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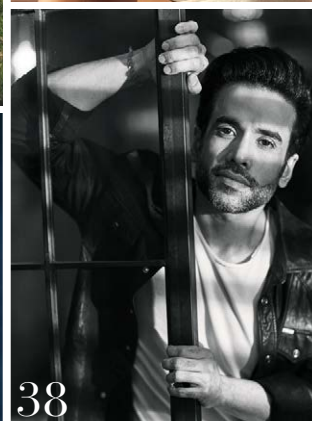

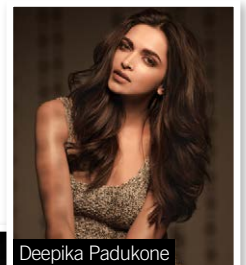
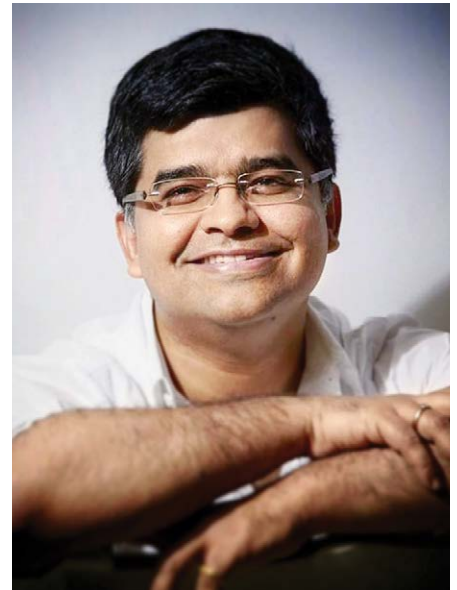
Our social media timelines have been flooded with reports and images of film stars lending a helping hand to those in need during the ongoing coronavirus pandemic. Kudos to all of them for all their good deeds. It's only now that the charitable activities of our film stars have come into the limelight so regularly. It's not as if they haven't been doing their bit for society. Most believe in silent charity and hence have been quiet about their work.

Akshay Kumar, for instance, has in the past provided financial aid of 90 lakh to the 180 families of the drought-hit farmers in Maharashtra who committed suicide, contributed 1 crore to Chennai's flood relief in 2015, and has started a marital arts school which teaches self-defence to women for free. It has helped 4000 women so far. He also launched an app, Bharat Ke Veer for India's Bravehearts, which enables donors to contribute directly to the families of Central Armed Police Force/ Central Para Military Forces. Nana Patekar too has been working with Marathi actor Makrand Anaspure and donating money to the widows of farmers who have committed suicide in Maharashtra. It's said he has donated 80 per cent of his life's savings to various causes.

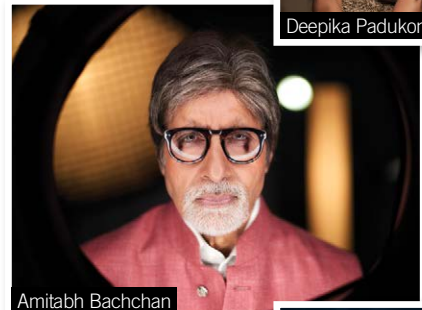
John Abraham has been closely associated with PETA. He also has started his own charity called John's Brigade, which provides food and shelter to homeless people. Priyanka Chopra Jonas has been a Goodwill ambassador of UNICEF for many years and has been visiting war-torn areas to learn firsthand about conditions there and lend succour to the needy. She runs her own foundation called The Priyanka Chopra Foundation for Education and Health which provides education and healthcare to underprivileged children. She reportedly donates 10 per cent of her annual income to this foundation. Her bouts with depression inspired Deepika Padukone to come up with the 'The Live Love Laugh Foundation' to raise awareness about psychological disorders. She also became the brand ambassador of the NGO Indian Psychiatry Society, and launched the campaign #DoobaraPoocho.

When Shah Rukh Khan's team Kolkata Knight Riders (KKR) won the Indian Premier League (IPL) season 7 in 2014, he donated the entire money (Rs. 15 crores) to cancer patients in Mumbai and Kolkata. In 2012, he adopted 12 villages in Bhitarkanika National Park in Odisha to provide them with electricity under the initiative Light A Billion Lives. Amitabh Bachchan has been involved in charity since the '80s. He has adopted flood and drought affected villages in the past, paid-off farm loans of hundreds of famers, has helped families of martyred soldiers, and has been the face of the Pulse Polio campaign, which successfully eradicated the disease in India. These are but some random examples. We're often blindsided by images of the luxurious lifestyle of the film folks. The fancy cars, the exotic vacations, the designer labels are all the trappings of being a star that they can't escape. But beneath the layers, lie hearts which care for their fellow human beings. Their hands don't hesitate when it comes to loosening the purse-strings for causes. We should take a pause to remember that before ranting about stars not doing 'enough'...

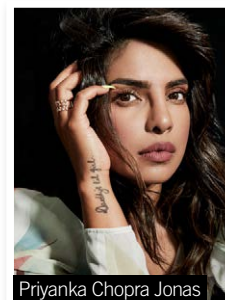

AAMIR KHAN'S UNIQUE BUSINESS MODEL



Everyone knows that **Aamir Khan** is known as Mr Perfectionist. But what many don't know is that Khan has a business model, when it comes to his remuneration. And it seems to have worked wonders for him. Elaborating on the business model, the actor says, "I've stopped taking money upfront. I don't charge a single rupee for my films. If a film does well, first the investment is recovered. When everyone is paid and the cost is recovered, I earn a percentage in profits. So if a film doesn't work, I won't make money. But no one should suffer a loss, I feel responsible for that." He further adds, "The model that I work on is, let's say a film costs INR 100 crore to make. So all the cost involved -- cast, crew, production -- I don't take any money. When the film releases, at that point I get zero money. As it starts to earn money, it goes towards the P&A (prints and advertising), which is over and above the 100 crore. Then, the investment is paid back. Now, the producer has recovered his cost. And then, I go into percentage of profits. There is no way the producer loses any money. So if the film sustains a loss, I don't get paid. The first rupee I earn is when the costs have been recovered," he added. It's a healthy practice and we wish more stars would adopt the model.



Ranveer Singh shoots with Russian artistes for *Cirkus*

Ranveer Singh and **Rohit Shetty** team up again, after the success of *Simmba*, for *Cirkus*. The film is based on Shakespeare's *Comedy Of Errors* where **Ranveer Singh** and **Varun Sharma** both play a double role. The



film started shooting in November last year and now is nearing completion. We hear that Ranveer Singh has been shooting for the film with some female Russian artistes. With Rohit Shetty helming the film, it is obvious that the movie will be colourful. PARINEETI CHOPRA SAYS HER CHOICES ARE HELPING THE CAUSE OF WOMEN IN CINEMA

Parineeti Chopra says she has always tried to change the narrative of how women should be portrayed on screen right from her debut. Parineeti with her superlative performances in *Ladies Vs Ricky Bahl*, *Ishaqzaade*, *Shuddh Desi Romance* and *Hasee Toh Phasee*, among others, has established herself as an effective and an unconventional counterpoint to the Bollywood norm that heroines should play a certain type of roles and look a certain way. "I strongly feel that actresses have to change the narrative of how women are portrayed on screen. Right from my debut, I have tried to do this. I have always taken it on myself to do something out of the ordinary, not portray the quintessential heroine that Bollywood has tried to depict for ages." She adds, "My last three films - *TGOTT*, *SAPF* and *Saina* were also an attempt by me to give varied, bold, confident, ambitious heroines to audiences. My next film choices will resonate this thought process too because I definitely want to do my bit to portray women better." That's smart thinking, alright.

Ajay Devgn's Maidaan set destroyed by Tauktae

Cyclone Tauktae has led to the deaths of many people and has also wreaked havoc in its wake, cleaving through many properties. According to media reports, it appears that the cyclone has not spared **Ajay Devgn's Maidaan** set either, which was located on the outskirts of Mumbai. While there were no casualties reported, the set on which a large part of the film was supposed to be shot, stands destroyed. "There were about 40 people on the set when the cyclone hit the *Maidaan* set - the guards and the curators of the football ground which largely comprises the set tried their best to save as much as they could but their efforts proved almost totally futile," said a source. This is the second time the makers of *Maidaan* have suffered a setback because of the set. In 2020, a 16-

acre, high-maintenance set built for the film was dismantled due to the COVID-19 lockdown and the rains. "The *Maidaan* makers **Boney Kapoor** (producer) and **Amit Sharma** (director) had hoped that the ongoing lockdown would be eased beyond May 31, 2021, and they would wind up the matches in the next 15-17 days. But all those plans, for now, stand washed out," the source added. Boney

Kapoor reportedly will have to shell out an extra seven crores to remake the set, once the lockdown gets lifted and shooting permissions are given.



SALMAN KHAN TAKES PIRATES TO COURT

Salman Khan has always been vocal against piracy. More so now with the theatres shut and online streaming becoming the major source of revenue. His latest release, *Radhe: Your Most Wanted Bhai* released on Eid and the actor had issued several warnings about taking strict action against anyone who indulges in piracy of the film. Despite the repeated warnings, a pirated version of the film started doing the rounds and the filmmakers had to involve a legal team to get to the bottom of it. A complaint was filed with the Mumbai Cyber Cell and it was later found that a Facebook user had been selling the pirated file through WhatsApp for INR 50. According to reports, a member of Salman Khan Films pretended to be a buyer and caught a man selling the film via the chatting app. This led to an FIR being filed against him and two other men for their involvement in piracy.

