Katrina Kaif and Alia Bhatt, for instance, both made substantial investments in a beauty brand. When the brand decided to come out with an initial public offering, their asset valuation jumped tenfold.

Deepika Padukone has invested in a set of startups ranging from those providing rental furniture to yoghurt to aerospace engineering solutions. That she's invested in such a diverse portfolio shows her keen business acumen. Aishwarya Rai Bachchan, Shraddha Kapoor, and Sara Ali Khan too have become angel investors. Priyanka Chopra has also invested in everything from edtech to real estate and also runs a profitable restaurant in New York, which has become the talk of the town. Anushka Sharma, till very recently, was a hands-on producer who produced quality products. But now she has handed the reins completely over to her brother Karnesh as she wants to concentrate more on her acting career, as well as mommy duties. She runs a successful clothing brand, and so does Sonam Kapoor, who has also invested in a gaming startup.

One should note that these ladies have taken more risks in investing than their male counterparts. Given the way they're going, it won't be long before they rule the film business as well. She was asked to audition for another character in *Kaun Banegi Shikharwati*, but she very much wanted to play Uma's character. She was initially told the spot was locked, but later the makers

told her it had opened up again. "I remember I was in Delhi and took an early morning flight and tested for it before anyone else could reach there," she reveals. She had grown up watching Naseeruddin Shah and was glad she could share screen space with him, as well as with Lara Dutta, Soha Ali Khan, and Kritika Kamra. "Lara is someone whose aura I have always been in awe of. Soha, she's so witty and so sarcastic. I love it. Kritika is also smart. We got on well and we also had Naseer sir and Raghubir (Yadav) sir who could sit and talk to you and tell you so many stories,"she gushes.





If you dress good, you look good and you feel good - how much do you agree with that statement? The importance of


appearance depends on an individual's style. Internally, it's the person's



and their mother is privy to the fact that Alia wedded Ranbir in Bandra on April 14 this year. Breaking from Bollywood tradition, the wedding was a simple and intimate affair. It created a lot of media hype, to say the least, for three days and we still see ourselves reminiscing over it.

But we aren't here to tak about her dream wedding, Instead we're decoding her other dream, -- that of working with Sanjay Leela Bhansali. She's completed a decade in Bollywood and her dream of working with SLB finally came true with Gangubai Kathiawadi. It's a dream that she had since she was nine years old when she

went to audition for a role in Black. "Yeh heroine hai. veh child actor nahi, veh toh heroine hai," Bhansali had said about her then. 20 years later, she's playing the titular role in a Bhansali film. It's said that her performance in the song Dholida from Gangubai Kathiawadi gave him goosebumps. "When she danced

in *Dholida*, I thought there was an actor who'd finally transcended. It's a very gooseflesh moment for me to even talk about it and think about it - that you transcend where you are, you forget all space, you forget where you are, you forget who's in front of you, cameras, what you look like, what you feel. She just became one with that character and expressed all her angst and all that she had gone through in that one song. It's a song that I will take to my grave. If there is any shot that I want to be played when I breathe my last - it would be Alia doing that shot because it is completely the best

thing that I have seen an actor do in a very, very long time," SLB said during a press conference at the Berlinale.

hat's high praise indeed coming from SLB. Many would say that Alia wasn't the obvious casting choice for Bhansali to play Gangubai, the feared and revered madame of Kamathipura. But SLB saw something in her and only had Alia in mind for the role.

It took her a while to start seeing herself as Gangubai. "It takes about a week sometimes, sometimes two days, sometimes one schedule for you



to start being one with the character. We started with this section where she had not become Gangubai, she was iust Gangu. There is a whole transition to her age and everything. Initially there was still a lot of pull and push with the character and the voice and the sound and this and that. I remember there was a scene where I think Sir (Sanjay Leela Bhansali) was happy and I could tell that okay, that was the first time he was happy and felt I have started to understand the character now."

ut becoming Gangubai wasn't easy. Bhansali wanted the dialogues to be hard-hitting but Alia's eyes to be vulnerable. He wanted the pain to reflect in her eyes but the swagger to be

visible in her body language. Alia admits that she found this dichotomy and contrast to be difficult. "There's a scene where Gangubai speaks in front of so many people in Azad Maidan. It's one of the biggest highlights of the film as it tells vou about all the work that she did for the women because that got her recognition. It was very important to get that scene right. I could feel a tingling sensation in my body after some takes while doing the scene. I used to shake and shiver because it was quite hardhitting and intense and very truthful." Her eyes sparkle as she recalls shooting those sequences.

