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

THE JOY OF SIMPLE DESIGN





Sometimes the hustle and bustle of big city life can get a bit much. And we all need a holiday to escape from this mundane everyday. This the story of one inspiring man, who is living his best life every single day. Pankaj Kumar, Founding Head of The [P] Factor, a collaborative Design agency based in Goa, gets to do what he loves most, that is designing, in the state that brings home much peace, Goa. This enigmatic designer's firm is known to develop some exciting vacation homes across India, but he does so from the sun, sand and surf of this vacation destination...suffice to say, Pankaj knows a thing or two about the perfect holiday. In this rapid fire round, we get talking with him and here's what he has to say:

Pankaj, according to you what are the elements that make a house a home:

It starts when you connect with every corner. You may find a space for every mood. It's the vibes that makes the difference.

Elegance to you:

Simple and minimalist

And what about colour:

Colour encourages visual communication...something that transports your mood. I feel it's constantly on the move.

Art to you:

To me art is an affair with your fantasy. Never stop dreaming!

Before we move on, we are curious about the overall design scape of Pankaj's work. We ask him about his design language and an interesting trend that is there in all his projects. He quickly shares, "I am always fascinated with black and shades of grey. Most of my projects are rich in its external spaces and bold textures." And how would he best describe the inspiration for his work? He replies, "Our observations and experiences continue to influence our perspective. Thoughts are an outcome of our connect with the subject. A beautiful design may inspire to get the best out of us. A well-lit verandah may just create those awesome vibes to smile a little extra, an incentive to be your best. Discipline is in the Chaos."

Okay, let's continue with the rapid fire, shall we?

A strong trend that you are celebrating?

Diminishing or blurring the lines between exteriors and interiors.

As a curator, what is the first element you bring into the canvas?

Beautiful outdoors. The journey begins where you enter.

Why are you a designer?

I'm still trying to figure out if I would like to be boxed-in and limited. Labels are a matter of perspective.

If you had to describe yourself in just one word, what would it be?

Dreamer in an igloo. Ok! That's four words. But it's important to have some madness in the midst of sanity. This makes for

interesting conversations when you grow older.

Advise for aspiring designers?

Dream. Believe. Be little mad though. Madness is the key ingredient to our sanity. And you don't have to explain when you grow old.

Who and what inspires you?

Freshness, boldness, the unexpected, role reversals, subtlety. Noise can wait. Let there be some music.

We cut through the session as our curiosity is piqued. From the beginning of his journey as the founder of The (P) Factor to now, how has he evolved along the way. "There is a possibility to every dream or an aspiration. That makes the journey exciting and worthy of exploration. Of course, endorsement follows just to reinforce our belief in everything we do." Beautiful words, and very inspiring, wouldn't you say? We dig a little deeper to ask him when it comes to design what he believes in? Once again, we stand impressed, "Romanticise with everything that's your playground." We carry forward with the rapid fire, as that reveals some gems of inputs from Pankaj.

Mentors you wish to talk about, and how they've contributed to your journey thus far?

In Design, every common man or a critic is your mentor. So I always have my ears wide open and never shut my eyes. I listen, absorb, think, imbibe and deliver. Constantly!

What are the biggest hurdles you face in today's design times?

Commerce is in the driving seat. Art and science are the backbenchers. But "Not everything that counts can be counted and not everything that's counted truly counts." Einstein said so.

What does the future hold for you?

I can sense many more lovely houses in Goa, Mumbai, Nilgiris, and maybe even Kerala. Also, a beautiful film for sure – very soon. It is a work in progress. But then again, who knows what the future truly holds?

And finally, what kind of design do you want to see in the future?

As spaces blend and homogenise, I think there will be a thinning of the line of urbanisation between rural and city living.

Pankaj walks the talk. In our rapid fire we learn that the designer advocates a lifestyle that is truly evolved in nature. From the materials one uses to create home, to the soul of a home. We ask him what the need of the hour and he says it's to slowdown and take few steps back. Nature has been taken too much for granted. We agree with him wholeheartedly. And Pankaj's reverence for nature is obvious in the material palate he uses... from natural-textured stones, terrazzo, and brass...his arsenal is earthy and rooted. Pankaj bids us adieu on a soulful note, he says, "Good design is like a window to someone else's world of imaginations. It leaves you with lot of thoughtfulness and inspired to write a similar story."


