

He and his wife Twinkle Khanna have also been procuring oxygen cylinders and sending them to the needy. He has also associated himself with the National Commission for Women's (NCW) initiative to help pregnant women amid the pandemic. Varun Dhawan has partnered with Mission Oxygen India, an initiative intended to procure oxygen concentrators and send it to hospitals in need across India. Farhan Akhtar and Ritesh Sidhwani's production company Excel Entertainment too have come forward and donated money to non-profit organizations like Hemkunt Foundation, Doctor For You, Mission Vayu, Rasoi On Wheels, Give India, Hope Welfare Trust, SBS Foundation, and Satyarth Socio.

Others are helping as well. Stars have a huge presence over the social media and celebs like Alia Bhatt and Bhumi Pednekar, for example, are aggressively using their social media handles to offer a list of verified COVID-19 resources daily. Stars are also re-posting messages from those in need of oxygen and other medical help, in the hope that someone from the vast majority of their followers might offer a solution. And actors are urging people to get vaccinated as early as possible.

Slowly, a resistance is being built.

A combined human effort that's cutting across political and religious lines. We're waking up to the fact that we're all together in this and it's our unity that will finally help us overcome this calamity. Reach out to those in need. Help in whatever way you can. Together, we will survive...


RANVEER SINGH TO STAR IN SHANKAR'S ANNIYAN REMAKE

Though she starred with Ranveer Singh in the former and with Ranveer and Shahid Kapoor in the latter, hers was the central figure in the film. She was reportedly paid more than her male co-stars in Padmaavat. Chhappak (2020), which was a biopic of sorts on the acid attack survivor Laxmi Agarwal, was a litmus test for her. As Queen Dee was attempting her first non-glamorous role. The film garnered 55.44 croes at the box-office. It might not be a 100 crore hit but still managed to earn a decent profit over and above its budget. Not to mention the critical acclaim.

Rab Ne Bana Di Jodi (2008), her debut She became an overnight star with the dance musical, which grossed 151.58 crores worldwide. With Band Baaja Baaraat (2010), she helped launch talent powerhouse Ranveer Singh. The movie, which was about two entrepreneurs falling in love, grossed 25.57 crores worldwide. PK (2014) the 25.57 crores worldwide. *PK* (2014) the alien encounter flick where she starred alongside Aamir Khan, was her biggest hit, with it grossing 769.89 crores worldwide. Anushka turned producer with *NH10* (2015). The gritty road movie had her playing an avenging angel and managed to haul 50.97 crores worldwide. *Phillauri* (2017), her next production, where she played a ghost, brought in 49.77 crores worldwide whereas *Pari* (2018) the out-and-out horror film (2018), the out-and-out horror film produced by her brought in 41.4 crores. The numbers indicate that the films recovered their budgets and made a tidy sum for the producer. Sultan (2016), where she played a wrestler alongside Salman Khan, grossed 614.49 worldwide and Sui Dhaaga (2018), the film and Sui Dhaaga (2018), the film promoting small businesses, where she had an equal role with Varun Dhawan, milked 125.09 crores worldwide.

Anushka extended her acumen as producer by producing the highly successful *Paatal Lok* for the OTT movie Bulbbul (2020).



(1997). She played a double role in her first film itself and held her own against Mohanlal. Thanks to her international fame, she had no difficulty in attracting big banners. Subhash Ghai's musical Taal (1999) had her playing a beautiful singer from the mountains who romances both Anil Kapoor and Akshaye Khanna. The film had a worldwide gross of 45.23 crores. Sanjay Leela Bhansali cast her as the daughter of a music guru in Hum Dil De Chuke Sanam (1999). Though Salman Khan and Ajay Devgn also starred in the film, she was central to the story. The film fetched a worldwide gross of 43.86 crores. Bhansali's *Devdas* (2002) had her starring with Shah Rukh Khan and Madhuri Dixit. She held her own in their film and was praised for her elegance and grace playing Paro. The film had a worldwide gross of 89.46 crores. *Dhoom 2* (2006) had her play a comphalicious super thief in the company of Hrithik Roshan. The caper film earned 149.98 crores gross worldwide and she certainly had a huge hand in the film garnering it. Guru (2007), reportedly based on Dhirubhai Ambani's life, had her playing the emotional anchor in the protagonist's life. The film wasn't about her but now one can't imagine it without her. It earned 83.07 crores worldwide gross. Jodhaa Akbar (2008), the fictional love story between emperor Akbar and his Rajput queen Jodhaa, directed by Ashutosh Gowariker, paired her with Hrithik again. She looked like a painting in the film and mesmerised the audience with her haunting beauty. She had an equal hand in earning its worldwide gross of 107.93 crores.