She's used to living in constant media spotlight and Alia says she's now become better at blocking it out. "I've



ut she'd be lying if she said that she isn't affected at times. Despite showcasing her acting chops in films like *Highway*, Raazi, Dear Zindagi and Gully Boy, she is still dogged by allegations of nepotism and having gotten everything on a platter. "I just don't understand when people assume that. It really unsettles me to think that people think that anything that is achieved happens by fluke. It all happens with hard work. You can rob people of praise but you can't deny them the hard work that they put in," she points out. One wonders how much weight those dainty shoulders have shouldered in these past 10 years.

The subject moves to social media. Unlike most celebrities, who are tight-lipped about



their love life, she has been very open about her feelings for Ranbir Kapoor and that seems to have rubbed off on the media-shy Kapoor scion as well. "I am putting up a picture that I want to put up. I am not doing it because I feel 'ki mere followers badh jayenge' and all. So, if I put up a picture, whatever picture it may be, I am doing it because of what I'm feeling at that moment, and that's it, there's no other

explanation for it. The other side to it is the pressure of having this perfect life because like I said everybody has bad days and you have to start speaking about the fact that it's normal to have a bad day. You can't always look Insta ready," she reflects.

Darlings, her first production venture is going straight to OTT and Alia is happy about that. "It is a film that I believe will do well on an OTT platform, it's that kind of narrative and that kind of story. We have got this stellar cast comprising Shefali Shah, Vijay Varma, Roshan Mathew and me and I am quite excited to be part of this new journey," she comments."

She'll also be seen in Jee Le Zara in the august company of Priyanka Chopra Jonas and Katrina Kaif. She's excited about the project and says it was Priyanka

who set the ball rolling on getting them all together. "PC and I have been friends for quite a few years and so have PC and Kat and Kat and me. So, we iust kind of all came together on this and said 'yaa, let's do this' and let me tell you it was not easy. It took many, many zoom calls. Just imagine three of us getting our schedules together? It worked out really well in the end and we can't wait to start."





Samantha, what were you thinking when you were approached for *The Family Man 2?*

When The Family Man 2 came to me I had been looking for a challenging role for over two years. Female actors don't get too many characters that allow them to explore different dimensions. They always get unidimensional characters, which can be pretty frustrating. So when this role was offered to me it was a chance to explore a new facet which was not familiar to me. The actor in me couldn't resist the challenge.

You have done the entire gamut in the South

whether it's *Mahanati* or *Super Deluxe*. What are the challenges you look for as an actor?

I always want to explore unfamiliar emotions. Otherwise you tend to get typecast with the same familiar characters, and your performances start getting boring and repetitive. You can't really do much when you constantly get roles that explore the same emotional space with the same cute bubbly persona. It's important to break free from that and choose your roles. I know it's definitely a risk when the audiences love you for something. But sometimes the risk pays off, like The Family Man did for me.



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While being a popular actor and star you haven't stuck to the song and dance routine. How do you manage an item song in *Pushpa* and a *Family Man*?

An item song is also extremely challenging. Things like getting the steps right, the right rhythm and being energetic throughout even if you are dead tired. On the other hand, playing Raji in The Family Man 2 had its own challenges. Her character seemed strong but she was vulnerable inside. I have seen life and know the kind of brutality women suffer. According to me her character was loosely based on real people.

I could feel her anger, her pain and the injustices she and her people faced. So my emotions were true and honest. Honestly, it was very traumatic for me to play Raji.

You said 'vulnerable', was it because you were playing the baddie and that the audience sympathy would not be with you?

