

Ranveer Kapoor and Deepika Padukone may have won the applause but she won the sympathy. She made the masses remember Kashibai. It was no mean feat indeed.

I consider her role in *Barfi!* as one of her finest efforts till day. Playing Jhilmil, who is autistic, would have been extremely difficult, as the actress had no parallel to draw upon. In 2012, she was the reigning queen of the marquee and yet chose to do a role which went against the grain. She didn't have much dialogue and relied on her eyes, her expressions, to get her point across. She gave the film a gravitas. You got lost in the romance between Jhilmil and Barfi as it was something you had never seen before. The film wasn't focussed on her but she still made it her own.

Currently, she's doing what no Indian actor has done before — getting star billing in commercial Hollywood films. It's not that Indian actors haven't shone in the international arena. Names like Om Puri, Irrfan Khan or Saeed Jaffrey, to name a few, have made India proud before. But they were mostly known in the art film circles. Priyanka has gone beyond that and has staked claim to being a truly international star. Movies and series are being written with her in mind. She's a part of the cult classic *Matrix* franchise now. You don't need a better proof of her Hollywood street cred.


BON VOYAGE!

Shreya has fond memories of the film and says she learnt much from Manisha Koirala. She is a diehard boxing enthusiast and is also into MMA training. That explains her well-toned body. And she loves driving big bikes. Like her character Tamanna Sharma from Bandish Bandits, she owns a Bullet and goes on long rides during her free time. She could certainly relate to that part of her character in the series.

Shreya became an actor because of her elder brother Karan, who is now settled in the US and whom she loves to death. Younger siblings often idolise the elder and such was the case with Shreya too. Her brother had an outgoing personality and was always winning elocution and debate competitions in school. The actress. who was something of an introvert back then, was

inspired by him to take part in such competitions herself. After being scared initially, she found she rather liked facing a sea of people and putting her points across to them. She opened up on stage and then there was no turning back. She was good academically and taking part in extra-curricular activities resulted in her being named the head girl of her school. "The seed for performing was sown early on in my life," she muses. She recalls having an unusual answer as a child when someone asked her what she would become when she grew up. She chuckles, "When someone asked me what I wanted to be when I grew up, they expected 'doctor' or 'lawyer' to be my answer but I used to tell them I wanted to be a mirror because I wanted everyone to look at me."

Born to a Maharashtrian mother and Raiput father. Shreya reveals that her family is her biggest support system and it is they who watch her work even before she does. "They are also the ones who give me wings to fly while keeping me grounded. I always ask my family to watch my work before I do. As I'm aware that they'll not hesitate to discuss the minus points as well." While she was growing up, her father would organise movie nights on Friday and Saturday where apart from the Bollywood staple, the family was treated to Iranian, Korean, European, Hollywood and South cinema as well. That introduced her to different kinds of cinemas at a young age. She got an opportunity to work in an advertisement while still in college.

Today she's an established name in the ad circuit. She has even done an adwith Ranbir Kapoor and other Bollywood biggies. Her parents were taken aback at first when she announced her decision to pursue modelling and acting. "When they realised how much I truly wanted to pursue it, they supported me completely. I think it was life changing when my parents told me not to do engineering just because I was good at math, but to pursue something I could see myself doing for the rest of my life, or I would be at a desk job unhappy with my choice."

After making her mark as a model, she was itching to be an actor and the opportunity came her way when Imtiaz Ali signed her for a short film, *The Other Way.* Imtiaz was impressed by her

acting skills and told her to give it a serious shot. As luck would have it, she bumped into Anand Tiwari, the director of Bandish Bandits, during an ad call and he called her for an audition for a music-based show that he was making for Amazon. She passed the audition with flying colours and the rest, as they say, is history.

hreva played the role of a singer in Bandish Bandits and had to undergo a lot of preparation to get the character right. "Luckily Anand Tiwari and producer Amritpal Bindra organised workshops before the shoot. So be it training in music and performing with singer and coach Akshit Parikh and choreographer Vijay Ganguly, interacting with composers Shankar Ehsaan Lov, visiting a music studio, listening to a scratch for the first time, understanding the mere basics of what goes into composing a song, everything came in handv."