Taapsee Pannu already had a flourishing career down South when she was launched by David Dhawan in *Chashme Baddoor* (2013). The film earned 59.07 crores worldwide and was declared a hit. In *Pink* (2016), her role was of as much importance as Amitabh Bachchan. The film gave out the message that when a girl says no, she means no. The film grossed 104.26 crores worldwide. *Pink* was the turning point of her career, after which Taapsee consciously picked women-centric roles. *Naam Shabana* (2017) was a prequel of sorts to *Baby* (2015) and told the story of how a docile girl came to be a secret agent. The action thriller fetched 57.56 crore worldwide, quite a sum for a female-centric action film. *Mulk* (2018) was a hard-hitting film about the citizenship rights of Muslims and earned 29.9 crores worldwide despite its sensitive subject and with a female lead. Her performance won plaudits throughout. *Badla* (2019), the twisted thriller where she played a cold-blooded vamp and pitted her wits opposite Amitabh Bachchan, fetched a neat 138.49 crores gross worldwide. It's her most profitable film in recent times. *Thappad* (2020) raised its voice against domestic abuse, something we all turned a blind eye to. It managed to earn 44.54 crores worldwide, before the pandemic and the lockdown cut its run short.



The sequel to the cult classic *Aashiqui* (1990), the musical proved to be a bumper hit, garnering 109 crores gross worldwide. In *Ek Villain* (2014), the gritty psychological drama, she had a small but important role. The film earned 169.62 crores worldwide. *Baaghi* (2016), where her role demanded her to kick and punch in the company of Tiger Shroff earned 125.92 crores worldwide. Her biggest box-office draw has been *Stree* (2018). She played an important role in the film, on par with that of Rajkummar Rao and helped the film earn 180.76 crores gross worldwide. *Chhichhore* (2019), where she played both younger and older versions of herself was another important film. Though she wasn't the central character, yet she played an important role. This campus dramedy garnered 215.41 crores worldwide.



Katrina Kaif started her career with the forgotten *Boom* (2003). She bounced Namastey London (2007), Partner (2007), Welcome (2007), Singh is Kinng (2008) and many more. Though she may not have in them. Not that she lacks acting chops. Her stints in Rajneeti (2010), Zindagi Na Milegi Dobara (2011), Ek Tha Tiger (2012) proved that in spades. Filmmakers consider her a safer on to add to a male star's box-office pull and make 100 crores a certainly. Humongous hits like Dhoom 3 (2013) which grossed 556.74 crore worldwide, Bang Bang (2014), which earned 332.43 worldwide gross, *Tiger Zinda Hai* (2017), which grossed 564.2 crores worldwide and *Bharat* (2019), grossing 325.48 crores worldwide have made her into boxoffice gold.

Vidva Balan has the rare honour of starting her Bollywood career with a women-centric film. Parineeta (2005) was based on an eponymous novel by Sarat Chandra Chattopadhyay. The film starred Sanjay Dutt and Saif Ali Khan besides her but the film revolved around her mostly. It earned a worldwide gross of 31.86 crores, which was a huge sum at that time. Her debut set a pattern for Vidya and she mostly accepted films where her role was central to the story. Bhool Bhulaiyaa (2007), for instance, had her playing an over imaginative woman who starts living a dual life. Though Akshay Kumar had the central role, the film wouldn't have worked without her. The film grossed 82.35 crores worldwide. In Paa (2009), she played a single mother to a son suffering from Progeria. Amitabh son suffering from Progeria. Amiliann Bachchan played her son. It was as much her film as Amitabh's and went on to gross 45.15 crores worldwide despite its highly unusual subject. *The Dirty Picture* (2012), some say, is her most definite film. Not only did she play a character based on sultry siren Silk Smitha, she managed to give it a respectability that real life Silk desperately craved. The film grossed 117 crores at the box-office. Likewise, Kahaani, released the same year, is a whodunit you can't imagine without her. The film grossed 80.43 crores. She was the soul of the multistarrer Mission Mangal (2019) as well. The film, which fictionalised the story of India's unmanned mission to Mars, grossed 290.59 crores worldwide.