FATTOUSH SALAD

INGREDIENTS For the Cake Base

- 180g pearl couscous
- 3–4 large heirloom tomatoes, diced
- 5 mini cucumbers, thinly sliced
- 15g fresh mint, coarsely chopped
- 30g flat-leaf parsley, coarsely chopped
- 1 large clove garlic, diced
- 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1/4 cup olive oil, plus extra to drizzle
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper, plus more to taste
- 1 teaspoon fine grain sea salt, plus more to taste
- 4 pita breads, toasted until golden and fully hard
- 2 teaspoons sumac (or more to taste)

METHOD

- Combine tomatoes, cucumbers, mint, parsley, garlic, lemon juice, olive oil, and vinegar. Let it sit for at least 20 minutes for all the flavors to combine.
- 2. Fold in the couscous to the mix.
- 3. When you're ready to serve, crumble the pita into large pieces and toss to combine. Towards the end of your mixing, garnish with sumac and serve!

Aditi introduces herself beautifully, "I grew up in Mumbai around inspiring cooks, my mother and grandmother, surrounded by delicious food. 4PM FIX


Beat the afternoon slump with these date and almond balls and power on!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup (160 gms) medjool dates
- 1/2 cup (80 gms) almonds
- 2 tbsp cocoa powder
- 1 tsp cinnamon powder
- 1/4 tsp vanilla essence
- 1/4 tsp pink Himalayan salt
- 1 tbsp dessicated coconut for coating

METHOD


- 1. Chop the almonds into small, bite sized pieces.
- 2. Toast in a pre-heated oven at 180 degrees for 7-8 minutes until golden
- 3. Mash the dates using a potato masher.
- 4. Add the seasoning to the dates and combine well.
- 5. Finally, add the toasted almonds and divide the entire mixture into eight equal parts.
- Shape into smooth balls and roll them in desiccated coconut.
 Remember to share it with someone you love.

CRUNCHY QUINOA SNACK BOWL

INGREDIENTS For the Quinoa Bowl

Combine all the ingredients into a bowl and mix well and set aside.

- 60g quinoa, boiled and fried on slow heat for 15 mins
- 45g onions, chopped (approx. 2 tbsp)
- 30g tomato, chopped (approx. 2 tbsp)
- 5g bird's eye chilli, chopped (approx. 1 tsp)
- 10g coriander, chopped
- Salt, as per taste
- Crushed black pepper, as per taste
- 15ml lemon juice (approx. 1 tbsp)
- 1/2 avocado, diced and 1/2 sliced for garnish

For the coriander and mint chutney

Blend all the below ingredients together:

- 100g fresh coriander
- 50g fresh mint
- 2 green chilies
- 2 garlic cloves1/4 inch ginger
- 10ml lemon juice
- Salt to taste

For the yoghurt & mint chutney

Blend all the below ingredients together:


- 45g mint chutney (from the recipe above)
- 50g yogurt
- 5ml lemon juice (Approx. 1 tsp)
- 5g garlic, chopped
- Black salt, to taste

TO ASSEMBLE THE BOWL

- 1. Quinoa mixture
- 2. Avocado slices
- 3. Mint and yoghurt dip

RED SNAPPER HONEY CHILLI & TAMARI

Red snapper fish served with steamed Chinese cabbage, buckwheat, bak choy, coriander and red chillies in ginger soy dressing.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 fresh red chilli
- 1 cup broccoli
- 250 grams Chinese cabbage leaves
- 250 grams bak choy
- 1/2 cup edamame beans
- 200 grams red snapper fillet
- 2 tbsps tamari
- 2 tbsp coconut oil
- 1/2 cup carrot, julienne
- 1 clove
- 1/2 inch fresh ginger, grated
- 1 garlic pod
- 2 tbsp honey
- 1/2 cup buckwheat
- Chopped coriander leaves for garnish
- Lime, a squeeze or more (as you like)
- Salt, as per taste

METHOD

- 1. Preheat oven at 200 °C
- 2. Finely chop red chilli into thin slices
- 3. Place baking paper on the tray and place the vegetables; divide them and place the red snapper on top of the vegetables
- 4. On the side, bring water to boil in a small pot. Add buckwheat and salt. Return to a boil, then reduce heat to a simmer, cover and cook until tender for 10-15 minutes. Drain off any remaining water. Add to the tray of veggies.
- In a bowl, add the tamari, garlic, ginger, chopped chilli, coconut oil, honey and whisk it all together and drizzle over the fish platter.
- Place the tray in the oven and bake for about 15 minutes or until cooked as desired
- 7. Sprinkle some chilli and coriander leaves and squeeze some lime over it and enjoy.

Nutritionist and Fitness Trainer, Maya Pereira Sawant

Maya Pereira Sawant, the founder of Lean Kitchen by Maya, is a leading nutritionist and fitness trainer. With more than 15 years of expertise, she launched the above mentioned organic café in Bandra in 2017. Her sheer passion for healthy living saw her training clients when she was a teenager. Through various certified courses, Maya gained experience on the gym floor. As part of a certification course from ISSA (International Sports Sciences Association) in sports nutrition, she became interested in curating wholesome food. And the rest, as they say, is history.