She got an opportunity to work with Naseeruddin Shah in the show and learnt a lot from the veteran. "The best memory I have with Naseer sir was when Ritwik (Bhowmik) and I got to spend some time with him post the shoot and do an acting workshop with him. That was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and one of my fondest memories."

films like *Hindi Medium* (2017), Namaste England (2018), Zero (2018) and now Indoo Ki Iawani has hit the screens. Indoo Ki Jawani happened to her after she met Monisha Advani and Madhu Bhojwani, of Emmay Entertainment. She's all praise for the dynamic duo for making a space for themselves in the entertainment world in such a short time. "I find them very amazing, powerful and go-getting. They built an empire for themselves. When they called I knew it would be worth my while. When they narrated, I just kept laughing. What I loved about my character is that Sonal has her own

personality and is not a sidekick. She is full of gyaan and sass."

The other thing she liked about the film was that it showed a 'sisterhood' between her and Kiara Advani. Mallika savs Bollywood has been showcasing brotherhood since ages and it's time they gave sisterhood a chance. She and Kiara became pals on the sets. "My relation with Kiara was super chill just like Indoo's and Sonal's. We hit it off instantly and she is a very comfortable person to work with. We knew the equation we had and even though we were not Indoo and Sonal in real life, every

line in the film kind of hit home," she points out.

The year 2020 has been the annus horribilis thanks to the global coronavirus. Mallika reveals that one thing she has learnt in 2020 is to not plan. "I haven't planned anything else and if something 2020 has taught us, it is to not attach yourself to plans and expectations. 



UNFINISHED WILL HIT THE STANDS SOON, WHAT MOTIVATED YOU TO WRITE IT?

The journey of Unfinished started about two years ago as I was nearing the milestone of being in the entertainment business for 20 years.... basically 20 in 2020. I am at a place in my life where I can look back and introspect and I thought it was a good time as any to pen down this journey I've been on. I hope to give readers an insight into my journey in my own words... it's sort of the 'in-between interviews' version of my life... the public version vs. my real story. It reveals a vulnerable side of me that only I can explain.... Sort of like a 'curtain's down' look at my life in my words.

WHY DID YOU CALL IT UNFINISHED? WAS THERE ANY OTHER TITLE YOU'D THOUGHT OF?

Ironically, I named this memoir years before I started writing it. I have a long and ever-growing list of things I want to do, both personally and professionally. So, in that, I am very much #Unfinished. But the funny thing about writing a memoir is that it forces you to look at things differently, reconciling so many things you thought you had put to bed. In doing so I've realised

But this is completely different... not meeting / interacting with people or doing onground events is very surreal. I'm someone who loved doing promotions because it gave me the opportunity to interact with so many

people, especially fans... I miss that a lot though I completely understand and support the need to stay home as much as possible and practice social distancing right now.

HOW DO YOU THINK THE BUSINESS OF MOVIES HAS

BEEN AFFECTED BY THE PANDEMIC?

AS ANY TO PEN DOWN THIS JOURNEY I'VE BEEN ON

There has obviously been a clear impact... from shoots being called off, to many releases moving from theatres to streaming platforms, the industry has had a tough year. We also have to remember that

the lockdowns and restrictions caused the loss of livelihood for many people within the industry... technicians, support crew, actors, dancers etc. It's been especially hard on them. And we can't forget the plight of theatres as well, which



were one of the last businesses to open. But there was a positive side... it made us all think more out of the box, explore new ideas and platforms and find new ways for the creativity to shine.

TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT YOUR CHARACTER IN THE WHITE TIGER WHICH RECENTLY GOT **RELEASED ON OTT?**

The White Tiger is not Pinky Madam's (my character in the film) story. Yet she is intrinsically linked to how the story unfolds. Director Ramin Bahrani has developed and expanded the role of Pinky more than what we read of her in the book. She is born to a hardworking, middle-class family of immigrants in the US and has a tough life. Marrying the affluent Ashok (Rajkummar Rao) and moving to India (for a short time, she thinks) isn't what she imagines it to be. Pinky is woke, but she's woke as long as it's convenient for her.

WHAT ATTRACTED YOU TO SIGN THE FILM? HOW WAS IT WORKING ON THE FILM?

