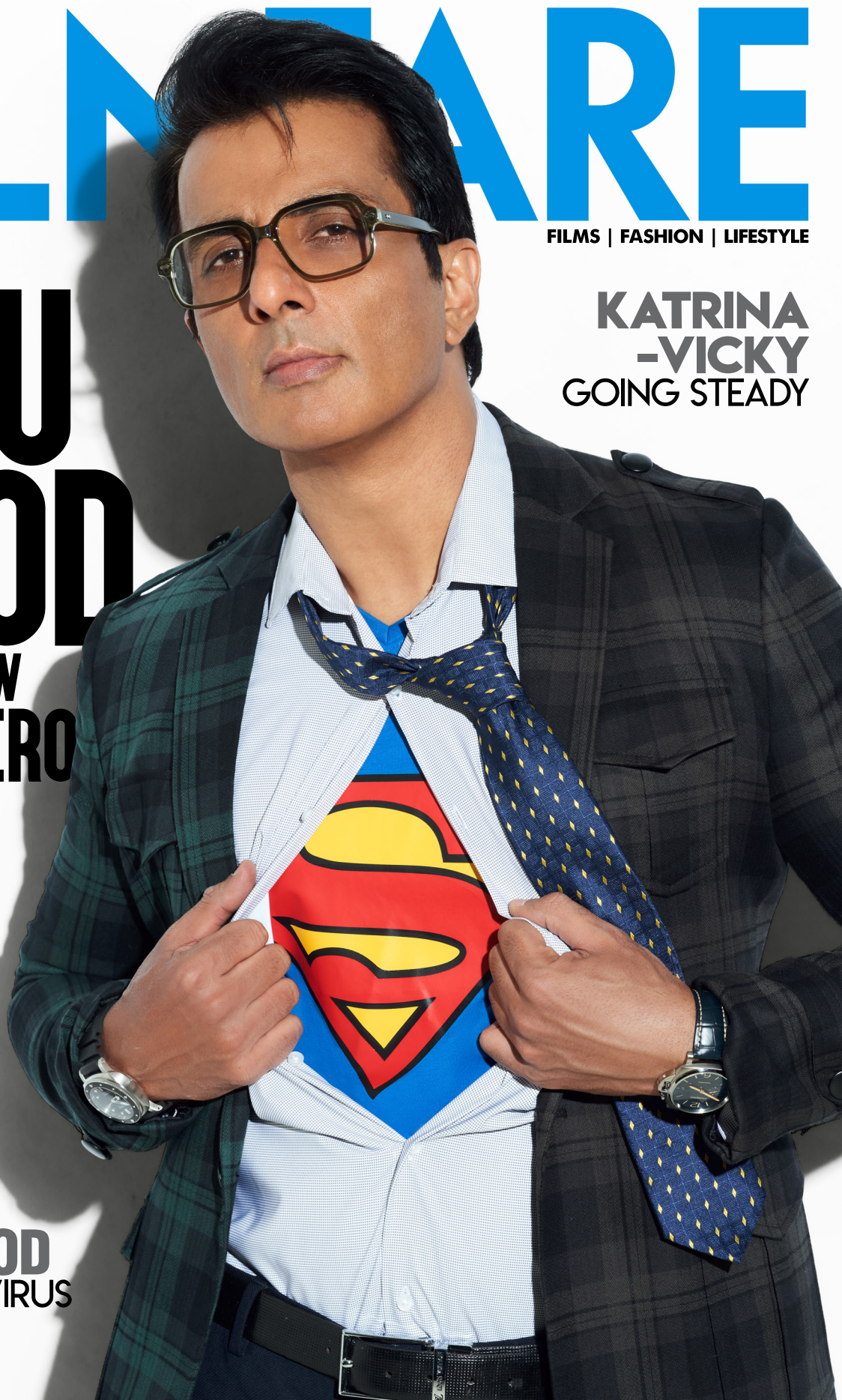

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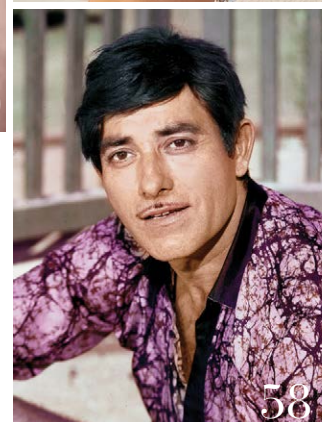

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Super Sonu

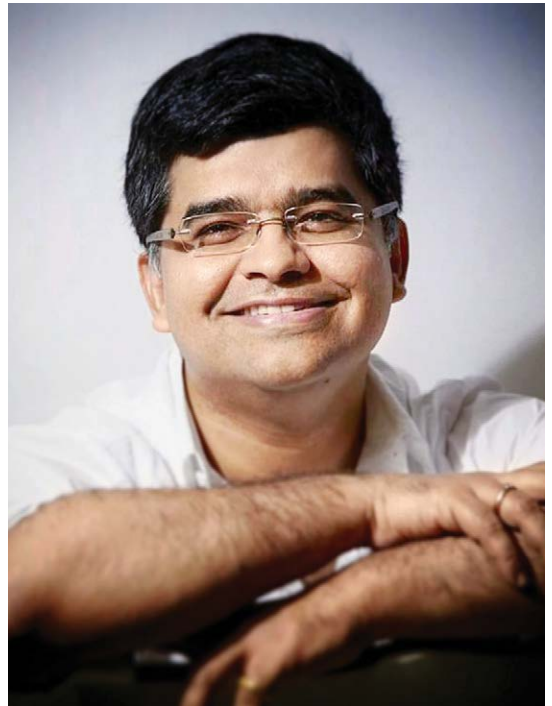

And when the second wave struck, he again helped arrange hospital beds, medical supplies, oxygen cylinders et al. His phone was said to be on 24/7. The dedicated helpline number was continuously bombarded with messages and calls.

Sonu has always maintained that while he started out alone initially, friends, well-wishers, fans and social workers joined him later in his crusade. His helpline is said to be maintained by volunteers. He's opened up a foundation to channel the money that individuals donate towards genuine causes. He says he has whatever he has because he loves his country. He has earned much in his life and feels it's time he gave back. And he couldn't think of a better way of doing that than by helping out those affected by the pandemic.

Salim Khan and **Javed Akhtar** are two of the most celebrated writers of the Hindi film industry. We hear that Javed Akhtar's daughter, filmmaker **Zoya Akhtar** is working on a documentary on the life of Salim-Javed. She wants to pay a tribute to the duo through her documentary. Salim Khan has also confirmed that a documentary is in the making with Zoya working on it for the last two months. The documentary has been reportedly titled *Angry Young Men*. KAREENA KAPOOR KHAN MAKES IT TO THE TIMES SQUARE BILLBOARD IN NYC

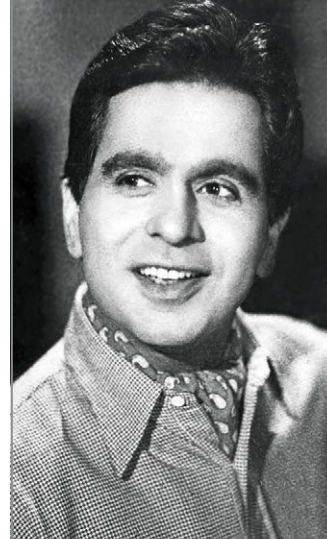

DILIP KUMAR PASSES AWAY

Legendary actor **Dilip Kumar**, who was popularly known as the 'tragedy king', passed away on the morning of July 7. The actor was 98 and is survived by his wife, veteran actor Saira Banu. Doctors treating him said Dilip Kumar suffered from advanced prostate cancer that had spread to other organs of his body. "He had water in pleural cavity, and he suffered kidney failure. He required blood transfusion multiple times. We carried out the last transfusion but it did not help." The actor was bedridden for several months and had become unresponsive in the last few days. With a career that spanned over five decades, he's considered as one of the greatest actors that India has ever seen. Some of his best films include *Devdas* (1955), *Naya Daur* (1957), *Madhumati* (1958), *Mughal-e-Azam*, *Gunga Jumna* (1961), *Ram Aur Shyam* (1967), and *Shakti* (1982) to name a few. X FACTOR: PASSION FOR THE CRAFT