I believe that in contemporary cinema the villains are hijacking the audience. The loker from *Batman* is a good example. The baddies are real, not stupid and they don't mouth some ridiculous dialogues. They are lavered characters and could be any of us. Like we all go through similar feelings of rage and pain. Some people can control that pain and rage but some people can't and they express it through different actions. It's just that we don't pick up a gun and shoot people but I think we must have thought of it several times. I cannot justify the path she took but I don't think Raji was the bad guy.

You have been pretty vocal about body and fat shaming. You run an NGO of your own and also run an organisation. When did you decide that you will not just be a pretty face but also do things that will make a difference.

I have gone through my own struggles. I came from nothing and found it very difficult to believe that people would love me so much after my first film. I could not process that love. So I had a

lot of insecurities and always felt that I was not good enough. My own personal struggle has been long and difficult. I felt I should speak about it and let the other girls know that we all go through our struggles. No one is spared. Some choose to speak about it and some don't. But I like to share it and have always vocalised it. If that helps someone else to make their journey a little less difficult then I shall be extremely happy. I wish someone had helped me during my struggle.

Can you articulate those struggles? Many people struggle with body issues and self esteem, always wanting approval and validation. What would be your advice to them?

People think that if you

are successful, have superhit films and millions love you, you feel like a million bucks all the time. But it's not true. I came from very humble beginnings and

like I said I saw success immediately with my first film. It would be like 'hev she has hit the jackpot. She must be feeling so happy'. But it wasn't like that. I felt I didn't deserve all this adulation. I didn't look like any of the other girls and didn't deserve all the big projects I was offered. But today I have stopped fighting that feeling. The feeling comes, I accept it, and it goes away. So I would tell girls it's okay if they are having a bad day. They should vocalise it and understand it. As soon as they accept what they are going through, half the battle is won. It's when they don't want to accept it that the problem begins. And fighting it is a never ending battle. I thought with my separation I would crumble and die. I never thought I could be this strong. I think most people are strong. It's just that they don't give themselves enough credit. Today I am very, very proud of how strong I am.



There was a backlash on social media and everybody had their own opinions on everything. How easy is it for an actor after a stressful day to read good and bad things. What would your advice be to your fans on social media?

Like I told you I like to share, so I have invited all my followers into my personal life. It's a decision that I made. So when they get involved in my life they have a say in whatever I do. I don't feel that everyone on social media needs to love me and whatever I do and accept all my decisions and my choices. I believe that we live in a time where everyone should have their opinion and still be able to live amicably. So I don't have any problem with social media. I do have a problem with YouTube and other channels who go to any length for that clickbait. And unfortunately for me they were using their platforms to fire over my shoulder everything that they

disagreed with, and felt about women who didn't conform to their thinking. It got very dirty in that sense. I wouldn't say that it was my social media that was the problem but people looking for those clickbaits.

I was so nervous when I went to audition for the part because he had directed Maggie Smith in Downton Abbey! But it turned out to be such an amazing experience. Yes Downton Abbey is right up there and I love Bridgerton too. Then there was Modern Love.

You are playing a strong bisexual in Arrangements Of Love. Have you worked closely with the LGBT community?

I haven't started work on the project but when we do, we definitely intend to. I would like to get all the smallest details right.

You went to some spiritual places where you did some spiritual cleansing. What was that journey like?

I've always wanted to go to the Himalayas ever since I read the Mahabharata. And my journey happened at the point when I really needed it. Everything was put together within a week. I found the right people to go with on this Char Dham. It was so beautiful and it feels like I just went yesterday. What you feel is so strong. JITESH PILLAAI CHATS WITH NAWAZUDDIN SIDDIQUI.

WHO HAS MADE A HABIT OF GIVING HIS UNIQUE

TOUCH TO ALL HIS ROLES



awazuddin Siddiqui is the kind of actor who grows on you. He peels off layer after layer of his character, and you sit mesmerised, marvelling at his virtuosity. In person, he can go from being this intense student of cinema to being a raconteur who can regale you with stories for hours. It's not easy to pigeonhole him into one single slot. He can play a killer, a bumpkin, a gangster, a poet, and a common man with equal measure. And he makes sure you root for him even when he's evil personified. He's become Mr. Dependable for filmmakers. They cast him with the blind assurance that he'd surely come through. And he does so every time. He doesn't follow trends but goes where his heart takes him, not caring about what the world thinks of him. Presenting excerpts from an engaging chat with the actor who could never do no wrong.

