
Awarding experience

I'm writing this after the successful completion of Planet Marathi Presents Filmfare Awards Marathi 2020. As kids growing up in Mumbai, we were fed a staple diet of Marathi films and serials. Ashok Saraf, Laxmikant Berde, Sachin Pilgaonkar, Mahesh Kothare, Dilip Prabhvalkar... and many, many more were part of our Saturday evening staples when Doordarshan used to telecast Marathi films. Yes, you heard that right, kids – we used to have one channel and programme timings were strictly adhered to. There was no pause button, no fast forward button. No binge watching and no luxury of watching things in your own free time. It was one-size-fits-all entertainment, take it or leave it. But you know what, it was still golden. Marathi cinema was at its commercial peak then, giving a tough fight to its Hindi big brother at the cinema halls.

Mahesh Kothare was the recipient of our Excellence In Cinema Award this year. I remember watching his Dhoom Dhadaka (1985) and rolling in the aisles with laughter. It was a remake of Pvar Kive Jaa (1966) for sure but the story didn't lose its charm in the retelling. Mahesh directed the film, and cast Laxmikant Berde and Ashok Saraf besides him. It was a roaring success and is popular even today. It's said that Mahesh and Laxmikant Berde were thick friends and that resulted in the actor being part of all his productions. In the midst of the show, it struck me that the Marathi industry still retains that old world charm of workplace friendship. It was evident in the way people greeted each other like long-lost friends, in the warmth of the applause and the genuine appreciation for those who took home the Black Lady. Even in the middle of a thousand and one concerns, a feeling of well-being came over me watching it. Let's hope the feeling persists always.

Anandi Gopal made history by bagging 10 trophies. Anandibai Joshi was an extraordinary woman who travelled all the way to America to study medicine and triumphed against all odds. I've read about her and her husband Gopalrao Joshi. The story of their struggles, their perseverance, needed to be told and I'm glad it finally came out. We need such positive stories. More so in today's times where the novel coronavirus hangs over our heads like a sword, ready to strike down if we slipped up on personal safety. At the function too, we insisted on masks and everyone was tested for COVID-19 before entering the venue. Now that the vaccination is happening rapidly, let's hope and pray that by the next edition of Marathi Awards we should well be rid of this pandemic...







She doesn't just possess exotic good looks and a great figure but has acting chops to go with them. Charming, vivacious and always full of positive energy, she's looking forward to 2021, where she has *Jug Jugg Jeeyo, Bhool Bhulaiyaa* and *Shershaah* coming up. On the personal front, she's reportedly seeing Sidharth Malhotra, though she has chosen to remain mum about it and doesn't even throw the 'we're just good friends' line when asked about it. Though the media reports the duo had a 'meet-the-parents' moment and even indulged in a Maldives vacation together. Hmm... No personal-questions policy aside, the actress is quite candid when it comes to tackling questions about her career and life. Excerpts from a free-flowing interview with the bubbly actress...

Dress: Giuseppe Di Morabito YOU'RE CONSIDERED ONE OF THE TOP ACTRESSES OF B-TOWN **RIGHT NOW. HOW DOES IT FEEL?** It feels like a dream come true. I always wanted to do the kind of work I am doing. So when directors and producers of that stature put that faith in you...it feels nice. The kind of scripts I am reading, they weren't there a couple of years ago. Now I want to do it all. Now I just want to challenge myself and push myself. There is so much more I want to achieve.

YOU'RE DHARMA'S BLUE-EYED GIRL. HAVING DONE GUILTY. GOOD NEWZZ AND JUG JUGG JEEYO WITH THEM. WHAT'S THE **EQUATION YOU SHARE WITH KARAN JOHAR?** Karan often jokes that everyone asks him why he's giving me films. And I always say that I must be so good that you give me these films. (Laughs) Sometimes even I joke that I should have my own cabin at Dharma. I love working with them. They have given me some of my strongest characters. When *Lust Stories* happened, it was the first role that I had that got so much appreciation. I think Karan sees me as a performer. Everything he has offered me, whether it has been Good Newwz, III or Shershah, every character has been so incredibly etched out that I naturally feel inclined to do it. I want him to direct me again.