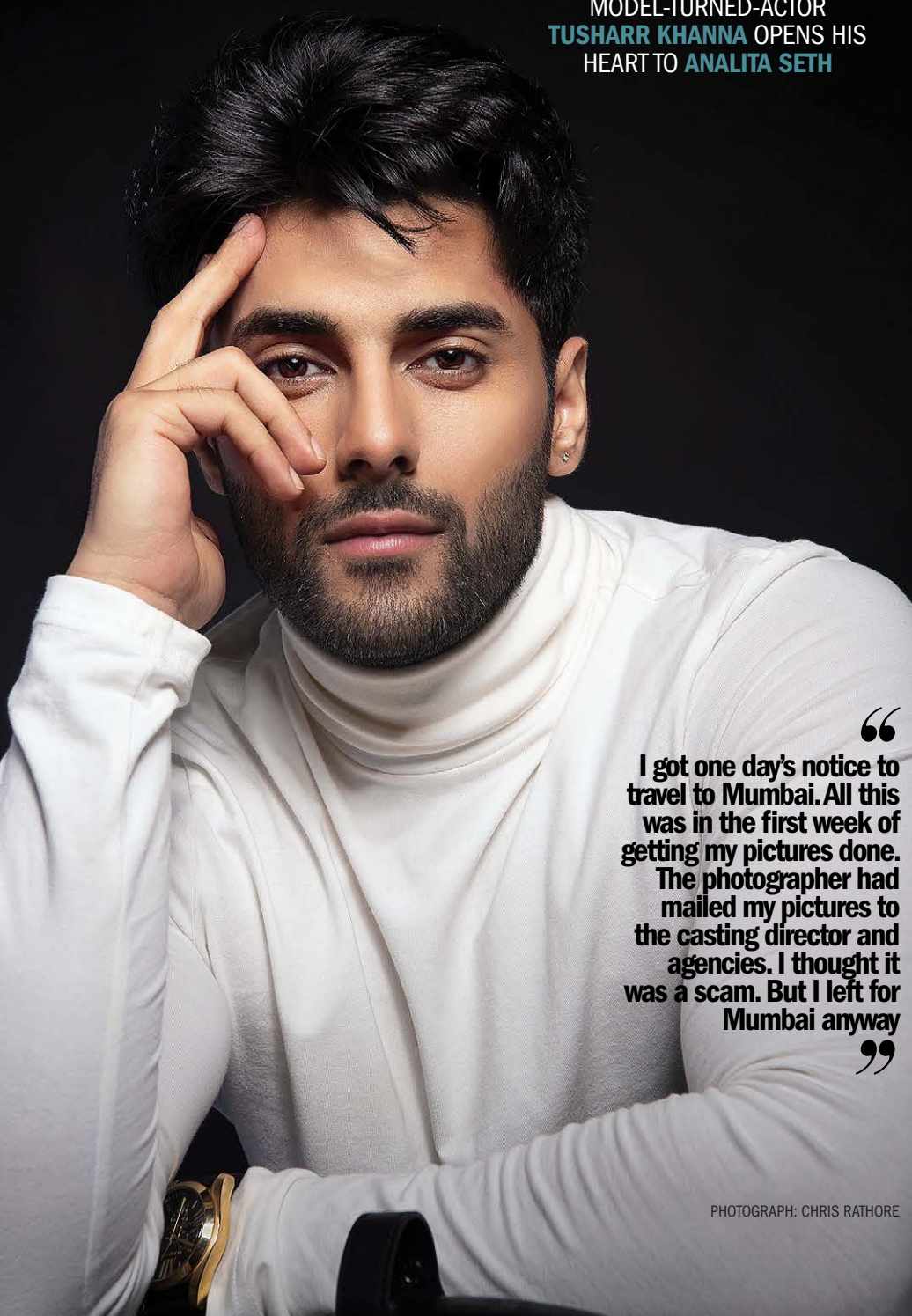

Theatre made him come in contact with like-minded individuals and he ended up getting a starring role in the independent film *Shuttlecock Boys* (2012), which garnered rave reviews on the festival circuit. His more recent works include series like *MTV Abhineta*, *Final Solutions*, *Flesh* and a TVC for *Amazon Apni Dukaan*. He was also a part of the play *Lassanwala* that opened at Prithvi Theatre and was in 13 productions of the show. He performed at the 12th META in Delhi where he received a META for Best acting in supporting role in 2017. An avid reader, Alok loves to read biographies in his free time and watch movies.

Handsome hunk Tusharr Khanna was born in Amritsar.

Since his father had a transferable job, he ended up changing schools a lot. From Amritsar, the family moved to Delhi and then to Noida and hence he found it difficult to make friends and sustain friendships. That led to him to have imaginary friends. Films and comics fuelled his hyperactive imagination. As he grew older, he realised that he can live all these characters and more if he became an actor. Ever since he had that epiphany, he devoted his energies into becoming an actor. “I did a filmmaking course from Symbiosis Institute of Media and Communication in Pune and I’ve been involved with theatre all my life. I’ve been on stage since the age of three. So the acting bug had bitten me quite early,” he smiles.

Like many other outsiders keen for a break on the silver screen, Tusharr too started as a model. His first assignment was a TVC for Cafe Coffee Day while he was still in school. They were auditioning for the ad in his school and he got the part. “I received a cheque of fifteen thousand rupees for it,” he recalls. “I gave that

2-3 episodes a day and literally living on the sets. They say the burnout rate is the highest among daily soap actors and Tusharr felt it too. He took a long sabbatical and returned with a web show for AltBalaji, called *Bekaaboo Season 2*. His popularity soared even further with the bold show and people started calling him OTT's greek god. "That's my journey so far in a gist. I've been offered two films but haven't started shooting for them because of the pandemic. I hope the shooting starts soon as I'm raring to begin my innings on the big screen," he confides.

The actor has had his share of setbacks but instead of calling them setbacks he calls them learnings. He's made a practice of reassessing

more difficult for him. So I feel very inspired by his journey. He didn't just go on to become one of the best actors, but he's also the number one star, the king. He's a great actor, a brilliant businessman and the fittest man in the industry," gushes the actor.

Tusharr wants to similarly carve his own legacy and inspire other newcomers through his work. He believes in the law of the Universe and says if the Universe has given him so much then it becomes his duty to give back that much more. Besides SRK, he's inspired by Ranbir Kapoor and Deepika Padukone, whom he considers to be the best in Bollywood. His Hollywood idols are Tom Hanks and Natalie Portman. Besides acting, he loves to play sports like football and basketball. He's a complete movie buff and watches at least one movie a day. He's also into music and knows how to play both the guitar and the violin. He's a spiritual person at heart and hence reads books on spiritualism as well as biographies of successful people in order to learn from them. He's happy the song video he shot for T series with singer Ipsitaa is going to release soon. "I'd love to talk about my two film projects but I've been ordered not to. I can't break such rules right now as my journey has just begun. I don't want to jinx anything at this stage. I've miles to go and I want the voyage to be a memorable one. Wish me luck," says he, before signing off.

Here's hoping his dreams are fulfilled. ■

to my mother.” Mumbai is known as the mecca for all young actors and Tusharr wasn't immune to the city's charms. He desperately wanted to pack his bags and move here but lacked the means to do so. At 21, after completing an acting workshop with Barry John, he got some photos clicked and sent them to a modelling agency in Mumbai. To his surprise, he got called for an ad with Sonakshi Sinha. “I got one day's notice to travel to Mumbai. All this was in the first week of getting my pictures done. The photographer had mailed my pictures

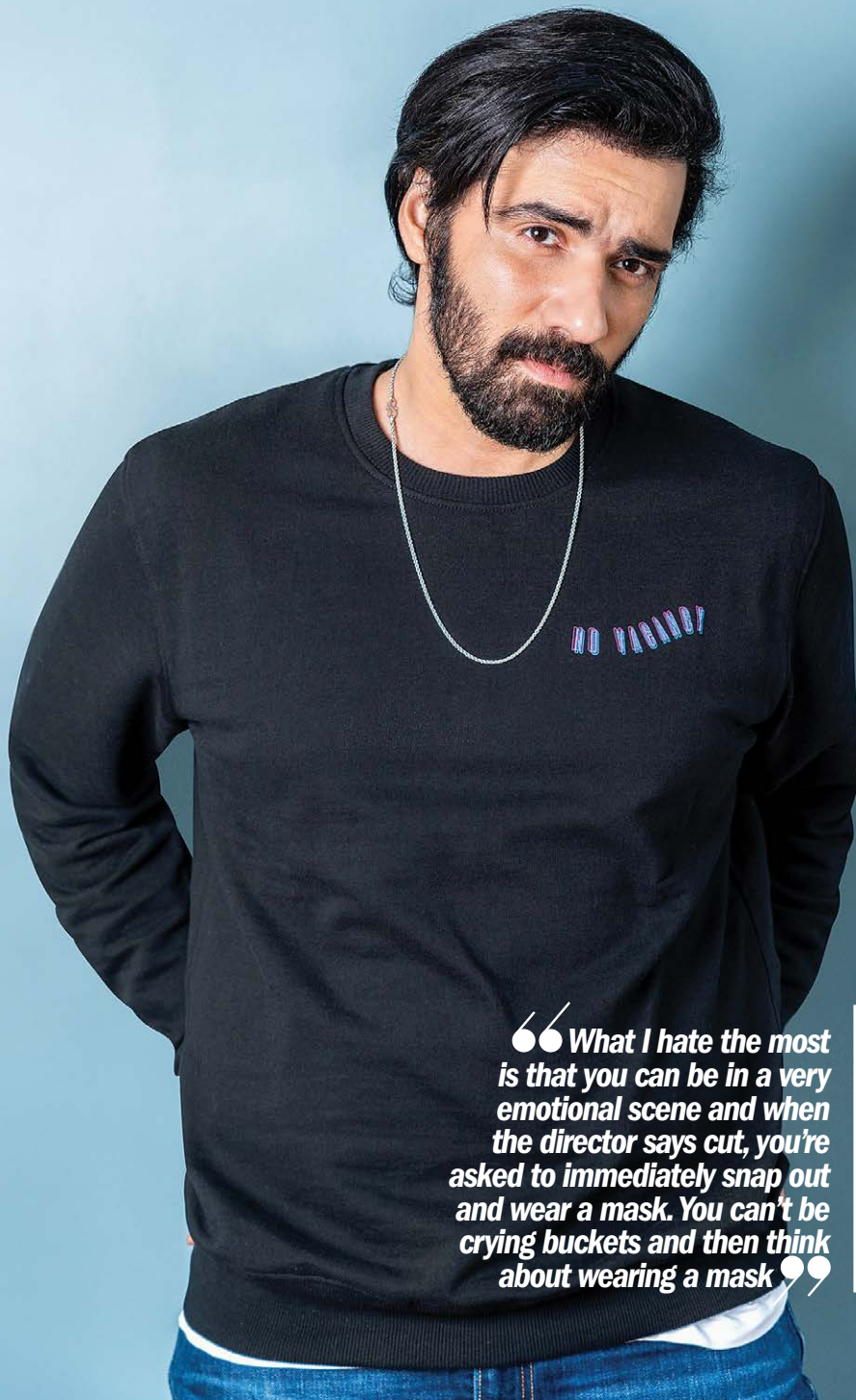
to the casting director and agencies. I thought it was a scam. But I left for Mumbai anyway. The person who was coordinating the ad told me to audition for several more and I ended up bagging them all. It was a dream beginning of sorts,” he reveals.

He slowly made contacts, did workshops and got his first television show, *Piya Albela*, produced by Rajshri Productions. The show proved to be a hit and he got sucked into the daily grind of working in a Hindi soap, shooting

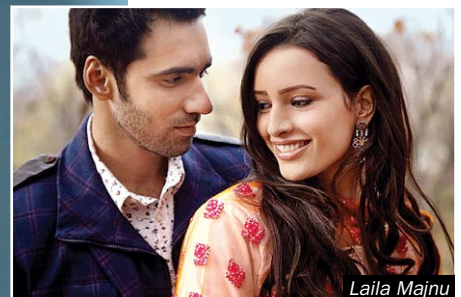

Making the most of the new normal as they call it, a virtual meet with this talented actor was the only way to find out what he's been upto. When asked what his life has been like in 2021, he smiles, “Aren't we still living in 2020,” and you can't help but agree.