DEVESH SHARMA PROVIDES A BIRD'S EYE VIEW OF ALL THAT HAPPENED AT THE **JOY FILMFARE AWARDS BANGLA 2020**

ll eyes were on Westin Rajarhat as it was the venue for the Joy Filmfare Awards Bangla 2020. We had just completed our Bollywood Awards three days ago and rushed to Kolkata for this event. It was as exhilarating, exciting and frightening as going down the Niagara Falls in a barrel. At the end of the day, seeing the smiles on the faces of the winners and the nominees, the mad ride seemed worth it.

Our Lifetime Achievement Award is always the most prestigious award of our events and this time it went to not one but two stalwarts of the Bengali film industry. It was awarded posthumously to **Soumitra Chatterjee**, who passed away in November last year. Soumitra was closely associated with **Satyajit Ray** and acted in several of Ray's immortal films, starting from *Apur Sansar* (1959) to *Ganashatru* (1989). He worked with other filmmakers too, from **Mrinal Sen** to **Atanu Ghosh** in his long career. It was Ghosh who came up on the stage to give the commemorative speech for Soumitra as the

award was announced and said while it pains him deeply that the thespian isn't there to collect the trophy in person, it gives him great pleasure to present it and collect it. Ghosh went on to win the award for the Best Film (Critics') for *Robibaar* and his day was made doubly sweet.

rolific filmmaker **Tarun Majumdar** was our other LTA winner. He's 90 but his energy puts people half his age to shame. The filmmaking giant, who started his journey in the 60s with films like *Kancher Swarga* (1962) and *Alor Pipasa* (1965) is still active in the field, with *Bhalobashar Bari* (2018) being his last release. He was felicitated by filmmakers like **Arindam Sil, Srijit Mukherji, Kaushik Ganguly** and **Indraadip Das Gupta**. The whole gathering rose as one when his award was announced. It speaks of the love and respect he shares amongst the Bengali film fraternity.

Prosenjit is an actor who has excelled in everything he has done in his career. Bumba da, as he's popularly known, said he was hesitant when the makers came to him to make a film on Subhash Chandra Bose as a single misstep would be sacrilegious to the memory of the National icon. He said yes reluctantly and was dreading the reception to the film. He

needn't have worried as not only the critics but the masses took hugely to Gumnaami and he took home the Best Actor In A Leading Role (Male) trophy for the same. The Best Actor In A Leading Role (Female) was a tie. It was shared by Swastika Mukherjee (Shah Iahan Regency) and Subhashree Ganguly (Parineeta). Subashree, who became a mother six months ago, still retained the new mommy glow. She said she was glad about getting the award as the competition was ever so tough this time around. She was happy sharing it with Swastika, someone whom she admires. Swastika unfortunately couldn't make it to the event but later sent a heartfelt message to us. Java Ahsan won the Best Actress (Critics') award for her roles in Bijoya and Robibaar, two roles that were vastly different from each other. The Best Actor In A Leading Role (Female) was a surprise. It was a tie between Subhashree Ganguly (*Parineeta*) and Swastika Mukherjee (*Shah Jahan Regency*). The industry folks were delighted to see our LTA winner, noted director Tarun Majumdar cutting a sprightly figure at 90. The other LTA went to the late Soumitra Chatterjee. Prosenjit Chatterjee too expectedly won the Best Actor In A Leading Role (Male) for his superlative performance as Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose in *Gumnaami*. LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

SOUMITRA CHATTERJEE

Soumitra Chatterjee was born in Sealdah, West Bengal on January 19, 1935. His claim to fame lies in his long and fruitful association with Satyajit Ray. The duo worked in some 14 films together. He had the honour of making his debut in the third part of Ray's most famous work -- The Apu Trilogy. In Apur Sansar (1959), he played a young writer dealing with the travails of a newly-wedded life.