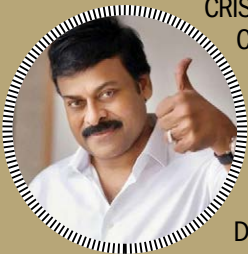
EMRAAN HASHMI TO PLAY THE VILLAIN IN TIGER 3

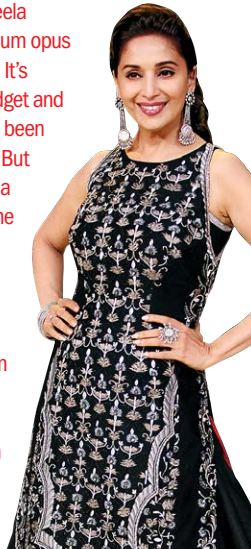
CHIRANJEEVI SETS UP FREE VACCINE CAMPS FOR CINEMA WORKERS AND JOURNALISTS

MADHURI DIXIT TO COLLABORATE WITH SANJAY LEEA BHANSALI AGAIN

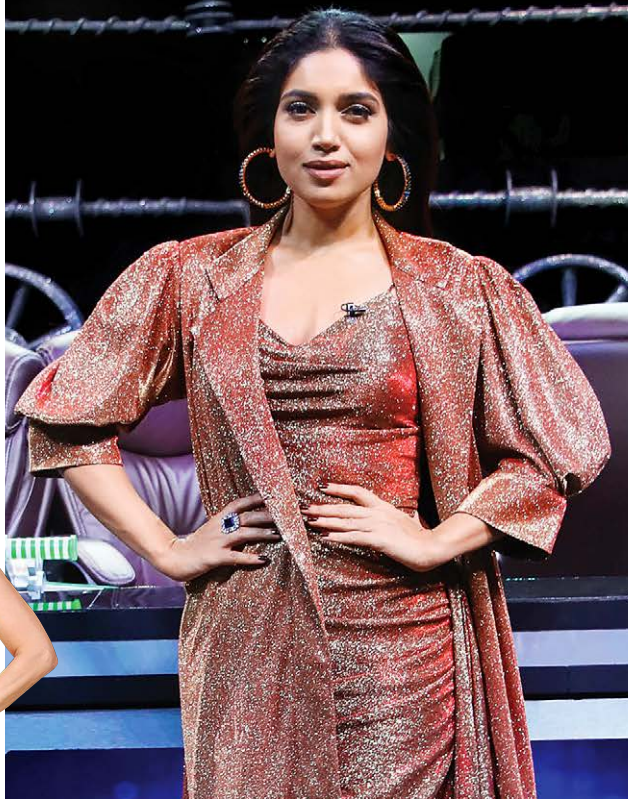


MOSTLY SANE!

VEDANSHI PATHAK INTERVIEWS **PRAJAKTA KOLI**, WHO HAS MADE A NAME FOR HERSELF THROUGH HER QUIRKY INTERNET VIDEOS AND WILL SOON MAKE HER BIG TICKET DEBUT WITH JUG JUGG JEEYO

The princess of digital content creation, Prajakta Koli, started out with a dream of becoming a radio jockey. A brush with Sudeep Lahiri (Vice President, Content and Strategy at One Digital Entertainment) pushed her into making content for YouTube and the rest is history. "I remember Sudeep Lahiri telling me – 'Hey you have got great energy, have you thought about making YouTube content'. And at that point in life, I was honestly in a space where anything would have been better than waking up every day and going to the radio station. So, I took a blind leap and surprisingly found my vocation," she recalls. Her claim to fame came on World Mental Health Day in 2016, when the internet audience flooded

Jug Jugg Jeeyo. Enacting a character written by someone else was something of a culture shock to her at first but she slowly adjusted. “During the initial phase of playing Dimple in *Mismatched* or playing Asha in my short film *Khayali Pulao*, I used to think that I am going to have a much tougher time understanding these characters because I haven’t written them. I don’t know their pulse. But then the writers and the directors I worked with helped me understand the nuances and slowly it became easier,” she smiles, adding



her with accolades, thanks to her #IPledgeToBeMe video. “It was a campaign where I championed self-love. It spoke against body shaming, spoke for body positivity and the response was so much more than what I had expected,” she reveals. Every

millennial who owns a smartphone dreams of becoming the next internet sensation and a few have definitely made it big. Prajakta is unfazed by the competition and takes it in her stride. “The only way you can stand out is if you have a personality that no one else has. And I

think the fact that so many creators are doing that, tells that there is no competition. No two creators are the same, then how do they compete,” she reasons.

While she still finds it fun enacting characters

that she writes herself, she has expanded her horizons and has made the transition to playing characters written by others. The young gun was seen in the Netflix series *Mismatched* recently alongside Rohit Saraf. Soon she will be seen in a Dharma Productions’ film

that she got the leeway to interpret the roles her own way in all her outside projects *Jug Jugg Jeeyo*, a Dharma film, fell into her lap thanks to casting director Panchami Gharvi who had earlier selected her for *Mismatched*. She was called for a test and her joy knew no



bounds when Karan Johar greenlighted her for the project. After that, director Raj Mehta called up to congratulate her and formally offered her the role. Rubbing shoulders with Varun Dhawan, Neetu Kapoor, Anil Kapoor and Kiara Advani on the sets must have been a huge high. Conversely, being an outsider, she must have felt left

out on the sets but Prajakta says it wasn't so at all. She gushes she found her co-stars and her unit to be her second family. She knew Varun from before as she had interacted with him online and found him supportive on the sets. She was surprised how knowledgeable he was about the world of content creators. "He watches a lot of

them. In fact, there are a lot of creators we mutually like. I was looking forward to hanging out with him on the set. He is extremely warm and sweet and that sort of helped me calm my nerves while shooting," she informs me.

Prajakta says Kiara too was extremely supportive and

welcoming and so were Anil Kapoor and Neetu Kapoor. She admired the fact that when the camera came on, they were just another set of artistes. "All they cared about was their performance and how well they could perform their role, and that passion was very inspiring," she asserts. There was COVID-19 scare on the sets of *Jug Jugg Jeeyo*, as Neetu Kapoor, Varun Dhawan and even director Raj Mehta reportedly caught the virus. Prajakta says it was a chaotic time for a while but later things quietened down. She didn't get infected herself but this close brush with the pandemic made her realise the importance of

self-care and that it should be made a priority. "I had been taking that for granted for the longest time and I realised how much it affects you. Taking care of your body, taking care of your mind is extremely important. And ever since I have started doing that I have become so much more productive than before," she reflects.

Prajakta is happy with the way her life has changed in these last six years. Says she, "I would love to act more, keep creating content online, write more, meet more people, and try new things... but there are no concrete plans as such. One must remember that the pandemic is very much on."

True that. ■

Ronnie doesn’t believe in having one passion or source of income and hence, he also owns a merchandise line and his clothing line is set to debut soon. NIKITA DUTTA TALKS TO VEDANSHI PATHAK ABOUT THE BIG BULL, TESTING POSITIVE FOR COVID-19, HER UPCOMING DANCE FILM AND MORE

Nikita Dutta's father is an officer in the Indian Navy. As a child, her life revolved around shuttling from one naval base to the other, making friends all over again with random strangers and then saying goodbye to them when another transfer took place. She came to Mumbai to study at St. Xavier's College,

and graduated in Economics. She took part in the Miss India pageant along the way and was one of the finalists in 2012. Being part of Miss India got her noticed and she soon picked up roles in popular television shows like *Ek Duje Ke Vaaste*, *Haasil*, *Dream Girl* and more before venturing into Bollywood. Her debut film was *Lekar Hum Deewana Dil*

(2014) but she got noticed for her role in Sandeep Reddy Vanga's *Kabir Singh* (2019). The film went on to become a blockbuster and changed many lives. One of them was Nikita's. Says she, "People finally started recognising my work post *Kabir Singh*. I got offered many good projects after its release. In terms of films, it did end up being

a turning point for me." Talking about her *Kabir Singh* co-star Shahid Kapoor, she says she admires him for the way he got into the character. She observed Shahid on the sets and tried to learn from him. "We didn't interact much but I found him to be an easygoing co-star. Overall, it was fab working with him as I learnt so much from the experience."

Nikita goes on to reveal how *Kabir Singh* came her way. Sandeep Vanga had watched her cameo in *Lust Stories* (2018) and asked her to come for a meeting after watching *Arjun Reddy*. She was intrigued by the call but said yes. She was blown away by *Arjun Reddy* and was open to doing any role in the remake. She was offered the role of actress Jia Sharma, with whom Kabir has a brief fling in the film. "I was expecting an

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audition but Sandeep sir just talked to me for ten minutes, asking me questions about *Arjun Reddy*. He must have liked my responses as he soon offered me this important role.”

Post *Kabir Singh*, Nikita did a Netflix film called *Maska* (2020) along with Prit Kamani, Shirley Setia and Manisha Koirala, which was received well by the audience. That paved the way for *The Big Bull*, which was based on the life of the notorious securities trader Harshad Mehta. Abhishek Bachchan played Mehta and Nikita played his

wife. Nikita met Abhishek the first time while the look trials were happening. And they were shooting a romantic song the next time they met. “We were shooting for our song *Ishq namaza* in Delhi and I was stressed out. But it went smoothly because Abhishek just kind of lightens everybody’s mood around him. He doesn’t have any airs around him, neither does he throw any tantrums. He is humble as a human being. He’s very humorous, always pulling people’s legs. He’s calm and doesn’t lose

patience. It could be the most stressful scene but he refuses to bring it on his face and that’s a very admirable quality,” reveals Nikita. The actress says one of the reasons she said yes to *The Big Bull* was because of the film’s period feel. That’s the reason she’d said yes to *Gold* (2018) too, the period sports drama where she played Vicky Kaushal’s love interest. There she played someone who was closer to her grandmother’s generation and here she was playing someone who was close to her mother’s generation. She took

pointers from her mother about the era to prepare for her role. *The Big Bull* got compared to Hansal Mehta’s hit series on the same subject, *Scam 1992*. Talking about it, Nikita says it’s unlucky that the two things came around the same time. “It is unfortunate that there are comparisons but I think there is a lot of difference because that is a web show and this is a film. I hope the audience understands this and gives the love they think it deserves. Of course, *Scam 1992* is brilliant and I loved it too,” she adds.

Her next projects include the remake of Malayalam horror flick *Ezra* (2017), where she’ll be seen with Emraan Hashmi. Another is a dance film *Rocket Gang* directed by

Bosco Martis. She says she’s been learning dance since 2019 to prepare for her role in *Rocket Gang*. “We were supposed to start shooting it last year in March but then the lockdown happened. We started again in December 2020 and it is scheduled to wrap as soon as the government lifts up a few restrictions.”