When I first read the book, I thought it was hard-hitting and provocative and sarcastic and funny and dark at the same time and I remember it being such a page-turner. So when I heard that it was being adapted for a film. I chased after it. I met with Ramin in cities across the world and auditioned for it multiple times. I wanted to be an executive producer so I could put support behind It. It was an incredible experience shooting this film and working with such talents like Ramin, Raj (Rajkummar Rao) and Adarsh (Gourav) not to mention the other stellar cast members who brought the finer nuances out in every scene. Working with Ramin was an experience unlike any I've had before. His style is more supportive of actors... he builds your self-confidence and gives you space... so much so that he never says action or cut... he just says "when you're ready"... it's incredible.

WHAT WAS THE **TOUGHEST PART ABOUT PLAYING YOUR** CHARACTER IN THE WHITE TIGER?

To fully give into being this American desi... one who was born and brought up there. My

reality is so different from hers. Also, her lens of the world is myopic in a sense and very different from mine and so I had to switch off that side of me when playing Pinky.

DO YOU MISS WORKING IN BOLLYWOOD? DO YOU PLAN TO SIGN A BOLLYWOOD FILM ANYTIME SOON?

Yes, I do... very much. I'm currently discussing some great projects and hopefully, I will announce something soon.

WOULD YOU BE OPEN TO WORKING ON THE OTT PLATFORM?

I already am... I already have multiple projects underway for the same. OTT is the future of entertainment and we have to catch up with the world in creating the right kind of content for these platforms. The White Tiger just released on Netflix, Citadel is being made for Amazon Prime and I have multiple projects being discussed for my Production House, Purple Pebble Pictures with various OTT platforms across the world.

ANY HINDI FILM OR WEB SERIES YOU WISH YOU HAD DONE.

Delhi Crime... but honestly my friend Shefali Shah is just amazing in it.

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












AISSEY ANALITA SETH CHATS WITH VIKRANT MASSEY, A MAN OF MANY MOODS AND GENRES

After being a part of primetime television, Vikrant Massey started a gradual ascent at the

movies. From doing small roles in films like Lootera and Dil Dhadakne Do, he slowly graduated to playing complex characters and impressed us with the shelled up Shutu in A Death In The Gunj, the hopeful Amol in Chhapaak, the morally bankrupt Pradeep in Dolly Kitty Aur Woh Chamakte Sitare and the bright and shiny Sunny in Ginny Weds Sunny, his first commercial venture. Despite his art cinema credentials, Vikrant has the ability to walk onto any set and make every role his own. He may not be a hunk but has been called the thinking woman's sex symbol. We caught up with the actor who is slowly earning the sobriquet of Mr Dependable with each of his releases...

YOUR LAST VENTURE, GINNY WEDS SUNNY WAS AN OUTRIGHT COMMERCIAL FILM, WHICH IS A RELATIVELY NEW GENRE FOR YOU. WHAT MADE YOU PICK THE FILM?

Yes, it's fairly new for the audience to see me acting like a typical hero. It was a conscious decision on my part. As an actor, you want to tap into the diet of the massy audience at least once in your life. It felt like the right time because I've already done a lot of intense stuff. I needed a breather from that. I thoroughly enjoyed working with Yami Gautam. The entire cast and crew were like a family because we were together for nearly two months. A strong sense of camaraderie existed on the sets. I think it also reflected in the feedback we got for the film. It's a nice and happy film, especially in times like these when our minds have turned negative.

I used to dance professionally on stage but had never done it in front of the camera before. I was blessed with a great team. The choreographer was so supportive, as was Yami, who shook a leg with me. Dancing



has always been a very close part of my life. So I just went out there to enjoy myself. I will always cherish the days I spent dancing in front of the camera.

THE TRANSITION LIKE AND WHAT DO YOU FEEL ABOUT THIS SHIFT?

It's actually great because there's an entire ecosystem that has fought for it for years. Because of the advent of the streaming platforms, this dawned upon us in a rush. We got exposed to international content and our content too got exposed internationally, all in one go. It's a level-playing field for everyone. I will also concede to the fact that in India the single-screen theatres cater to a different audience altogether. But yes, the shift is prominent. As for me, it was a conscious decision to try this and tick that box. I also wanted to experiment and it felt like the right time. There is now





around us grabbed everyone's attention. It was exactly the case with me. But after that, it was full of introspection and filled with gratitude. I've understood the fragility of life. Though I had four releases this year, I did miss out on meeting people. But no complaints.

