Filmfare reached its 70th anniversary this March. Age is just a number, as they say. One should count the experiences rather than the years. *Filmfare* got its first issue out in 1952. Back in those days, entertainment magazines were few and far between. Most were mostly trade journals really, giving information about which films are getting made and offered tidbits about the cast and the crew. *Filmfare* could truly be called a fanzine in every sense of the word. It's approach was refreshingly different. While it did offer readers insights about new films by carrying photos from the sets and shooting reports, it also helped the fans engage with their favourite stars in an intimate way. Stars wrote guest columns not only on their own lives but on each other. They shared photographs of their vacations and offered glimpses of their palatial homes. The magazine was the perfect bridge between the celebs and their admirers.

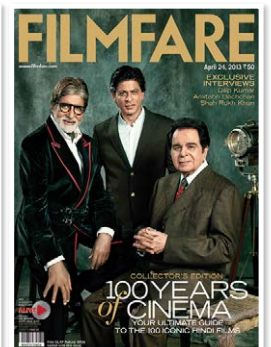
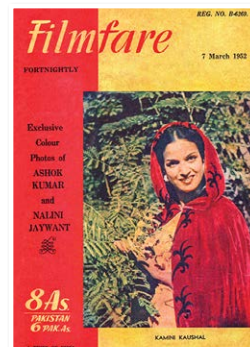
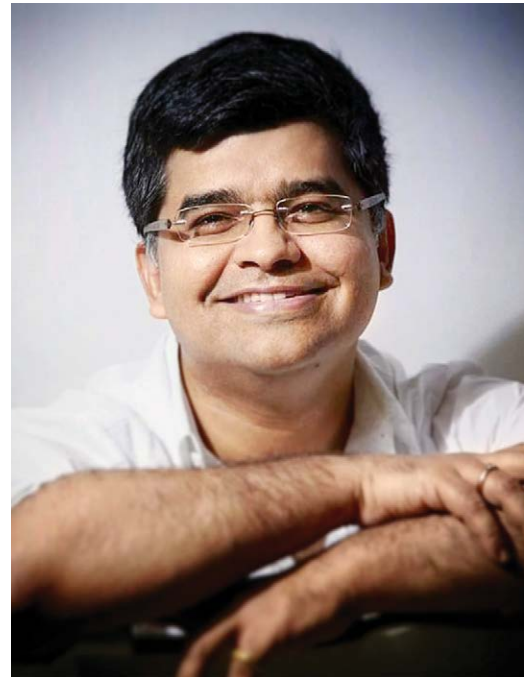
One can say that the stars were doing the same kind of things on *Filmfare* that they do now on Instagram. But minus the filters. It was raw, visceral, true to life. And that has been the template we've adopted since then. We try to portray as real a picture as possible of the stars today as we did back when we began.

Our films were in black and white when the magazine started. Colour photography was expensive but even then we strove hard to make our covers a colourful spectacle. *Filmfare* covers became the talking point among the masses. They were cut off and pinned to the walls and revered. We have kept that tradition alive and kicking. For example, we were the first and perhaps the only magazine to bring together superstars from three generations Dilip Kumar, Amitabh Bachchan and Shah Rukh Khan, to mark the special occasion of 100 years of Indian cinema. We broke ground when we featured 12 directors on the cover together. Also, history got made when Aamir Khan and Shah Khan graced the cover together, perhaps the only time they did so.

When I joined the magazine as a cub reporter 25 years ago, I knew I was standing in the shadow of a giant. That the love and respect the stars have for the magazine is unparalleled. You don't ever have to break the ice with anyone as they considered themselves part of *Filmfare's* inner circle. I've seen stars unburdening their joys and sorrows to us as if they're talking to family. And they know we'd exercise discretion and not carry any controversial information.

The same values have been ingrained in our website as well, which is flourishing as one of the top entertainment sites the past decade. And I needn't add that the Filmfare Awards are considered the premiere awards show both the masses and the industry.

We're a treasure trove of memories. Here's to making more in the next 70 years to come...

After the release of *Gangubai Kathiawadi*, Shantanu Maheshwari was hailed by the media as a Sanjay Leela Bhansali discovery. But he isn't a rank newcomer. Thousands of fans know him as Swayam Shekhawat from the hit television show, *Dil Dosti Dance. D3*, as it is popularly called, was an instant favourite with desi millennials who were just hitting the peak of their adolescence. That's when Shantanu Maheshwari and his gang came into their lives and became the subject of many canteen discussions across schools and colleges in India. Looking back at his

journey, he reflects, "It's been a long journey but I'm happy with whatever I have gone through. It feels amazing to be part of Sanjay sir's movie. He's the best that I could have ever dreamt of to work with," he says, overwhelmed. Shantanu plays the role of Afsaan, Alia Bhatt's love interest, in the film. His scenes with Alia are special because there aren't many words involved but the romance

He first met Alia on the sets of a reality show, when she was doing the promotional rounds for her debut film *Student Of The Year* (2012). She called him a hottie. Shantanu asked her if she remembered that when they met to do prep work for *Gangubai...* and was gratified when Alia remembered bumping into him all those years ago. "She was there as a guest and we shared a moment where I tried

to perform, if she wasn't so warm and friendly."

While there will be many who'll wonder about his overnight success, Maheshwari has had a long, long journey. It wasn't always roses and candy floss for the actor. It was a struggle to fit in mainly because the pace of Mumbai is so different from the city of his birth, Kolkata. Nevertheless, after his successful debut in *Dil Dosti Dance* in 2011,

Maheshwari went on to participate in *Fear Factor: Khatron Ke Khiladi 8* and won that season. While Shantanu is an actor by profession, dance is his first love. The 30-year-old is a member of *Desi Hoppers*, a dance crew that participated in the World of Dance 2015 Championship in Los Angeles and went on to emerge as winners. *Desi Hoppers* even had a special appearance on *America's Got Talent* (season 11). He's been a staple on reality shows in India whether it is *Nach Baliye*, *Jhalak Dikhhla Jaa* or *MTV Big F 2*. He also had a special performance on *Bigg Boss 10*.

Shantanu was selected for *Gangubai Kathiawadi* through an extensive audition process. "I cleared one round, second round, third round and I was still not very sure where this was heading. I decided to just enjoy the process and not think of the outcome. I was thrilled that I was getting a chance to audition for Sanjay Leela Bhansali. I wasn't expecting anything out of it and when it happened it came as a big surprise."

Initially, he had a hard time believing he was selected and almost didn't go to the final meeting with SLB because of a prior work commitment. He believes in sticking to his commitments and since he was already booked for another project he was finding it hard to leave that. His friends cajoled him to take one hour off and meet Bhansali. He went because he wanted to

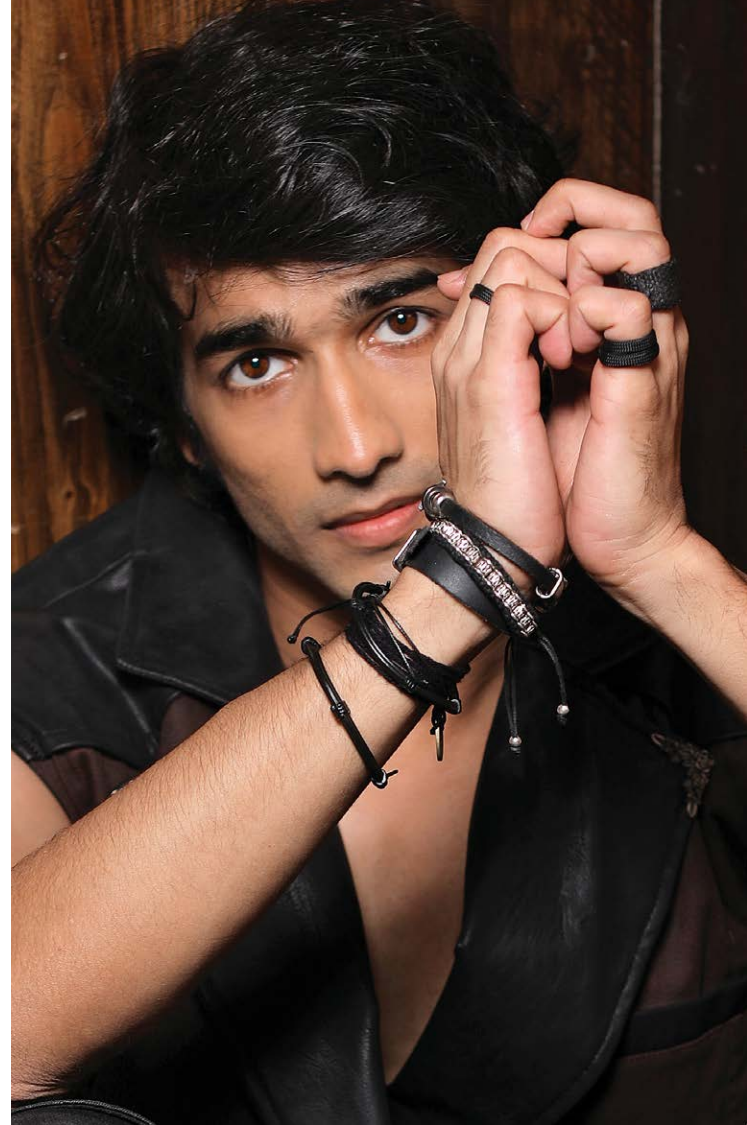
meet the director for a long time. "I went just for the experience. The universe works in mysterious ways I guess, as said he was pleased with my auditions and offered me the role."