Nikita tested COVID-19 positive but made a rapid recovery. She shudders at the memory. “I just hope 2021 doesn’t bring disappointments because we have had enough of that last year. The whole world has had enough of that. So, just praying that there’s more positivity this year.” Trying to keep that in my head. Just more good news and less bad news.” Our prayers are towards that as well... ■

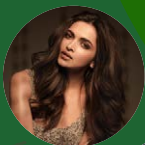

She developed a love for nature as a child, maybe it was her name which did the trick. And she longed to do something about the environment when she became an actress. In 2019, she launched Climate Warrior, a social media initiative that brings to light work done by various individuals as well as environment groups across India. She teamed up with activist Afroz Shah for a beach clean-up project in Versova, Mumbai. She was also part of Fridays For Future march in Mumbai. She also started the #OneWishForTheEarth campaign on Instagram and encouraged colleagues from the film world to share messages about the environment-based issues. Amitabh Bachchan, Akshay Kumar, Karan Johar, Anushka Sharma and many more joined her in the initiative.

Amitabh Bachchan has been espousing the cause of the environment since ages. In 2007, he launched the Global Cool campaign along with Sienna Miller, to raise awareness in India about global warming. In 2008, the icon showed his support for the United Nations' Billion Tree Campaign by planting a tree at the UN's Asia Pacific regional headquarters in Bangkok. He also partnered with Global Cool, an International Indian Film Academy initiative, to build awareness about India's vulnerability to climate change. He's also part of the movement to reduce the use of vehicles and air-conditioners while shooting films. He's also the brand ambassador of Indian Government's Swachh Bharat Abhiyan' campaign, encouraging fellow citizens to be more hygienic and is also associated with Green Good Deeds Campaign, aimed at bringing about small behavioural changes in everyday life towards environmental benefit.

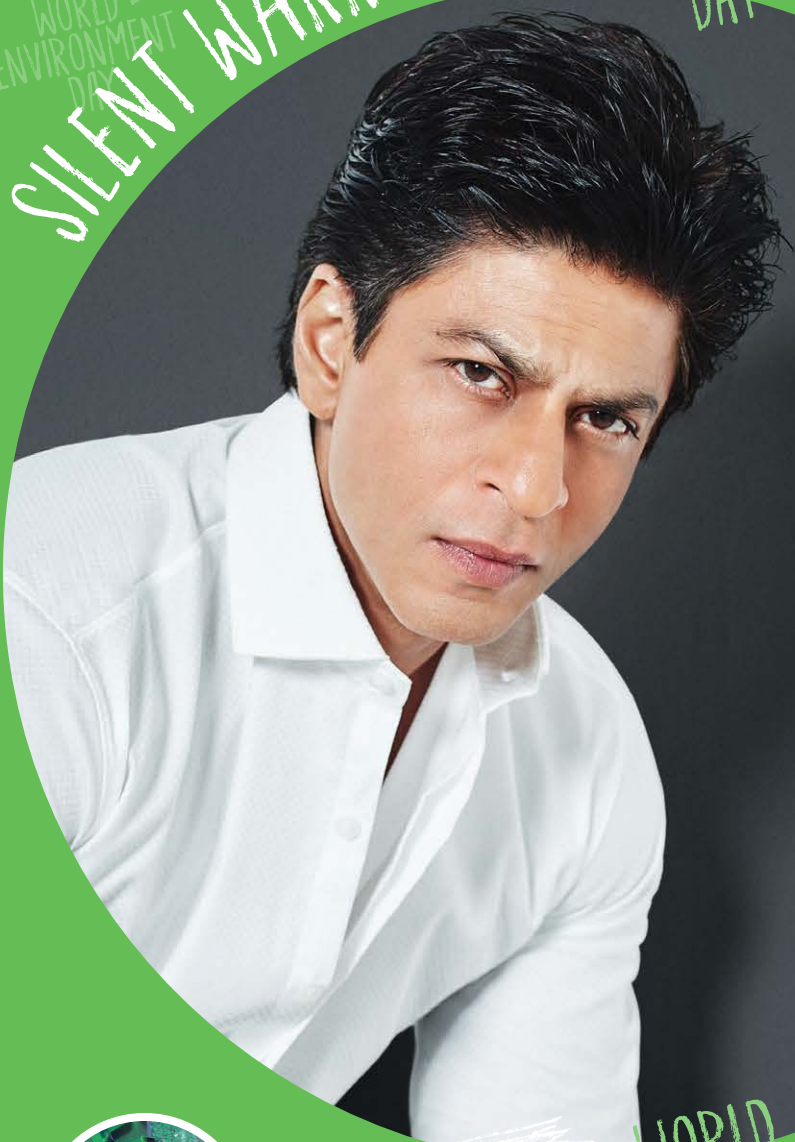

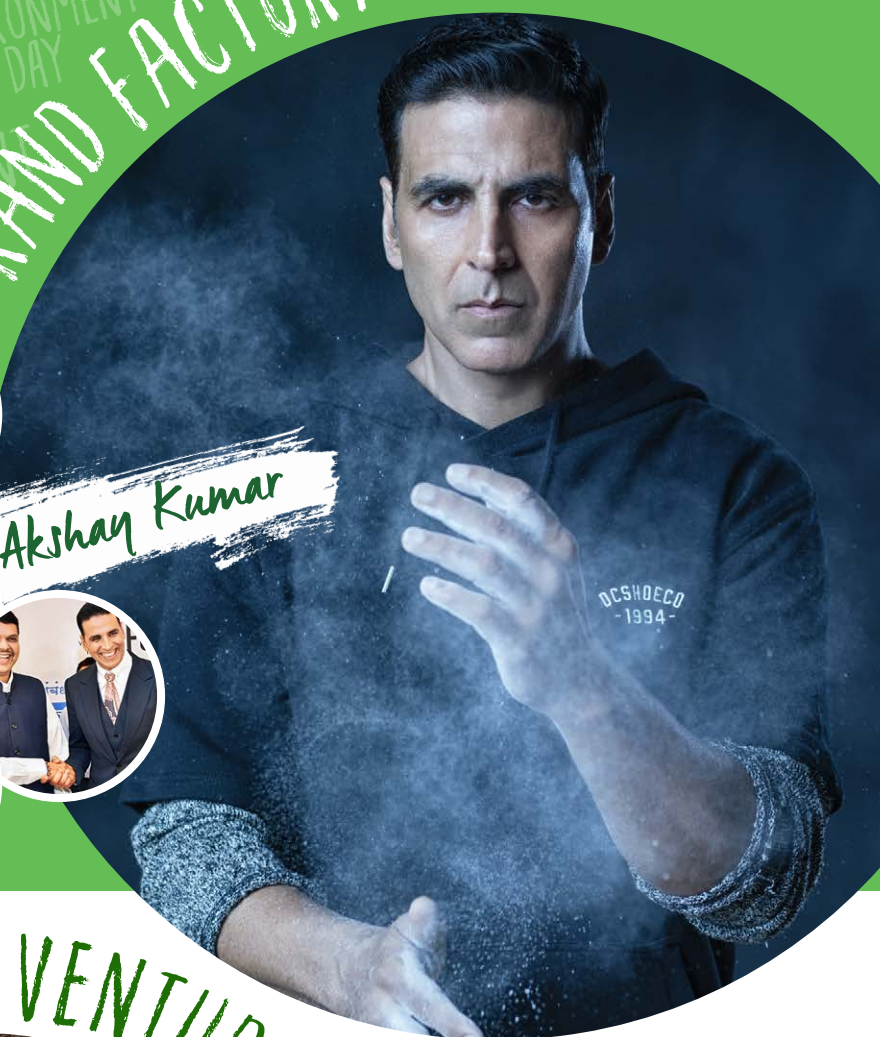

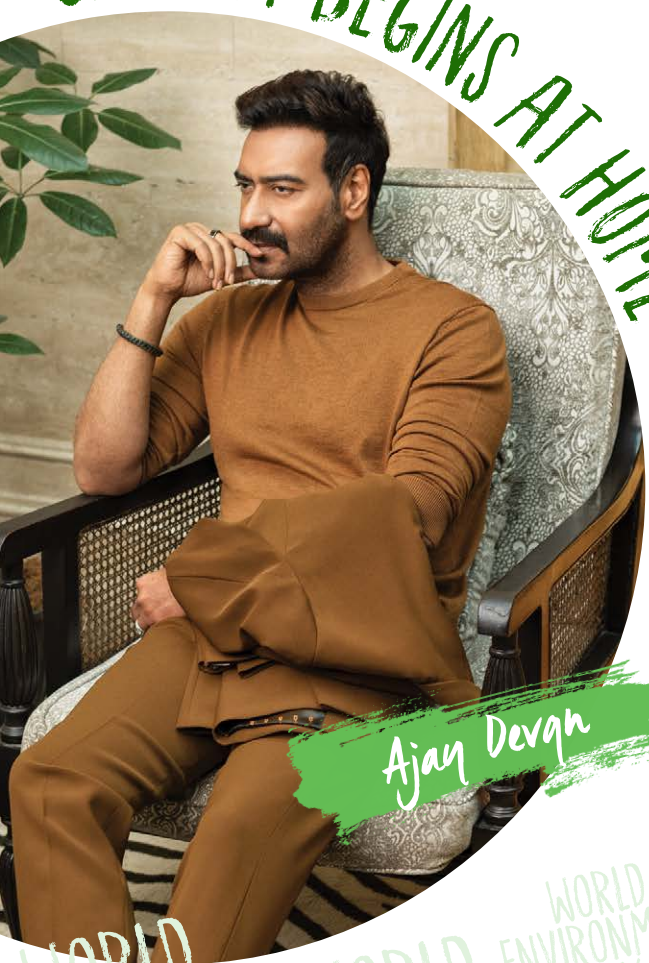

Taapsee Pannu is so down-to-earth, so real that you have to pinch yourself into believing you're talking to a film star. You feel you're conversing with a college friend. You can ask her anything under the sun and be assured of an honest answer. There's no off-the-record conversations with her as she doesn't like to gossip. She'd rather talk about the art of cinema or the craft of acting than give pointers towards who's in whose bed currently. She doesn't talk about her own love life either, arguing that it has nothing to do with what she does as an actor. She's not known to mince words on the social media. Her forthright views are a refreshing change from the doublespeak that most actors practice. She promised us an interview after winning the Best Actor In A Leading Role trophy at the recently concluded Vimal Elaichi Filmfare Awards 2021. Excerpts from a free-flowing tete-a-tete...