CHHAPAAK, CARGO, DOLLY KITTY AUR CHAMAKTE SITARE AND GINNY WEDS SUNNY... WHICH WAS YOUR FAVOURITE TO WORK ON AND HOW WAS THE TRANSITION FROM ONE TO THE OTHER?

I have always been someone who represents realism and alternate cinema. It's something I or how important your part is. That has never been my case. So *Chhapaak* was socially relevant. I was proud to be associated with that film.

WHAT DID YOU LEARN FROM THESE FILMS?

You learn a lot from the people who work with. Especially when you spend not a few days, but months together. There are days you get vulnerable in front of each other. There are bonds and relationships you build over time. So it would be hard to pick one thing because there's so much to each one of them. But if I were to pick one, then I'd say

a sense of realism in everything we do and I've always said, cinema and society are interrelated and intertwined. So it's a great time for creative people to go out and tell stories.

WITH FOUR RELEASES IN 2020, YOU WERE LUCKY

THAN MOST. HOW DID THE YEAR GO FOR YOU?

It's been like it's been for everyone else, besides the work aspect. Things have been how they've been for most people. The last six to seven months have been challenging for all of us. I've missed shooting and being on a film set. Luckily, I did get the opportunity to be on sets during an ad film. It's also been a period of introspection in a lot of ways. The initial few months of the lockdown and the things that happened

enjoy because I love drama and talking about interpersonal relationships. So I would say *Chhapaak* was very special for me this year and so was *Cargo*. A lot depends on what the film is trying to say. It is not always about what you are doing

I've learnt a lot from Deepika Padukone, while working with her in *Chhapaak*. Her poise, grace and calm are something I admire a lot. Her conduct, especially at workplaces is admirable. It's so endearing and inspiring to see



as a director, is one of those people I trust blindly. I'd go shoot for her even without reading my part. As much as she's open to suggestions, she knows what she wants from her actors. Half your job is taken care of when you're working with someone like her. On a lighter note, her obsession with roses has increased with time. From Lipstick... up until Dolly Kitty... vou'll always find a reference of a red rose somewhere. Our style of storytelling

platform, all of these can co-exist. A lot of questions have been asked about which one will outdo the other. I think the two mediums can peacefully coexist like they did before the lockdown. The larger purpose is to tell stories.

HOW WAS YOUR EXPERIENCE OF WORKING IN HASEEN DILRUBA?

It's been great working with Taapsee Pannu and director Vinil Mathew, and producer Aanand L.

KONKONA SEN SHARMA THE ACTOR OR DIRECTOR, WHO DO YOU PREFER?

I'd choose Konkona the director any day. I'm one of the millions fans she has. I want to see her on the screen as well. But the time I spent with her during A Death In The Gunj, where she navigated me as Shutu, will always

be special for me. She will always be one of the most gifted directors I've worked with. She is very sensitive as a person and that's a special quality. The times that we are living in, in terms of all the negativity around, it's a rarity and a blessing to be around someone who has her heart in the right place. I've learnt so many things from her. I look up to her in so many ways and would choose her

as a director at the drop of a hat.

HOW WAS IT WORKING WITH ALANKRITA SRIVASTAVA AGAIN IN DOLLY KITTY AUR WOH CHAMAKTE SITARE AFTER LIPSTICK UNDER MY BURKHA?

The names we are mentioning here are all supremely talented and independent women. They have strong heads over their shoulders. Alankrita, or the things we want to say are pretty much alike.

STREAMING PLATFORMS BECAME THE SOLE SOURCE OF ENTERTAINMENT DURING THE PANDEMIC. WHERE DO YOU SEE THIS GOING IN THE FUTURE, ONCE THINGS GET BACK TO NORMAL?

her whether the acting process is different when it comes to OTT and she savs that's not the case at all. She didn't feel the difference as she's always worked in a 'different' brand of cinema. I was known for and just be the character. It made me nervous as an actor because it was like learning and unlearning again." She enjoyed the whole process of making the film and was gratified that the audience took to it.