Avinash Tiwary started out doing TV serials like *Ek Aangan Ke Ho Gaye Do* and *Bikhri Aas Nikhri Preet* which came on DD National and later he also did *Yudh* with Amitabh Bachchan. He made his feature film debut in 2017 with *Tu Hai Mera Sunday* which won him a lot of critical acclaim. His claim to fame was *Laila Majnu* (2018), which was directed by Imtiaz Ali's brother Sajid Ali. He reunited with his *Laila Majnu* co-star, Tripti Dimri in Anushka Sharma's production, *Bulbbul* (2020) and won a nomination for the FLYX Filmfare OTT Awards. His last release was *The Girl On The Train* (2021)

with Parineeti Chopra and Aditi Rao Hydari, where he played the antagonist. He was praised for the ease with which he essayed his negative character. Avinash has no qualms about his films releasing on OTT as according to him, that means more and more people are watching them. He says he received messages from people thanking him as web shows and movies were the only things that kept them busy during the lockdown.

Sharing his experience of going back to set briefly during the last unlock, Avinash says “I started work and that was the only normal thing in life. But the way we were shooting with masks and PPE kits was a little awkward. But kudos to the team for pulling it off. We were being tested twice a week during the whole shoot,” he reveals. While prevention seems to be the only cure for the coronavirus, Avinash shares that for an actor, shooting with protocols has its pros and cons, “What I hate the most is that you can be in an emotional scene and when the director says cut, you’re asked to immediately snap out and wear a mask. You can’t be crying buckets and then think about wearing a mask. As for the good things, we know people have become more focused. The efficiency rate has really gone up.”

Avinash’s work so far can be seen as being part of the middle-of-the road cinema. It’s neither pure art nor purely commercial. He agrees with the fact that

commercial cinema has a certain charm to it but says he never saw himself doing it. He says he chooses his roles based on his likes and dislikes. “I’ve always been the audience. There is a certain kind of cinema you like and that doesn’t mean I don’t like escapist cinema but I never saw myself doing that.” Then he contradicts himself by saying *Laila Majnu* was a commercial subject. “It was a film made by Imtiaz Ali. For some reason it didn’t reach out to the world but that doesn’t mean that it wasn’t a commercial idea.” His next is a series called *Dongri To Dubai*, which co-stars Kay Kay Menon, Amyra Dastur and Kritika Kamra. He plays ‘the biggest gangster in the world’ in it and calls it a hugely commercial idea. He never goes by the banner or the director alone but wants to know every aspect of it. “My choices are defined by the people associated with it, the writer, the director, actors, and composers. I want to know the story in detail.” He adds that these parameters haven’t limited his choices. “You

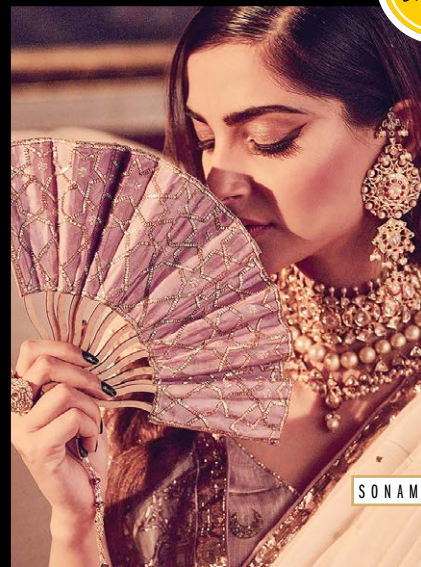

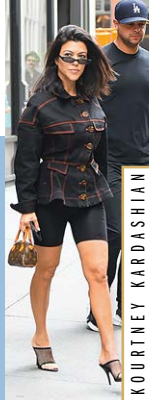

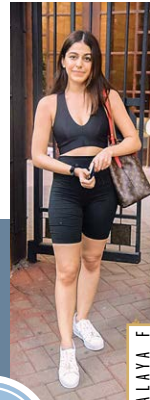

Sonu Sood talks about how a single act of charity led him to become a one-man army whose reach impacted thousands affected by the COVID-19 pandemic

SONU SOOD TELLS ANURADHA CHOUDHARY THAT HELPING OTHERS HAS GIVEN HIM A FRESH PERSPECTIVE ON LIFE

Sonu Sood's talking to me but his mind is tuned to his phone, which is blinking incessantly even though it's on silent mode. His inbox is a beehive of activity as messages come streaming in. Some people want COVID-19 treatment, some are in need of a job. Others are looking for medical assistance... All of them are cries for help in these trying times. Some have sent gratitude-filled messages for the timely help they've received...

A certain caller is too overwhelmed to say anything except thank you, thank you, thank you repeatedly. Another caller is sharing her brother's latest health update. This is but a glimpse of the kind of life Sonu Sood has been living for the past one and a half years. There hasn't been time for anything else except listening to people's problems and trying to come up with workable solutions. These days people have even started walking from distant places just to thank the actor. Some even come to discuss their problems in person with him. He has indeed become a cult figure for the masses. We hear of people naming their shops after him. A temple has also supposedly come up where he's worshipped as a deity.

He's perceived to be a magician who waves his wand and problems go away. Some also call him a superhero because he seems to be online 24/7, fighting the good fight. For most people, he's the answer to all their troubles. In short, Sonu Sood has been a force to reckon with in times when most governments have failed... A one-man army out to vanquish all problems. Taking time off from his busy schedule, we link up on Zoom. He reluctantly keeps his phone aside as I roll out my first question. An excerpt from a free-wheeling interview with the real-life hero...

PEOPLE COME TO MUMBAI AND TELL THE AUTORICKSHAW DRIVERS AT THE RAILWAY STATIONS *KI SONU KE GHAR JANA HAI* (DROP US AT SONU SOOD'S HOUSE) AND THEY GET DROPPED AT MY PLACE WITHOUT FAIL

EARLIER, PEOPLE USED TO REACH OUT TO YOU VIA CALL OR TEXT. NOW, THEY'VE STARTED COMING TO YOUR GATES...

Yes. Now, they've started coming to my house. People come to Mumbai and tell the autorickshaw drivers at the railway stations *ki Sonu ke ghar jana hai* (drop us at Sonu Sood's house) and they get dropped at my place without fail. They sometimes reach at 3 a.m. or 4 a.m. and wait the whole day to meet me. Earlier, I used to come out to meet them multiple times but then I wasn't able to do any work because of the frequency. So, now I come out just once a day and till that time, my people take the details about who wants what kind of help. Many want funds to further their education, while others need medical help and so on...

YOU MEET THEM ALL?

Yes. They say that, for us, hope means Sonu Sood. A lot of girls who come to meet me get stuck because there are no trains or buses available for them to go back. So I make sure they get a safe place to stay till transport can be arranged.

HOW DO YOU REACT WHEN PEOPLE CALL YOU A SUPERHERO?

I'm no superhero. I just feel connected to the masses. There's some kind of a chord I've stuck with them. They feel I can solve their problems. In that way, I feel blessed.

HOW DID IT ALL START?

It started last year when I thought of sending a family back to Karnataka and the 'family' turned out to be 350 people. Those were the first buses that I sent from Mumbai to Karnataka.

The journey of sending the migrant labourers through trains, buses and bikes got started from there. I vowed I won't stop till the last person reaches his home safely. It took a few months because people stranded in such faraway places as Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan, Georgia, Philippines and Russia reached out to me as they wanted to come back home. There were some kids from the Philippines whose liver transplant surgeries were scheduled in the Max Hospital and the Apollo

Hospital in Delhi. They were stuck because of the lockdown. The local Filipino people heard that there is an Indian who is helping people reach home so they approached me. I helped 39 such kids. There were 41 kids actually but two passed away before I could get the necessary permissions.

YOUR ONLY REWARD IS THE PEOPLE'S BLESSINGS...

It's a different feeling altogether. You know, all these years when I was

doing films, it all came to an end when the director called "cut". But for what I'm doing now, there is no "cut". God is the director and I'm playing a real role which I always wanted to play in my life.

DID YOU EVER IMAGINE THAT THE MAGNITUDE OF WHAT YOU ARE DOING WOULD GROW SO BIG?

No. When the lockdown started, nobody knew how long it would last. We were all lighting candles back then. However, the situation went from bad to worse. I realised that I would do my bit and won't wait for anyone. I can say that I've rediscovered myself. I've gotten so many scripts in the last one-and-a-half years but I haven't had the time to read any of them. The goal now is to save lives. I feel blessed when an unknown person gets saved.

WHAT WERE THE OBSTACLES YOU FACED WHEN YOU STARTED OUT?

Like everyone else, I didn't know how bad the situation was or how long the lockdown would last. It took me a while to realise the magnitude of the problem. It's not just about



sending people home safely. It's about taking care of their employment, their education and their needs later on. I've created about two-and-a-half lakh jobs by now. Last year, I helped more than 2400 students with educational scholarships. This time we're going to do ten times more than that. We've

added IAS coaching, chartered accountant coaching and many other fields in our sphere.

YOU HAVE DONE WHAT GOVERNMENTS HAVE FAILED TO DO IN THIS COUNTRY.

I don't know. I didn't follow any protocols but just followed my heart.

I connected one-on-one with every single individual. And that connection was not based on caste, colour, creed or state. I've spent days on the phone with them and I was living their pain, literally. I feel they are my family.

HOW DO YOU MANAGE TO REPLY TO EVERYONE?

I REMEMBER I'D MESSAGED YOU FOR A HOSPITAL BED FOR A FRIEND'S MOTHER. YOU REPLIED TO ME WITHIN A MINUTE...

Really? You'd messaged me? I don't remember that. I get so many messages... I have diaries all around me labelled priority, urgent, important etc. Then there are diaries and pages

with names of states on them. I have teams on the ground in different states and there too, there are subsections where there are teams for oxygen, for medicine, for ventilators, for hospital beds... They update me every 30 minutes. I've instructed them to reach out to everyone who reaches out to us because there are a lot of hopes vested in this.

HOW DO YOU REACT TO PEOPLE NAMING THEIR SHOPS AFTER YOU AND BUILDING TEMPLES IN YOUR HONOUR?

I feel humbled. I miss my parents and I wish they were here to see the love that people are showering on me. Many people have walked all the way from Tirupati, from Andhra, from Telangana and different places to meet me. I call them and request them to not to make the journey on foot and take a bus or something. They reply that when they go to temples, they don't cheat God by taking a bus but make the pilgrimage on foot. It's their way of saying thank you. This is the emotion they ride on. Even as we are talking, there are three people I know of who have already reached half way from AP. In the morning, we again requested them not to walk further and take some transport but they're continuing on foot.

