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
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





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O who else is done with the whole working from home business? Because I know I am.

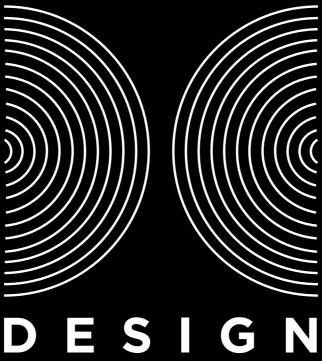
So here I am, at home, working, and wondering where home is for all of you as well. Because I know that the feeling I called home is too busy getting lost, at work.

FURNITURE FLIPS AND MAKEOVERS

- weathered solid wood planks. After sanding down the dirt
- and a weird blue paint on them, she got a local carpenter
- to add clamps and fixed them to the existing dining table
- base. Another major DIY project she undertook during the lockdown was to paint her balcony. To make the process
- easy, she used a rag cloth dipped in paint instead of a paintbrush. After two coats of enamel paint in white, it looked much better than the previously black grill which was visually making the tiny space smaller.



TANUSHRI DALMIYA

Founder, Vayam

Architect and founder of Vayam, Tanushri Dalmiya is on a steadfast crusade...at the heart of all her designs is the focus to champion Indian arts and crafts, explore local materials and encourage vernacular talent. She is the bright face of Indian design looking inwards for inspiration. In the pursuit of her cause Tanushri doesn't compromise on high-quality design and detail and this 4,300sqft home in Chennai is a testimony to that.





Taking us through the dining area, Tanushri details out the design for us, "The dining is brought together by natural light grazing a three arched antique teak wood jaali that defines the space. Crafted with upcycled carbon from the environment, the differently patterned floor tiles are mesmerising. We love how Tanushri makes crafts a highlight here: The Nakashima inspired live-edge table paired with a bench and chairs dressed in wine and olives, contrast wonderfully with artisanal perch lights, reimagined in textures of banana paper."

This project came to Tanushri in June 2020, when Tamil Nadu was in lockdown. Considering the tough times many were facing; the architect wanted the design process to integrate crafts people so as to rebuild livelihoods. She says, "It was a no-brainer to turn to our local artisanal communities...the original custodians of traditional crafts." Tanushri's Vayam, tied up with a women collaborative in Kabini who worked extensively with banana bark to create fibres...as a result, this home has rugs, planters, light fixtures, and more created from it. She further tested the strength and went on to screen print decorative pendant lights. This approach to advocating a humble material is inspiring.



Completed in the latter half of 2020, architect Tanushri Dalmiya of Vayam worked remotely from Bengaluru to complete this 4,300sqft home in Chennai, Tamil Nadu. To champion the outside-inside narrative, she did away with visible limits...so, trees and plants are inside, furniture and cushions are outside. She says, "In a humid climate like Chennai, greenery played a pivotal role. The house had ample scope for landscaping on all sides and allowed us to bring down the exterior walls that flushed the home with natural light and unobstructed views of foliage. The interior walls were brought down strategically to allow for continuous movement between the living, family and dining with all three spaces opening outdoors to shaded verandah's. The choice of furniture was critical to this tropical narrative."

Part of the brief given to Tanushri by her client's, a young couple and the owners of a sustainable lifestyle brand, was to be mindful of the materials used. As a result, the home embodies the essence of sustainability and stands as an ode to natural/materials in design.


After five decades of living in a sprawling bungalow in Khar, Mumbai, architect Rasneet Anand's parents shifted to a compact apartment in Santacruz, Mumbai, and she was tasked with making the transition a seamless one. For

Rasneet, the challenge was designing a narrative that emulates the openness of a bungalow within the boundaries of a 1,450sqft space. While the unspoken challenge was in capturing the essence of a homecoming in this new pad.

As her parents were used to large uninterrupted spaces, Rasneet pushed the dining area to a corner to maximise the living area. By doing so, she was able to introduce a custom designed swing in the centre of the room which today is the most loved seat in the home. Sustainably embroidered panels created by the local artisans of Kutch from Mori design act as a focal point behind the swing.







Raahaat Versev Makani. Founder, House of Arrah, had a lot of expanses to play with. She converted two apartments, (a three-BHK and two-BHK), into a functional, thoughtful home with an open-plan design in response to the individual needs of each member of this three-generation joint family. The architect drenched her palette in a combination of warm and cold tones, and further colluded to the scheme by introducing form-based pieces of furniture.





Urban Mistrii is a young multidisciplinary design studio started by architect Ritika Rakhiani in August of 2019. Talking to us about her design atelier she says, "We believe that the built environment significantly contributes to the growth and wellbeing of its users, and hence each design is developed through multiple factors resulting in a strong concept. We address each project as a diverse opportunity—with its specific requirements which develop into unique experiences.



Located in South Delhi, this three-bedroom apartment is owned by a young lawyer-couple. After moving back to India, they wanted their home to reflect the European design sensibility experienced during their travels. Ritika decided to develop the architectural elements of this home around a Victorian theme. To mellow the maximalist characteristics of this style, she selected earthy materials, cool colours and included fresh plants throughout the house.
