### AASHITA CHADHA Co-founder & CFO, The KariGhars



January chills call for heartwarming broths. Supreet Ghai, Executive Chef at The Cafe by Foodhall, shares his favourite recipes



## MUSHROOM CAPPUCCINO

### INGREDIENTS

- 300 gms Button mushrooms
- 25 gms Onion, chopped
- 10 gms Garlic
- 2 gms Thyme, fresh
- 500 gms Water
- 12 gms Butter
- 8 gms Vegetable oil
- 2 gms Salt
- 1 gm Black pepper
- 40 gms Cream
- 6 gms Leeks
- 8 gms Celery

### METHOD

- Clean and slice the mushrooms
- Wash the mushrooms thoroughly with water and soak them in some water (keep 50 gms aside for garnish)
- Boil the chopped mushroom to cook the soup. Season with salt and pepper, and add fresh thyme, garlic, leeks & celery
- Blend to a smooth fine puree & strain, return to pan & boil to thicken the soup
- Finish by adding butter & cream and seasoning if required
- Garnish with small dices of button mushroom & thyme leaves, with a drizzle of a few drops of cream



## ROASTED TOMATO BASIL SOUP


### INGREDIENTS

- 550 gms Tomato, quartered
- 70 gms Onion
- 50 gms Garlic
- 40 gms Carrot
- 40 gms Leeks
- 40 gms Celery
- 200 gms Tomato puree
- 5 gms Salt
- 0.5 gm Black pepper, crushed
- 15 gms Basil, fresh
- 20 gms Oil

### METHOD

- Add salt, pepper and oil to the quartered tomatoes & roast in pre-heated oven at 180deg C for 20 minutes
- Add all the trimmings of the vegetables (leek, celery, carrot and onion) to some water and boil to make a veg stock
- In a separate pan, sauté onion, garlic, leek & celery in oil, till translucent
- Add roasted tomato and vegetable stock, boil until it reduces and add basil stalk and season
- Add tomato puree and cook
- Remove the basil stalk and blend to a smooth texture
- Strain the soup & adjust seasoning, serve hot
- Garnish with basil julienne and croutons







It was a century-old property, and when interior designer Aditi Vora Nair landed the project, it was in complete disarray. The beauty of the heritage structure was hidden behind gaudy colours and false ceilings. For Aditi, the task at hand was to unravel the architectural beauty of this space. "The fact that it was a heritage property made things even more challenging. We were not allowed to make any structural changes. And its lofty height added to the challenge," informs Aditi. Once the paint was chipped and the false ceilings removed, it was easy to work with the raw structure. The sole motive of Aditi's design intervention was to enhance the beauty of the existing structure.

After completing her Bachelors in Interior Design from the American University of Sharjah, UAE, Aditi moved to UK to complete her Masters. In 2004, Aditi earned a Masters in Furniture Design from the Kent Institute of Art and Design.

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New finishes were not copies of the original material. I chose them for their decorative and handmade qualities, creating a relationship between the two.



Deborah Mariotti is a New York-based, Milantrained designer who works as an architect in her native Italy and as an interior designer in the US. She designed the interiors of this sixstory Victorian-era townhouse in Brooklyn. The interiors were almost a time capsule and were not renovated for 40 years, except for a 1970s kitchen. In short, this property still maintained 95% of its original details. The approach to the design was to keep a continuous dialogue between new and old. The challenge was to design contemporary spaces that would offer a pleasing contrast with the historic spaces.