Despite getting accolades for his role, Shantanu still can't believe he's done the film. The reality of it has yet to sink in. "Sanjay sir is an icon. It's every actor's dream to work with him. And even after you've worked with him, it still feels like a dream. One doesn't absorb the fact easily." Shantanu says working with SLB is a huge ego booster. "Initially, you feel he's made a mistake in casting you. You doubt whether you're worthy of being directed by him. But as you spend time on the sets, you realise he has invested with you because you fit in his vision. Then you just surrender yourself to his commands and go with the flow."

The Bhansali set was

also difficult for him to adjust to initially but he learned to let go of inhibitions and just trust in the master's process. "Most of the sets I come from, there is a bit of a chaotic feel to it, the hustle-bustle but on this set, there was absolute silence so being able to accept that silence and perform was initially something I found difficult because I was not used



to it. But once I adapted to it, it was fun, it had its own charm and its own value. Once I accepted the silence, I started enjoying the way the flow was happening in terms of the performance."

He struggles to give voice to his emotions when asked about the response to *Gangubai Kathiawadi*. "I'm glad that I'm getting positive responses for my

role, as well as for the film.. Because of COVID-19 and the constant lockdowns, it took two-and-a-half years for this movie to get released. I knew we'd made a great movie and was anxious to see how the audience would react to it. It's doing great at the box office and has been lauded by the critics. I'm feeling relaxed and happy these days." ■

sister passed away four years ago. She battled with chronic kidney failure for a long time. She used to talk about how she couldn't live her life and that I should definitely live my life to the fullest. And the day she passed away, I specifically felt her sense of release because she'd struggled a lot.

You didn't feel like you were taking a risk by going for a sex change procedure at the peak of your career?

Our professional lives do offer a sense of stability and security. So when I decided to dive into something like this, there was always that risk factor whether

people would accept me. Will the stylists still want to work with me? Will my clients still want to flaunt my designs? Because now they'll have to proclaim that I am wearing Saisha Shinde. I'm wearing something designed by a trans woman designer. How comfortable will my clients be with that? But, you know, we really underestimate humanity. We underestimate Indian people to be specific. We think that we are not as progressive as the West but I feel we're by far the most progressive country. I have had the most amazing acceptance from my clients and my team. I have been stressing this

constantly since I've come out. The fashion and the film industry is so much more inclusive, accepting and welcoming of any identity and they have clearly proven it. The question should be asked to the corporate world, government sector, and the military. Why are there no questions being asked to those professions?

In Chandigarh Kare Aashiqui Vaani Kapoor, plays a trans woman. What is your stance on the whole conversation about representation and casting trans women in such roles?

Considering it was the first movie of its kind, it was fine. You have to

understand that in India, for the masses at the grassroot level to understand and accept the reality of people opting for transition is never going to be easy. You don't want to scare them. You have to understand that this movie is not made for OTT or it's not made just for the metros. It's made for the entire country and 80 per cent of it is still orthodox. Which is why I feel taking Vaani Kapoor, a cisgender woman (Cisgender denotes a person whose gender identity and sex assigned at birth are the same) to play such a role was a great move.

How have your sensibilities about fashion changed in the last one year?

I used to favour heels all the time and now after wearing heels, I've understood that I can look hot and sexy and cool without heels as well. Secondly, small details like the armhole should be of a certain width, the back should be of a certain depth, especially if it's day

wear. If I'm wearing lingerie then I need to take care of this. The process is much more personal now. Each and every detail is something that I've experienced in my new life. Prior to my coming out, I used to just create without understanding on what occasion was my client wearing the outfit. Why she should be wearing this? But there is a much more sensitised understanding of what women are going through. It helps me understand the nuances better. Like what fabric or texture will work for a particular outfit. This attention to minute details is something I'm giving a lot more importance to right now.

Where do you see yourself in the future

It's literally a Pandora's Box that's opened in my life currently because there is so much that I have been wanting to do. We are working on a line of jewellery, we are working on

a line of bags, we are working on a line of shoes, apart from the collection. Beyond and above that, I am hoping to start a makeup line soon as well.

What's your take on 'fat tax' that charges plus size women more for the same outfit?

I've never charged a client anything extra than what the actual cost of the outfit has been. Probably the fabric consumption varies from person to person, but does that mean that if the client's size is much smaller than the model's size, are you going to reduce the cost as well? If you don't plan to reduce the cost when the fabric consumption is less, why do you plan to increase the cost when the fabric consumption is more. As Saisha, I realised the importance of making designs and creating designs that can work on all

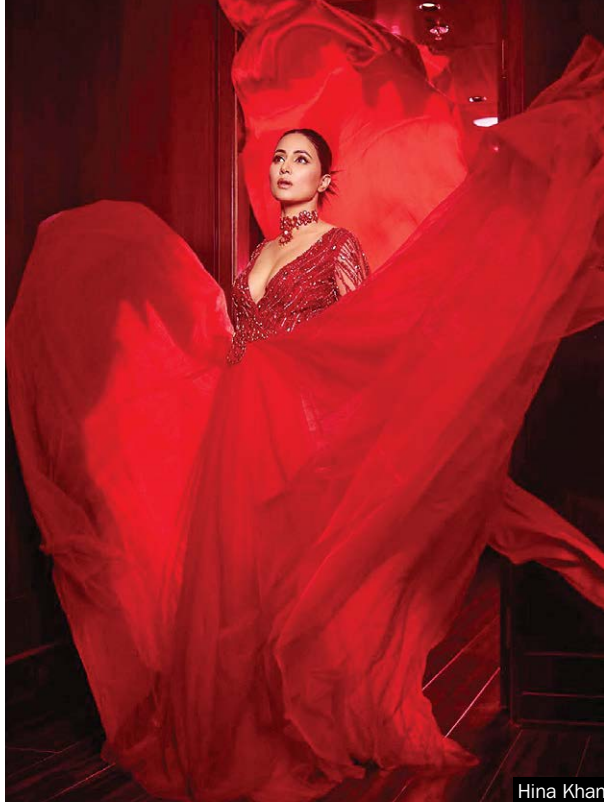

body types and all identities. I am limiting my biases to a specific size, which has taken a complete 180 degree turn since my coming out.

Is fashion a necessity or is it a luxury?

I personally feel fashion is for everyone depending on your pocket. We don't need to shop for a designer brand every second week. Adding value to each and every piece you design is far more superior than just randomly making designs every second day. If anyone wants to purchase a designer outfit, there should be value to it. But if you're going

to make two lakh pieces of the same style, its value is lost because it's no longer something that you'd aspire to own. It's as expendable as a pair of jeans that you can buy at a random store.

Do you have a favourite look that a celebrity sported?

Harnaaz Kaur's gown for Miss Universe is now going to be super special for me. But my new line of Saisha is not out yet. So, I have yet to see it on women but I'm dying to see it on Deepika Padukone because I love her. I've worked with her

and she's absolutely amazing.

Do you have a specific stylist who you think styles your clothes the best?