“GENDER-EQUALITY OR EMPOWERMENT WILL HAPPEN ONLY WHEN THE ACTRESSES EMPOWER EACH OTHER, WHEN THEY STAND UP FOR EACH OTHER, WHEN THEY APPRECIATE EACH OTHER. I REALLY FEEL WE SHOULD START APPRECIATING EACH OTHER MORE”

WHEN YOU ACCEPTED THE FILMFARE AWARD FOR BEST ACTRESS THIS YEAR, YOU THANKED ALL YOUR FELLOW NOMINEES. WHAT PROMPTED YOU TO DO THAT?

Every girl nominated this year in both the popular and the critics' category was part of a special film. I mentioned in the speech how each one of them is so courageous in choosing the kind of films they have chosen. Because I know the kind of hardships a female actor faces. You can't put too much 'feminism' in a female-centric film because it's not considered 'safe' from a business point of view. Then, there are budget constraints. A female-centric film has a limited budget compared to a

male-centric film. Casting too isn't easy. Because, trust me, no matter how big an actress you become in the film industry, it's tough to cast a male actor opposite you when it comes to female-centric films. I can say from experience that my directors face a lot of issues as male actors feel insecure about not being the lead or getting lesser screen time. Sometimes I wonder how insecure you are, when you're giving away a good film just because you have 10 per cent less time than the girl. Girls have been doing that for decades, where they have 1/5th of the screen space and they still happily do it. Because they feel that even that much is enough for them to show their potential. Until last year I



was doing films like *Mission Mangal*, *Soorma* or *Judwaa 2*. Because I wanted people to understand that I'm not against doing lesser screen space. I'm just saying give me a role through which the audience will remember me when they walk out of the theatre. And after all that's sorted, we have to make sure we don't clash with any big male star when it comes to the film's release. Because even if the film with the female lead looks more promising, the film with the male star ends up getting more number of screens and shows. Gender-equality or empowerment will happen only when the actresses empower each other, when they stand up for each other, when they appreciate each other. I really feel we should start appreciating each other more. Only then the next level of empowerment will happen.

HOW DOES IT FEEL WINNING THE BLACK LADY BACK-TO-BACK?

It's quite unreal actually because in 2016 when *Pink* happened and I was not even nominated, it did break my heart back then. After that, I almost lost hope that this will ever happen. So when it happened back-to-back, it was quite unreal for me. It feels nice to get validated by the oldest awards in the country. It gives me confidence to keep following my

intuition because if it has happened back-to-back then it's just not a fluke. It probably means I am on the right path and I should continue pushing myself ahead in the same direction.

WHAT DO YOU HAVE TO SAY ABOUT YOUR PERFORMANCE IN THAPPAD? HOW WILL YOU REVIEW IT?

I always end up finding so many holes in my performance and that leaves me underwhelmed. After watching *Thappad*, I told my director Anubhav Sinha that I felt everyone was good except me. I think it's good in a way because it kind of helps me to push myself to get better with every film. I'm glad that I don't consider myself the epitome of perfection because if I do that then my scope of learning will decrease.

WOULD YOU SAY THAPPAD'S CRITICAL SUCCESS HAS CHANGED THE GAME FOR YOU?

Thappad was my first ever solo lead film, which ended up getting a lot of love from the critics as well as from the audiences. The way it started up picking momentum at the box-office in those two weeks before the lockdown was remarkable. That's what *Thappad* did. It just kind of sealed a certain position for me.

BEFORE THAPPAD YOU DID FILMS LIKE MULK AND SAAND KI AANKH WHICH WON PLAUDITS FROM THE CRITICS BUT WEREN'T 100 CRORES FILMS. HOW DOES AN ACTOR MOTIVATE HERSELF TO KEEP INVESTING IN GOOD CONTENT IN AN INDUSTRY WHERE YOU'RE MEASURED BY YOUR BOX OFFICE SUCCESS?

I've always believed that if you have to survive in the industry for a long time, you need to create a unique space for yourself. That will only happen, if I do the kind of movies



that I enjoy watching as an audience. And in spite of not really seeing those magic figures of 100 crores for every film of mine, I still ended up having an audience for my films. Yes, that does test your courage. But you know that you have chosen this path knowing that it's going to be longer and tougher. So you should be prepared for the hardships you're going to face.

WHEN YOU LOOK BACK AT YOUR JOURNEY, WHAT WERE THE HURDLES YOU FACED AND WHAT WERE THE MILESTONES?

I started off knowing nothing about the industry or about the craft. One thing that really helped me at that point was my inquisitiveness, my eagerness to learn. Because I knew the only way ahead in life is to be open to learning whatever you can from around you. I made mistakes but I did not repeat my mistakes. If you want me to name a turning point then that probably was *Baby*, where a seven minute role took the masses by surprise. I was launched in Hindi cinema by David Dhawan, one of our biggest commercial directors, in *Chashme Buddoor*. So that's another milestone. Actually, everything I did back then has led me to do the new kinds of films I'm doing now. I think over the years, my audience has shown so much faith and confidence in me, that their expectation levels have become high and nothing average in terms of content is going to make them happy. I am totally fine with that kind of pressure because it helps me grow as an actor.

DO YOU FEAR THAT FAME AND STARDOM WILL VANISH ONE DAY?

No, not at all. This part has never scared me. I didn't enter the industry with the idea of becoming a star. I just stumbled upon this profession, then I learned my way up. And I know that the ladder that I'm climbing up, I have to climb it down one day. That the fame and glamour will go out of the window. And I will gracefully embrace and accept it too.

SO YOU DON'T HAVE ANY KIND OF INSECURITY AT ALL?

I can tell you the fears I have as an actor. I fear that there will come a day where my performance will not add anything new to the film. Also, I want the performances in each successive film to be better than the one earlier. I'm trying to lead as normal a life as possible. To keep an even head on my shoulders. So that I'm able to depict normal people as they are. I want my performances to be as true to real life as possible. The fear of getting disconnected from my audience worries me.

YOU DON'T SEEM TO BE POLITICALLY CORRECT. WHAT GIVES YOU THE COURAGE TO BE SO BOLD?

I might be a politically incorrect, non-diplomatic person, but I feel I am honest. Even if I make mistakes, I accept them because I know I am a human being. To err is human, so there is no shame in making mistakes. I don't speak against people. I speak against issues. I speak against the sin and not the sinner. Blaming people is just going to create a bitter atmosphere. Basically, you should be able to live a life where you can sleep peacefully knowing that you haven't harmed anyone or done something wrong that you're embarrassed about. It's the most beautiful life to have and I have that life.

HOW DO YOU HANDLE NEGATIVITY?

The negativity affects you in the beginning when it's new. You know how they say you should keep changing your workouts so your body can react to it, otherwise it just hits a plateau. That's what happens with negativity also. So if they're just going to keep throwing the same baseless random, illogical, negative stuff at you, it stops affecting you after sometime. And I've realised that people who are doing that are just unhappy with their own

lives. Only an unhappy person can be negative against someone else consistently. Now I just feel sad for those unhappy people.

PINK GAVE OUT A STRONG MESSAGE THAT NO MEANS NO. THAPPAD TOLD WOMEN TO STAND UP AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. SO ON ONE HAND THERE ARE SUCH MOVIES BEING MADE AND THEN THERE ARE SOME WHICH CONTINUE TO OBJECTIFY WOMEN. WHAT'S YOUR TAKE ON THAT?

Our films have helped normalise a lot of things. Change takes time. Decades of conditioning has made us feel a certain kind of behaviour is okay because it's shown in our films.

Change won't happen overnight but it'll definitely happen if we collectively work towards it. It'll happen when every actress refuses to do something which isn't in keeping with her on-screen character. Most of the roles offered to women are written from a man's point of view. And we give in to that because our leading men are okay with it. Our heroes have to be more woke and open to seeing things from our point of view too. What I'm saying is that the change will come if everybody makes a conscious effort towards it.

CAN YOU NAME THREE OF YOUR FELLOW ACTRESSES FROM THE RECENT TIMES WHO HAVE HELPED MAKE THE INDUSTRY A BETTER PLACE FOR FEMALE ACTORS?

If I have to choose three names who've made the audience look at the female actors seriously then I'll name Vidya Balan, Tabu and Priyanka Chopra. Vidya because she did such mind-blowing films like *The Dirty Picture* and *Kahaani* back-to-back and showed us this is possible.

Tabu because she always makes us curious about what she's going to next and Priyanka because of all that she's achieved not just here but abroad as well. All three have helped change perceptions about female actors for the better.

As a public figure, all I can do is donate to the cause and help people in need connect with people who have the resources. I find this is a basic responsibility of a celebrity who the audience believes is their hero because of the characters and films we do on screen. I know we don't sign up to be the real hero when we perform in films but for someone like me who came from no film background and no additional support from the industry, audience is what made me into who I am today so this is the least I can do for them.

right to say anything and everything to anyone, without any knowledge – most of the time. But yeah, there is always a flip side to the coin, right? So the pandemic really helped me to see that positive side of Twitter. This whole pandemic really made me see how humanity is not totally dead on Twitter and people still want to use the platform for helping each other. It was so nice to see that. Because I have been missing that side of people on Twitter for the longest time.

SHOOTER DADI CHANDRO TOMAR DIED OF COVID-19. HOW DID THE NEWS AFFECT YOU?

For the first few hours it was a feeling of disbelief because she had defied so many difficulties and hardships in her life. It almost felt like she would survive this also. I have been in touch with her family. So I knew she had been hospitalised. But they told me that she has been taken care of and she is all fine... and then suddenly that news came in... it was a big shock to me! I really hope that her last few days made her feel that she is content and happy with life. Because there are so many people who loved her. Her story has reached so many people and inspired so many people. I wish I could have gone to meet her. Because last time I met her she was in AIMMS for a treatment she was going through before the pandemic. And after that because of the pandemic I just couldn't go because I could have been a carrier. I don't know how I will feel if I go to Baghpat to her house. It will be a very awkward feeling to not have her around. Because I stayed in her house, practically in her room, for almost two months. That kind of haunts me even more mentally that she is no more.