TODAY YOU'RE WORKING WITH THE BIGGEST SUPERSTARS AND BIG BANNERS. WHAT WAS THE TURNING POINT IN YOUR CAREER? Everyone will point out to my successful films whether it was *Lust Stories* or *Kabir Singh*. Naturally those films had a wider reach. But personally, I think my foundation has been my first film *Fugly*. I owe it to the first



film for every film I've landed. Also, every film has taught me something, every person I have acted with, every director I have worked with has taught me something. So for me, every film is special, whether it was a box-office success or a big dud, it taught me something and it has been a part of my journey.

WHEN YOUR DEBUT FILM DIDN'T DO AS WELL AS EXPECTED. WHAT MOTIVATED YOU TO KEEP YOUR CHIN UP AND SAIL ON? That was the toughest period because I didn't know better. I didn't know what was next? I didn't realise that it's not just about your first film. Every film is a challenge. And it's every Friday to Friday, no matter wherever you are in your career. My belief in myself was what motivated me during that period of time. I hung on to that and dug my feet in. There was never a plan B.

THERE WAS NO PLAN B? There was never a plan B. From far back as I can remember, the only thing I wanted to do was be an actor. I have been training probably since I was four. So everything was around that.

WHAT DID YOU LEARN FROM THAT PARTICULAR PHASE NOW THAT YOU LOOK BACK AT IT? I was preparing every single day, that when the opportunity comes I'm ready for it. I didn't want to ever feel like I haven't given it my all. I

Crop top: Topshop Jacket: Paule Ka Earring: Studio Metallurgy really feel lucky today that the directors conduct workshops. They want you to prepare for roles, they want you to unlearn what you have learnt and approach a character in a new way. Even when you cry in a film, you cry differently in each film. And that is a very daunting task for an actor. That's why today, when I look back at *Kabir Singh* and see the climax scene, I still have tears in my eyes because I never watched it as myself. I never felt like that was me.

AFTER *KABIR SINGH,* WHEN PEOPLE MADE MEMES ABOUT YOUR CHARACTER IN THE FILM, HOW DID YOU REACT TO IT?

I think if memes come out about something, then people have enjoyed it. And there were really some funny memes. It's all that love from people that they got so creative. They were genuinely creative and funny. WHICH ONE IS YOUR FAVOURITE? The meme which has a charger and someone has written Preeti on it because nobody wants them to touch their charger. That was a smart one.

HOW DO YOU HANDLE SOCIAL MEDIA TROLLS?

I don't pay attention to them. Unfortunately, they're so hurt in their own lives that they want to spread hate. So giving in and answering back is not something I would want to do. I just kind of ignore it. Also, I've a well-developed sense of humour and am able to see the funny side of it.

DO YOU BELIEVE THIS INDUSTRY IS A CUT-THROAT PLACE AND YOU'VE TO BE ON YOUR TOES HERE ALL THE TIME TO STAY AHEAD? Definitely cut-throat. It's actually nice to be in a league of actors where everyone is bringing in something new and interesting to the table. So it helps you to pull up your socks. You can't take it easy not for a second. The kind of content we've seen on OTT in the whole of last year, I feel everybody has opened up to out-of-the-box ideas. The whole creative space has had a full 360 degree turn. Everyone wants to push the envelope now.

WHEN YOU CARRY A FILM ON YOUR SHOULDERS. DO YOU GET MORE REMUNERATION? PERHAPS AS MUCH AS A MALE LEAD? I can't really answer that as I don't know what others are getting. I'm happy with the kind of money I make. It's a great time for actresses today that we are getting films where we are shouldering the product. *Guilty* was my first film that I shouldered. For me, it was a special film. Because the kind of character that I played there and the kind of work that had to be put in to prepare for that character, the whole experience, just made me grow as an actor. And it makes you so much more confident to shoulder more films in future. Hopefully, this year will see much more of that.

DO YOU FEEL *INDOO KI* JAWAANI DESERVED A BETTER RELEASE STRATEGY?