Divya says the film industry is known to put a stamp on the actors and hence if you're serious about your craft it's important not to get slotted. She personally feels she'd get bored doing the same thing over and



over again. "When Delhi 6 came out. I started getting all these sensuous roles. After Bhaag Milkha Bhaag, I started getting 'sister' kind of roles and with Badlapur it was back to serious roles. So, yes, I did make an effort to say no to the things I've done before and took on things that I hadn't. However, if the script is really interesting and the director is good, then even if the role is similar to something that I've done before then I try and tweak it... give it a different colour," she reveals.

The first one was Leader (2010). It was a political drama set in Andhra Pradesh. Since it was a regional political film, it mainly dealt with Andhra politics. It obviously was a regional Telugu story. The second story that I heard and wanted to be part of was Dum Maaro Dum (2011). That was a film set in Goa and revolved around drugs and crime in the place. So, that would work in the national language as well. It need not be any regional film. So, for me, it's the story that decides if a film needs to be multilingual or a regional language.

TELL US ABOUT YOUR PROCESS OF CHOOSING A PROJECT

It's the stories that motivate me to take that leap. Each industry offers such a different cultural film experience. I've been working for 10 years now and fortunately. I'm in a position where I have the liberty to choose the film. I want to be a part of. For example, I have an upcoming film called Haathi Mere Saathi. I was approached for it right after Baahubali by Eros. This is directed by Tamil director Prabhu Solomon. The idea of the film was to showcase a bond between an elephant and a man. Since it works on a larger scale, this is now a Hindi feature film as well. The other film that I'm doing right now is called Virataparvam. This was a story that came to me while I was shooting for Haathi Mere Saathi. It is a film set in the '90s in the Naxal bank which is Andhra Pradesh, West Bengal and those regions. Now, since this film was based on a regional setup, we shot the film in Telugu only. It'll be dubbed in other languages too, of course, as is the norm nowadays. We didn't shoot it in Hindi as it didn't have a Hindi resonance.

SONAKSHI SINHA



ijay Anand was born on January 22, 1934 in Gurdaspur, Punjab and was the youngest of the three Anand brothers. His elder brothers were director Chetan Anand and actor Dev Anand. Though Vijay, affectionately known as Goldie, some say because of his curly hair, is known today as a director, he actually started his career as an actor in 1955 in a family drama called Joru Ka Bhai (1955), directed by brother Chetan. He didn't pursue acting, however, preferring to be behind the camera for most part. His best film as an actor is said to be Kora Kagaz (1974). The film, directed by Anil Ganguly, was based on the 1963 Bengali film Saat Pake Bandha directed by Ajov Kar, and starred Suchitra Sen and Soumitra Chatterjee. He played a college professor who marries a much younger girl (Java Bhaduri), from a wealthy family. The girl's mother doesn't like the fact that their son-in-law isn't affluent like them and her constant interference creates acrimony between the couple. In Tere Mere Sapne (1971), a film starring Dev Anand and Mumtaz, he played a doctor who is drunk all the time. Though he's a drunkard, he acts as the conscience keeper of the protagonist and was well-liked for his small but significant role. He also directed the film. It's said to be his most serious film till date as it revolved around the real-life profession of doctors forgetting the Hippocratic Oath and blindly



The film used footage of the premiere of the film Mother India (1957) to great advantage and with actors like Dilip Kumar, Nargis, Geeta Dutt, Guru Dutt, Raai Kumar and Raiendra Kumar being featured in it. It became one of the talking points of the film.

His next film was Tere Ghar Ke Saamne (1963), a romantic comedy. It's said Goldie liked Nutan as an actress, who was said to have the perfect photogenic face. He shot one of the best songs of the actress, Dil ka bhanwar kare pukar in the film. The song was said to be shot on the spiral staircase of Qutub Minar and is a marvel of song picturisation. Nutan and Dev Anand climb up the tower as friends but come down as lovers, the whole courtship being played out amidst the journey.

ndeed, shooting songs aesthetically and using them as extensions of the narrative became something of a trademark for Vijay Anand. In the Tere mere sapne song from Guide (1965), for instance, the morning sun becomes a metaphor for the new-found love between Raju and Rosie. The light Goldie wanted was available only for 15 minutes per day early morning so he timed it to perfection and shot for those 15 minutes each day till he was satisfied. The song *Hothon mein aisi* baat from Jewel Thief (1967) was shot at the royal palace of Gangtok, Sikkim and showed the heroine in a dilemma as she has learnt a fateful secret. The fast-moving song looked almost like an uncut take. Pal bhar ke liye koi hame pyar kar le from Johny Mera Naam (1970) was filmed on a set representing a house with multiple doors and windows. You can see Dev Anand in a continuous motion

serenading Hema Malni from various nooks and crannies.