THE MONEY

Tusshar Kapoor has always impressed us with his sincerity. He's known to give his hundred per cent to every project and has made a name for himself as a dependable actor over the years. After dabbling in drama and action, he found his forte in comedy. He features prominently in Rohit Shetty comedies, as well as raunchy rom coms. Tusshar became the first celebrity to have a baby through surrogacy. Fatherhood very much becomes him and his son Lakshya completes him. He's been a hands-on father, not shying away from diaper duties. He's currently giving his son company during the online classes, reliving his own childhood all over again. His sister Ekta Kapoor has been the producer in the family and now Tusshar has followed suit. He launched his own production house, Tusshar Entertainment, sometime ago. The horror comedy *Laxmii*, starring Akshay Kumar, was the first film he produced under his own banner, in partnership with Fox Star Studios and Cape Of Good Hope Films. Excerpts from a tete-a-tete about the new changes and challenges of his life...



What was your biggest challenge as a producer?

While the director is the captain of the ship, the producer is the wind that powers the sails. He has to be in control of every department. See that everyone is happy. And then keep track of the budgets and timelines. You don't know what's going to happen next and are constantly fire fighting. It's a roller coaster rider which only stops on the day of your film's release. And even after that, you have to keep

track of the business reports, count your profits or losses and start planning for the next one.

Why did you choose to remake *Kanchana*?

When I watched *Kanchana* in 2012, I loved it. I thought it was a very massy, commercial and a unique subject. And horror-comedies were new at that time. They had not been explored as much as they are being explored now. So when I bought the rights, I decided to remake the film

as my first venture as a producer. Given Akshay Kumar sir's success rate in comedy films he was the ideal choice for the main lead. He had done a successful horror comedy *Bhool Bhulaiyaa* in the past. This film needed a superstar to take it to the next level. I'm so happy that he agreed to do it.

How did you convince him to play a transgender in the film?

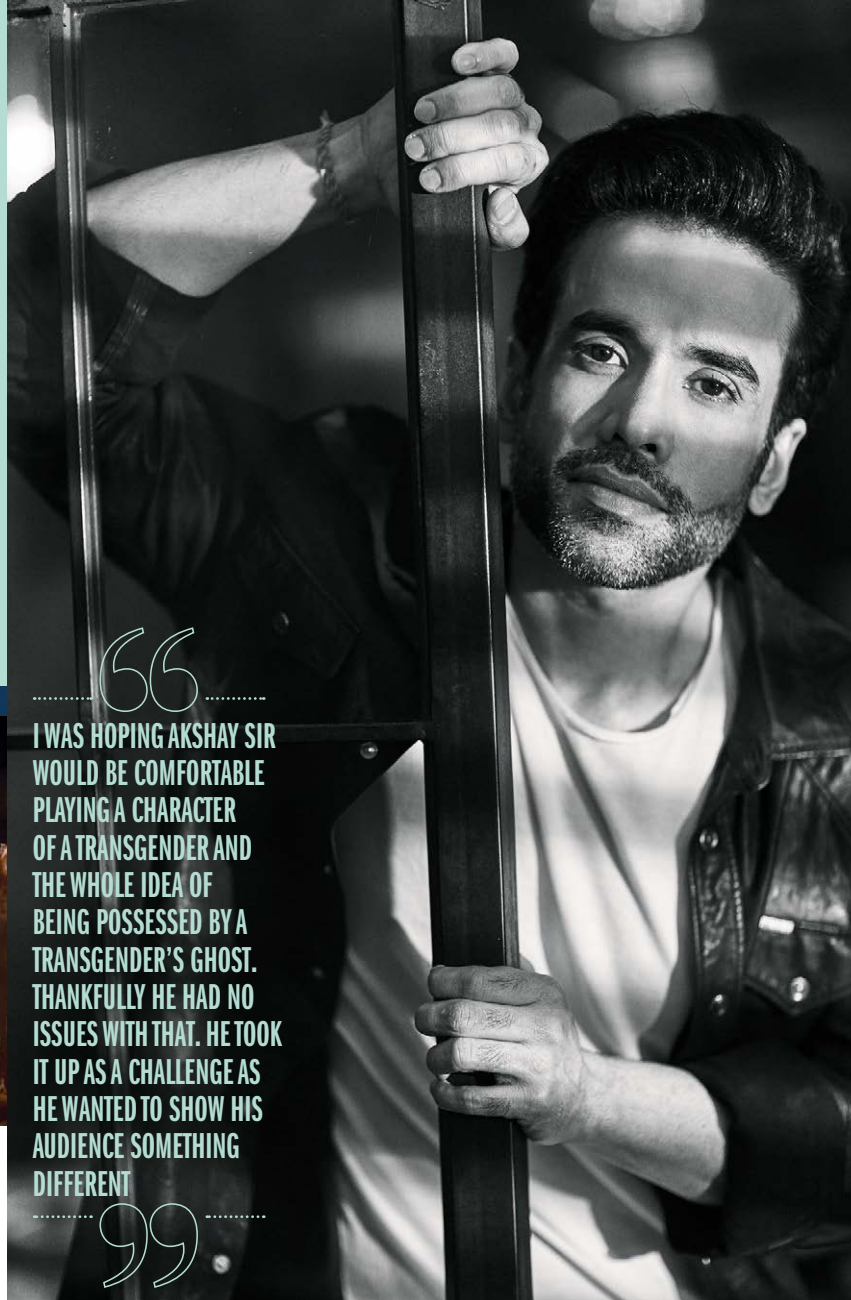
I was hoping that he would be comfortable playing a character of a transgender and the whole idea of being possessed by a transgender's ghost. Thankfully he had no issues with that. In fact, he agreed to do the film because his character

goes through a transformation. He took it up as a challenge as he wanted to show his audience something different.

Were you unhappy by the fact that *Laxmii* got released over OTT?

There was a mental adjustment when we realised that the film was being slated for OTT. But there is a flip-side

to everything. We didn't have to worry about the whole COVID-19 aspect of it or any kind of piracy. The OTT platform is a great answer to the cinema shutdown. We knew that we would get the numbers even on the OTT. So the Friday fever remains intact. Given the new normal, we have been successful in bridging the gap between cinemas and OTT. I think it has been a game changer and it will set a trend for producers to not feel insecure about releasing a film on OTT platforms in this situation.

Laxmii has broken viewership records on OTT. Did you expect this since the curve of people watching OTT content was already high?

Our reaction was firstly that of relief. Because I'd spent seven years with this film and I wanted to get a positive reaction. I did expect the high numbers to some degree because the hype for the trailer had been huge. I was happy about it.

Now what's the next step for you as a producer?

Well, I already have another film that's ready and it's going to be announced

shortly. It's a very different film from *Laxmii*. I'm going to act in it as well.

Did you ever take any tips regarding production from your sister Ekta?

Ekta is a pioneer in television production, and now even in the web space and she has produced a lot of films. The challenge of being a producer is one wherein you really learn on the job. The mistakes and the obstacles that I would have faced would be different from the ones she has faced. So you can never really use another's experience. Given my experience as an actor for the past 20 years and growing up in the industry, I have had a fair idea of what production really entails.

The experience of Akshay sir as a producer and Shabina Khan, my partner was there to bank upon. I really didn't have to take much advice from my family. Of course, the moral support is always there and if I was ever confused about something regarding legal or financial aspects, my mother and sister were always present. But

that's just being a part of the family.

One piece of advice your father has given you that has always stayed with you.

One piece of advice my father has always given me and stayed with me is that don't brood over the past. What has happened... has happened. Otherwise you can really have sleepless nights about something that

doesn't deserve to be worried over. My dad is a patient and a calm man and that's what I want to emulate.

You had Akshay as your star and he carried the film on his shoulders. But if you are asked to produce a multi-starrer, would you be able to handle the stress and the many starry tantrums?
Well, I think what we have managed with *Laxmii* has laid

a foundation for the bigger challenges. I haven't thought of producing a multi-starrer yet. Every film carries its own challenges. I'll cross that bridge when I come to it.

If you had the following genres as a producer who would you pick as actors – romcom, horror-comedy and sex-comedy?
For a romcom definitely in today's

day and age – Shahid Kapoor. For horror comedy, Akshay Kumar. And for sex comedy why not me? I have got the best track record in sex comedy, I won't take anyone else.

Is it safe to say that you can make friends in Bollywood?
Yes, definitely. Apart from actors or directors or producers, there are technicians you can be friendly to. There

are assistants you can be friends with, there are journalists that I have close ties with. But in life like in Bollywood, the lesser friends, the better friends.

One film of yours you would love showing your son.

I have not started showing him films yet. But I am waiting to show him the *Golmaal* series soon. And I would probably not show him *Shootout At Lokhandwala* yet, because there is too much violence in it.

The weirdest question your son has ever asked you?

As per his age he is very curious and

he keeps asking me why for everything. If I say I am going out – why? If I say I am going for work – why? I love his curiosity and I keep answering all his questions.

What do you do when you get angry?

When I get angry, it takes me a while to get it out of my system. Of course, I am trying to change that about myself. But the first reaction is I lose sleep. I start getting all the anger out in the middle of the night, and I don't get enough sleep. So that's very unhealthy and I'm trying to get out of that.

You've always chosen to be low-profile. Was it a wise decision in hindsight?

Yes, I have stayed low profile as far as my personal life is concerned. But I have never shied away from publicising my films at the time of their release. I don't like catching headlines for anything and everything. It's more of an ego-booster, which I don't really need after 20 years in the industry. ■



ROAR OF THE TIGER

Life has peaked for Adarsh Gourav in a big way post the release of his Netflix film *The White Tiger*. Directed by Ramin Bahrani, the

film also stars Priyanka Chopra Jonas and Rajkummar Rao in crucial roles. Adarsh's performance as the protagonist Balram Halwai, who fights societal norms to rise from being a lowly driver to being a multimillionaire entrepreneur is spot on. The film offers a critique on how the Indian society is still stuck in the morass of caste and religious divide and states that we need to come out of it pronto if we ever want to become a first world nation. Till then, the only way up for the marginalised is to use whatever comes their way to claw ahead, even if these opportunities are amoral in nature. It's a powerhouse performance that ranged from him being a submissive mouse to being transformed into a hungry tiger unafraid to use his fangs.