Of course, it breaks my heart that it came out amidst the lockdown. But it was a call producers had to take because they wanted to support the multiplexes. Last year was really a difficult year and many films which were to be released in theatres, ended up on OTT. I think it's for the first time that every single actor wants every single film to work, so that we can go

So the first time I went back to the theatres was to watch my own film. It was surreal and lovely.

WHAT WAS THE SITUATION LIKE ON THE SET OF JUG JUGG JEEYO WHEN YOUR CO-STARS TESTED **POSITIVE FOR COVID-19? HOW DID YOU HANDLE IT?** I have to say that the production and everyone on set was so prompt with the entire situation. It was scary, no doubt. And the truth is all of us were extremely paranoid when this happened. Because you worked with them you always had this thought that maybe you've got it as well. Thankfully, all three of them -- Varun Dhawan, Neetu Kapoor and director Raj Mehta had minimal symptoms and they came out of it stronger. And hats off to Neetu aunty. It was her call that we should go back to Chandigarh for the shoot. Director Raj Mehta too was convinced and then everyone else too came on board. We took extra precautions and managed to shoot without further mishap. The team spirit was quite strong. I think we have all emerged stronger after the experience.



Kajol, who came back to our screens with Tribhanga talks to Raghuvendra Singh about the experience

KAJOL. There's something indefinable about her that escapes expression.

Having seen most of her films, you feel you know her intimately. And at some level, you do because like every actor, she leaves a part of herself in her roles. But at another level, she's a stranger. she's at once warm and engaging and at the same time, cool and detached. Actors never show us their vulnerable face. Maybe because they can't afford to. Not in the dog-eat-dog world they live in, where any weakness is pounced upon by rivals like a prize. Where anything and everything can be used against you. So they hide behind a thousand masks, a thousand faces. The only place they can take off that mask is ironically in front of the camera. They laugh, they cry, with abandon, revelling in the freedom the limelight brings. In Tribhanga, Kajol plays a classical dancer who is also a superstar actor. She's also someone who has a strained relationship with her mother. Someone who cusses like a sailor and someone who yearns to be loved without being judged. It's an all-heart performance from Kajol yet again. Whether it was all an act or something closer to the truth...ask her and she only hints... not revealing much. Excerpts from a candid conversation with the firebrand actress who over the years has learnt to mind her ps and qs...

WHAT ATTRACTED YOU TO A PROJECT LIKE TRIBHANGA?

I loved the script, I absolutely loved the script. I heard about five drafts of this script. Every time I heard this script, it resonated with every part of me. I loved the fact that all these strong women were put together in an interesting project. So yeah, it was everything put together that excited me about the film.

DID YOU IDENTIFY WITH YOUR CHARACTER IN ANY WHICH WAY?

I did identify with Anu a lot. I thought there is something amazingly

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DO MOTHERS AND DAUGHTERS ALWAYS HAVE TUMULTUOUS RELATIONSHIPS? WHAT SORT OF AN EQUATION DID YOU HAVE WITH YOUR MOTHER?

I think all mothers and daughters have a very unique, a very complex relationship. Not easy at HONESTLY, I DON'T USE GAALIS IN REAL LIFE. BUT I HAVE A LOT OF PEOPLE AROUND ME, WHO USE IT AS A NATURAL PART OF THEIR VOCABULARY. HONESTLY, I GUESS IT'S MORE OF AN EXPRESSION OF EMOTION, THAN AN URGE TO ABUSE



all. And I think it's more like an umbilical cord which cannot be broken. Bad, good, whatever your mother is, whatever your daughter is, there is something you have to resolve. You can't leave it unattended or break it off completely either. There will always be something that will be missing in your life if you don't resolve it. As far as my relationship with my mother is concerned, I have had the most wonderful, wonderful relationship with my



mom. I never went through teenage rebellion. I rebelled against the whole world except her. She was always behind me and cheered me on. So I have had an absolutely amazing relationship with my mom. But I can understand her being such an opinionated and an individualistic person. I can understand where it could have gone horribly wrong, if we hadn't been who we are and talked it out. So I understand Nayan (Tanvi Azmi) and Anu (Kajol's character) because of that.