When you joined NSD to become an actor, who did you first speak to?

I just spoke to myself. I come from a small village where the environment was not the kind where someone would motivate you to become an actor. Ever since I wanted to become an actor, everyone, including my relatives, would comment on my looks and say I should stop thinking of becoming one. But after my graduation, I realised that I wanted to do something out of the ordinary. I had seen this film called *Ek Doctor Ki Maut*, and there was

a dialogue in the film which changed my life. It was Pankaj Kapur saying, "The moon and stars in the universe have secrets and there are some people who challenge those secrets." That stuck in my mind, and I said to myself that I had to do something


to challenge myself. What I wanted to do was not clear. Then one day, someone took me to a theatre to see a play, and I realised that this was it! I would never get bored of playing different characters and discovering new things. Then someone suggested

that I should join NSD. That was how my journey started.

Did you have a mentor during your theatre days? If so, what was the best advice that this person gave you?

There was this Russian teacher, Valentine Taplico. He lived in Moscow


Do you remember your first audition? Who did you call and say that you had bagged a role?

It was mostly my mother who I would call and sav that I was doing a film. But soon she stopped believing me because whenever I would tell her I was doing a film, it would slip from my hands after a few days. Then I decided I would only tell her I was in a film after it had been released in the theatres.

Did anyone tell you during your struggling days that you would not make it and to go back to your village?

Yes, especially during the days when things were really bad. But there were many actors around me who were in the same situation. The feeling that nothing was moving for anyone was a bit consoling. But the taunts started from the family itself, including my aunt (mv dad's sister). who would tell me that with my face the film industry was not the place for me. But I thought. like other actors. I was also human, so I continued with my journey.

What was that one thing that kept you going during your struggling days? Where did you get that confidence?



I never had any confidence, so I did everything to gain confidence and sharpen my skills. Like during my training, I would lock myself in a room for 12-15 hours and just live on water. There I would keep


practising because I knew I really had to work hard on myself. I realised very early in my journey that if one has the passion, keeps practising, and has an open mind, things start happening. So I never let that go.

What did you think when you first saw yourself on a movie poster?

Initially there were many films which didn't have posters, and then slowly I was there on some posters, but between two other actors. Then *Gangs Of Wasseypur* got

released in 2012, and I was placed prominently on a poster. Of course it was a good feeling, any actor would feel good. I remember my daughter was only two then, but she instantly recognised me on the hoarding. When that poster was











pulled down, she would look at that space, wondering where my picture was. I couldn't explain to her at that time that the movie was no longer in the theatres. My daughter recognising me on a hoarding was a precious moment in my life.

You have done several films with Anurag Kashyap. You even mentioned in one interview that if one of you was a woman, you would have gotten married to the other. Is he your go-to person? Anurag understands me so well that if I go to him, there is no need for me to tell him anything.

He instinctively understands if I am going through any problems and what is going on in my mind. In real life and in reel life. I mean, if I am doing a scene and I have a mental conflict as to how to do it, he knows instantly. If you put Anurag and me in a room for five hours, we may barely talk except for small things like passing the matchbox to light a cigarette, but that time is the best time for us.

Gangs Of Wasseypur or Sacred Games?

Sacred Games, especially the second season. The role was so complicated for me as an actor!

Whether it is Raman Raghav or *Badlapur* or *Sacred Games*, you play a lot of dark characters. What draws you to these types of roles?

The most boring characters in Bollywood are the ones played by the hero. These roles have only one shadebeing goody-goody. The hero has all the amazing traits-he can attract girls, he can beat up 10 people, he can ride horses, fly planes. He can do everything and gets to speak the best dialogues. Why he does all this is never shown, and I, for one, could never comprehend

how he acquired all these skills. So the most boring character for me is the Bollywood hero. There is no scope of performance and no effort required because there are no complications. Everything happens so easily. Barring the hero's role, I don't mind playing any other character.