It's no wonder that Adarsh was nominated in the Best Actor category by the British Academy of Films and Television Arts (BAFTA). Though he eventually lost out to Sir Anthony Hopkins (*The Father*), it was still a proud moment for India that he got nominated. *The White Tiger* was also nominated at the Oscars in the Best Adapted Screenplay category and Adarsh is excited about that as well. We chat with the actor about the global recognition coming his way and how that's changing his life and career choices.

YOU MUST BE OVER THE MOON BEING NOMINATED ALONGSIDE NAMES LIKE ANTHONY HOPKINS, CHADWICK BOSEMAN AND MADS MIKKELSEN FOR THE BAFTA?


It feels like a dream

to be nominated amongst my childhood heroes, Sir Anthony Hopkins and Mads Mikkelsen. It is a dream for any actor and honestly it's shocking and unexpected too. I wasn't upset when

I lost because being nominated itself was a big deal for me. I have my whole career ahead of me to get nominated multiple times. This is only the beginning of my journey.

BAFTA WAS CRITICISED LAST TIME FOR NOT BEING TOO OPEN TO DIVERSITY IN THE TOP CATEGORIES. ACCORDING TO YOU, DID THAT CHANGE THIS YEAR? WHAT'S YOUR TAKE ON THE CONTROVERSY?

I actually wasn't aware of that criticism. But I'm glad that there are

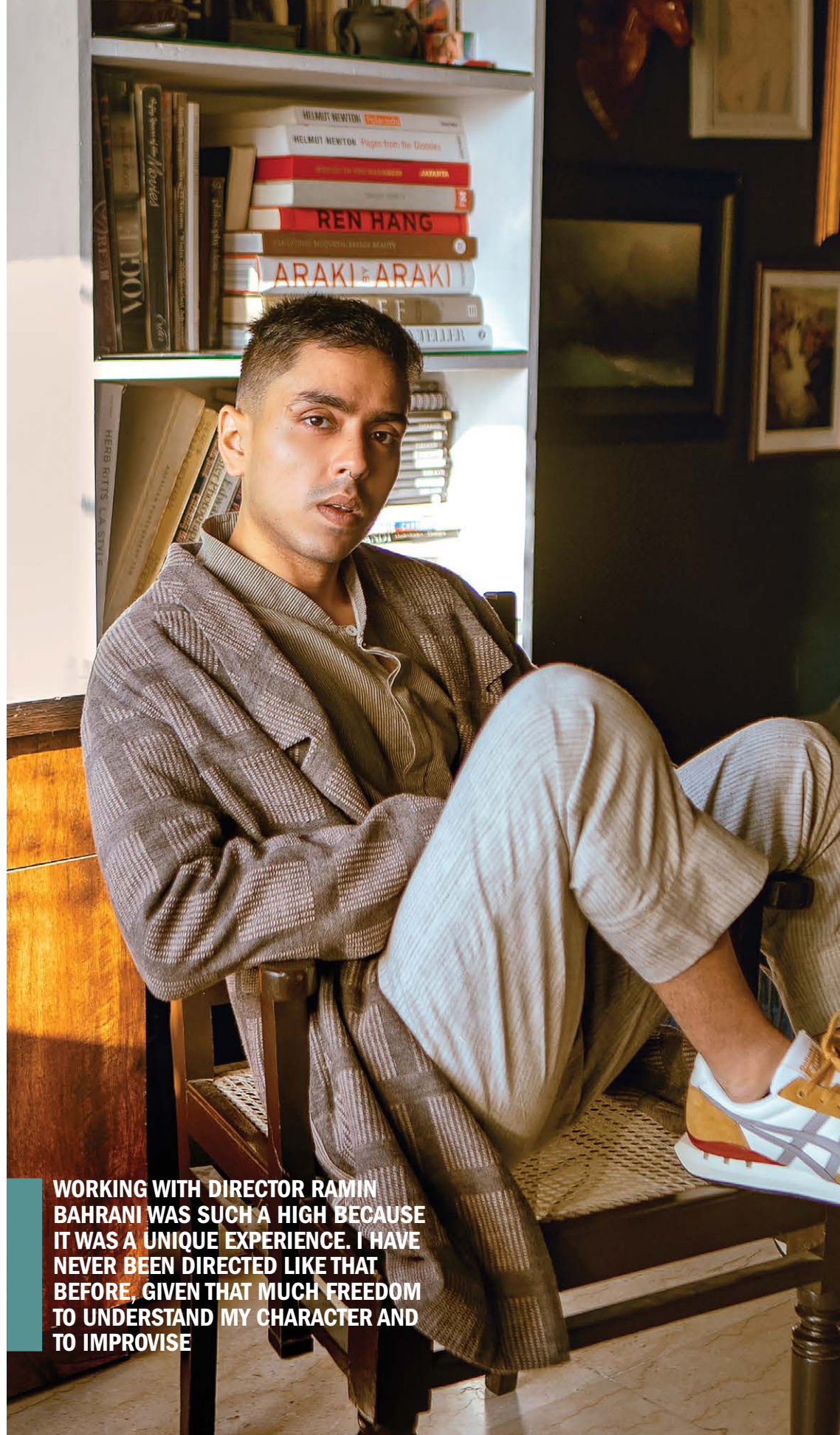
different actors from different ethnicities being nominated because it is important for people all over the world to know about one another's cultures and stories. What's a better way than casting actors from different ethnicities to actually represent their side of the world. It's a great way for people to get to know one another.

WHAT YOUR FAMILY'S REACTION ABOUT THE BAFTA NOMINATION?

My family has been over the moon since the trailer released. They have been glued to their phones ever since. They share all the articles and the interviews of mine with everybody on the family WhatsApp group. I feel both embarrassed and happy by their behaviour. They are truly proud, also relieved in a way, I guess.

HOW DID THE NEWS OF THE NOMINATION REACH YOU?

It wasn't just one person who broke the news. My agents in the US called me up, as did my father. Friends in the media too sent in their messages. Fellow actors started calling in, offering their praise. Then, social media is the big thing today. Everything gets splashed there as

soon as it happens. So that surprise factor no longer exists, as the news gets picked up at the speed of light.

GLOBAL RECOGNITION LIKE THE BAFTA AND THE OSCARS HAS PUT YOU ON THE WORLD MAP IN A BIG WAY. THE EXPECTATIONS FROM YOU HAVE INCREASED. DO YOU FEEL THE PRESSURE?

More than the pressure, what I feel is the spike in excitement. I want to continue doing good work and grow as an actor. I want to constantly keep learning new things and keep playing more and more diverse characters. I'm just hoping that the recognition gives me more opportunities to work with the directors I want to and to create work that inspires me. I hope that this happens within India as well as globally.

HOW DID THE WHITE TIGER HELP YOU EVOLVE AS AN ACTOR?

The White Tiger really made me realise that the more time I spend on understanding the character the better it is. It's like any other thing. It's the universal truth. I had the luxury of four months to understand Balram's role during which I went on this journey and I feel that's my biggest lesson. Also, working with director Ramin Bahrani was such a high because it was a unique experience. I've never been directed like that before, given that much freedom to understand my character and to improvise. I also feel I've become a better listener after working on that film. Apart from that, playing Balram really helped me empathise more with people and understand them better.

YOU REPORTEDLY WORKED IN A TEA STALL TO GET YOUR CHARACTER RIGHT?

One thing Ramin told me is to not read Aravind Adiga's *The White Tiger* and rely on the screenplay to get the job done. Of course, I skimmed through the book in order to understand the character better. Ramin advised me to arrive at my own truth about the character and that's why I asked one of my friends to take me to his native village in Jharkhand, where I did work for some time at a tea stall in order to understand the angst of someone like Balram.

RAMIN BAHRANI IS SAID TO HAVE SEARCHED FOR 'REAL ACTORS' TO BE CAST IN THE WHITE TIGER. HOW DID YOU FIT INTO THAT SCHEME OF THINGS?

That could be better answered by Ramin. I guess what

really helped me in understanding Balram was that I spent my formative years in Jamshedpur, which is closer to the region where Balram actually belonged to. So I had an understanding of those people and their culture. As Ramin mentioned in a lot of his interviews, he wanted to cast a lesser-known actor for the part. I guess both these reasons helped me get the part. He's always worked with people who almost have had no history in acting and then the kind of performances he extracts out of those people, it's unbelievable. You feel like you are watching a documentary.

AS AN INDIAN ACTOR, YOU MUST'VE NEVER IMAGINED YOUR OTT FILM TO TAKE THE NUMBER ONE SPOT IN 64 COUNTRIES IN JUST FOUR WEEKS. WHAT WAS YOUR REACTION TO IT?

It was supposed to be a Netflix global film and it was supposed to release in many countries. But to see our film do so well across the globe is reassuring because it is such a universal story. People from all over the world connected to it. All our hearts are full of gratitude for all the records that it set. ■

FAREWELL, VANRAJ BHATIA

DEVESH SHARMA OFFERS A BRIEF PROFILE OF THE RENOWNED COMPOSER, WHO PASSED AWAY RECENTLY

(MAY 31, 1927 -
MAY 7, 2021)

For the masses, his most popular song remains *Tumhare bin ji na lage ghar mein* from *Bhumika* (1977). Picturised on Smta Patil, it was written by Majrooh Sultanpuri and sung by Preeti Sagar. She was just a chit of a girl back then, famous for her *My heart is beating* song from *Julie* (1975). It's said that people told Vanraj Bhatia to choose another singer as Preeti was considered too westernised for a classical-based song. But he stuck to his guns and came out with his most famous song in the process. *Saawan ke din aaye*, a duet Preeti sang with Bhupinder, too became famous. The use of trumpet at the start provided another

dimension to the song. It wasn't that she was totally untested. He had made her sing the highly intricate composition, the heavy duty Quli Qutub Shah *ghazal Piya baaj pyala piya jaye na* from *Nishant* (1975), which is another rare gem from Bhatia's repertoire.

He's known to have worked more with Asha Bhosle but one song of his, *Barse ghan saari raat*, from *Tarang* (1984), sung by Lata Mangeshkar, was described by the late composer himself as one of his most difficult songs. And he marvelled at how Lata sang it in one take.