YOU HAD TO SAY LOTS OF CUSS WORDS IN THE FILM. HOW COMFORTABLE WERE YOU ABOUT THAT? Honestly, I don't use gaalis in real life. But I have a lot of people

vocabulary. Honestly, I guess it's more of an expression of emotion, than an urge to abuse. So it's not an abuse so much as it is an expression of what you are feeling. That's where I channelled all those people inside me while enacting Anu.

My kids have not seen the film yet.



together. But besides that, we also chilled out together and had a lot of fun. And it was an amazing feeling to see work get done amidst the amazing camaraderie that took place with so many fearless people on set. It was an amazing experience which I will never forget. And the best compliment I've got for the film is that I've heard people have gone back and looked at their lives



and moms and seen them as who they are without judging them harshly as we tend to do. All of us tend to do that. We're extremely judgemental towards our moms and towards our parents and our kids in turn judge us as well. So hopefully we'll judge each other a little less after watching *Tribhanga*.

HOW WAS IT BEING DIRECTED BY A WOMAN DIRECTOR? WAS THE EQUATION ON THE SET DIFFERENT BECAUSE OF THAT?

I think *Tribhanga* couldn't have been written by a man. *Tribhanga* had to be definitely written by a woman. And the complexities of the characters and all that put together, nobody knew that script as well as Renuka Shahane. And she did a fantastic job. She did a fantastic job of pulling out performance from us. And making sure we lived upto the characters in the film. Gender not withstanding.

DO YOU THINK YOU'RE GETTING MORE FULFILLING ROLES NOW, AT THIS STAGE OF YOUR CAREER?

I chose to do fewer films. I chose to work less. And as I said, I'm more particular about picking projects now. So I don't want to do everything that comes to me. I want to take on something only if it fits all my criteria. Only then I will agree to do it.

divorcee facing blackouts who subsequently becomes embroiled in a murder investigation. There is already a Hollywood movie based on the book **COMPLETELY DIFFERENT** starring Emily Blunt and directed by Tate Taylor of The Help fame. "I'm dying of nervousness. I've

never felt this nervous about any film. Girl On The Train means so much to me. Personally and professionally, I've invested so much in the film. I'm excited to finally hand it over to the audience and know what they think of it," Parineeti says.

Her nervousness, perhaps, also stems from the fact that her past few films haven't been successful at the box-office nor have they been wellreceived by the critics. This is a new phenomenon for the actress who has been the critics' favourite





I wanted to play this character. I was saturated with what I was doing and I wanted to do something completely different and surprise everyone," she says.

> ince the book and the Hollywood adaptation are so popular, there is of

course pressure on both director Ribhu Dasgupta and Parineeti to show something that will keep the audiences hooked. Parineeti agrees there's a certain amount of pressure. But both her director and she believe that the script has been written keeping the Hindi audiences in mind. "Having said that, we are excited that our reference material is so well received and is already a bestseller book and a well-received film and we just hope that we've done a good or even a better job," she says.

For preparation, Parineeti watched the Hollywood adaptation, listened to her director and then, surprisingly, ignored her first instinct towards a scene and thought about enacting the scene in a way that she usually wouldn't do. She says that she didn't want to do good acting but new acting. "I used to hear stories about how a role took a toll on my co-actors and messed up their minds. They needed therapy. I'd wonder why they took it so seriously. Why couldn't they just perform and go home. But I guess I was naïve because I've experienced the same now. Not that I've needed any therapy, in fact, doing

the film has been therapy for me because it gave me clarity on what I wanted to do," she says. "It was so challenging, intense and so emotionally draining but so satisfying as an actor. I used to go back home and be so happy that I'd done this crazy work today."

he lockdown helped Parinneti really introspect about her life and career about the kind of films she wants to do, her work ethic and the places she wants to travel. The lockdown which began with her doing puzzles at home and taking walks in parks in London culminated in a renewed zest for work and life in 2021. Parineeti also says that like half the world, the skill she has picked up during the lockdown is cooking. "I genuinely didn't even know how to boil water and I had to learn from the basics. I surprise myself now when after a hectic day I like to call over a friend for dinner even if I'm not having it myself. I like to spend that half an hour in the kitchen preparing something silly for my friends. I never imagined that cooking would be destressing for me," she says. When it comes to fitness. she's had to face the reality of gyms closing and letting go like the rest of us. She says that she's been "very bad" at keeping up with her fitness regime and ate what she wanted and did not workout properly.