Can you talk about your relationship with Irrfan?

Irrfan Bhai was a friend and a mentor. Whenever I was disturbed about something, I would call him. I would confide in him if there was no work happening, and he would console me by saying that

something would come up and to leave everything to God. Whenever we met, we would chat about cinema, films. and the nuances of acting. Then he got the chance to direct Alvida, a film for Star Bestsellers. When he selected me for the main lead in the film, I developed confidence that I could play a lead role. Later, we even went to a couple of festivals together and shared meals several times. When it came to work, he used to give me fantastic tips. I remember while shooting a scene in Alvida, I had a cycle in my hand and I was telling this girl to sit on my cycle. Irrfan Bhai then explained that the audience could see the cycle on screen, so there was no need to say cycle. I really liked that. There are certain nuances in acting, like the less done, the better. You should see the object. Text is not important; subtext is.

What was your last conversation with him?

The last interaction I had with him was mostly through messages where I enquired about his health.



Ram Madhvani is a doyen of advertising, churning out one hit commercial after another. When he switched tracks to the movies, he debuted with the sharp and edgy Let's Talk. And followed it up with the moving biopic Neerja. His latest outing Dhamaka has wowed both the masses and critics for its incisive social commentary. A candid conversation with the filmmaker who's always seen himself as a struggler both in the world of advertising and films. Excerpts...







When did you decide that you wanted to make *Dhamaka?*

(Laughs) I decided
I wanted to work with
Kartik Aaryan We were
discussing many projects.
And one time Kartik
mentioned the Korean film
The Terror Live. So I said
let's have a look at it and
we decided to collaborate
on remaking it. So this is
how that came about.

But Kartik is known for doing rom coms. How did you convince him to act in a thriller?

My process is a very different kind of process because I make films with three-four cameras, or sometimes even seven cameras. With *Dhamaka* we used 10 cameras. I surrounded the actor

in a world where there is no action, there is no cut, there are no marks, there are no lights. I did it in a very theatre meets documentary meets film kind of way. We employed the same techniques in Neerja and also in my we series Aarya. If my actors buy into my system, that's really the only thing I'm interested in. And I think that was the great thing about Kartik. When I said this is how I want to make it, this is how I want to shoot it, and he said ves, let's do it like this.

What was that magical moment when you and Kartik struck the right chord?

On the fifth day, I was shooting with seven cameras. There were



in my system, he had

started enjoying himself

doing things in a new way. It wasn't about me and him being on the same page as far as the script was concerned. He had to believe in the process and once he did that, I knew everything would go off smoothly.

Amruta Subhash's character says in the film that, "Hum news bechte hain." Is that your point of view about today's media?

The film isn't about the media at all. It focuses on human drama. Amruta plays an ambitious editor but she's an individual in the film and doesn't stand for all media. The film is about life choices you make and how you have to live with the consequences of those choices. There's

a price you have to pay for success. That's all we wanted to show. Thinking anything beyond that would be mere conjecture. We all know the kind of world we live in and so I wouldn't further comment on that.

Are you okay with the OTT system or do you pine for theatrical releases and the whole legacy associated with them?

I think I am very happy that the OTT partner decided to come on board. We had wanted Ronnie Screwvala, and we wanted this particular partner. The only thing I was worried about was that traditionally, the film is assured of being in the cinemas for a week. You at least get to gauge the reaction of the audience on that first day, first show. If nothing else, you're satisfied that your movie reached out to an audience. Here, you don't know what's going to happen. Because your viewer is an all-powerful entity who has this super weapon in his hand called the remote control. He can throw you out by pushing a button. So I'm glad my film got so much love and acceptance from the audience.

You shot the film when COVID-19 was at its peak. Tell us something about the experience.

One of things that we did was that we booked a whole hotel - The Renaissance at Powai for our shoot. We constructed a COVID Corridor and a COVID bubble. The safety protocols that we followed were huge, thanks to

Amita Madhvani, my co-producer. We built the set at the Maidan, which is there at Renaissance. So everyday, everybody would just step out, take a five minute walk and we would come back. We did all the normal protocols and also tested everyone each day. And everyone who wasn't in the frame had to wear a mask. I'm proud to say that when we wrapped up the shooting, we didn't have a single person testing positive.