I can't stress more on how Shaleena Nathani has been instrumental in my professional life. She came out of nowhere and gave my clothes to Deepika. And that was like a second life to me. So, for me Shaleena is God, as far as styling is concerned. Eka Lakhani is God, I mean I have done a lot of period costumes with Eka for movies and her understanding of costumes for movies is unparalleled.

What are the things that you are doing for the environment and sustainability?

Fabric wastage is one big concern and the other one is of course labour wages. What we have consciously decided to do is make a certain number of styles and they are going to be produced in a specific amount only. And once those styles are sold out, they won't be produced again. There is less wastage and you get to wear a piece which is absolutely going to be limited. Because these pieces are special, they are gonna be priced, which means that

my workers will be given a good wage as well.

Is social media a boon or a bane?

There's no way to control the trolling. We wanted the world to grow smaller, we wanted everyone to access our lives, we wanted everyone to see where we are having breakfast, with whom we are having dinner and which restaurant we are sitting with and what we are wearing. You want to put your life out there? Well, guess what, everyone has an opinion on everything. Welcome to the jungle. ■

With *Chandigarh Kare Aashiqui*, Vaani has clearly shown that she is not just another pretty face and here's hoping filmmakers take note.

As a member of the LGBTQ+ community, when I saw the trailer for *Chandigarh Kare Aashiqui*, I was worried if it would treat the community sensitively. I never thought a film like this would be possible....

I am so happy it resonated with you. Thank you for watching and thank you for acknowledging it and loving it.

It's said that members of the community were apprehensive about how they would be portrayed in the film? And afterwards they were glad the film got made.

Yeah, a lot of people actually told me that. It was my biggest validation. I don't belong to the community so you want to do them right. You don't want to misrepresent anything. Sometimes you can go wrong even if your intentions are right. We were just hoping and keeping our fingers crossed that it doesn't do them injustice in any way. And I'm happy that today I'm talking to you and I've talked to other people. And they felt that it didn't do injustice to the community, it didn't disrespect them in any way. That's a big deal.

How relieved did you feel after seeing the reviews after the film's release?

I was grateful. I won't deny the fact that it was a huge sigh of relief. I wouldn't probably have said yes if it weren't for a filmmaker like Gattu (Abhishek Kapoor) who I knew had the right aesthetics to present this. Everything matters, from my co-actors to my filmmakers. They should possess the right sensibility

for such a subject. Thankfully, we were all on the same page mentally. So, that gives you some comfort. Maanvi's treatment in the movie really mattered. I don't think that a character like her has been depicted before on screen. I give the credit to my director for making her the way she is.

Why wasn't a trans woman cast the role?

See, I cannot be the decision-maker of who gets cast or not, that completely depends on the makers. This film is a conversation starter. Especially for people who aren't aware of the LGBTQ community per se. I really hope in the future there can be many more films, different storylines, different narratives on the same subject, where trans people get to play these parts. And not just this, I hope someday, a trans girl should be able to play a cis girl's part.

When you are an actor, you don't make decisions in isolation. There are so many people involved. So, when you took that decision to play a trans girl, what was the reaction and how did you face them?

I make my own decisions when I am doing a film. I don't go around looking for any validation from the outside. Yes, some people can guide me when I am confused. But I genuinely wasn't confused with this one. When I read the script, I truly felt it was mind-blowing. And I called up Gattu and figured out what the treatment of Maanvi would be like. Talking to him cleared my head and then I just went ahead with my gut feeling.

You made a fantastic debut and even won the Filmfare award for the Best Debut Actor (Female) for *Shuddh Desi Romance*. But since then, you have been extremely selective with your projects.

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There is no right or wrong over here. Whatever instinctively feels right, one follows that path. This just felt more comfortable and honest to me and feels truer to who I am. Do less work but good work and be a part of good cinema. And that's what my intention has been. I can also only pick from the handful of offers that come my way. And I tried to be honest to what felt right to me. There has been no calculation. Whatever felt right to me I went ahead with that.

Has there ever been a sense of frustration that I am just not getting the right script or I am getting the same script from different people.

I'm also human at the end of the day. You do have low days and you do feel restless and you do question why isn't it coming to me. I guess I can either whine and mull over it or look at the brighter side and be grateful for the things that have worked in my favour. Do I hope that I had more projects like these? Yes, of course. Better late than never, right?

Why haven't you gotten more roles like this?

I don't know, I mean I hope they don't feel that way at least anymore because in *Shuddh Desi Romance* I was playing a small-town girl and I was getting those kinds of roles. At the end of the day, you are an actress and you should be able to pull off just about anything. I would love to challenge myself, I would love to do

things I haven't done before. After *Befikre*, which was uber cool and set in Paris, I started getting roles where I had to play an urban character. I think with every movie, people decide differently. But I am hoping that after *Chandigarh*...people will have more faith in my versatility.

How has the response been from the industry?

It was in a good way and I am just very happy that people have kind of given that respect to the film and me as an actor. So it does feel nice. I am just hoping that that can materialise into films and projects.

What's your favourite feedback that you received from someone in the industry?

They all have been kind and generous with feedback. I don't know whom to quote but someone like Hrithik Roshan went all the way. He posted stories and he called us all up and he was pleased with the film. And he is someone who's honest and if he doesn't like something, he will say it. There were many filmmakers who I looked up to and they commented on the film and texted me and said lovely things. I am happy that it made Anurag Kashyap cry in the second half of the film. I told him that I am happy that you cried because that means you connected with the film. The most significant validation came from the community itself.

As an actor, everything you do is scrutinised. Has it gotten easier over the last few years?

In this industry, I am very aware

that your success is loud but your failure is louder. Everybody gets to have a say and have a judgement about your work and life decisions. But I try to not get sucked into the negative energy and the trolls or in a conversation where people write you off. Those very same people will talk highly about you tomorrow if you achieve success. So, I think this is also temporary. Nothing is permanent - success is not permanent, we all will have ups and downs.

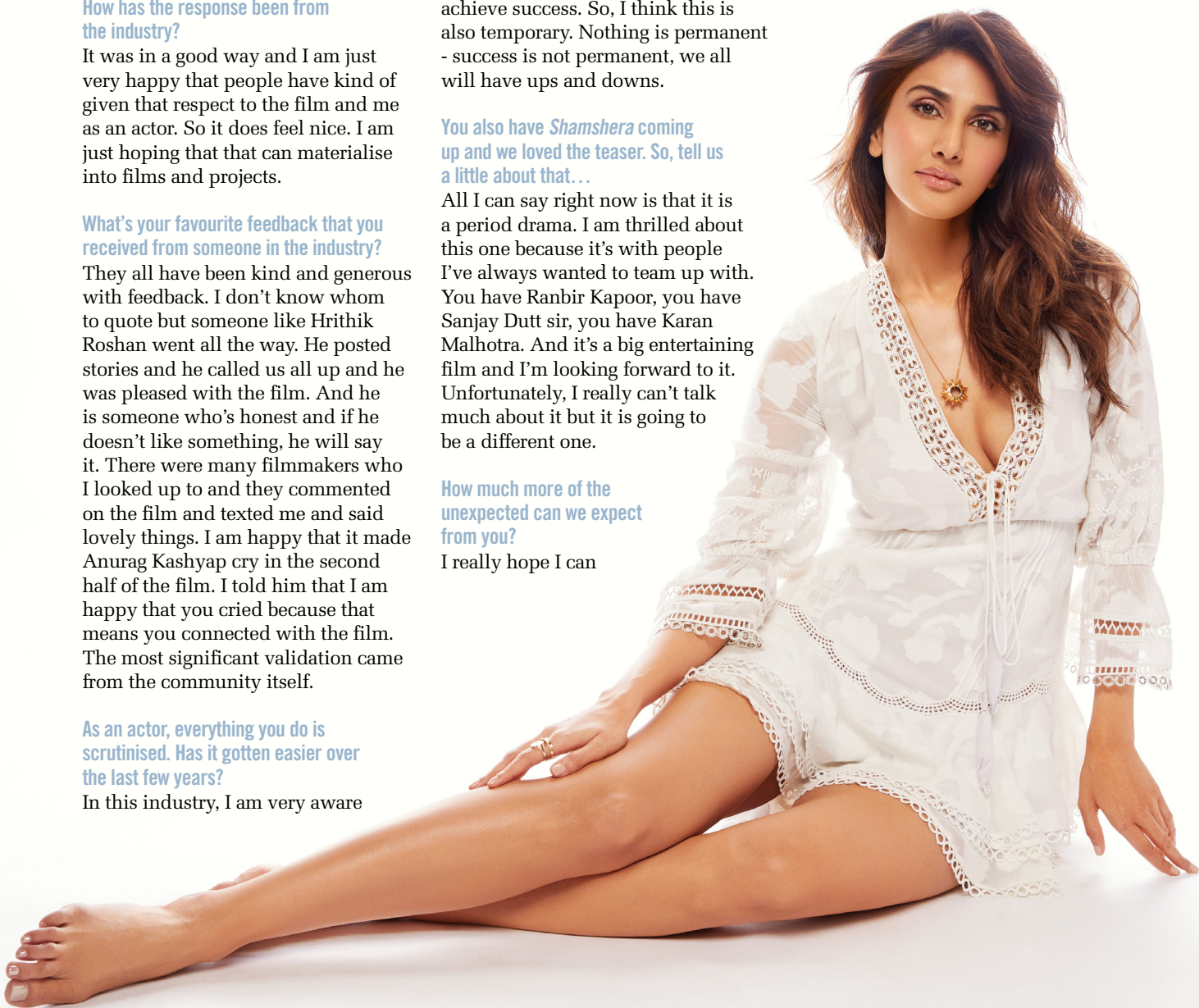
You also have *Shamshera* coming up and we loved the teaser. So, tell us a little about that...