Looking back at her career, Parineeti doesn't have any regrets but

she does wish to have entered the industry better prepared. She wishes she could have spent a year preparing to be an actor before her first film. That's the only thing she'd like to change. "There's so much that is involved. You learn how to style yourself; you learn basics about hair and makeup, you meet people and learn how to deal with people. My first day on set was literally my first day in the industry. I never got that time to really get into it and made a lot of mistakes in public," she says.

When it comes to

Sandeep Aur Pinky Faraar, which might release this year, she doesn't wish to talk about much. But she does reveal that director Dibakar Banerjee set a diktat that co-star Arjun Kapoor and she do not interact off-screen. That didn't quite work because Arjun and she go back a long way. "We had to talk to each other," she maintains.

In the future, Parineeti is looking for roles where she'd be a surprise casting and do movies that people don't expect her to do. Let's hope she gets the breaks she wants...



REMEMBERING RAJV KAPOOR

DEVESH SHARMA PROFILES THE LIFE AND TIMES OF RAJ KAPOOR'S YOUNGEST SON RAJIV KAPOOR WHO PASSED AWAY RECENTLY...

(AUGUST 25, 1962 -FEBRUARY 9, 2021)

n his biography *Khullam* Khulla, the late Rishi Kapoor credits younger brother Rajiv Kapoor as being the most talented of the three brothers. Rishi reveals Raiiv was a musical genius, as he was expertly able to play the piano without ever having learnt it formally. He also credits Rajiv doing a commendable job as an editor on Aa Ab Laut Chalen (1999) which was directed by Rishi and produced by Rajiv. Rishi laments that his younger brother just couldn't apply himself to any field, otherwise he would have become the number one in any thing he chose. Rishi Kapoor also revealed that their father Raj Kapoor loved Rajiv, or Chimpu as he was affectionately known, the most. He even goes on to say that while their father did make Bobby for him, it was Dimple Kapadia's film all the way while Ram Teri Ganga Maili was made exclusively to showcase Rajiv.

If that was Raj Kapoor's intention, it certainly didn't pay off. One can say the decision boomeranged, as all the viewers took away from the film was the waterfall scene featuring the scantily-clad Mandakini. The multilayered film, which talked about class divide as well TIMESCONTENT

as cleaning up the Ganges is only remembered today because of its skin show.

Rajiv Kapoor was born on August 25, 1962. He was the youngest of Raj Kapoor's children. Like the rest of the Kapoors, he too was undeniably handsome and as such, was expected to follow his brothers into films. He used to look like a young Shammi Kapoor when he was in his 20s and as such, his roles, films and even his mannerisms were moulded on his uncle. In a later interview, Rajiv lamented about the decision. He felt that he should have been his own man from the start and not let himself be moulded as another Shammi Kapoor. He was convinced things would have turned out differently then. Unlike his elder brothers Randhir Kapoor and Rishi Kapoor. he wasn't launched by his father. His debut film Ek Jaan Hain Hum was produced by FC Mehra and directed by Rajiv Mehra. It introduced Raiiv and Divya Rana and is also said to be Anu Malik's first big

film. Songs like *Dil lagana* tum kya -- where his dance steps were reminiscent of Shammi Kapoor's steps from Teesri Manzil (1966) -- Yaad teri aavegi, Dil dil hai, and Aasman pe likh doon were hits and for a while it felt like a new musical star had dawned despite the film's below par run at the box office.

ut it wasn't to be. Ram Teri Ganga Maili was a jubilee hit alright but afterwards, Rajiv's films like Zabardast (1985), Lover Boy (1985), Preeti (1986), Zalzala (1988), Hum To Chale Pardes (1988) all flopped. Raj Kapoor could have revived his son's career but after his untimely death in 1988, the zest for acting seemingly left Rajiv. He tried his hands at other things -- he directed and edited Prem Granth (1996) -- a reworking of Thomas Hardy's Tess Of The d'Urbervilles and produced Aa Ab Laut Chalen (1999). Unfortunately, both films flopped. The latter was the

last film produced under the illustrious RK banner.