AVOCADO CRAB SALAD

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 cup cab meat
- 1/4 cup Kewpie mayonnaise
- 1/4 teaspoon wasabi
- 2 avocados

METHOD

- Steam the whole crab (live crab: 250-350 gm) for about 20-25 minutes. Once cooked, allow it to cool down before picking the body meat.
- Only use the meat from the body of the crab (white meat) no legs and claws, to get a delicate crab texture and flavour for this salad.
- In a bowl, add the crab meat, mayonnaise, wasabi and mix till evenly combined. Set aside.
- Half the avocados lengthwise, remove the seed and fill the centres of the avocado with the crab filling.

SERVE

- · Serve cold.
- Freshly crush pepper on the crab salad at the table (optional).



Chef Akanksha Saigal

Chef Akanksha Saigal's inclination towards cooking began early. After pursuing two degrees, she worked with a marketing firm before realising her passion for food. She trained at Oberoi Group, and post several dabbles in hospitality, joined Gourmet Investments with Ministry of Crab, Asia's 30th best restaurant. Here, she learnt a new cuisine and underwent training at Ministry of Crab, Colombo. Celebrating seafood coincided with her vision of making produce-lead gourmet food.



RELIGIEUSE

INGREDIENTS For Craquelin

- Sugar 80 gms
- Butter 68 gms
- Flour 80 gms

METHOD

- Cream butter and sugar until combined
- 2. Add flour
- 3. Refrigerate, then roll to 1/4th inch thickness and cut into discs. Place it on the choux just before baking.

INGREDIENTS

For Pate a choux

- Water 125 gms
- Milk 125 gms
- Butter 112 gms
- Salt 5 gms
- Ap flour 238 gms
- Eggs 250 gms

METHOD

- 1. Bring the water, milk and butter to boil
- 2. Add flour and salt
- 3. Cook until there is thick layer at the bottom of the pan
- 4. Put in a stand mixer & paddle until slightly cool
- Start adding eggs little at a time.
 Add more if needed until it's a smooth dropping consistency.
- 6. Pipe around 2 inch circles
- 7. Add craquelin. Bake at 130c for 15 min, increase temp to 170c and bake until golden
- 8. Leave oven door open to dry out in the oven

INGREDIENTS

For Pastry cream

- Milk 450 gms
- Sugar 100 gms
- Butter 45 gms
- Salt pinch
- Cornstarch 45 gms
- Eggs 170 gms
- Vanilla extract 1 tsp

METHOD

- 1. Milk + 1/2 sugar bring to boil
- 2. Mix the cornstarch, remaining sugar and eggs in a separate bowl
- Temper the milk into the cornstarch mixture. Put it back on stove on low heat.
- 4. Cook for 3-4 mins after it comes to a boil
- 5. Whisk in butter one cube at a time.

INGREDIENTS

For Hazelnut praline

- Hazelnut 150 gms
- Sugar 100 gms
- Salt 1 gm

METHOD

- 1. Toast hazelnuts
- 2. Make dry caramel with the sugar and add hazelnuts
- 3. Once cool, blend until liquid

INGREDIENTS

For Soft caramel

- Fresh cream 140 gms
- Sugar 150 gms
- Glucose 60 gms
- Butter 80 gms
- Salt 1/2 tsp

METHOD

- 1. Boil cream and glucose and set aside
- 2. Make a caramel from the sugar
- 3. Pour boiled cream & butter. Blend.

TO ASSEMBLE

Fill the choux with some hazelnut praline and some salted caramel using a piping bag. Then fill the choux completely with pastry cream.



Chef Freny Fernandes

Alumni of The Culinary Institute of America, Freny Fernandes is the 25-year-old pastry chef and founder and owner of Monèr. Touted to be India's first dessert bar, this is a progressive dining experience and Freny is making it her business to curate every delicious plate of sweet goodness that comes our way. The chef painstakingly draws how each dish will look, before it is introduced to her discerning clientele. Freny could easily be mistaken for an artist, and we base this observation on her stunning Avantgarde plating skills. Master pastry chef, indeed!



MATCHA SMOOTHIE

INGREDIENTS

- 1 packet Matcha Latte Premix
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/2 large banana
- 1/2 cup seasonal fruit (mango/ avocado etc)
- 1 cup frozen spinach (optional)
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon matcha cashew butter
- Trail mix

If you aren't using the Matcha Latte premix, use 1 teaspoon of Matcha and 1/4 cup regular or plant-based milk (coconut milk, almond milk, etc.)

METHOD

- 1. Place all ingredients in a high powered blender. Pulse a few times to combine everything.
- Turn speed up to the highest setting and blend until completely combined and smooth. If the smoothie seems too thick, add some more water/ milk. Pour into your smoothie bowl and garnish with a dollop of matcha cashew butter, bananas, trail mix or chia seeds.