WAS THE SECOND WAVE TOUGHER THAN THE FIRST ONE WHEN IT CAME TO HELPING PEOPLE?

Yes, it was tougher because we were losing lives. I must have lost almost 270 people whom I was

trying to help. I have all their details - the people who died and who survived. There were times I got them beds or whatever they needed but I still couldn't save them. But leaving aside these 270 people, there are thousands I was able to save. Thousands. I'm happy that I jumped into the fray during the second wave. I keep thinking that if I didn't have that awareness or awakening, maybe thousands more would have lost their lives. I thank God for what I'm doing today. I get messages from people everyday thanking me and saying that they're with their families because of me. I still get messages from people I've helped last year. There are some who message me every day. And it's not a forward, it's a personalised message that they send. This is very precious.

WHICH HAS BEEN YOUR HAPPIEST MEMORY OF SAVING A LIFE AND WHICH HAS BEEN THE SADDEST?

There was a girl from Nagpur who was air-lifted to Mumbai. She was the daughter of a railway employee who used to get only Rs 15,000 as pension. I got her the best of hospitals. She needed a lung transplant. A lung transplant is very expensive, it costs around a crore if I'm not mistaken. I called the hospital in Nagpur and said that I need your help as well.

Let's try and save her together. I remember she had to be airlifted and was on an ECMO machine. An ECMO machine is very expensive. The machine costs almost 2.5 lakh rupees per day and the doctor said that there is only a 15 percent chance of survival. She was just a young girl of 25. She came on that air ambulance and was here for 25 days and was showing improvement but then we lost her. That day, I was totally heartbroken. I hadn't met her ever in my life but I used to get images every single day from the hospital. I just wish the family had connected with me a week earlier. Perhaps we could have saved her. There are many more cases like this. There are also many happy memories. Yesterday, I heard about a 13-year-old girl who had a successful bone-marrow transplant. The treatment had been going on for almost 11 months. I felt very happy when I heard that she has recovered now. There was a boy from Telangana whose lungs were 100 per cent damaged. The

doctors said that there is no chance of survival. He is the only brother to three sisters. I took a chance on him and shifted him from one hospital to another and he recovered in 20 days. I felt very happy that day. He called me up and said "Sir, I'm looking forward to working out with you."

HOW DOES IT FEEL WHEN THE UN AWARDS YOU WITH THE SPECIAL PRESTIGIOUS HUMANITARIAN AWARD?

It feels nice but if you ask me, I feel happy when we solve these cases everyday. For instance, a guy from Telangana came today. He'd lost one arm in an accident. I asked him if he wanted to get a prosthetic hand and he said that that'd be nice. In two days, he'll be going back with a new prosthetic hand and can do everything he wants to. This is my award.

THERE'S TALKS ABOUT A THIRD WAVE, ARE YOU PREPARED FOR THAT?

You know, even when the first wave got over, it didn't actually get over

as people were still suffering. *Logon ki takleefein khatam nahi hui thi.* (People's troubles didn't get over) When the second wave gets over, it'll mean the cases of COVID-19 have gone down. But the problems won't vanish. People still won't have jobs, won't have money for admissions or for medicines. So my work will continue.

WILL YOU CONTINUE WITH THIS WORK EVEN AFTER COVID-19 GETS OVER?

All my life. This is part of my life now. *Sonu rahe na rahe, Sonu ki* future generations will continue to do this work. (My children and their children will continue this work). My kids are very inspired with what they're witnessing.

And I asked them to promise that no matter how busy they get in life, they wouldn't stop this movement that we've started and it should pass from one generation to the other. We started this journey during these COVID-19 times and it will continue.

ARE PEOPLE COMING FORWARD TO DONATE? BECAUSE I BELIEVE YOU STARTED OUT WITH YOUR OWN MONEY...

Apart from the money that comes in, your faith in people is restored. You feel that people are standing with you. People tell me that we should give you an award and I tell them,

“What will I do with this trophy in my house? Instead of that, please go ahead and get two surgeries done for someone in need. That will be my award.” I signed almost 57 to 60 brands in the last one and a half years. *Maine unko bhi kaam par laga diya.* (I’ve put them all to work) *Koi light ka brand aata tha toh main kehta hoon ke chalo, kisi gaon mai bijli lagayenge.* (If a lightbulb brand signs me up for endorsement I tell them to provide electricity to a village). I would listen to their pitch and come up with ways to help people. You know, we’ve been working with big ad agencies for years but we never thought we could use our reach to help the masses in this manner. People tell me that working with me has opened their eyes to new possibilities. They feel blessed that they can provide help to the needy. And it’s no longer just about the brand or the money coming in but concerns the welfare of the society at large.

YOU ALSO BATTLED COVID-19. WHAT WAS YOUR PERSONAL BATTLE LIKE?

I MUST HAVE LOST ALMOST 270 PEOPLE WHOM I WAS TRYING TO HELP. I HAVE ALL THEIR DETAILS – THE PEOPLE WHO DIED AND WHO SURVIVED. THERE WERE TIMES I GOT THEM BEDS OR WHATEVER THEY NEEDED BUT I STILL COULDN’T SAVE THEM

I was more busy than ever. I would be working for 22 to 23 hours. I was shut inside one room and since I couldn’t meet anyone in quarantine, I’d use my phone to help people out.

A LOT OF PEOPLE WANT TO HELP BUT THEY DON’T KNOW HOW TO...

(Laughs) Aap unhe mere paas bhej do, mai unhe

kaam pe laga dunga. (Send them to me. I’ll put them to work). I have a friend called Abhishek who’s from Bangkok and he is a party animal. I asked him to join my cause. He has helped save 20-30 lives till now. He tells me that he’ll not party anymore. He is only thinking about helping people these days.

HOW DID THIS AWAKENING COME TO YOU?

My parents were humanitarians. They would organise *langars* and I would join them in their endeavours. I would notice the joy in someone's eyes when I served them *halwa*. *Jab mai kisiko puri, chhole deta tha toh main dekhta tha uske chehre par ek smile aa jati thi. Mujhe pata nahi chalta tha ki kya khaas baat hai. Thoda halwa de diya, kya khaas baat hai? Lekin us halwe mai jo khushi thi, woh koi aur duniya mein nahi ho sakti. Woh mujhe ab jakar pata chala ke jab ek anjaan aadmi aapki madad karta hai to ek alag kism ki khushi mehsoos hoti hai* (When I used to serve them *puri* or *halwa*, their eyes used to light up. I used to wonder why they're so happy with so little. But now I've come to realise you experience a different kind of happiness when a total stranger helps you). The kind of happiness that you get, you can't put in words. My mother taught students free of cost all her life. If someone dropped out of college, she would travel all the way to his village to

convince him to get back to college because education is important. That is the kind of environment I was raised in.

WHAT IS YOUR NORMAL DAY LIKE?

In the past 16 months, my life has changed. I already have 60 missed calls since I've started speaking to you. There are 5414 unread messages *jo sirf reports aur help ke hain* (I have 5414 messages which are just reports or help requests). I know that when I keep my phone aside, there is someone who is hoping that I'll pick up their phone and someone's life will get saved.

DO YOU GET TIME FOR YOURSELF?

In the last few months? No. I may be physically present with my family but my mind is elsewhere. I'm always trying to get things organised. Usually, NGOs deal with just one cause. But

I take on everything. And NGOs aren't well-known among the masses. For me, it's a national thing because people ask for help from across the country.

WILL YOU GET BACK TO ACTING AFTER THIS?

Of course, I'll get back to acting. When I was shooting last year, there were hundreds of people who would come to the sets to meet me. Even the people on the set would spread the word that I'd be on set that day. I would listen to their problems for around two to three hours each day.

DOES IT FRUSTRATE YOU SOMETIMES?

I can't get frustrated because *takleef bahut zyada hai* (because the suffering is immense). But yes, I do feel that more people need to come forward. *Yeh jung akele nahi jeeti ja sakti* (one can't win this war alone). I need more people to come forward and take responsibility. People often ask how I manage to do all this and I tell them that I don't think twice before calling someone I don't know for someone I don't know. I'll even call the PM's office if I need to.

PEOPLE SAY YOU'RE PLANNING TO GET INTO POLITICS. IS THAT TRUE?

I have a lot of regards for politics but *mera mindset abhi uss taraf nahi hai* (I don't have a mindset for that right now). I feel that when you get into politics, you have to follow a lot of rules and regulations. *Maine koi protocol follow nahi*

kiye. Kis state mai kiski sarkar hai, mujhe kuch farak nahi parta (I haven't followed any protocol. It doesn't matter to me which party rules in which state). I never checked who called me from which state. I'd directly call up foreign ambassadors and embassies. I stepped out to help people and I'd tell them that let's do it together. It used to surprise them initially and also make things happen.

ARE PEOPLE HELPFUL? OR DO YOU STILL FACE OBSTACLES?

In the beginning, it was difficult. Now, they have heard and seen things. So when I call, they know I'm helping people out so they help out. When I used to mail DMs, I would tell the ADMs to send me a screenshot to show me that the mail had arrived. I would then message the DM that *dekho Sir, aapke paas mail aa chuka hai* (I used to inform DMs that the mail has reached them). That's how I used to follow up - *aisa nahi ki mail kar diya toh ho gaya* (Just sending the mail isn't enough). Every minute counts.

I'VE HEARD THAT YOU'VE HELPED SOME 90 LAKH MIGRANTS. IS THAT TRUE?

No, I just helped 10 lakh migrants. The number 90 lakhs includes all the people who approached me for help. Yes, almost a crore people connected with me

for different reasons like employment, education, medical help etc.

HOW HAS ALL THE WORK YOU'VE BEEN DOING AFFECTED YOUR CAREER?

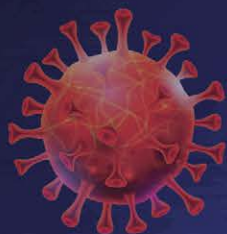
Like I said, I'm signing all the top brands now. I'm

getting many movies and roles that are larger than life. That of a superhero, messiah. Big budgets and good directors. Everything has changed, *logon ka nazariya badal gaya hai* (People look at me with a different perspective). ■

The international star used her social media clout to start a fundraiser for \$ 1million with which she procured resources like oxygen concentrators, vaccines and medicines for the affected people in India. A total of 14,000 people donated to her Give India fundraiser and the actor received immense support from eminent celebrities like Hugh Jackman, Irina Shayk, Zoya Akhtar, Lilly Singh and more. The target set was achieved in a couple of weeks and she decided to take it further and extend the fundraiser to \$ 3million. Priyanka also actively amplified verified contacts for resources in India and was vocal about the vaccine shortage in the country. She even tweeted to POTUS requesting Joe Biden to send vaccines to India as the USA had procured three times as much as they needed to vaccinate the entire population. Priyanka has been an advocate for mental health and wellbeing in these tough times and has shared details of people you can get in touch with to cope up with the COVID-19 crisis.