His personal life was said to be tumultuous at best. He was said to be seeing Divya Rana but nothing came off the relationship. He was also reportedly linked to Mandakini, Nagma and even Madhuri Dixit, though he always rubbished those rumours. In 2001, he married Aarti Sabharwal, an architect but the couple got divorced two years later in 2003. He was a Kapoor throughout and never let his lack of commercial success keep him away from romancing life. He was fond of food and drinks and while he didn't have children of his own, he used to pamper his nieces and nephews. He was said to be especially close to Ranbir Kapoor, and reportedly used to buy expensive watches for him. Rajiv was all set to revive his acting career with Toolsidas Junior, a sports film produced by Ashutosh Gowariker, which co-starred Sanjay Dutt. Unfortunately, death took him away from this mortal plane before that could be realised...





Mahesh Kothare began his career as a child artiste with the Hindi film Raja Aur Runk (1968), where he played a double role. He made his Marathi acting debut with the film Gupchup Gupchup (1983) and never looked back. Along with Sachin Pilgaonkar, Ashok Saraf and Laxmikant Berde, he formed a formidable quartet and ruled the Marathi silver screen. He made his directorial debut with the Marathi film Dhoom Dhadaka (1985), which was a remake of the hit Hindi comedy Pyar Kiye Jaa (1966), starring Shashi Kapoor and Kishore Kumar. The film turned out to be a phenomenal hit. He's credited with introducing creature horror in Marathi films through his version of the Chucky films called Zapatlela (1993). 20 years later, he again became a pioneer when he made a sequel to the film called Zapatlela 2 (2013) in 3D. It was the first Marathi film which was totally shot with a 3D camera. His son, Adinath Kothare too is an actor and a filmmaker and has taken his father's legacy forward.





Last vear, for the first time in our history, we broke protocol and whizzed all the way to Guwahati for the event. It was a hell of a ride made all the more memorable by the fact that all hell literally broke loose soon after in the form of the COVID-19. And we had to give a long kiss goodbye to the movies for pretty much of 2020. But here we are again, back to the familiar arena. Yes, the threat of the coronavirus pandemic is still very much present but imbibing the heady cocktail of 'the show must go on' and 'Jeena yahan, marna yahan,' we're soldiering on come what may. The entire film industry is in the same boat. While some have gone for shoots abroad, some have opted to shoot outside Mumbai. The

theatres are open but the masses have vet to make a beeline for the movies. Hopefully, things will get better soon as people are buoyed by the vaccination drive. So far, it has been an interesting round of jury meetings and other sundry things. While I can't reveal anything at this stage, it would be safe to say that some intriguing choices have come up. The viewers are going to be surprised for sure. Fingers crossed!

Apart from the Bollywood awards, we also have the Bangla awards coming up. Yes, we've trained our eyes due East once more. Though like the recently concluded Marathi awards, we'd be celebrating excellence in films released in 2019. I've always been an admirer of Bengali films as they offer a mix of heart-touching stories with some refined performances. Bengali cinema suffered from the influx of Bollywood influences in between but



is currently going through another renaissance where filmmakers are telling local stories with a global worldview. The lines between regional cinemas are blurring and soon we're going to have pan-Indian films and pan-Indian stars and the filmmakers, technicians and actors from the Bengali cinema are going to be at the forefront of that revolution.

Someone asked me why I keep coming back to award shows. Why can't I be a pure journalist and just do interviews. I do it because I believe we at *Filmfare* definitely make a difference. In our own small way, we have been serving as an aspirational beacon for people in the film business since the '50s.