As a filmmaker, do you still have moments of learning and unlearning?

Each one of us constantly goes through the process of learning and unlearning so how could I be immune from that? No one shouts on my sets. So one thing we're constantly learning is patience. I'm learning how to tackle the everyday problems of filmmaking in a more compassionate way and I think that learning affects other areas of life as well. My commitment is towards making a film in a more humanitarian way. Sometimes you have to be forceful to get work done and you've to learn the limits of that force. I keep telling my team, "I'm not your mentor. We're all co-learners. we're all co-mentors."

We're living in an age where people get offended quite easily. Public pressure sometimes leads to censorship issues. Calls for boycott are becoming common. Do you feel we've gone on a backfoot as far as creative freedom is concerned? I haven't faced such issues

yet. I try to make what can be best described as a *thaali* kind of cinema – there's something there for everybody. I am a non-conflict, non-confrontational, non-controversial kind of a filmmaker. So I don't want to get there.

Talking about *Neerja*, do you recall the moment when the film won the Filmfare Award and Sonam also won the Filmfare Award? What was going on in your mind at that point?

It was huge because what happened was that, for

me, we knew that we had something going, right because the masses had loved the film so much. In India, if you look at the pinnacle of awards then there are Filmfare Awards and then there are the National Awards. So for me, this formed a part of my bucket list. And when I got the Black Lady, and gosh it was quite heavy, that's when it started to sink in. It was a big deal and so was getting the National Award.

You've been one of the big names in advertising. How different is that world from the world of filmmaking?

I've always seen myself as a newcomer, even in advertising. Your biggest worry, whether in films or advertising, is that you should keep getting work. So I tell people in advertising I'm not making films and I tell film people that I'm not making commercials in the hope that both avenues remain open for me.



rishnakumar Kunnath, fondly known by his stage name KK the world over, was a versatile singer with romantic songs as his forte. Songs like Khuda jaane, Tu hi meri shab hai, Aankhon mein teri, Zindagi do pal ki, Tu ashiqui hai, Tadap tadap ke, Aawarapan banjarapan have set millions of hearts beating and have stayed in the hearts of the audience forever.

He was born to Malayali parents C. S. Menon and Kunnath Kanakavalli in Delhi and went to Delhi's Mount St Mary's School and graduated from Kirori Mal College. He reportedly has no formal training in music. He grew up listening to Malayali songs and also Hindi film songs and used to hum along with them. He used to sing in school and college and was popular because of his naturally gifted voice.

He married his childhood sweetheart Jyothy Krishna. in 1991. He has a son called Nakul Krishna Kunnath and daughter, Tamara Kunnath, from his marriage.

After doing his graduation in Delhi, he started his own rock band. He had to work part time in the hotel industry in the marketing department to earn a living. Being a creative person, he found the job suffocating and some time later he quit it to start working for the advertising sector, where he sang 3500 jingles in 11 different languages. His wife Jvoti, as also mentor Hariharan were instrumental for his success. They always encouraged him to try his luck on the playback circuit. Hariharan heard him sing at the Meridian Hotel in Delhi and asked him to come to Mumbai and try his hands at

singing in films. In an earlier interview with Filmfare, he had stated, "My wife wanted me to try my luck in Mumbai. I believed in her and I came to Mumbai in 1994. We were expecting our first born then. I had a cassette with me in which I had recorded two English songs. I met Hariharan and

Leslie Lewis and handed over my cassette to them." The rest, as they say, is history.