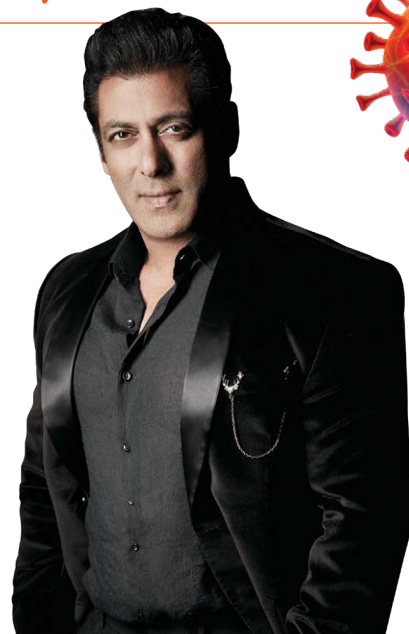
ANUSHKA SHARMA AND VIRAT KOHLI

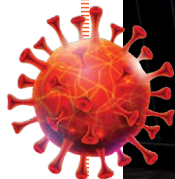
AJAY DEVGN

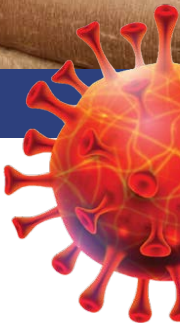
SHILPA SHETTY KUNDRA

ADITYA CHOPRA

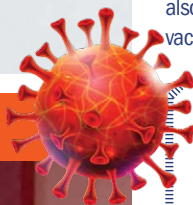

No full stops allowed

Neetu Kapoor is on a comeback trail. She shares her hopes and apprehensions with **Vedanshi Pathak** and also recollects what it feels like to be a mother to Riddhima and Ranbir

Neetu Kapoor is all set to make a comeback as an actor in Raj Mehta's *Jug Jugg Jeeyo*. She started life as a child actor, graduated to doing lead roles in films but left acting after marriage to be the emotional anchor to her husband, the late Rishi Kapoor. Later, she became a helicopter mom of sorts to Riddhima and Ranbir. Her children became her life. Her world revolved around them, making sure her kids were being brought up properly. Her routine changed somewhat after they grew up and started their own lives. Rishi Kapoor got diagnosed with cancer a few years back and she was there with him every inch of the way, helping him battle the disease. She lost him last year and then decided that one way to deal with her sorrow was to put on the greasepaint and face the arc lights again. In a straight-from-the-heart interview, she narrates her struggles of becoming a full-time actor once more and also shares glimpses of what life was as a hands-on mother in an actors' household.

You are starting life again as an actor with *Jug Jugg Jeeyo*. What difference did you find between then and now when you landed on the sets?

When I did those 70-80 movies, I was young and my mother used to accompany me. And then I did those two movies (*Do Dooni Chaar* and *Besharam*) with my husband. For me to agree to *Jug Jugg Jeeyo* took a lot because for the first time I didn't have anyone with me. It was quite an experience. Also, my husband had passed away recently, so I was a bit shaken

up inside. I needed something to make me feel stronger. I was anxious initially but gradually became used to the routine. And everybody made me

feel better on the sets. Anil Kapoor, director Raj Mehta, Kiara (Advani), Varun (Dhawan), everyone was a pillar of strength. So, I relaxed after a few



days. I'm glad I did the film.

How has your decision to come back to films changed your equation with your son Ranbir?

Actually, it has strengthened our bond. We've always discussed movies, actors, performances... We've always had that sort of a relationship. That's our passion. I'm a total movie buff. I can watch the worst movies. Now, I also discuss my forthcoming projects with him. It's a better bond now, because now I am discussing myself. Earlier we were discussing other people. He also discusses his films with me when he wants to, though he makes his own decisions. But once in a while he also wants my take on the script. So, we have that relationship of movies, scripts, performances and now it's become even better.

Are you spending more time with your children currently?

I want them to be busy with their lives. I say *mere dil mein raho, mere sar pe mat chadho* (stay in my heart, don't sit on my head). When Riddhima was with me during the lockdown, I was so stressed for one year because she couldn't go back. I used to

get restless and tell her, "Go back, Bharat is alone." I was literally pushing her away. I like my privacy. I'm used to this way of life. I remember when Riddhima was going to London to study I used to howl for days. If someone came to meet her to say goodbye, I'd start crying. But when later Ranbir went abroad to study, I didn't cry. He told me, "Mom, you don't love me." But it isn't that. It was just that I had gotten used to living away from a child. So when it happened again, I was prepared. I think those times when they were abroad made me stronger and made me feel that I'm okay being alone. Also, they have to get on with their lives. I'm happy when they come, but I want them to go back to their homes and be settled. I just say one thing -- don't meet me every day, but stay connected. I don't want them to be around me all the time. I'm independent that way. I love my life the way it is.

How different are Riddhima and Ranbir from each other?

Riddhima is a hands-on daughter. She goes crazy worrying over me even if I cough a little or if I say I am tired. She will send

hazaar messages, she will give me all her home-made cures, she will chew my head because she wants her mother to be okay. Ranbir is different, he is more on the quieter side. He will be worried, but he'll just ask me, "How are you doing mom, are you okay?" Ranbir's one call or message just makes me feel better, whatever I am going through. They all have their own things to make me feel good.

What's your fondest memory of Riddhima and Ranbir from their childhood?

For a mother, her children are her world. For me every day is a memory. Ranbir had just started earning. He was an assistant director in *Black* and he had made some money. It was Mother's Day and he took me to a restaurant called Just Around the Corner. It served lunch for Rs 100. So that was my best Mother's Day memory as we stood in a line with

a plate and I saw everyone was piling up their plate with food as you could fill it only once. And I was the proudest mother that day, as that was the first ever lunch my son had taken me out for. Riddhima was studying in London and she started doing some part-time jobs. I went to meet her during one of her vacations and when I landed at Heathrow, a limousine met me. It had flowers and champagne and she had arranged it all with her own money. I called her up and said, "Riddhima, are you crazy, such a big champagne bottle at 11 am?" She said, "I just wanted to do the best for you." I stayed with her in her apartment and she had all these beautiful cards all over with 'welcome to my home' written on them. They always asked me as children -- "Whom do you love more?" I used to say I love Riddhima two years

more because she is older. Both are special to me, but because she came earlier, I loved her two years more.

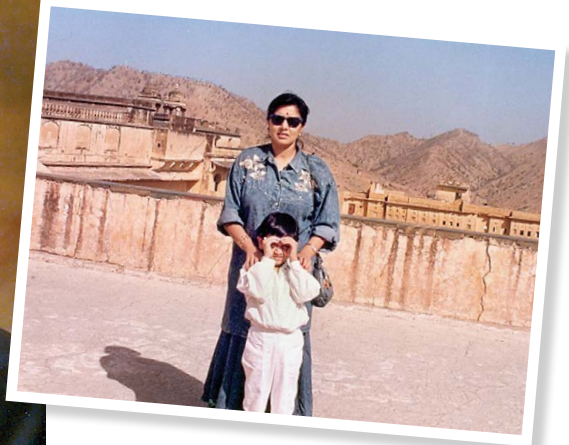
What were the changes that came into your life when you became a mother?

I was so obsessed with my kids that I forgot about the world for the first 10 years. I used to drop my children to school, pick them up myself -- I was that crazy. I had to be home when they were there. I had to make something special for them. Ranbir loved butter chicken, so I made sure that my butter chicken was the best. In the process I lost a lot of friends, but

my husband did not want to spoil them, we would say no. When Ranbir was an assistant director on *Black*, his father told him to go to work by an auto or a bus as that’s what other ADs would do. I never bought Riddhima a designer bag. Because how will they value what they get in life or from their partners, if you spoil them when they are children. Today she values it when Bharat buys her

something. Ranbir had to go to America on these long flights travelling economy. He used to say, “Mom, my legs go numb.” The only thing I used to make sure then was to buy him an aisle seat. So at least he could stretch his legs. I think these things are important. We wanted them to learn the value of life, value of money. That helped them in the way they are today.

One thing you wish you would have done differently as a mother...

I became a mother at 22. Sometimes I screamed at them when I was angry. I now understand that if a child is behaving in a different way there has to be an issue. Don’t scream, get to the bottom of it. I analyse things now. I don’t get upset or don’t get angry with them. I feel one should have children at a later stage, when you are more calm. ■

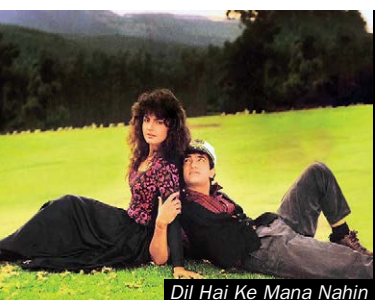

A new dawn

NEENA GUPTA IS ENJOYING A SECOND SPELL OF STARDOM IN HER MIDDLE AGE. SHE SHARES HER EUPHORIA WITH **ANALITA SETH**

Age is just a number. Or rather, it should be. But more often than not, this doesn't apply to our heroines. While a 50-plus hero is seen to be entering his golden age, for a heroine it's the reverse. She's said to be leaving her golden years behind and is expected to gracefully fade into the woodwork. Times are changing and thankfully today good roles are being written for mature actresses as well. One such beneficiary of this change is Neena Gupta. Thanks to her performances in films like *Badhaai Ho*, *Shubh Mangal Saavdhan* and series like *Panchayat*, she's finding herself flush with offers. Neena appeared as a 90-year-old grandma in *Sardar Ka Grandson* recently and her bravura performance won hearts. She's also revelling in the joy of her well-received autobiography *Sach Kahun Toh*. Excerpts from a free-flowing interview with the actress who has always lived life on her own terms...

What motivated you to write *Sach Kahun Toh*?

It was the time of the first lockdown. I had time to reflect and someone suggested that I should write. Fortunately, it all flowed smoothly this time around. I've tried before but I couldn't write for long.