It's ironic that Vanraj, who is known for his Indian classical and folk inspired melodies, was actually a trained composer in the Western

heritage. After getting his M.A. (English Honours) from Elphinstone College, University of Bombay in 1949, Vanraj studied composition with Howard Ferguson, Alan Bush and William Alwyn at the Royal Academy of Music, London, where he was a recipient of the Sir Michael Costa Scholarship (1951–54). After graduating with a gold medal in 1954, Bhatia won a Rockefeller Scholarship (1954–58) as well as a French Government Scholarship (1957–58) that allowed him to study with the hallowed French composer and teacher Nadia Boulanger at the *Conservatoire de Paris* for five years. Vanraj belonged to a Kutchi businessmen family



Vanraj, known for his Indian classical and folk inspired melodies, was actually a trained composer in the Western heritage

who reportedly used to make fun of his love for music and thought he should give it up and join the family business. His father sponsored his trip to England on the condition that he should return home after six months if he failed to

win a scholarship. But such was his brilliance that he continued to win one scholarship after another. It's not as if he was unaware of Hindustani classical music. He had studied under the Deodhar school of music and was versed in its intricacies as well. It's said that he was mesmerised after hearing Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1 and that led him to develop an interest in Western classical music. Despite living in Paris, he reportedly spent his free time practicing music, rather than visiting its famous bistros and cafes. He was said to be extremely fond of the opera and travelled to Europe to see it being performed.

Perhaps, in hindsight, he made a mistake returning to India, instead of pursuing a career in the West. He returned penniless and to make ends meet, accepted the newly-minted post of the Reader in Western

Musicology at the University of Delhi from 1960 to 1965. It wasn't to his liking as there were hardly any students of Western music theory in Delhi at the time. The authorities too, perhaps blinded by nationalistic fervour, didn't see a future for such a stream. The composer thankfully got the opportunity to attend international seminars in Asia and Europe, furthering his knowledge. He's credited as being the first person to score music for an ad film, and went on to create around 7000 jingles. Some of them, for Shakti Silk Sarees, Lyril, Garden Vareily and Dulux are still remembered today.

He came in contact with Shyam Benegal during his advertising stint. The well-known ad and documentary filmmaker was thinking of trying his hand in feature films and asked Vanraj to compose the music for his directorial debut *Ankur* (1974). He went on to score for almost all of Benegal's films down the years. Perhaps he

became so steeped in Benegal's way of making films that he could only relate to the art world. He collaborated with other noted art filmmakers like Govind Nihalani, (whose *Tamas* won Vanraj a National Film Award for Best Music Direction), Kundan Shah (*Jaane Bhi Do Yaaro*), Aparna Sen (*36 Chowringhee Lane*), Saeed Akhtar Mirza (*Mohan Joshi Haazir Ho!*) Kumar Shahani (*Tarang*), Vidhu Vinod Chopra (*Khamosh*), Vijaya Mehta (*Pestonjee*) and Prakash Jha (*Hip Hip Hurray*). Though he couldn't work in the haphazard environment of mainstream cinema as a film song composer, he nevertheless made a name for himself when it came to background music. *Ajooba* (1991), *Ghatak*

(1996), *Pardes* (1997) and *Chameli* (2003), remain some of his famous BGM scores. He also gave music in TV serials like *Khandaan* (1985), *Katha Sagar* (1986), *Yatra* (1986) and *Bharat Ek Khoj* (1988). He also composed music in the Western classical discipline. His most frequently performed works are the *Fantasia* and *Fugue in C* for piano, the *Sinfonia Concertante* for strings, and the song cycle *Six Seasons*. He wrote an opera *Agni Varsha*, based on Girish Karnad's play of the same name, which premiered in New York City in 2012 in a production featuring soprano Judith Kellock.

The composer died on May 7, at his Mumbai residence. He was 93 at the time. ■

REMEMBERING RAAM LAXMAN

DEVESH SHARMA
SKETCHES THE LIFE
AND TIMES OF THE
VETERAN MUSIC
DIRECTOR WHO PASSED
AWAY RECENTLY

1942-MAY 22, 2021)



No one today remembers the movie *Hum Se Badhkar Kaun* (1981) but the song *Devo deva Ganpati deva* from the film is aired at full blast from every Ganpati pandal during the 11-day festival of Ganeshotsav. The film had music by Raam Laxman, who had the knack of coming up with hugely popular numbers from time to time throughout his career. If only he was consistent, he would have been counted as one of the greats of Hindi film music. Nevertheless, this

shy, reticent composer did enjoy his share of popularity. *Hum Se Badhkar Kaun* had another good number, *Dekho logon yeh kaisa zamana*, sung by Asha Bhosle and Mohammed Rafi. It reminds one somewhat of Bappi Lahiri's compositions and was one of the last songs sung by Rafi.

They say goodwill and friendship is the adhesive that holds this industry together. Raam Laxman is a prime example of it. His actual name is Vijay Patil. He was friends with Surendra Kadam, the

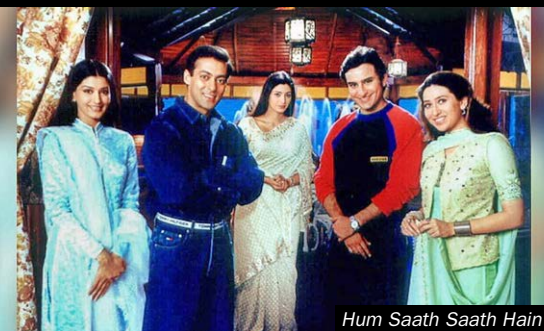
Raam to his Laxman. It was the era where having a *jodi* of music directors was considered lucky or auspicious. Hence Vijay formed a partnership with Surendra and the two friends began their journey together in the '70s. A story goes that it was veteran Marathi comedian and filmmaker Dada Kondke who christened them as Raam-Laxman, when he asked

them to compose the music of his Marathi film *Pandu Havaladar* (1975). The music proved to be a hit and their career took a flying start. They got a chance to compose for Rajshri Productions' *Agent Vinod* (1977), an espionage drama based on the lines of James Bond films, starring Mahendra Sandhu. However, Surendra unexpectedly passed away in 1976. To

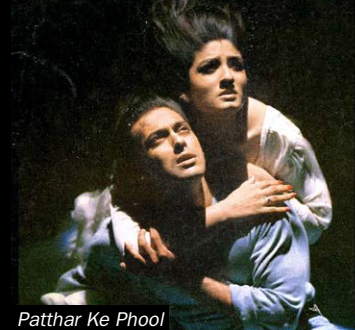

keep the friendship alive, Vijay took the *nom de plume* Raam Laxman and composed music under it in his four-decades-long career. His association with Rajshri Productions took off with *Agent Vinod*. They immediately signed him for another film, *Taraana* (1979), starring Mithun Chakraborty and Ranjeeta. The musical love story had hit songs like *Sultana sultana*, sung by Usha Mangeshkar, *Gunche lage hai kehne* and *Meri dilruba tujhko aana padega*, both sung by Shailendra Singh. It's said the composer developed a friendship with the baritone-voiced singer and considered him as one of the best he has ever worked with. Raam Laxman was able to offer something different even to masala potboilers. Consider *Hum Se Hai Zamana* (1983) for instance. It had a wonderfully nonsensical song in the mould of RD Burman in *Kolaba kuiba kuiba kuiba*, sung by Lata

Mangeshkar. Its title song, as well as the bhangra-like *Tenu mainu dekh zamana*, too became popular. *Woh Jo Hasina* (1983), remains forgotten but it contains one rare lullaby sung by Kishore Kumar in *Chand chal tu zara dheeme dheeme*.

Raam Laxman had always been close to Rajshri Productions and his biggest break came when Sooraj Barjatya asked him to compose the music for his directorial debut *Maine Pyar Kiya* (1989). The film had 11 songs and all proved superhit. The composer introduced the hit South Indian singer, SP Balasubrahmanyam as the voice of Salman Khan and the move proved to be a masterstroke. Lata Mangeshkar too, who was slowly losing her hold as the numero uno singer in the film industry, got one of the biggest hits of her career. Songs like *Dil*

deewana bin sajna ke maane na, *Kabootar ja ja ja*, *Aaja shaam hone aayi*, in fact the entire list ruled the airwaves and are still popular today. The music director deservedly won the Filmfare Award for his sublime effort. Because *Maine Pyar Kiya* became a hit, it's said Salman Khan recommended Raam Laxman's name for his *Patthar Ke Phool* (1991). It was the debut film of Raveena Tandon and had hit songs like *Tum se dekhte hi pyar hua* and *Kabhi tu challiya lagta hai*. His next hit, *100 Days* (1991), starring Madhuri Dixit and Jackie Shroff, had popular songs like *Sun beliya*, *shukriya meharbaani*, *Le le dil*, and the nonsensical *Gabbar Singh yeh kehkar gaya*.

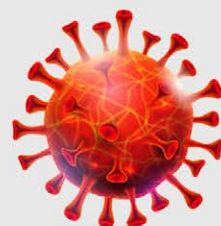
His best was yet to come. Sooraj Barjatya turned to Raam Laxman again for his family saga *Hum Aapke Hain Koun..!* (1994). This thinly disguised marriage video had a whopping 14 tracks

and each one again proved to be a hit. It's perhaps the last big hit of Lata Mangeshkar's career as well. Be it *Maye ni maye*, *Didi tera devar deewana*, *Joote do paise do*, *Waah waah Ramji*, or the title song, they have made a home in our hearts. Today, where multiple composers are the norm and one, two hummable songs come out of the whole album, this achievement looks miraculous indeed. His last outing with Rajshri, *Hum Saath Saath Hain* (1999) had only seven tracks in comparison and wasn't as successful. Still, *Maiyya Yashoda* and *Mhare hiwda mein* are remembered even today.

It's said the composer suffered a brain stroke 10 years ago and chose to settle in Nagpur, his native place. He died of a heart attack on May 22, 2021, at the age of 78. He may have passed on but will forever be alive in the memory of his fans through his music ... ■

HOW'S THE WORLD'S LARGEST FILM INDUSTRY COPING WITH THE PANDEMIC?