All I can say right now is that it is a period drama. I am thrilled about this one because it's with people I've always wanted to team up with. You have Ranbir Kapoor, you have Sanjay Dutt sir, you have Karan Malhotra. And it's a big entertaining film and I'm looking forward to it. Unfortunately, I really can't talk much about it but it is going to be a different one.

How much more of the unexpected can we expect from you?

I really hope I can

do the unexpected. I am not trying to box myself right now and I'm also looking forward and feeling hopeful that something different is going to come my way and the energy is good about it. So, I am just keeping my fingers crossed and hoping it happens soon. ■

Rise, Roar, Revolt... *RRR* by SS Rajamouli is one of the most awaited pan-India epic. The film picks two historical figures, Komaram Bheem played by Jr NTR and Alluri Sitarama Raju played by Ram Charan from the Indian Independence movement and tells a fictional story about the revolutionaries. The film also stars Ajay Devgn, Alia Bhatt and Shriya Saran in pivotal cameos. As this epic pre-partition drama faces several rounds of delays because of the pandemic, the eager cast of the film waits with bated breaths for the grand theatrical release. The strenuous shooting, long post-production hours and this extended period of promotion has given the actors a lot of time to reflect on their film. Known as the megastar and power star across India, Jr NTR and Ram Charan carry an air of calm and humility with them despite their crazy fan following and the impeccable body of work. Here they take us through the mindscape of their director SS Rajamouli and the effortless camaraderie they share on and off the screen. Excerpts...

HOW IS MUMBAI TREATING YOU?

Ram Charan: Fabulous.

NTR: Fabulous indeed. Mumbai has never been an alien space for us. We come here quite a bit. Mumbai is fantastic.

WHEN YOU WALK INTO THE SET OF A RAJAMOULI FILM, DO YOU HAVE SOME SENSE OF INHIBITION OR IS IT GAME FACE FROM SHOT ONE?

N: It's game on from shot one.

R: Shot one, we're at home. We walk onto the sets and we know everybody.

N: (Laughs) Yeah, we're on a marathon run from the beginning and there are no inhibitions. Rajamouli makes sure there are no inhibitions. Everything is laid out crystal clear for the actor. No inhibitions at all.

HOW STRENUOUS IS PRE-PRODUCTION AS COMPARED TO GOING ON SETS?

N: See the preparation is also equally very important for an actor,

especially when you're being a part of a movie like *RRR*, also when you're being directed by Rajamouli himself. Yes, it is very strenuous for sure. It involves more of your mental strength but there's a physical aspect too which you have to master. He makes sure you're at your peak in all aspects.

R: He is one of the few directors who enjoys the hard work.

N: And the process...

R: And he knows that it will pay off so yeah...

DO YOU THINK INCLUSION OF TWO ACTORS FROM THE HINDI FILM FRATERNITY ADDS THE PAN-INDIA STATURE TO YOUR FILM?

N: Rajamouli always says that it's always the story which is paramount for him, and not the marketing. It's him and his story first. In the later stages, yes marketing strategies and blah blah blah comes in. But it's his story and his characters and his main star cast that cement his products together.

OF A LEARNING-UNLEARNING PROCESS INVOLVED? YOU KNOW AS A DUO AND AS INDIVIDUALS?

N: Every movie you learn something and you get out, but when you are stepping into a new project, especially with Rajamouli, it's better to unlearn everything and then get into it with a fresh slate.

R: Absolutely. You undo a lot. You have to. It's better for your growth as an actor.

WHAT ABOUT TRUSTING YOUR CO-STAR AND HAVING FAITH? WAS THERE EVER FRICTION ON-SET OR OFF-SET?

R: Never. I think we were only complimenting each other

N: Yes! Absolutely.

R: We just do what is required. Rajamouli is so particular that he makes us do exactly what is required. We are in a very comfortable space working with him. The actors are always complimenting each other.

N: I think in general also, Rajamouli has always made his actors compliment each other because you

are working towards a vision, there is no personal interest there. It's the product which has to shine so we never had that friction, never.

DO YOU RECALL THE MOMENT WHERE YOU REALISED YOU'RE LIVING A HISTORICAL CHARACTER?

R: *(Laughs)* Yes, I realised it on day one. Rajamouli isn't going to give you a day or a schedule to get into your character. You better realise that from day one itself.

N: The sooner you realise, the better it is for you.

R: NTR is an experienced actor, and I too have done a couple of films and I know how to get into roles, especially when you have a director like Rajamouli.

N: Yes... Like he takes you through a lot of things during the preparation stage itself, you know, so it makes it easier for the actor.

WHAT WAS THE HARDEST PART OF PLAYING BHEEM AND RAM IN THE FILM?

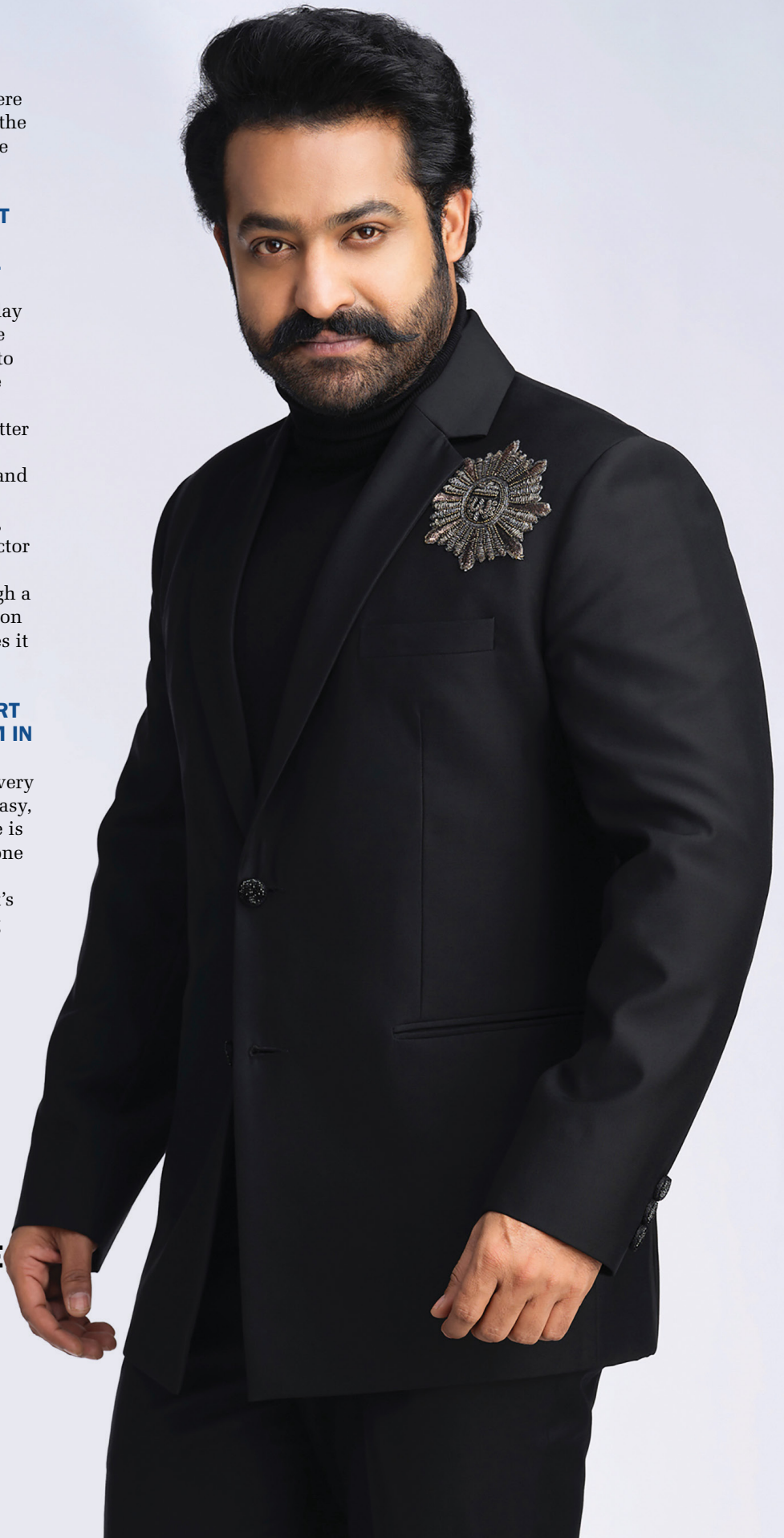
R: Playing Bheem and Ram was very hard. To an outsider it looks so easy, effortless and seamless, but there is a lot of preparation which has gone into the characters.