Did you at any moment feel like maybe it's a bad idea?

I never felt it was a bad

idea. It's strange but it was like I took a road and I didn't want to turn back. I just wanted to get somewhere and I kept going. The road was difficult but I never lost heart.

It's got great reviews and the reception has been great...

I was nervous that people might not like it. I've written from the beginning



so I'd wonder who'd want to read about my childhood days in Karolbagh and NDA. I felt people only wanted juicier stuff and that's very little in the book. I had my doubts. But the praise and reception I've received, it's unbelievable. I'm ecstatic about the way people's received it.

Do you think it'll put a rest to the recurring questions about your past or will it raise new ones?

I don't care about whether it changes the false image the media had created of me. I've reached a point in my career and life where

all of this doesn't matter. I have a feeling that people will think differently of me as a person but if they don't, it doesn't matter. I've suffered, I've taken it in my stride, I lost a lot but now it's all in the past and doesn't matter.

There is a certain credibility attached to your name now. What does that feel like?

It is a big responsibility. It's like how I watch Hollywood films because it stars a certain actor. It's the same thing. My approach to accepting roles hasn't changed. I always see it from the point of

Badhaai Ho and Sardar Ka Grandson, how much have you evolved as an artiste and how much has the industry evolved in your view?

With every show, film or play I did, I found out more of my flaws. I realised what I lacked and what I had to work on. For example, on the screen, in a close up, you look double your size. So, I realised I can’t put on weight. Over the years, I’ve become my best critic. I know where I have gone wrong. As for the industry, it’s in a great phase for cinema currently. I’m thankful that I’m still getting work. I have a lot of good work lined up. It’s a great phase for everyone, writers, producers, directors, etc. The audience is accepting newer subjects so people are making better content. OTT has also helped a lot. You can make a low-budget film and masses will get to see it on streaming platforms.

What’s your take on the age gap that’s increasing between the male and the female leads? Does it mean there’s a shelf life to a

female actor but not one for her male counterpart?

There is no problem here. In our society it’s the same. A sixty year old man marries a twenty year old. But turn the roles and tell me, can a sixty year old woman marry a twenty year old man? It doesn’t happen. At least, I haven’t heard of such a thing. So in our society, a man can be with a younger woman but not so often the other way round. If it doesn’t happen in reality, how can you show it on screen? So one is used to it. Initially, I would say that yes, the actor is way older than me but then the other choice was to sit at home and not work.

Meryl Steep was seen romancing Keegan-Michael Key who is twenty years younger than her, in The Prom. You see something like that happening here?

No, it can’t happen here. I think it doesn’t happen a lot in the West either. Even if it does, it’s usually on the lines that the man will find a younger girl and will leave the older woman. That’s the mindset.

You played Kanwaljit Singh’s mother in Sardar Ka Grandson. You’ve often played his lover in both films and TV. Did you find it odd to see him cast as your son?

We are professionals and hence it doesn’t matter. I have played Feroze Khan’s older sister, for that matter. I have also played mother to actors who are just ten years younger than me. Maybe one day the audience will see Kanwaljit and me again, playing our real age in a drama. My role was

view of a lay person. If I’m not convinced that I would enjoy watching my character on screen, I won’t do it. Earlier I used to do films that I prayed would never see the light of day. I played badly-written characters because I had no work. In television, I’ve never done anything that I’ve not liked. But there I could choose. With films, I needed the money so I had to do such rubbish work, you can’t imagine. There is this one film that comes a lot on TV and I cringe when I see myself in it. So yes, now I have a responsibility and I’m quite clear in my head about

what I like and what I don’t want to portray. It can be correct to you, but it’s not correct to me.

How has work from home been for you?

I miss going out for promotions to different cities. I miss meeting people, having fun with them, eating and drinking together. But I do thank the almighty that even in this scenario we can work virtually. God knows when all of this will end, so whatever we’ve got, I’m grateful.

From your initial films like Mandi and Utsav to now

so good that nothing else mattered.

What was your first reaction when you heard the story of *Sardar Ka Grandson*?

When I learnt that I'd be playing a 90-year-old in the film, I told my manager that I am not even going to listen to the story and it was a no from me. But he told me to hear the narration and then decide. Kaashvi (Nair), the director narrated the script to me and when she finished I told her I'm game. I did have queries about the process of moving an entire house like it's shown in the film, so I asked her about it and she said she's done her research. In fact, the other day someone commented on my Instagram post that they have seen this happen in Germany. So it happens, though rarely. Also, I don't feel the love

in the winters with the same cap and scarf and she said I looked like her. So I knew we passed the look test. But initially we had a few issues. We experimented a lot. We made a mould and it was scary. I then tried many things and different people worked on the prosthetics. We had to keep in mind that it cannot hamper my performance. They wanted a full thing but I wasn't able to emote. So we decided on patches around my cheeks. It took me two hours to get ready everyday. The worst part was that we'd work till late and after packing up while everyone would rush to their rooms, I was stuck there to remove the make up for a good hour and a half.

What was it like working with an ensemble cast?

It was great fun. We shot

What was the most difficult part of playing a nonagenarian?

I received so many pictures of people's grandmothers and they tell me I look exactly like them. One of my friends sent me a picture of her grandmother

We shot around a farm so the place was beautiful. The weather was nice and food in Patiala was fabulous. We were living in a beautiful old palace. We got to know each other so well and Arjun (Kapoor) was so much fun. He

would keep cracking jokes. He's a very hardworking boy. We rarely met him in the night for dinner because he was doing intermittent fasting so he would eat early. He was disciplined and would do his workouts diligently. But on the set, we had a great time. Kaashvi is also a cool cat, we would always keep goofing around on the sets.

The film revolves around your character's memories of her past. What's your strongest memory of your life before you became an actor?

I'm from Delhi so when I came to Mumbai in 1981, it was difficult. I didn't have a godfather and I had no idea about the rules of the game. So after every two months, I would want to go back but something always came up. Although I still miss Delhi, Mumbai is my home now. But when I go back and visit places that I used to go to during school and college, sometimes it hurts a little. It's a sweet pain that will always remain and those are my most nostalgic moments in life. ■

She's the daughter of two talented artistes, Sachin and Supriya Pilgaonkar. One can say that Shriya Pilgaonkar was born to act. Like her father Sachin, who made a name for himself as a child artiste in both Hindi and Marathi cinema and then stretched that streak into adulthood, Shriya too started off when she was quite young. She appeared in the hit serial *Tu Tu Main Main*, playing a character named Bittu, when she was just five. She made her big screen debut with the Marathi film *Ekulti Ek* (2013), which was directed by Sachin. She won the Maharashtra State Film Award in the Best Debut Actress category for that. She then landed a French film called *Un plus une* (2015), which was much celebrated on the festival circuit. Her Hindi film debut happened with *Fan* (2016), where she was paired opposite Shah Rukh Khan. It's to her credit that she stood shoulder-to-shoulder with him in the film and didn't give off any newbie vibes. OTT beckoned in the form of the hugely successful *Mirzapur* (2018), she was even part of Gurinder Chaddha's period piece *Beecham House* (2019). Her last release was the multilingual *Kaadan* (2021), whose Hindi version *Haathi Mere Saathi*, has been put on hold because of the spike in the COVID-19 cases and a partial lockdown in Maharashtra. 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of that and recommended a book on screenplay writing called *Save The Cat*, which I bought later.

WHAT ARE THE THINGS YOU'VE LEARNT FROM YOUR PARENTS THAT MAKE YOU A BETTER PROFESSIONAL?

I've seen the grace with which my parents have always carried themselves and that's what I aspire to be. The goodwill they have is a result of not just their contribution and talent but their demeanour as people. They've always told me that no work is too big or too small and that the best way to be different is to be yourself. The legacy I want to leave behind is of being a solid human being who was kind to people and good at her craft.

DO YOU EVER GET IMPATIENT IF WORK IS SLOW?

Patience is a virtue actors need to have. There's no way out. I don't see my career lasting just 10 years, I want it to last 50 years or even more. So the quality of

the work I do is more important to me. There will be a good phase and a not-so-good phase but the point is to be consistent and keep moving ahead. When I feel like I have some free time, I take off and travel or learn something and prep myself for what's to come.

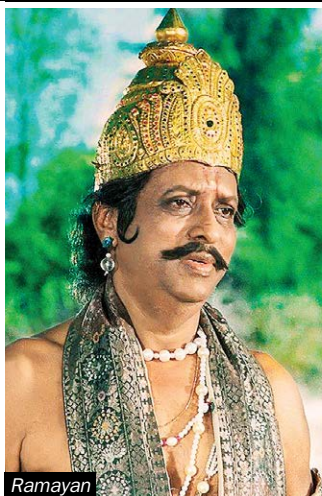
FAREWELL, CHANDRASHEKHAR

VETERAN ACTOR **CHANDRASHEKHAR** PASSED AWAY RECENTLY. **DEVESH SHARMA** OFFERS A SHORT PROFILE OF HIS LIFE AND TIMES

(JULY 7, 1922-JUNE 16, 2021)

They say Mumbai is a city of dreams. Sometimes, those who dream have to sleep on the footpath. One such person was the veteran actor Chandrashekhar. He started life in the movies as an 'ordinary' extra, who were paid 1.50 rupees per day in the 40s. The 'decent' extras were paid Rs 8. From ordinary extra he soon became a decent extra. He preferred working in Devika Rani's Bombay Studios, which paid Rs 10 and whose canteen offered subsidised food. In his initial years, he spent the days working in the studios and used to sleep on the footpath as accommodation was too costly in Mumbai.

Chandrashekhar was born as Chandrashekhar Vaidya in Hyderabad on July 7, 1922. He got married when he was just a teenager. Hard times befell his family and he left schooling and started doing odd jobs. He left for Bangalore at the age of 18 and worked in a factory pushing trolleys for a meagre wage. Later, he came to Mumbai to try his luck in the film industry. Life in Mumbai didn't prove to be easy. As said earlier, he was sleeping on the footpath, which wasn't

safe. He decided to shift to Pune as the cost of living was much lower in Pune. It's said singer Shamshad Begum helped him get a job with a fixed salary at a studio in Pune. He was able to afford a house in a chawl and called his wife to live with him there.

