friend in Rocket Singh: Salesman Of The Year (2009). Though his work got appreciated, offers were still hard to come by. He did act in films like Babloo Happy Hai (2014), Dombivli Return (2014), Mili (2015) and *Traffic* (2016). The same vear, he cut his teeth on the OTT circuit with TVF Tripling and since then there has been no looking back as far as the OTT is concerned. Ask him what he finds more difficult, working in films versus working in a web series and he goes all serious saving that the medium shouldn't concern an actor. "My job is to give my best to every role, irrespective of where it's getting aired. The length or the treatment might defer but essentially an actor's job is to be as truthful to his role as he can be," he asserts.

He felt no qualms when his film *Dolly Kitty Aur Woh Chamakte Sitare,* which was to get released in cinemas, got released on OTT because of the pandemic. "I was born of the digital space. For me it's my hometown. It's true that when I signed it, it was supposed to have a theatrical release but none of it changes the fact that we all gave it our best. I found out that the film was released in 193 countries digitally and it was accessible to millions. Maybe this wouldn't have been the case with a theatrical release. Also, my audience has been watching me on digital platforms so it's better for me. People didn't have to go to the theatre and wonder who's this new guy."

The film got a fair share of flak because a certain section of the audience felt that it depicted women



as having loose morals. He shakes his head at that and says today we have a problem with everything, even with a women-centric film that talks about women empowerment. "We are starting to call things sensitive because some people are getting sensitive. There are people who might like or dislike it but they don't get sensitive about it. If we keep saying it's sensitive, we are manipulating their outlook towards the film or show," he reflects.

Currently, there is a huge hue and cry over censoring OTT content. Amol wonders why it's so. He explains that you have to consciously use the remote to reach the content you want. "So if someone doesn't want to watch a particular programme, then he/she just shouldn't pick up the remote. It's that simple. No one is forcing them. The platforms also categorise content as violent or sexual in nature for the viewers to make their own choices," he reasons.