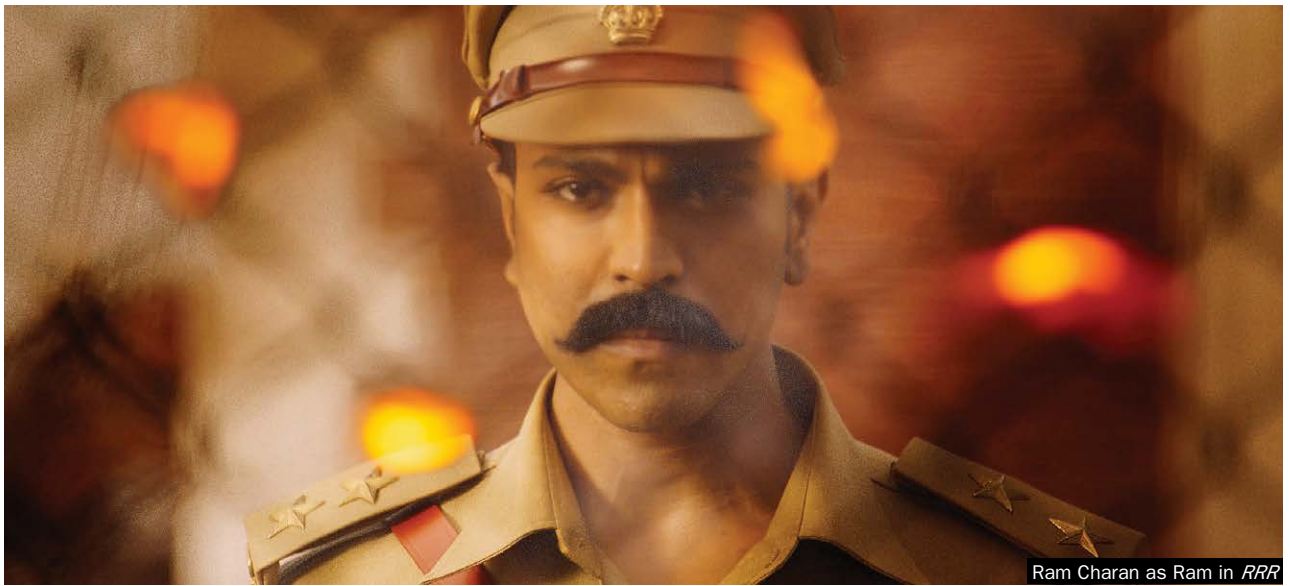
N: Though the film is fictional, it's based on the legend surrounding them. Their vision for fighting against the British. It was a challenge to get that right.

R: Yeah that was a responsibility.

N: But as the movie is fictional, that did make it a bit easier.

WHAT KIND OF RESEARCH GOES INTO YOUR CHARACTERS AS AN ACTOR?

N: Rajamouli did the research for us.

R: And we have to be equipped, mentally, to understand the research.

N: It's his vision and the less you put in your inputs, the better it is. We just trusted his judgement and went with the flow.

R: It was a smooth ride throughout.

ARE YOU RELIEVED THAT IT IS RELEASING IN THEATRES, AND HOPING THAT IT WILL REACH 100 PER CENT OCCUPANCY IN THE COMING WEEKS?

R: Absolutely. Fingers crossed for that.

N: And we have to be positive about that. I mean that is what we have been hoping for these past two years. Positivity is the key. We have been positive about the pandemic, what drove us was our positivity.

R: *Sooryavanshi* did so well despite the 50 per cent occupancy. So just imagine...

N: Yeah, just imagine. Every film that is doing well is bringing our audience back to the theatres.

Every seat, every head counts. So everyone is doing their job and we hope even *RRR* will do its job.

R: The tag is also bringing back the glory of Indian cinema so we hope that happens.

N: I don't believe in resolutions...

YEAH, BUT THEY ARE MEANT TO BE BROKEN, SO WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FORWARD TO?

N: I'm looking forward for the pandemic to end. Everyone is hurt, everyone has suffered. The entire movie industry has taken a toll. I hope everything gets back to normal soon and the Indian film industry keeps on rising up and up. ■

JITESH PILLAAI CHATS WITH **MADHURI DIXIT**, WHOSE THE FAME GAME HAS TAKEN THE OTT WORLD BY STORM

I have always been a Madhuri Dixit fanboy ever since her *Tezaab* days. She looked believable even in the most commercial of films. You couldn't take your eyes off her. Filmmakers knew that and started writing meaty roles for her. Her male actors felt vulnerable doing films with her as they knew they'll have to up their game in every frame to match her histrionics. Her dance numbers weren't just cherry on the cake. Sometimes, they were the whole cake. People used to leave the theatre after the songs got over. Madhuri made a name for herself in the art circuit as well, shining in non-glam roles as effortlessly as she did in mass cinema. After now, through *The Fame Game*, she has conquered the OTT space as well. The series has offered her a chance to explore nuances of her character much more in depth than movies and the audience is in love with what she's done. Excerpts from candid chat with the lovely actress who is always fun to talk to...

IF YOU WERE TO MEET YOUR CHARACTER, ANAMIKA ANAND, FROM THE FAME GAME WHAT WOULD YOU TELL HER?

I would tell her that things will work out. Don't worry. Anamika is shown to have all the problems possible because the series is in that genre where you have to create that mysterious atmosphere. Yet at the base it's all family drama and relationships.

HOW CLOSE ARE OUR MOVIES, AND THE LIFE YOU HAVE LED IN THE MOVIES TO WHAT IS SHOWN IN THE FAME GAME?

I am not saying that in our private lives everything is always hunky dory. Of course there are hiccups, but that happens in everybody's life. She's trying to survive that fame which is very important to her because that's the life she has led

and that's where the mother always pushes her saying 'to be famous you always have to be in the limelight'. Honestly, I could never imagine my mom saying that to me. I am very secure with who I am, I am very comfortable in my skin. But she is not. Anamika Anand is a very insecure person.

Yes. The scene where I give Manav Kaul a piece of my mind because he's late on the set. Remember earlier we used to do two to three shifts a day, and at times wait endlessly on the sets for a costar to turn up because he would be shooting on another set. That scene with Manav reminded me of that.

ANY FAMILY PORTIONS IN THE FILM YOU RELATE TO?

If tomorrow my son wants to work in films I would be a little apprehensive, explaining to him

that he would have to work very, very hard. What can go wrong and what can go right and so forth. I'd give him the same advice I gave Amara in the series. 'You have to have focus, you have to go about it relentlessly and not care about anything else. And go through the ups and downs with a level head'.