His sensitive performance won him accolades and admirers worldwide. Soumitra also brought to life that masterful creation of Ray, the detective Feluda. Ray's stories revolving around the adventures of this Indian Sherlock Holmes were a rage and Soumitra captured the nuances brilliantly in films like Sonar Kella (1974) and Joi Baba Felunath (1979). His other notable films with Ray include Devi (1960), Teen Kanya (1961) and Charulata (1964). He didn't just restrict himself to his mentor but also worked with other notable directors of Bengali cinema. One remembers him for the natural ease he displayed in Mrinal Sen's Akash Kusum (1965) or in Tapan Sinha's Jhinder Bandi (1961), an adaptation of The Prisoner Of Zenda, where he incidentally played a villain opposite Uttam Kumar, Entering the 1980s and the 1990s, he started working with contemporary directors, like Goutam Ghose, Aparna Sen, Anjan Das and Rituparno Ghosh and even acted in television. In 1986, he played the role of a swimming coach in the film Kony (1986) directed by Saroj Dey, a role that came to be much admired by all.

Soumitra didn't lose his command over acting to age. His famous films during his latter years include Rituparno Ghosh's Asukh (1999), Florian Gallenberger's Shadows Of Time (2004), Pratim D. Gupta's Paanch Adhyay (2012) Srijit Mukherji's Hemlock Society (2012), Atanu Ghosh's Rupkatha Noy (2013), Goutam Ghose's Shunyo Awnko (2013) and Bela Seshe (2015), and Posto (2017), both directed by Nandita Roy and Shiboprosad Mukherjee, and Mayurakshi (2017) directed by Atanu Ghosh. The thespian passed away on November 15, 2020. He was bestowed the honour posthumously.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

TARUN MAJUMDAR

Hindi viewers may know him through Balika Badhu (1976), starring Sachin Pilgaonkar and Rajni Sharma. It was a reworking of his own 1967 Bengali film of the same name, starring Moushumi Chatterjee. His early films were credited to Yatrik, which was the screen name of the trio directors Tarun Majumdar, Sachin Mukherji, and Dilip Mukherji until 1963, after which each began to be credited separately. As Yatrik, their first venture was Chaowa Paowa (1959) starring Uttam Kumar and Suchitra Sen.

In 1965, he made two films: Ektuku Basha with Soumitra Chatterjee and Alor Pipasha with Basanta Choudhury. The films featured Sandhya Roy, a popular actress whom he married later. After that he never looked back and was known for his plethora of commercially successful films. He has worked with everyone from Uttam Kumar, Suchitra Sen, Soumitra Chatterjee, Sandhya Roy to Tapas Paul, Prosenjit Chatterjee, Debashree Roy and Rituparna Sengupta.

The 90-year-old filmmaker, who's helped shape the career of so many stalwarts of Bengali cinema, was the recipient of our second Lifetime Achievement Award this year. Despite his advanced age, he was still sharp as a pin in both mind and body. The entire gathering rose as one when he came on stage and the moment became a golden memory.



REMEMBERING SHRAVAN RATHOD

MUSIC COMPOSER SHRAVAN RATHOD PASSED AWAY RECENTLY DUE TO COVID-19. **DEVESH SHARMA OFFERS A SHORT PROFILE OF HIS LIFE AND TIMES...**


(NOVEMBER 13, 1954-APRIL 22, 2021)

hravan Rathod of the iconic composer duo Nadeem-Shravan died battling COVID-19 at a Mumbai hospital on April 22. He was 66. The news of Shravan Rathod's death was confirmed by his son, musician Sanieev Rathod. "He passed away around 10:15 p.m. tonight. Please pray for his soul," the grieving son was quoted as saying. Shravan reportedly had attended the Kumbh Mela and tested positive for COVID-19 after returning from the pilgrimage. He was admitted to Mumbai's SL Raheja Hospital three days before his death as his lungs had been

infected due to the disease. Shrayan also reportedly developed heart complications and was on ventilator for the last few days. His wife and Sanjeev too had contracted the disease and were admitted to the Seven Hills Hospital, Andheri. Sanjeev and younger brother Darshan Sanjeev-Darshan. Shravan Rathod was 13. 1954. He is the elder brother of the playback singers and Vinod Rathod. was a celebrated