through accident. The film is based on the 1958 novel The Guide, by R. K. Narayan, and was conceived as an international project between Dev Anand and writer Pearl S Buck, who brought in American director Tad Danielewski to direct her version of the film. Dev Anand brought in his elder brother Chetan Anand to helm his version, which would have extensive songs and dances. It's said the American team didn't gel well with the Indian team. Then, Chetan wanted to make the war drama Hageegat (1964). Hence, he exited the project and Goldie was asked to helm it. The director gave it the poetry and the pathos of a Guru Dutt film and the grandeur of a Raj Kapoor film. And its songs are something Sanjay Leela Bhansali is still emulating. Today, it's considered a classic and gets taught in film schools. Incidentally, it's said that Naravan himself didn't like both the Indian and the American adaptations

and wittily described Guide as being

misguided. By the by, Vijay was one

of the protagonists of Hageegat. The

Pal pal dil ke paas from Blackmail (1973) was designed like a daydream. The heroine, Raakhee, reads the letters written to her by the hero, Dharmendra, and imagines he's there alongside her. It rates as being one of the most romantically picturised songs ever. In Akela gaya tha main (Rajput, 1982), the daydream motif is again utilised, this time on Rajesh Khanna, who is shown riding a horse and thinking about Hema Malini. The film may have flopped but the beauty of the song hasn't diminished. Composers Laxmikant-Pyarelal too cleverly incorporated the tick-tock sound made by the hooves of the horse into the soundtrack.


film opened with a long panoramic shot of him driving a jeep through rugged mountains. People often said Vijay Anand excelled because he only worked with Navketan films, Dev Anand's banner. Perhaps to prove them wrong, he chose to direct Teesri Manzil (1966), which was produced by Nasir Hussain and starred Shammi Kapoor and Asha Parekh. The noir elements were again evident in the film as it chronicled the exploits of the hero wrongly accused of the murder of her sister by the heroine. It had some evergreen tunes composed by RD Burman, was shot on picturesque locales and showcased crackling chemistry between the two leads. It proved to be a blockbuster hit and silenced his critics once for all. It's a pity the team couldn't come together again.

t's said he also directed *Hum Dono* (1961), though the film's credits say Amarjeet. Even Dev Anand, who played the double role of two army guys, had said so in his interviews. It has one of the finest songs ever filmed on Dev Anand -- *Main zindagi ka saath nibhata chala gaya*. The song has all the landmarks of Vijay Anand's wizardry. Over the course of the song, one gets to know the mindscape of the protagonist. Jaidev's music and Sahir Ludhianvi's lyrics were the soul



of the film. The bhajan, Allah tero naam, sung by Lata Mangeshkar, is revered even today. The highlight of the film were the confrontation scenes between Major Manohar Lal Verma and Captain Anand. Shot way before computer graphics came into the picture, they nevertheless successfully gave an illusion that we're watching two characters, despite a single actor enacting them.

Some credit Vijay Anand as being one of the most prolific of commercial Hindi film directors. Well, come to think of it, Nau Do Gyrah was a road movie, Kala Bazar was neo-realist cinema, Tere Ghar Ke Saamne a romcom, Guide a book adaptation, Teesri Manzil a murder mystery, Jewel Thief was noir, Johny Mera Naam employed the lost-and-found formula, while Hum Dono explored how war and PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) changed the human psyche.



Vijay Anand reportedly lost interest in direction after three conecutive films, Blackmail (1973), Chhupa Rustam (1973) and Bullet (1976) didn't perform well at the box office. To overcome the depression, perhaps, he became a disciple of godman Rajneesh and was said to belong to Rajneesh's inner circle. He married his niece Sushma Kohli in 1978, when he was making Ram Balram (1980). This move led to a huge scandal within the conservative Punjabi community. Subsequent films like Rajput (1982), Hum Rahe Na Hum (1984) and Main Tere Live (1988), too flopped. His last film was Jaana Na Dil Se Door (2001), which didn't get released.

He died on February 23, 2004 due to a heart attack and was aged 70 at the time of his death.



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