WHEN YOU CAME FROM THE US YOU SAID YOUR KIDS WERE COMPLETELY UNAWARE OF YOUR POPULARITY AS AN ACTOR. WHEN DID THEY UNDERSTAND

THAT PART OF THE FAME GAME?

When we moved to India my sons were very young - six and eight. When we moved here there were paparazzi everywhere. They were a little confused and wondered what was happening but slowly started realising the 'fame game' as you call it. They are more comfortable now. They take it in their stride and are chilled about it.

WHAT ARE YOUR SONS' INTERESTS? WHAT DO THEY COMMENT ON WHEN

THEY WATCH YOUR MOVIES?

They don't watch my movies. My elder son, Arin, is interested in music. He's a very good musician and produces his own music. He plays the piano, the tabla, the guitar, and drums. At the same time he is interested in physics, maths and computers. Arin had high level maths and physics and also drama which is a very strange combination. He's done a few plays and he's quite good on stage. My younger son, Ryan, is more into science and

technology. He's also into music. When he watches something he can read between the lines and tell you exactly what's going on. When he saw the teaser of *The Fame Game* he said 'mom she's saying my life is so beautiful but she sounds sad'. He got the gist by watching a few seconds of the teaser.

WHAT KIND OF A MOM ARE YOU?

I'm a protective mom but not over protective. I'm not a worrier but I don't want my kids to have any bad experiences in life and want their life to be smooth.

But I think life teaches you a lot and I want them to learn from life.

The LGBTQ COMMUNITY LOVES YOU BECAUSE YOU HAVE EMPATHY FOR THEM. HOW MUCH EMPATHY IS REQUIRED AS AN ACTOR WHEN DOING A SCENE WHERE YOUR SON IN THE SERIES REVEALS THE TRUTH ABOUT HIS SEXUALITY?

For me that scene where my son Avi talks about his sexuality was so beautiful. I wanted to be sure that what was being touched upon was pure and real and exactly how it should be. Then I had such a good actor in Lakshvir Saran, who plays my son. We wanted to make sure it did not sound false even for a second. On a personal level, I think your sexuality should not define you. You should be free to love who you like. All that was in my mind when I did that scene.

CAN YOU TALK ABOUT A REAL LIFE INCIDENT WHEN A FRIEND OR SOMEONE HAS CONFIDED IN YOU ABOUT THEIR SEXUALITY OR THEIR DEMONS?

When I was in Denver there were people who talked to me about different things in their lives. Like

how hard it is hard for people to understand what they are going through. After the series was released some fans wrote to me about the mother-son scene saying they cried because that is exactly what they said to their mothers when they came out. There was someone who said she wished her mother had reacted the way Anamika did. It brought tears to my eyes.

YOU ALSO ADDRESS THE ISSUE OF BODY SHAMING BEAUTIFULLY WITH YOUR DAUGHTER AMARA IN THE SERIES.

I had faced it when I started out as an actor. People used to think I was too skinny to be a heroine because at that time the ladies were so buxom. And here I was a Maharashtrian youngster, petite and small. People used to say ‘isko mota karo’. But my mom stood by me like a rock. She used to say ‘you are what you are, you just

do your work, and the day you become famous they will forget this and say everyone should look like Madhuri'. And that's the attitude I had with Amara when she says that she doesn't feel beautiful or she hates herself. That scene shook me. After the director said 'cut' I couldn't stop crying because it really hit me. Maybe that's what I went through when people were criticising me and I felt there should be something different about me.

HAVE THERE BEEN MOMENTS AT THE PEAK OF YOUR CAREER WHERE

YOU HAVE FELT VULNERABLE LIKE ANAMIKA AND YOU HAVE BOUNCED BACK?

Sometimes your success brings that vulnerability. After *Hum Aapke Hain Koun..!* became a success, it was like, now what? This film was so successful. What else can she do now? And then *Raja* came on the heels of *Hum Aapke...* and also became a big hit. After that when *Dil To Pagal Hai* happened people stopped saying anything. Also there was a time when people said she should get married. And I would think why

should that be the end of everyone's achievement? Thankfully girls don't have to face that today.

AT ONE TIME YOU WOULD JUST HAVE ONE OR TWO PERSONS AROUND YOU BUT NOW YOU HAVE AN ARMY OF PEOPLE

Initially when we did film promotions there used to be a few film magazines and newspapers for which we did interviews. Then they used to release the trailers and some songs and that was it. But today because of social media there are so many departments.

Twitter, Instagram, YouTube, digital magazines. You need people to manage those different things.

WHAT ELSE HAS CHANGED AND HOW HAVE YOU REINVENTED YOURSELF?

One has to keep thinking forward. I want to do roles where I can sink my teeth, show my craft. When Sri Rao came to me with this subject I thought it was a very good combination of director and producers.

YOU THINK THERE WAS A STRAIN OF SMITA PATIL'S FILM

BHUMIKA IN THE SERIES, ESPECIALLY THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN YOU AND YOUR MOM SUHASINI MULAY?

You hear about overbearing mothers from different directors. There was a time when parents used to be very overbearing because the children used to be the only earners in the family. So that's what we did with the whole relationship between Suhasiniji and me. She played it so well. What I like about Anamika is that despite all that she doesn't disrespect her mother. She would even tell her off but in a very respectful tone.

WHAT'S THE BEST AND WORST PIECE OF ADVICE THAT YOU HAVE GOT?

When I wanted to do *Mrityudand* a lot of people advised me against doing it saying I was from commercial cinema and *Mrityudand* was a very artistic film. But I wanted to do it because I loved the script. It was a good woman empowerment kind of thing and the actors were brilliant - from Shabanaji to Mohan Joshi to everyone. I did it and even today people talk about *Mrityudand* when they talk about my filmography. ■

The Little Big sensation

JITESH PILLAAI HAS A CONVERSATION WITH MITHILA PALKAR, AN ACTRESS WHO HAS GROWN WITH EVERY OUTING

Good things come in small packages. Mithila Palkar started out doing skits on the internet and her natural ease stayed. She's never out of element – be it in her OTT series Little Things, Marathi films or Hindi cinema – Her big chirpy smile, her twinkling eyes make her out to be a person high on life. She has retained the ability to look at everything with a waif like curiosity. She's in love with her craft and can't think of anything else besides acting. Her zest for life is infectious and you feel like smiling along with her as she yammers nineteen-to-the-1900 about everything from Gulzar to '70s songs to Madhuri Dixit. Reproduced below are excerpts from a chat with a talented Ms Palkar...

You were the winner of the Filmfare Best Debutant Award in Marathi cinema, and Best actress at Filmfare OTT Awards. Can you describe your two Filmfare moments?

The Marathi Filmfare was my first Filmfare award. I did not expect it at all. Because that year I did not win any of the Marathi debutant awards so I didn't expect one from Filmfare. I thought I'd go, look pretty and come back. But I won. So no words to describe the feeling. And also the first

Filmfare OTT award was so, so special. Both Dhruv (Sehgal) and I won for a show that's, once again, special to us.

With so many online shows to your credit you are like the queen of OTT. What is your take on this platform?

I personally enjoy being on OTT because there is so much choice, for the audience, and as an actor. I remember I auditioned for Filter Copy's show called News Darshan for YouTube when I started out. And

Dhruv Sehgal, who happens to be the writer and my co actor in *Little Things*, auditioned me for the part. We worked together on the show and that transitioned into the two sketches that Dhruv and I did together, and that led to *Little Things*. That's my journey.

Are you as quirky and mad as your characters? (Laughs) Yes! Absolutely.

of your acting career. How did you get them to come around?

My grandfather knew I had it in me to do something in the performing arts space. But he wasn't sure of this space. So his way of protecting me was by not letting me get into it. Also I didn't have a mentor or a godfather or any reference to showbiz. I had to sit him down and tell him that even if it didn't work out, I should at least be given a chance. He reluctantly agreed but was confused. He said he knew I was acting but asked me why wasn't I on television or newspapers. That's the time I had started working with Filter Copy and everything was on YouTube and I had to explain to him that he had to see me



online. Then my 'cup song' went viral which a Marathi news channel covered. When I came home one day he said some family member of ours called him and said that I was in the news. That's when he said 'now you are famous'. We got him a smartphone and a tablet so he could google me. After that he started collecting my interviews and articles. He's my biggest fan now.