He had to shift base



again to Mumbai, after the owner of the studio he was working in migrated to Pakistan after Independence. He got his first role as a character artiste in *Bebus* (1950), which was made by Bharat Bhushan's brother Ramesh Chandra, who owned a studio in Lucknow. Bharat Bhushan was the hero and Chandrashekhar got

to play a character role in the film. He also became an assistant director in it. Incidentally, later in his life, Chandrashekhar became an assistant director to Gulzar, as he wasn't getting work as an actor. He assisted Gulzar in films like *Parichay* (1972), *Koshish* (1972), *Achanak* (1973), *Aandhi* (1975), *Khushboo* (1975) and *Mausam* (1975).

It's said he named his grandson Shakti Arora, who is a TV actor, after Shakti Samanta. Likewise, his friendship with Ashok Kumar led him to name his elder son Ashok, who is a businessman

VShantaram cast him as a second lead in *Surang* (1953). The film depicted the plight of the quarry workers and Chandrashekhar's role of a miner brought him plaudits. Better work started coming his way. And with that, better pay. He started getting Rs 15,000 per film. His films from that era include *Mastana* (1954), *Bara Dari* (1955), *Basant Bahar* (1956), *Gateway Of India* (1957), *Kali Topi Lal Rumal* (1959), where he played the lead role, and many more. He had a versatile 'face' as casting directors say, it could fit into any role, be it an inspector, a doctor, or lawyer. He played everybody from a prince to a pauper in his long career.

By the '60s, he had saved enough money to turn producer. He

produced and directed a dance film called *Cha Cha Cha* (1964), casting himself as the hero and taking talented dancer Helen as the heroine. It was her first lead role. The film became famous for its songs like *Subah na aayi, Woh tum na the* -- sung by Mohammed Rafi and the romantic duet *Ek chameli ke mandwe tale*, sung by Mohammed Rafi and Asha Bhosle. The film's music was given by Iqbal Qureshi, one of the unsung heroes of Hindi film music. The film became a super hit and that prompted Chandrashekhar to make another musical called *Street Singer* (1966). It had music by Shankar-Jaikishan and though the songs became popular at the time, the film didn't perform well at the box office. He quit filmmaking after that.

He was friends with

Shakti Samanta, who cast him in many films like *Kati Patang* (1971), *Ajnabee* (1974), *Mehbooba* (1976) and *Alag Alag* (1985). It's said he named his grandson Shakti Arora, who is a TV actor, after Shakti Samanta. Likewise, his friendship with Ashok Kumar led him to name his elder son Ashok, who is a businessman. From early 70s to the late 80s, Chandrashekhar played minor characters in films like *Hum Tum Aur Woh* (1971), *Gehri Chaal* (1973), *Charitraheen* (1974), *Shakti* (1982), *Namak Halaal* (1982), *Nikaah* (1982), *Disco Dancer* (1982), *Sharaabi* (1985), *Sansar* (1987), *Hukumat* (1987) and many more.

The mythological serial *Ramayan*, produced by Ramanand Sagar, brought him fame later in life as his character Arya Sumant, was well-received.

He had come up the hard way and was well-versed with the life of cinema workers. He was instrumental in the formation of the Cine Artists Association in 1958. He was involved with various film trade unions throughout his life. He served as President of the Cine Artistes Association (CINTAA) from 1985 to 1996. He was also the President of the Federation of Western India Cine Employees, All India Film Employees Confederation, trustee of Cine Artistes Welfare Fund of India and Cine Artiste Welfare Trust, Vice-President of Indian Film Directors Association, associated as Member with Film Writers Association, and Indian Motion Pictures Producers Association.

He died of age-related illness at the age of 98 on June 16, 2021. ■

— Remembering — Raaj Kumar

Devesh Sharma offers a short profile on the life and career of veteran actor **Raaj Kumar**, whose death anniversary falls on July 3

Raaj Kumar was born as Kulbhushan Nath Pandit in Loralai, Balochistan, in a Kashmiri Pandit family on October 8, 1926. Not much is known about his childhood or pre-movie days except that he joined the Mumbai police as a sub-inspector in the '40s. It's said that noted filmmaker Sohrab Modi once saw him in Metro theatre where they were both watching a film and impressed by his dashing personality, offered to launch him as a hero. He said no to Modi then but eventually did the costume action drama *Nausherwan-E-Adil* (1957) with him, which turned him into a star. He made his acting debut with the 1952 film *Rangili*. *Mother India* (1957), where he played Nargis' husband, further added to his fame.

Raaj Kumar was known as an stylised actor and was famous for his dialogue delivery but that wasn't the case in the '50s. Back then, he was known more for his realistic portrayals and understated performances. *Paigham* (1959) where he played Dilip Kumar's elder brother, is a case in point. He matched Dilip Kumar in every frame and some even said he bested the thespian in the film. Whatever the case may be, the duo never worked together again, till Subhash Ghai managed to bring them together for his *Saudagar* (1991), which was touted as the coming together of titans.

He reportedly changed his style and became a more stylised actor with the Yash Chopra multi-starrer *Waqt* (1965). The success of the film, where he played a loveable rake, made writers write grey-shaded roles for him, in which he excelled. Also, his command over both Hindi and Urdu got noted and he was offered flamboyant dialogue, which he pulled off with ease. Somehow, when he said them, those bombastic lines didn't sound cheesy. He excelled in romantic roles as well. And was well-suited to play

the stoic lover in such films as *Dil Apna Aur Preet Parai* (1960), *Dil Ek Mandir* (1963), *Kaajal* (1965) and his best romantic film till date, *Pakeezah* (1972). Incidentally, Raaj Kumar wasn't the only choice for the role in *Pakeezah*. Sunil Dutt, Rajendra Kumar and Dharmendra were all considered before Raaj Kumar got chosen. The film was initially launched in 1956 but took 16 year to get completed. But this gap did nothing to dilute its magic. It's still an immensely watchable film and its songs, composed by Ghulam Mohammed, remain immortal.

He lived life king-size, preferring to have the best of everything, be it cars, whiskeys or clothes. And he was eccentric enough to tailor shirts out of curtains if the colour or the design caught his eye. There are many stories about his acerbic wit. He once reportedly told Zeenat Aman, a top actor in the '70s, "You have a pretty face. You should try acting." And he even supposedly told Zeenat after *Satyam Shivam Sundaram* it was difficult to recognise her with her clothes on. Then, another story goes that he once told a gold-laden Bappi Lahri that the only thing missing was a *mangalsutra*. He was offered *Zanjeer* but allegedly turned it down as he didn't like Prakash Mehra's face. He's even said to have told Mani Kaul, the maker of the seminal art film *Uski Roti* (1969) – *Jaani, hamare saath aao*, commercial film *banate hain*, *Apna Halwa*.

From the '70s till his death in the '90s, he mostly worked in supporting roles. But such was his aura that he made those roles his own and had the masses rooting for his character more than the hero. After working in 70-plus films in his illustrious career, he succumbed to throat cancer on July 3, 1996. He was 69 at the time and is survived by his sons Puru Raaj Kumar, Panini Raajkumar and daughter Vastavika Pandit. He was a very private person and respecting his wishes, the film industry was informed of his death only after the cremation. We take a look at some of his best roles down the years.

DIL APNA AUR PREET PARAI (1960)

DIRECTOR: KISHORE SAHU
CAST: RAAJ KUMAR, MEENA KUMARI, NADIRA

This was a typical nurse-doctor romance known today for its

evergreen songs like *Ajeeb dastan hai yeh* and the title song. Karuna (Meena Kumari) joins a hospital as a nurse and comes into contact with Dr Sushil Varma (Raaj Kumar). Love blossoms between them and they seem right for each other. However, Dr Sushil has to marry Kusum (Naadira) due to the obligations of her father upon

him and his family. Kusum is the jealous sort who wreaks havoc in her marriage because of her nature. After much melodrama, the film veers towards a happy ending. Raaj Kumar was impressive as the doctor and so was Meena Kumari as the heartbroken nurse. Nadira too stood out as the overtly jealous wife.







GHARANA (1961)

DIRECTOR: S S VASAN

CAST: RAAJ KUMAR, RAJENDRA KUMAR, ASHA PAREKH

The film was a remake of the 1960 Telugu film *Shanthi Nivasam* and remade in 1988 as *Ghar Ghar Ki Kahani*. Shanta (Lalita Pawar) is a tyrant. Her husband Ramdas (Bipin Gupta) is a very religious, meek man. Her middle son Kailash (Raaj Kumar), is married to a loving woman Sita (Devika). Youngest son is Kamal

(Rajendra Kumar), a college student, who falls in love with another student Usha (Asha Parekh). Her married daughter Bhairavi (Shubha Khote), has now moved back home for a trivial reason. Shanta has completely spoiled her daughter. One day, Bhairavi plants a suspicion in Kailash's head that Sita is having an affair with Kamal. The peace in the family is destroyed with that suspicion as acrimony develops between the brothers. However, circumstances lead them to unite, leading to a happy ending for everyone.



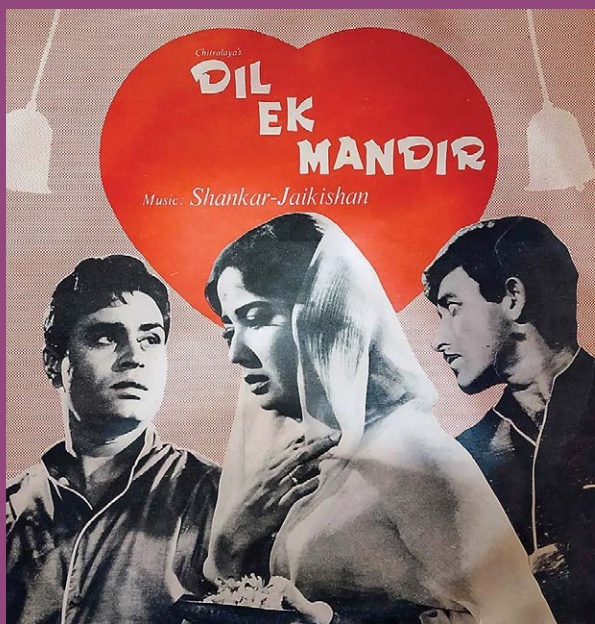
WAQT (1961)

DIRECTOR: YASH CHOPRA

CAST: SUNIL DUTT, RAAJ KUMAR, SHASHI KAPOOR, SADHANA, BALRAJ SAHNI, SHARMILA TAGORE, ACHALA SACHDEV AND REHMAN

Waqt is often said to be Hindi cinema's first multistarrer. It utilised the lost-and-found formula as its basic plot, something which has become an often-used trope in Hindi films. Its grand production values, an A-list cast and fabulous music ensured good box-office returns as well. Yash Chopra, who wanted the three Kapoor brothers – Raj, Shammi and Shashi – to

play the roles of long-lost brothers, settled for Raaj Kumar, Sunil Dutt as the elder and middle brother, with only Shashi retained from the original cast. He cast Sadhana and Sharmila Tagore, both known as style icons, as the love interest. The lost-and-found formula didn't look like a cliché and we sat engrossed as the brothers unknowingly crossed each other's paths. Raaj Kumar played a grey-shaded character in the film and was said to have overshadowed his other co-stars, thanks to his suave acting and the author-backed dialogue. He won his second Filmfare Best Actor In A Supporting Role trophy for this film.