MAYUKH MAJUMDAR FIGURES OUT HOW THE BUSINESS OF CINEMA FARED UNDER THE PANDEMIC



While industry insiders remain cautiously optimistic about the immediate future of the Hindi film industry, the numbers tell a different tale altogether. In the first quarter of 2020, Bollywood's box office report card stood at approximately Rs 1,150 crores. Compare that to the March quarter of 2021 which saw Bollywood's box office earnings barely crossing Rs 50 crores. According to data compiled by consulting firm Ormax Media and reported by Business Standard Newspaper, a billion movie tickets were sold in 2019. The total amount from ticket sales was around Rs 10,948 crs. Around a third were from Hindi movies, 19 per cent from Tamil industry and 18 per cent from Telugu. The contrast couldn't have been starker in 2021. It was estimated that the movie business would crash by as much as 70 per cent this year. It's freefall as far as the entertainment industry is concerned.

The second wave of corona virus has only compounded the filmmakers' problems, who were already reeling from the lockdown last year. When the lockdown was suddenly announced last year, the industry was still hopeful that things would be normal in about three months and that things would be back to normal in no time. Honestly, no one thought the coronavirus would pan out like this. So film shootings were stalled, movie releases postponed. When the theatres were re-opened last year, it seemed things would

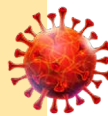
improve. The box office collections of 2021 releases like South's *Master* and Hollywood movie *Godzilla vs Kong* further ignited hope. While *Master* collected Rs 200 crs, *Godzilla vs Kong* did a business of Rs 46 crs in India. Besides this the list of movies to be released in 2021 looked strong. Yash Raj films had some five movies on its roster. The release dates of movies like Kabir Khan's '83, Rohit Shetty's *Sooryavanshi* and *Satyamev Jayate 2* were announced. But with the second lockdown the release dates have once again gone haywire. With every delay, the interest rates mount adding to the cost. Trade pundits point out that *Sooryavanshi*, made on a budget of Rs125 crs could have made around 200 crs at the box office during normal times. The makers would have sold the movie to an OTT platform for about 25 crs, they'd have earned around 20 crs from music and satellite rights. Now it's losing money every day because of the accruing interest. *Angrezi Medium* had a nominal loss of Rs 10 crs. The conservative estimate of both *Radhe* and *Laxmii* was around Rs 200 crs each. *Laxmii* was sold to an OTT platform for around Rs125 crs, which means it made a loss of around Rs 75 crs.

Most trade analysts have written off the first quarter of this year. According to them, the recovery will start only by September this year. Sitting in June, this seems highly optimistic. They however reiterate that the industry will take a 70-80 per cent hit as compared to the previous years. While the entire industry is facing a crunch

today, the Hindi film industry is particularly in dire straits. That's because even when the theatres reopened briefly, the industry didn't rush in to release the movies. It was kind of testing waters to see if the people would come back to the theatres. True enough, the footfall was miniscule. The only two movies released in the interim period were *Roohi* and *Mumbai Saga*. And the total collection this year is just about Rs 50 crs. Questions were raised if the audience would ever walk into the theatres in the times of covid. Right now, no one knows when the projectors will be fired up again. The future indeed looks bleak for the film industry, till at least the coronavirus looms large. With a more severe second wave in progress, it'll be a while before the film industry limps back to normalcy.

According to Vinod Bhanushali, President of Marketing, Media & Publishing (TV), Music Acquisition of T-Series and the co-producer of T-Series Films, "If a film like *Tanhaji* or *Kabir Singh* had released in these COVID times, we would have never understood the potential of the films, namely the possibility of them hitting 300 crores. We would have had to sell it to OTT platforms at a lower cost which would be based on the actor's previous runs at the box office. The loss of money for the films which couldn't start on time is something which we have to bear, and even post lockdown we will never get the full capacity benefit till COVID-19 is totally gone."

What's made life difficult for most producers is the COVID-19 protocols, which have to be followed on the sets while shooting.

These increase the cost and thus add to the losses. Also when the lockdown was announced last year most sets had to be dismantled. Sanjay Leela Bhansali's *Gangubai Kathiawadi* set and Boney Kapoor's *Maidaan* set had to be brought down. Last year, *Maidaan's* set was taken down because of the pandemic and this year, it suffered damages because of Cyclone Tauktae. Producer Boney Kapoor will reportedly have to shell out an additional seven crores to offset the damage, once the shooting commences after the lockdown. If you add 10-12 per cent as inflation cost, the numbers escalate quickly.

Trade analyst Taran Adarsh estimates the industry losses at anywhere between Rs1500 crs to Rs

2000 crs, if not more. Some trade pundits say the number could be as high as Rs 3000cr to 4000 crs. If you take into account the interest rates, the salaries paid, maintenance charges, jobs lost, sets dismantled and rebuilt again and the cost of maintaining covid protocols, then the picture looks bleaker still.

Says Taran, "We are facing the second wave right now which is far more lethal than the first wave. We really don't know till when this is going to continue and now, we are back to square one with theatres being shut. From the common man's point of view, when you hear and read about COVID-19 and you see the statistics about the deaths and the lack of oxygen, entertainment does not even feature on the list anymore. Right now, it's a little difficult to calculate the losses because few films went to OTT platforms and suddenly, when the scenario seemed better, a lot of producers announced their films. A few films were also released in theatres like *Roohi* and *Mumbai Saga*. We are heading for a very

uncertain future.....”

Taran cites *Radhe* as a case in point and says Salman Khan went for a hybrid release as the film was delayed for a year and the interest was piling up. Says he, “If you take a home loan, you have to pay an interest on it every month. That goes for a movie, as well. Talking about Salman Khan, he was supposed to release *Radhe* last year on Eid. He couldn’t do that because of the lockdown. Somewhere in January, when things began looking up, he said that he’s standing by the theatres and he would release *Radhe* in May 2021. Hence, when the second wave came in, many wondered what he was going to do. Salman Khan is financially sound but every film has a certain budget and you cannot exceed a particular amount that has been sanctioned. Now, if the film had been delayed for a year, the interest factor that Salman Khan Productions would have had to pay would have been enormous. So, Salman Khan decided to not delay the film any further..... and how long could he wait?”

The worst hit, it seems, are the exhibitors. The estimated loss of the exhibition industry is around 1500 crs. Many top multiplex chains which are listed on the Sensex have dropped their share prices due to no business. On the other hand, there are several small theatres which have had to completely shut down. Trade analysts reckon that the first lockdown led to the shutdown of around 1,500 screens - a number which will only increase given the second lockdown

Kamal Gianchandani, CEO of PVR Pictures is heartened by the fact that the majority of producers are holding out for a theatrical release. He’s also optimistic about people coming back to the theatres. “Looking at the box office signals that we got in January, February and March, we feel very confident that there has been no change in the customer habits. In fact, there

is a pent-up demand and people want to come to cinemas by force. An overwhelming number of producers have decided to wait until theatres reopen. Also, in the overseas markets and all markets where the virus has been contained, whether it’s China, Japan, Australia or the US, the box office is doing exceedingly well. In the first three months of 2021, China has already done \$3 billion in their domestic market. And, this is without there being Hollywood films. Only with their local films, they have managed to do three billion dollars worth of box office collections till April 15, which gives a very positive signal that, in any market where the virus has been contained, people come back to theatres in big numbers,” he hopes.

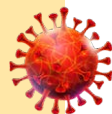

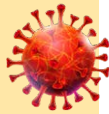

contingency built into their contract to help tide things over. While everyone is still focusing on their health and wellness, it is evident to all that the virus isn't going anywhere soon. "When the next virus wave comes, we should have systems in place that will allow us to work in a way which is safe and still substantial. Halting everything is not the solution. It's difficult for theatrical business to recover soon, but now theatrical business is competing with same day releases on OTT platforms. For example, *Radhe* released with a ticket price of Rs 249. So, power will temporarily move to platforms," Singh says.

As for the future of the big screen, no one is beating its death knell yet. Even those who have suffered financial losses remain optimistic.

Sanjeev Kumar Bijli, Joint Managing Director of PVR Limited says that PVR saw four-and-a-half lakh admissions for *Roohi* and two-and-a-half lakh admissions for *Mumbai Saga* nationwide. The response to *Mumbai Saga* was muted because it was one of the last films playing in cinemas when the second wave of COVID-19 hit. Before PVR shut down for the lockdown in 2020,

they saw a whopping amount of 100 million admissions. Bijli is hopeful simply because when things got better in India after the first wave, filmmakers rushed to announce release dates for their movies. From *Thalaivi*, *Gangubai Kathiawadi* to *Sooryavanshi*, there was a rush to release trailers, teasers and posters. "It's difficult to recuperate after the losses sustained in 2020. A loss is a loss and I don't think we can make up for those losses. Our only hope is that we open as soon as possible and that there is no third wave of the coronavirus. There is, of course, talk of a third wave but I think that can be minimised if the nation-wide vaccination program really becomes aggressive. It's not even at the brink of where it should be. We are vaccinating very few people. We've seen examples from the US, UK, Israel and many parts of Europe. It's the only way to ensure that the impact of any other wave is minimised. I'd estimate that we will open now by the end of June because numbers are going down. I hope we're able to get films and people start going back to the cinemas..... It's going to be a slow burn but I think we'll get there because the fundamentals of the business are very strong. The need to go out and watch cinema is very strong," he comments.

Bijli believes that the future of theatres in India remains strong - even if we're in this situation for another year. Says he, "This is a 140-year-old industry and it has seen disruptions in technology coming from DVDs and television and OTT. It has seen disruptions coming from wars and past pandemics but it always bounces back because there is that social need for humans to go out with friends and family to watch a movie in a darkened theatre and share that experience with everyone else. It is still the cheapest form of entertainment in India. It's a holistic form of family entertainment. This is a blip and this blip is only because of a pandemic nobody had foreseen."

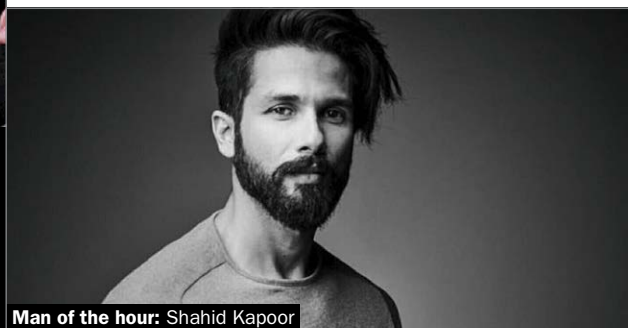