How did the cup song come about?

I knew I wanted to have fun with those beats popularised by Anna Kendrick in the song *When I'm gone* from *Pitch Perfect* (2013). So I put my singing to use with the beats during my college summer vacation and then put it online. I had no idea about the reaction. Imtiaz Ali, Vicky Kaushal and everyone started sharing the video and soon it blew out of proportion. I met Imtiaz Ali one year after the video was released and he said 'oh you're that girl who did that cup song'. That cup song is special because it put me on the map. Many people thought I was a singer, and then I got introduced as an actor, and the Marathi industry took note of me because of the

song. It opened the floodgates of opportunities for me.

How do you look back at *Little Things* now that you have done three seasons?

Little Things has been an incredible journey because I don't think there will be anything like that for me, or for anyone who has been associated with

the show. We were literally all starting out, not only as actors, but as writers, DOPs, editors. We have all grown with the show as artists and as human beings.

Did fatigue set in at any time?

I think I lack the creativity of thinking how a character can grow from

one season to the other. I just held on to Dhruv and he did everything that was to be done in the writing. What kept our characters Dhruv and Kavya exciting for the audience was they had all the uncomfortable conversations to figure out whether the relationship was working out or not.

What has been the experience of working in big films and then doing series?

I absolutely enjoy being in this space where I am not in one category and get to be everywhere. My grandfather once told me that you are becoming Jack of all trades and master of none, so better be focussed on one thing. But I think

been my idol when growing up and suddenly I was sharing screen space with her. But she made it so easy with her infectious laughter. It was the same with Irrfan sir. When shooting for *Karwaan* I would go on the sets even when not needed. I just wanted to watch these actors work.

REMEMBERING BAPPI LAHIRI

DEVESH SHARMA OFFERS A BRIEF PROFILE OF THE PROLIFIC COMPOSER AND SINGER WHO PASSED AWAY RECENTLY

(NOVEMBER 27, 1952–
FEBRUARY 15, 2022)



Veteran singer and music composer Bappi Lahiri passed away due to multiple health issues on February 15. He was 69 and breathed his last at Juhu's CritiCare Hospital in Mumbai. He had survived COVID-19 last year but had not been keeping well all this while.

Bappi, who was known as the 'Disco King' among the masses, had a penchant for wearing gold jewellery and trademark black glasses. It's said he idolised Elvis Presley, and was inspired by him to wear multiple gold chains. "I remember once a man refused to accept that I am Bappi Lahiri," he once said in an interview to *The*

Times Of India, "because I was wearing a coat to protect myself from the cold and he couldn't see my gold chain."

Bappi was said to be instrumental in making the disco genre popular in India. Some of his hit disco songs include *Mausam hai gaane ka* (*Surakshaa* 1979), *Jimmy jimmy jimmy* (*Disco Dancer*, 1982), *I am a disco dancer* (*Disco Dancer*, 1982), *Yaar bina chain kahan re* (*Saaheb*, 1985), *Zoobi zoobi* (*Dance Dance*, 1987), *Tamma tamma loge* (*Thanedaar*, 1990) and many more.

He had been making music since 1971, both as a singer and a composer. One can say that he has

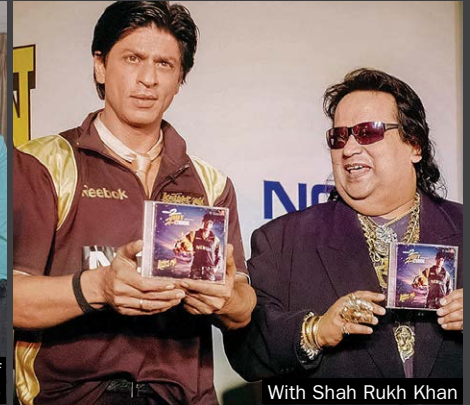
been active since the days of Dilip Kumar, Dev Anand and Raj Kapoor to the era of Ranbir Kapoor, Ranveer Singh and Varun Dhawan. In between, his songs had been pictured on the likes of Amitabh Bachchan, Jitendra, Rishi Kapoor, Mithun Chakraborty to Govinda, Anil Kapoor, Jackie Shroff, Sanjay Dutt and even Aamir Khan.

He had also sung playback for a whole gamut of stars as well. As a composer, Bappi was fortunate to have worked with luminaries like Lata Mangeshkar, who treated him like a son, Mohammed Rafi, Asha Bhosle, Kishore Kumar, Manna Dey in Hindi films and P Susheela, Yesudas, SP Balasubramaniam, S Janaki in South Indian movies.

Bappi *da*, as he was popularly known in the film industry, was born as Alokesh Lahiri on November 27, 1952 in Kolkata. Bappi's father Apresh Lahiri and mother Bansari Lahiri were great exponents of classical music and Shayama Sangeet. Bappi was a child prodigy who could play multiple instruments

like tabla, dholak, drums, guitar, piano and even saxophone effortlessly. He started learning music at the age of three and composed his first song at the age of eleven. It's said that his father made him learn tabla with maestro Samta Prasad at the recommendation of Lata Mangeshkar. When he turned 19 in 1971, he came to Mumbai to try his luck in the Hindi film

music scene. He received his first opportunity in a Bengali film, *Daadu* (1972) and the first Hindi film for which he composed music was *Nanha Shikari* (1973). The film which established him in Bollywood was Tahir Husain's Hindi film, *Zakhmee* (1975), for which he composed music and doubled as a playback singer. Bappi completed 50 years in Bollywood and

is said to have 625 films to his credit jointly as a composer and a singer. He also marked his presence in Hollywood, what with his songs being used in films like *Lion*, *You Don't Mess With The Zohan*, *Moana*, *Will To Live* and *Witness to Murder*. The young generation took to his music in a big way, thanks to remixes like *Tamma tamma* again from

Badrinath Ki Dulhania and *Ooh la la* from *The Dirty Picture*.

Bappi was accused of plagiarism all his life and in his interviews defended it saying every musician and composer took inspiration from somewhere else. Ironically, Bappi Lahiri sued musician Dr Dre for copying his track *Kaliyon ka chaman* from *Jyoti* (1981) for the song *Addictive* from the album *Truth Hurts*, and won the copyright case. Incidentally, it's said that the song *Chidiya chon chon*, sung by Kishore Kumar from the same is based on *Marianne* by famous calypso singer and composer Roaring Lion.

In Bengali cinema he's known for the music he

composed for Prosenjit starrers. It started with *Amar Sangi* (1987) whose song *Chirodini Tumi je aamar*, sung by Kishore Kumar and Asha Bhosle, became a love anthem of sorts and is still hugely popular today. Prosenjit posted a video where he sang a few lines of the song in Bappi's honour, after his death. His Bengali hits include *Ogo Bodhu*

Shundori (1981), *Guru Dakshina* (1987), *Asha O Bhalobasha* (1989), *Bolidaan* (1990), *Tomar Naam Likhe Debo* (1992) and many more.

Besides Hindi and Bengali, Bappi had a flourishing career in the Telugu industry as well. His Telugu compositions were mostly picturised on Chiranjeevi and Mohan Babu. Bappi has given

music for hit Telugu movies like *Simhasanam* (1986), *Thene Manasulu* (1986), *State Rowdy* (1989), *Rowdy Gaari Pellam* (1991), *Gang Leader* (1991), *Rowdy Alludu* (1991), *Rowdy Inspector* (1992), *Brahma*, *Big Boss* and many more. He also composed music for some Kannada films like *Africadalli Sheela* (1986), *Krishna Nee Begane Baro* (1986) and *Police Mattu Dada* (1991). He had a brief foray into Tamil films as well, composing songs for films like *Apoorva Sahodarigal* (1983) and *Paadum Vanampaadi* (1985).

Bappi won the Filmfare Award for *Sharaabi* (1984) and was later awarded with the Filmfare Lifetime Achievement Award in 2018. He had won the

Golden Lotus Award – Best film at the National Awards, for producing the film *Lal Darja* (1997), directed by Buddhadev Dasgupta. He was also the recipient of Sangeet Samrat Award, and several Silver Jubilee and Golden Jubilee trophies for the films like *Namak Halaal*, *Disco Dancer*, *Sharaabi*, *Himmatwala*, *Toofan*, *Thanedaar*, *Chalte Chalte* and many more. He entered the Limca Book of World Records for recording over 180 songs for 33 films in 1986.