The film contains one of the finest renditions in Bhojpuri by Asha Bhosle, More hothwa se nathuniya gulel karela. They were lucky to get Manna Dev, who sang the evergreen Bhojpuri song Kashi hile Mathura hile for the film and Mohammed Rafi, who sang the duet Phoot gayi kismativa along with Asha, in their debut film. They continued to make music in the '80s, where their prominent films were *Ilaaka*. Hisaab Khoon Ka and Lashkar. After sixteen years of struggle, they were yet to make their mark, however. At that point of time, they reportedly decided to get into the business of readymade clothes. And even came up with a brand name, Composers Collection. The turning point came with Baap Numbari Beta Dus Numbari (1989). The songs were liked by Anuradha Paudwal,

who introduced them to Gulshan Kumar of T Series fame. Gulshan too loved what they had composed and said he'd like to bring out a private album with them. Later. when Mahesh Bhatt heard the songs, he requested Gulshan Kumar to give him the songs for his new film Aashiqui (1990). They were reportedly paid 15 thousand rupees as fees for the film. Aashiqui's music became superhit. It's said to have sold the highest number of cassettes for T Series till date. The film, which starred rank newcomers Anu Aggarwal and Rahul Roy, did well just on the humongous popularity of its music. They became stars overnight and after that never looked back. They did some 154 films together as music directors, from 1990 to 2005.

Their next film, Saajan (1991) was supposed to have music by Laxmikant-

Pyarelal. Due to some reason, L-P parted ways with director Lawrence D'Souza. Nadeem-Shravan were approached to give the music and they did it only after seeking the blessings of L-P. Saajan's music too was a tremendous hit. They became the most sought after music directors after that, giving a long line of hits like Dil Hai Ke Maanta Nahin. Phool Aur Kaante and Sadak in 1991 itself. They won Filmfare trophies back to back for films like Aashiqui (1990),














Saajan (1991), Deewana (1992). Their fourth Filmfare was won for Raja Hindustani (1996).

l hev were known for their folk and sem-classical tunes and even gave a modern touch to the ghazal. Inspired by SD Burman, they were known for incorporating Indian instruments like bansuri, sitar and shehnai in the tunes they composed. Later, they took to the violin as well and made ample use of it. Melody formed the basis of their creations and their songs, even today are known for it. Kumar Sanu, Udit Naravan, Anuradha Paudwal and Alka Yagnik were said to be the mainstay of their career. Another constant was lyricist Sameer, who was with them since their salad days

and wrote around 1000 songs for them. In August 1997, Gulshan Kumar was shot dead by some gangsters. Nadeem, was named as one of the masterminds behind the conspiracy. Nadeem fled to London and later took on the British citizenship. Their rift with T series began from there on and couldn't be patched. Their partnership continued however and they gave hits like Dhadkan (2000), Ek Rishta: The Bond Of Love (2001), Raaz (2002), Andaaz (2003) before splitting after *Dosti*: Friends Forever (2005). Though they did comeback to make music for Do Knot Disturb (2009). Nadeem wanted to do a world tour with Shravan, carrying their music to newer fans worldwide but COVID-19 snatched that dream away...

BOOKED FOR LIFE

KABIR BEDI HAS JUST COME OUT WITH A BOOK ON HIS LIFE CALLED *STORIES I MUST TELL.* HE DISCUSSES THE AUTOBIOGRAPHY AND HIS REASONS FOR SHARING HIS STORIES WITH **DEVESH SHARMA**



He's India's most-famous export to the Western cinema. Much before Om Puri, Irrfan Khan or Priyanka Chopra burst onto the international acting scene, there was Kabir Bedi, paving the way for others. He lived in America for more than two decades, carving a niche for himself doing series like *The Bold And The Beautiful* and multi-starrers like *Ashanti*, where he rubbed shoulders with the likes of Miachel Caine and Omar Sharif. His most famous role abroad was that of *Sandokan*. The Italian series made him a household name across Europe. He's considered an icon in Italy. They've bestowed him with the title of Cavaliere (Knight) of the Order of Merit of the Italian Republic, their highest civilian honour. Kabir has been romantically involved with a bevy of beauties and remained friends with them all, despite the break-ups. He remains a romantic at heart, having found the perfect life partner in current wife Parveen Dusanjh, despite the 30-year difference in their ages. Presenting excerpts from a candid interview with the man who has been a journalist, model, adman, actor and writer in his rich, varied life.

In the initial parts of your autobiography, Stories I Must Tell, you sound like someone in their twenties and then there is a certain maturity in the later parts. It's like time travel of sorts. It's time travel for me because I had to go back to that moment in time and focus on it. Relive it, to bring out all its nuances.

I've written things out like a scene because I remember scenes very well. The idea was to take the reader back with me and let him feel the emotional pulse of the moment.