It was at this time when Sony music was being launched in India and they were looking for a singer. They chose KK and came out with an album named *Pal* which did well. KK then sang for AR Rahman

He reached stardom when composer Ismail Darbar offered him Tadap tadap ke from Sanjay Leela Bhansali's Hum Dil De Chuke Sanam. It's said that after listening to the recording, Bhansali got emotional and had tears in his eyes. Reflecting on the same, the singer had said, "I have had no tragedies in my life. I married the girl I love and I am a very happy man. It's about convincing yourself about the lyrics

songs Pal and Yaaron from the album became hugely famous and are even remembered today. In 2008, KK released his second album Humsafar after a gap of eight years. The songs Aasman ke, Dekho na, Yeh kahan mil gaye hum, and Rain bhai kaari became popular after its release. The album had 10 tracks out of which eight were composed by him.

part from films, KK has also sung for many television serials like Just Mohabbat, Shaka Laka Boom Boom, Kuch Jhuki Si Palkein, Hip Hip Hurray, Kkavyanjali and Just Dance. Though he kept himself away from reality shows, he was part of Fame Gurukul and Indian Idol Junior. He sung extensively for popular shows like Coke Studio. where his rendition of the hit *qawwali Chadta suraj* in the company of Sabri

brothers became famous. He often sang for MTV Unplugged and Sony Mix as well.

The reticent singer, who always shied away from publicity, was a well-known name in the show circuit. He toured extensively across India and abroad and performed to sold-out venues. On May 31, he was performing at Sir Gurudas Mahavidyalaya fest at Nazrul Mancha, Kolkata and complained of chest pain while going back to the hotel after his performance. He suffered severe cardiac arrest and was rushed to CMRI hospital in Kolkata from his hotel, where he was declared dead on arrival. He was just 53 and is survived by his wife and children.

He may have left for his heavenly abode but will forever be in our hearts, thanks to his songs and memories...

Subhash Ghai recently made a comeback with a small film called 36 Farmhouse. Analita Seth interviews the showman

Subhash Ghai started out as an actor, tried his hand at writing and then made a name for himself as a director. He took on the mantle of showman from Raj Kapoor. Larger than life films, with their roots in Indian mythology and folklore, teeming with pulsating music became his hallmark. He became bigger than the stars he employed. A Subhash Ghai movie became an event to look forward to. From 1976 to 1999 he had a successful run at the box office, churning out hits after hits and scaling new heights. For perhaps the first time in his career, Subhash Ghai made a single-location film set in a farmhouse. Released on an OTT, 36 Farmhouse is unlike any other thriller made by the director. Excerpts from an interview with the filmmaker who has a never-say-die spirit...

YOUR NEW FILM **36 FARMHOUSE WAS MADE AT HOME FROM THE CONCEPT TILL** THE EXECUTION. **HOW WAS THE EXPERIENCE WORKING IN A BUBBLE DURING** THE PANDEMIC? We took five to six months to write the script at home. We have a story lab, a room for young writers, we developed the entire film

there. I have a

habit of writing poetry, so I wrote three songs for the film and then I called my students from Whistling Woods to compose them. When the rough draft was done then we went to the studio to record. We started shooting the film on June 24, 2021 in the Lonavala farmhouse. Since there was a lockdown, we had to be very

careful during the shooting. Our executive producer, Vishal Gandhi was verv particular about it and he took care of every artist and unit member. If we have made a good film in this kind of stress, then the credit goes to all the members.

KALICHARAN (1976)

The film was the directorial debut of Subhash Ghai. The masses loved the stylised thriller where Shatrughan Sinha played a double role, that of an honest police inspector and his lookalike criminal. Shatrughan Sinha and Reena Roy were lauded for their roles. It was later remade into the Telugu film Khaidi Kalidasu (1977), the Kannada film Kaalinga (1980), the Tamil film Sangili, (1982) and the Malayalam film Pathamudayam (1985).





VISWANATH (1978)

It again starred Shatrughan Sinha and Reena Roy in the lead. The film, a revenge drama, proved to be a blockbuster. Shatrughan Sinha played a hotshot lawyer who later takes to crime to avenge himself, becoming the monster he was trying to slay in the process. The film was remade in Telugu as Lawyer Viswanath (1978) and in Tamil as Naan Mahaan Alla (1984).



KARZ (1980)

Starring Rishi Kapoor, Tina Munim, Simi Garewal and Raj Kiran, the film touched upon the theme of reincarnation. It was a stylised thriller and Subhash Ghai was much appreciated for the narrative as well as song picturisation.