Besides his illustrious film career, he has also done commendable private work. He has collaborated with international artistes like Samantha Fox, Boy

George, Snoop Dogg, MC Hammer, Akon and more. He also composed songs on Bharat Ratna Shri. Atal Bihari Vajpayee and Bharat Ratna Dr. Ambedkar. His short film *Slum Stars* won the Best Short Film award at the International Film and Entertainment Festival Australia (IFEFA).

The composer was popular in the TV circuit for judging the singing reality show, *Sa Re Ga Ma Pa*. In 2006, he judged *Sa Re Ga Ma Pa* alongside Alka Yagnik and Abhijeet. In 2007, he appeared as a judge on *Sa Re Ga Ma Pa Challenge*. Apart from that, he was seen making guest

appearances in several other talent shows as well. In 2020, *Indian Idol* paid a tribute to Bappi *da* for the completion of 50 years in the industry.

He's survived by his

wife Chitrani, daughter Rema, son Bappa and two grandsons. Bappi is no longer there with us in flesh but will forever remain with us through his songs and films...

PERFECT PARTNERSHIPS

DEVESH SHARMA EXPLORES **BAPPI LAHIRI'S** COLLABORATIONS WITH SINGERS SUCH AS KISHORE KUMAR, LATA MANGESHKAR, ASHA BHOSLE AND YESUDAS

Bappi Lahiri formed formidable partnerships with different singers. He was related to legendary Kishore Kumar, who was his maternal uncle. In fact, Bappi *da* made his acting debut in Kishore's *Badhti Ka Naam Dadhi* (1974). Bappi played a character called Bhopu in the madcap comedy. It's said Kishore Kumar's last song, *Guru guru*, was recorded by Bappi just a day before Kishore died. Bappi was reportedly hugely upset by his uncle's death and even thought of quitting films. However, better sense prevailed and he went back to composing. Bappi benefited a lot from Kishore's versatility, especially when it came to rendering the numbers of South remakes like *Himmatwala* (1983), *Maqsad* (1984), *Bewafai*

(1985) and many more. *Sharaabi* (1984) remains their most talked about album, where Kishore sang a *ghazal* like *Intehan ho gayi intezaar ki* on one hand a comedy song like *Jahan char yaar* on the other.

Lata Mangeshkar knew him since he was two. He used to call her Ma and was devastated when she passed away some days before him. She supported him throughout his career and in fact sang in his first Bengali film *Daadu* (1974). Lata Mangeshkar is often called the queen of melody and perhaps keeping that sobriquet in mind, Bappi Lahiri composed many soft, lilting melodies for her in films like *Zakhmee* (1975), *Chalte Chalte* (1976), *Aangan Ki Kali* (1979) and many, many more.

Bappi is often called the King of Disco and one singer who helped him reach that lofty status was Asha Bhosle. He gave her many disco numbers in films like *Namak Halaal*

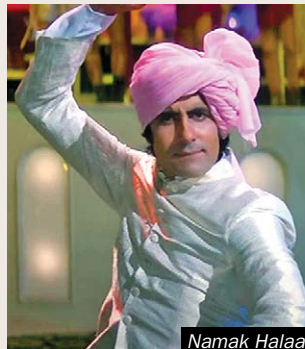

(1982), *Haathkadi* (1982) but didn't just limit her to disco songs or item numbers. He gave her a *ghazal* as well in *Aitbaar* (1985). Bappi loved to use Asha for his solo songs and it's her punchy numbers always stood apart from the context of the film and have remained popular till now.

Thanks to being associated with disco, people kind of forget that Bappi was classically trained. One singer who pushed him to compose *raag*-based tunes was Yesudas. The South maestro is known for

his intricate *murkis* and *harkats* even while singing a simple song and the duo came up with some catchy earworms in films like *Toote Khilone*, *Haisiyat*, *Ek Baar Kaho* and many more. Listening to his songs with Yesudas provides us with another side of Bappi, one which was more in sync with SD Burman than RD Burman, the man he was unfortunately always compared with. Bappi perhaps was the connection between the old and the new, and through remixes and covers, continues to gather new fans even today. ■

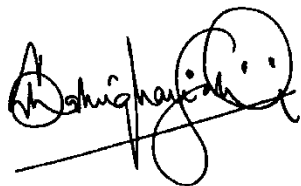

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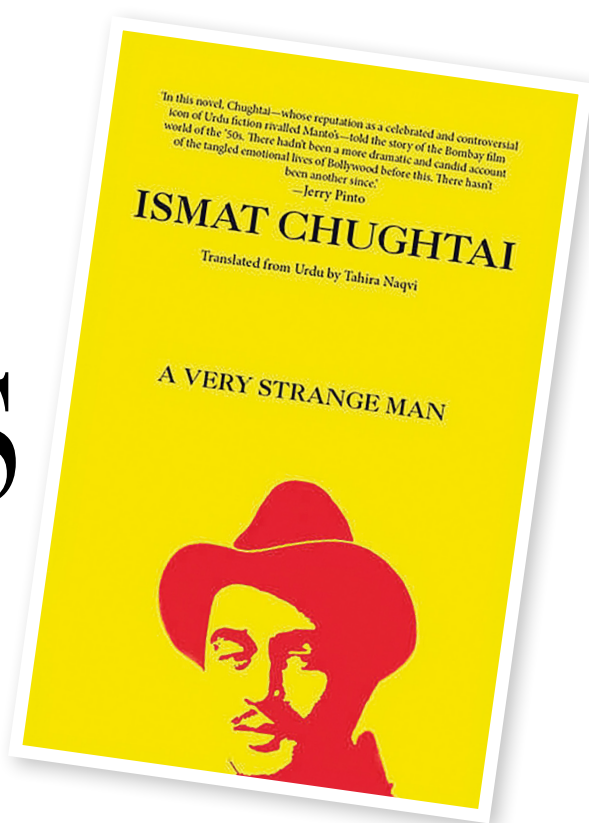
LOVE & OTHER THIRSTS

On a second rereading of Ismat Chughtai's *A Very Strange Man* on the turbulent life and times of Guru Dutt, I'm inclined to believe the book is as much as an exposition of dark human also has a misogynistic streak. So Guru Dutt is Dharam Dev, Waheeda Rehman is Zarina Jamal, Geeta Dutt is Mangala. One of Dharam Dev's close confidants keeps referring to Jamila in a derogatory manner, even Mangala is shown as conniving and foul mouthed despite being vulnerable. Make no mistake it's a very readable book and Tahira Naqvi who's translated it from Urdu to English has done a commendable job. But certain transliterations jar a lot. The similar problem I had with Naqvi's english rendering of Chughtai's *Masooma*.

How much can a man and woman fall to the boondocks in

love? Through a haze of alcohol and other addictive substances, besides numbing the brains it also shatters their spirit. Chughtai says those involved in the story couldn't pick up the pieces and heal because their souls had become "shards of glass". Guru Dutt is shown as wilful, mercurial person not able to handle either genius or his excesses and yes a man madly in love. In our extreme deification of Dutt, we must realise the ones who have been vilified and wronged are Waheeda Rehman and Geeta Dutt.

Mangala in the book falls prey to many substances and her dalliance with a young man Farid who once called her "aunty" makes you wince. It also appears to me that those who swore by Dutt and other loyalists have provided fodder for this novel which was first released in 1970.



Chughtai's writing is sharp and trenchant. Her observation of the industry is probably fuelled by her own experiences that she saw. Her husband Shaheed Latif who was the allegedly the ghost director on *Baharen Phir Bhi Aayengi* was at the receiving end of Dutt's temper too.

It's by all accounts a very readable and gossipy tale of heartbreak. Minus empathy. A sneaking feeling that a radical novelist who empowered generations of women could have shown more sensitivity while etching out the tragedy of Geeta or how unfair history has been to Waheeda ji. Life in tinsel town is inexorably

sad. Some will always be more sinned against than sinning.

They say memory changes with every retelling. And that's perhaps true of this book as well. It'll make you believe that the gods and giants of tinseltown were all too human and were as prone to frailties as you and me.

In retrospect, that isn't a bad thing at all. Guru Dutt in his films showed we're not heroes or villains but mere clay in the hands of time, constantly being moulded. He would perhaps approve of the different interpretations of his persona...

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