You've mentioned you're a direct descendant of Guru Nanak. Is that a historical fact?









The Bedis are said to be the direct descendants of Guru Nanak. The Bedis of Dera Baba Nanak are certainly his descendants and I presume there are others too.

You became a Buddhist monk for one year in Rangoon while you were young. You had your hair shorn, lived on alms...what was the experience like?

I was taught Vipassana by Mahasi Sayadaw. He's the one who taught Goenka ji. Learning Vipassana at that age was life altering. It was a way of becoming much more aware of yourself, of your surroundings. It tells you how your thoughts run you and how to calm your thoughts and look



into the spaces in between to find your real essence. It instilled a belief that you need to be compassionate towards other beings on this planet, who are suffering and who are less fortunate than you.

Do you agree with the Buddhist philosophy that life is suffering?

The Buddha was a far wiser man than me. Obviously there is an enormous amount of suffering in life. My belief is that anything I believe in, I bring into reality. And therefore, I didn't want to believe that life is suffering. While I've the greatest respect for Buddhism, for its emphasis on meditation, on compassion towards all, the sheer wisdom of the Buddha, I didn't become a Buddhist because to do so I'd have to make suffering the centre of my belief. And I didn't want to do that.


Your tremendous popularity in Europe somehow didn't translate into stardom in Bollywood.

What happened in Italy, in Europe was phenomenal. I didn't come back to India after that. I went to Hollywood and spent 25 years of my life outside India. Bollywood is where

I began. It gave me a name which led to the Italians discovering me. Then, Bollywood also came back into my life through films like Khoon Bhari Maang in the '90s, which proved to be the second lease of life. I went back to America after that to do The Bold And The Beautiful, which again gave me fans around the world. It was watched by 350 million people in a day. Bollywood has been in and out of my life. I never wanted to live my whole life abroad. My last big role in Bollywood was in Mohenjodaro, the Hrithik Roshan starrer, where I played the emperor. And Bollywood can still offer me wonderful roles. The journey isn't over.

The film industry is said to be a place where you're supposed to have great people skills but you've



described yourself as being shy and introverted.

That's one of the problems I had in fact. Networking, hanging out with people, constantly creating little social circles, that's how Bollywood conducts its business. I should have been more skilful, I should have been more outgoing as the lack of it has certainly affected me. I'm who I'm and at heart I'm a shy person.

You started off by working for All India Radio. Interviewing The Beatles for them was one of your first assignments but that recording doesn't exist any more. I've tried hard to get that recording. We're talking about the mid-'60s here and very few people had a tape-recorder at the time. Those days, the









radio guys used to reuse the tapes to save money and my interview with The Beatles unfortunately was taped over. I was so angry, so disgusted with that, that I decided to quit the organisation and do something else. So I guess I have to thank that faux pas for my acting career.

formative years seem to be a list of who's who from Delhi elite. Some of the people who are big today were with me at St Stephens in Delhi. Then, I've also written about my friendship with Rajiv and Sanjay Gandhi. They helped shape India's destiny in years to come but back then we were just a bunch of kids playing

gaze of Indu aunty. And having the Prime Minister Of India, Jawaharlal Nehru, play with us, leaving aside the worries of his office for a while. After many years, when I went back to the Teen Murti House, it didn't seem as big as it did during my childhood.

Your father, Baba Pyare Lal Singh Bedi and mother, Freda Bedi, were involved in India's freedom struggle. Your mom was English and yet she fought against the British...

She was a remarkable woman who led a very idealistic life. She didn't like colonialism. She didn't like the fact that one nation was ruling over another. Coming from Oxford, where they met, they could have got the best jobs in Indian Civil Service but

they sacrificed all that to fight for India's freedom.

Your parents had a very unconventional marriage. Did that influence you later in life as you went on to have many unconventional relationships yourself?


Their example led me to believe that you can live life on your own terms and you don't have to necessarily follow the tried and the tested route. You can still thrive, still make a success of your life. He became a spiritual guru in Italy. She became a Buddhist monk. They

lived across continents but were always there for each other when needed and remained friends throughout.

When your father first met Protima, he predicted she'd be a dancer...

He had the gift of psychic foresight. He has a vision of the Universe where everything was connected, from the smallest rock to the distant suns. What he found was that there weren't enough people in India who wanted him to talk about those things. They saw him more as

a *jyotishi* (astrologer). In Italy he found whole communities of people wanting to discuss his vision, that's why he moved to Italy for the last 20 years of his life. He got to Italy four years before I did. It's not as if he moved there because I became *Sandokan*.