DIL EK MANDIR (1963)

DIRECTOR: C. V. SRIDHAR

CAST: RAJENDRA KUMAR, MEENA KUMARI, RAAJ KUMAR

The film was a remake of the Tamil film *Nenjil Or Aalayam* (1962), also directed by Sridhar. This was another love triangle between a doctor, his lover and the man she eventually marries. Dr Dharmesh (Rajendra Kumar) only lives to serve his patients. He's nursing a broken heart because the love of his life Sita (Meena Kumari) has married a rich businessman Ram (Raaj Kumar). Ram gets cancer

and comes to Dharmesh's hospital for treatment. Sita isn't sure Ram is the right doctor for her husband as his feelings might come in the way. To prove to her that his zeal for curing patients is bigger than his feelings for her, he dedicatedly works day and night to find a line of treatment and even suffers a heart attack in the process. He successfully operates on Ram but later dies out of exhaustion. Ram and Sita later erect a hospital in his memory. Raaj Kumar won the Filmfare Best Actor In A Supporting Role trophy for his role in the film.



KAAJAL (1965)

DIRECTOR: RAM MAHESHWARI
CAST: MEENA KUMARI, DHARMENDRA, RAAJ KUMAR

The film is adapted from Gulshan Nanda's novel *Maadhavi*. After her munim passes away, Ranimaa brings up both his children as her own, along with her only son, Rajesh (Dharmendra). Years later, Rajesh has grown up and is of marriageable age. Munim's son Kaushal passes away, leaving behind a devastated Madhavi (Meena

Kumari). Rajesh blames himself for Kaushal's death. A few months later, Rajesh gets married to Bhanu (Padmini), who is extremely jealous of Madhavi. She even accuses Madhavi of having an affair with Rajesh. Madhavi wants to commit suicide and is rescued by Moti (Raaj Kumar). She gets married to Moti but it looks like he has his own agenda for marrying her. The film is known for its fab songs like *Choo lene do nazuk hoton ko*, *Yeh zulf agar khul ke*, and the evergreen rakhi song, *Mere bhaiyya, mere chanda*.

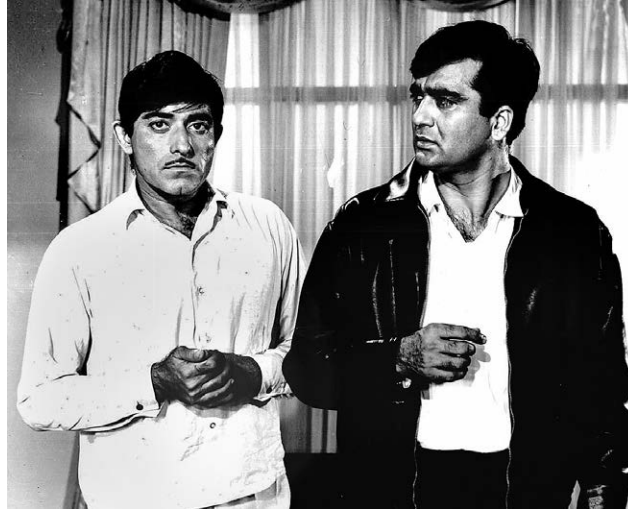
OONCHE LOG (1965)

DIRECTOR: PHANI MAJUMDAR
CAST: ASHOK KUMAR, RAAJ KUMAR, FEROZ KHAN, KANHAIYA LAL, DEVEN VERMA, TARUN BOSE, KUMUD TRIPATHI

It is based on the play *Major Chandrakanth*, by



K. Balachander. Widower Chandrakant (Ashok Kumar) is a blind retired army Major living with his two sons Shrikant (Raaj Kumar), a police inspector and Rajnikant (Feroz Khan), a collegian. While Shri is an honest police officer, Rajjo is a spoilt brat. Rajjo gets a girl pregnant and her brother kills him in retaliation. As fate would have it, the killer comes and hides in the Major's house and the wise Major puts the two and two together. Shri is after the killer and the Major does his utmost to hide him from the police, knowing that his younger son deserved to be killed. All three actors, Ashok Kumar, Raaj Kumar and Feroz Khan were a match for each other and the film got known for the macho chemistry



HAMRAAZ (1967)

DIRECTOR: BR CHOPRA
CAST: SUNIL DUTT, RAAJ KUMAR, BALRAJ SAHNI, VIMI, MUMTAZ

Hamraaz was a Hitchcockian film made by BR Chopra. Ravi provided the music and songs like *Neele gagan ke tale*, *Tum agar saath dene ka*, and *Na moonh chhupa ke jiyo* written by Sahir remain popular even today. Kumar (Sunil Dutt) is a well-known stage actor who performs plays along with his assistant Shabnam (Mumtaz), who is a little in love with him. While on a trip to Darjeeling, he falls in love with Meena (Vimi). Her behaviour

changes after his father's death and Kumar begins to feel she's having an affair. He means to investigate and disguises himself with the intention of following her but finds her dead. Soon, inspector Ashok (Balraj Sahni) starts suspecting him. In order to escape the murder charge, Kumar starts a parallel investigation of his own. His enquiries lead him to Captain Rajesh (Raaj Kumar), who confesses to being Meena's first husband. He also tells him that they have a daughter who was given for adoption. The man who killed Meena now has the child and the duo come together to find out the truth about the mysterious happenings.



NEEL KAMAL (1968)

DIRECTOR: RAM MAHESHWARI
CAST: WAHEEDA REHMAN, MANOJ KUMAR, RAAJ KUMAR

Neel Kamal is a reincarnation drama where Waheeda Rehman, playing the titular

role sleepwalks in the night because she's haunted by the ghost of her lover in a past life. How she's cured of her illness forms the crux of the film. Raaj Kumar played a rather suave ghost in the film. It has the evergreen marriage song, *Babul ki duayein leti ja*, sung by Mohammed Rafi.



PAKEEZAH (1972)

DIRECTOR: KAMAL AMROHI

CAST: MEENA KUMARI, RAAJ KUMAR, ASHOK KUMAR, NADIRA, D.K. SAPRU

A man from a *nawabi* family falls in love with a *tawaif* but circumstances don't permit him to marry her. History gets repeated twenty years later when his nephew falls for her daughter. Thankfully, this time there is a happy ending. Acons in the making, this Kamal Amrohi masterpiece had sparkling performances by Meena Kumari, Ashok Kumar and Raaj Kumar. It also had a fantastic score by Ghulam Mohammed, who tragically died before the film's release. It's still remembered for such gems as *Inhi logon ne* and *Thare rahiyo* by Lata Mangeshkar and the epic duet *Chalo dildar chalo* by Rafi and Lata.

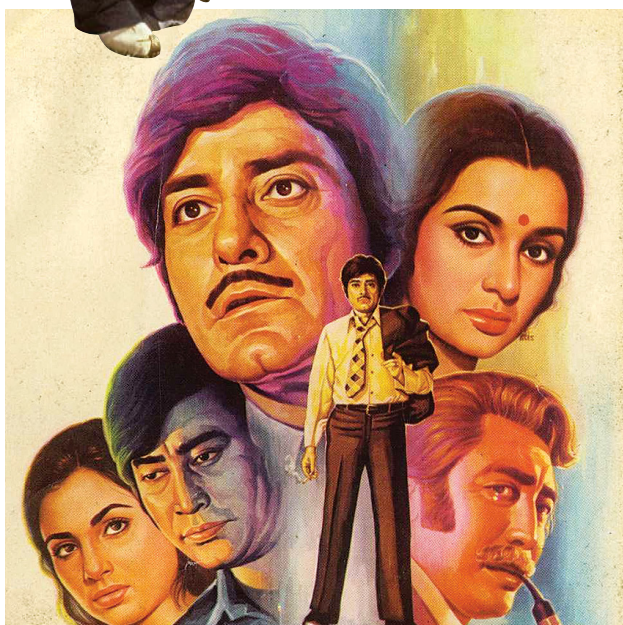


HEER RAANJHA (1970)

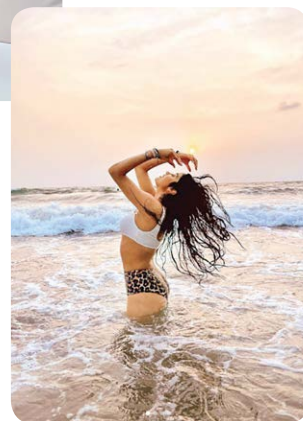

From black and white, colour films, multiplexes to OTT, I think Hindi films are losing their value day-by-day. What do you think?

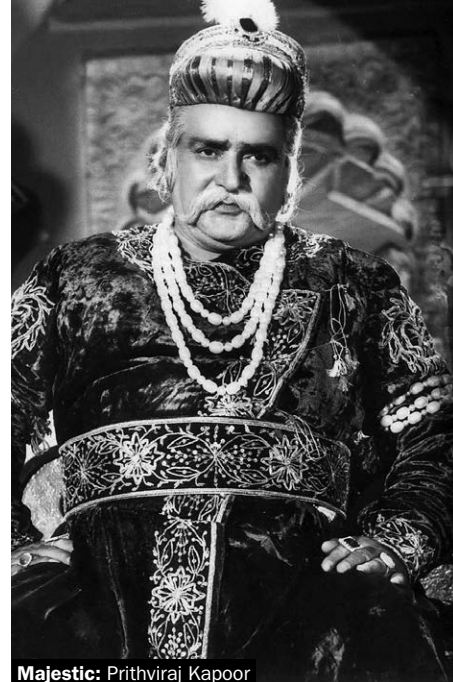