You had a spiritual experience while you were in Israel.

Yes.Spirits awoke me and I saw a vision of Jerusalem that Christ must have seen 2000 years ago. It was a very moving, very humbling experience.

You've been quite candid about all your relationships, be it with Protima Gupta, Parveen Babi, Susan Humphreys, Nikki Moolgaoker or Parveen Dusanjh... I've only written about my known relationships. There's no secret about them. People just see the outside of it. That I moved from one beautiful woman to another. I've described

what actually happened in great emotional terms.

Putting it all out on paper, did it offer you a sense of closure, a sense of completion?

In one sense, yes. It was cathartic. It was revelatory. I looked at everything with the hindsight born of age and was better able to relate to the person I was

then, the people they were then. By going back I made my peace with it.

You've said in the book that Parveen Babi was already married to a Pakistani citizen and hence couldn't marry you...

I've said that yes and in my own way proved that it's true. Parveen told me she was already married and hence couldn't marry me and I accepted it as being a part of our unusual relationship. Details are there in the book. Let the people discover them when they read it.

The pain with which you've written about your son Siddharth's death is palpable. What made you share such a traumatic chapter from your life?

I chose to share the story of my son's battle with schizophrenia because I wanted people to understand more about it. It's not just the person going through it who suffers. The tragedy affects his entire family as well. I want to remove the stigma that is attached to mental illness. These conditions are treatable. Many are manageable. Many have led productive lives even after that. I shared everything I could in the hope that I'll help those who are afflicted by it and those who care for the afflicted.




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100 YEARS of SATYAJIT RAY


atyajit Ray would have turned 100 on May 2 had he lived. India's finest filmmaker was born on May 2, 1921. It's ironic that today, foreigners know him more than Indians do. His films are taught in film schools the world over and shown across festivals but he remains largely unknown to the Indian masses. He's an icon in his native Bengal and every filmmaker worth his salt swears by his name. Intellectuals write about him with much gravitas. And 'serious' cinegoers try to find new meaning to The Apu Trilogy. Most don't go beyond that, figuring the three films are enough to understand his brand of cinema, ignoring the vast canon he left behind.

One reason for this lack of knowledge about his masterful works among the large Indian populace is that he by and large shunned Hindi cinema. preferring to work with Bengali actors all his life. The only exception was the Hindi film Shatrani Ke Khilari (1977), an adaptation of Munshi Premchand's short story of the same name. It starred Sanjeev Kumar, Saeed Jaffrey, Amjad Khan, Shabana Azmi, Farooque Shaikh, Farida Jalal, David Abraham, and Tom Alter. It was a story about the decline of Indian royalty,











as the British took a firmer control of the Indian subcontinent. Amitabh Bachchan narrated the film. But barring that, he stayed away from Hindi stars. One can only speculate what he could have done with Dilip Kumar or Balraj Sahni, to cite two obvious examples.

He might not have contributed much to Hindi cinema directly but indirectly, his influence can't be denied. Much of the neo-realistic cinema that flourished in the '70s and the '80s has been shaped by Ray's works. The films of Shyam Benegal, Mani Kaul, Sai Paranjpye or even Govind Nihalani can be said to be indirectly influenced

by what Ray was trying to do in his own cinema. Unlike other realistic filmmakers, who tried to portray the struggles of the Indian middle-class through stories born out of newspaper clippings, Ray also delved into literature as his source material. His influences include writers such as Sankar (Jana Aranya and Seemabaddha), Bibhutibhushan Bandyopadhyay (Pather Panchali, Aparajito), Tagore (Charulata, Ghare Bhaire) and even Henrik Ibsen (Ganashatru), Ray married literature with contemporary themes and what came out was sheer poetry.

He wasn't just a filmmaker but a consummate writer and painter as well. It's said that he used to storyboard each frame of his films, even color-coding the costumes worn by the actors to the surroundings, adding an overall singularity to his films. And he's the masterful creator to India's answer to Sherlock Holmes -- Feluda. Feluda stories written by Ray are classics of detective fiction and offer a veritable delight to the readers. On his birth centenary, we certainly need to go back to his films, to his writings, as they're postcards to both the past and the future.

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
